
A new addition was built on the, east side of the Ours Dry Cleaners building to house the laundry. which has 10 Easy Spin washers and four Huebsch dryers. Each washer has a capacity of approxi-

mately 10 pounds of clothes and each dryer holds one to three loads or up to 30 pounds of clothing at a time. The price for laundering is 20 cents per load of wash and 10 cents for drying for 10 minutes.

The laundry also contains detergent and bleach dispensers and a coin changer for your convenience. A soft drink dispenser will be added soon.
