Picnic Near Record Success Despite Rain On Saturday Evening

BIG CROWDS ATTEND EVENT SUNDAY; PARADE, AMATEUR SHOW WINNERS NAMED

Although rain halted most of the activity Saturday evening, fine weather Sunday helped make the annual Firemen-Legion picnic among the most successful held in recent years. The park was jammed with people throughout the afternoon and evening and even during the supper hour there was little let up in the crowd because of entertainment goilg on. steady Many said it was the largest crowd they have ever seen in the park and the evening attendance was especially large.

Financially, too, the event was a grand success. Without the rain Saturday night the picnic would have easily surpassed all previous records. Over \$45 pounds of hamburger, almost half a ton, were consumed, more than 2,000 ice cream bars were sold, to say nothing about the bratwurst, beer, popcorn and other refreshments consumed.

The rain started just about the time the picnic was to get underway Saturday evening and not many persons came to the park, although the refreshment stands, protected from the rain, did a fair business. The amateur show was called off until 5 p. m. Sunday but Les Schneider's orchestra played through out Saturday evening for the entertainment of those hardy ones

who stayed despite the rain. Sunday's parade at 12:30 p. m. was one of the best ever seen here. It was a very long one with snappy marching units, fine musical organizations, numerous floats, dozens and dozens of children's specialties, comedy entries, lots of horses, visiting firemen and Legion units and numerous other entries.
