### Fire Destroys Barn, **Farm Machinery on Elroy Egerer Farm**

DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT OVER \$40,000 IN BLAZE NEAR BEECHWOOD WEDNESDAY

Fire leveled a large barn and destroyed thousands of dollars of farm machinery last Wednesday afternoon on the Elroy Egerer farm, about 21/2 miles southwest of Beechwood. The loss was estimated at over \$40,000. The Egerers also own properties in Kewaskum.

Barely two hours after the blaze was reported by the Egerer's 12year-old son, Joseph, the barn and an adjoining 30 by 48 foot storage building were in smouldering ruins. The loss included over 100 tons of recently mown hay and a variety of equipment, including a cornpicker, chopper, blower, swather and hammermill, stored in the 40 by 100 foot barn. All the livestock was saved.

The Egerer boy discovered the fire when he entered the barn about 3:30 p. m. He sounded the alarm and then battled his way through dense smoke to lead his 4-H calf to safety. His father and a neighbor, Byron Gessner, managed to save five Holstein cows and a bull before the intense heat drove them back. Sixty-one other head of cattle were in pasture at the time.

More than \$0 firemen from Boltonville, Beechwood and Batavia fought the fire for more than three hours during a light rainfall but the blaze had spread so rapidly that by the time they arrived it was impossible to save the barn. Egerers' two-story frame farmhouse, less than 100 feet east of the barn, was not damaged.

But the barn, adjoining structure and most of the farm machinery inside was a total loss. Egerer said most of the loss was covered by insurance. Origin of the fire was not determined.


