LOCAL MAN HURT IN OZAUKEE CO. MISHAP

Thirty-one stitches were required to close the cut on Oliver Eichstedt's chin when the Kewaskum resident was injured in a traffic mishap in Ozaukee county last Thursday night. Authorities said that Eichstedt lost control of his car on Hwy. 141 and it left the road, rolling over. He was removed to a Port Washington hospital. Eichstedt also sustained a leg injury.

Two children were hurt at 1:30 p. m. Saturday in a two-car collision on a Forest Lake road, a private route near County Trunk GGG in the town of Auburn. They are Mary Fischer, 6, of West Allis, a bruised nose, and her brother, Robert, 3, injured mouth. A car driven by their father, Ignatius, 48, and another operated by Osborne Lysne, 53, of Shorewood, collided on a curve on the narrow road. Four other passengers in the Fischer auto were uninjured.

FIREMEN RECEIVE CALL AFTER FRIDAY'S STORM

The fire department was called out late Friday afternoon following the violent wind and thunderstorm. The top of a tree broke off in the storm and fell across live wires on a side road about 100 feet north of Hwy. 28 near the Spring school. A passerby saw the sparks fly and called firemen, who notified the electric company and stood by until workers arrived at the scene to clear the branches from the wires.

Surrounding Areas Hit By Severe Storms; Village Escapes Worst

MANY TREES UPROOTED,
BUILDINGS DAMAGED,
POWER DISRUPTED,
FIRES CAUSED

Severe electrical, wind and rain storms hit surrounding areas late Friday and Monday afternoons causing considerable damage but Kewaskum escaped the brunt of the storms, with little if any damage reported.

Hit hardest in the storms were the areas of West Bend, Barton, Campbellsport, Theresa and Lomira, where hundreds of trees were uprooted and broken, cars were damaged, electrical and telephone lines fell, lightning struck, fires were caused and buildings were damaged.

In Friday afternoon's storm the Theresa and Lomira area was hit very hard. Farm crops in the territory suffered heavy loss with many corn fields stripped of their foliage by the battering from torrential rains, 60-mile-an-hour winds and hail.

Theresa was literally covered with trees, trunks and branches. Windows were shattered by the force of the wind, electricity was cut off and phone service disrupted. Small fires broke out all over Theresa as the wires came down and more than 100 trees littered the highway between Mayville and Theresa. A wire fell across a car parked by Miss Lenarda Weninger of Theresa and caused it to catch fire.

The Baker Canning company there lost a smokestack, the silo at the farm of William Engmann was blown down and the Knowles Produce Co. elevator was destroyed. Farms of James Dobbe and Reuben Pribnow received the brunt of the storm. Both their barns were de-roofed and the Dobbe woodshed was crushed by a falling tree. A large hay wagon was flipped over on its back and the roof of the Dobbe house put a hole in the chicken house.

Lomira was hit almost as hard with hundreds of trees in the area blown down, including a large one in front of St. Paul's Ev. Lutheran church. Sidewalks were torn up and residents of that village said they received no warning before the storm struck.

Friday's storm was also quite severe in the West Bend area, where trees were broken, cars damaged, electrical and telephone lines fell and other damage resulted. Extremely heavy rainfall accompanied the storm, which reached gale proportions. Lightning struck the Geo. Petri residence in that city.

Monday afternoon's heavy rain and thunderstorm was most severe in the Campbellsport area, where the elements went on a rampage. The electrical storm struck farm and village buildings causing fires and also killing several head of cattle. A total of 2.5 inches of rain fell.

A bolt of lightning struck a tree on the Robert Schnitzler farm three miles south of Campbellsport then bounced from there to the granary. The blaze leveled the granary building, which included a tool shed

Arthur Klukas, 58, Passes On Saturday

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, after 2 p. m. Monday. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, July 26, at St. Lucas Lutheran church, the Rev. Donald Bitter officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

Monday's thunderstorm, accompanied by hail, tore down trees, branches and power lines in the West Bend-Barton area and blacked out the southern section of West Bend.

Thunderstorms again hit the Kewaskum area early Tuesday evening and late Wednesday night. But they were not as severe and did not last as long as those on Friday and Monday, although heavy rain fell. This made a total of four storms in six days.

Ours Self-Service Laundry Now Open

Ours coin operated self-service laundry, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ours, on Hwy. 28 near the bridge on Main st., now is open for business. The laundry, which is unattended, is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

A new addition was built on the east side of the Ours Dry Cleaners building to house the laundry, which has 10 Easy Spin washers and four Huebsch dryers. Each washer has a capacity of approximately 10 pounds of clothes and each dryer holds one to three loads or up to 30 pounds of clothing at a time. The price for laundering is 20 cents per load of wash and 10 cents for drying for 10 minutes.

The laundry also contains detergent and bleach dispensers and a coin changer for your convenience. A soft drink dispenser will be added soon.

Ours laundry was planned, engineered and equipped by the Arrow Engineering Service, Inc. of Milwaukee. The public is invited to visit the plant and look around.

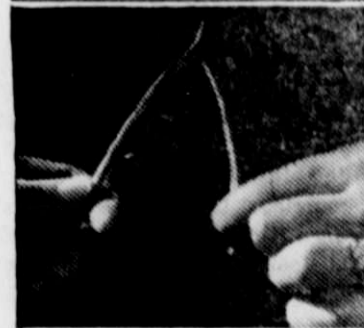

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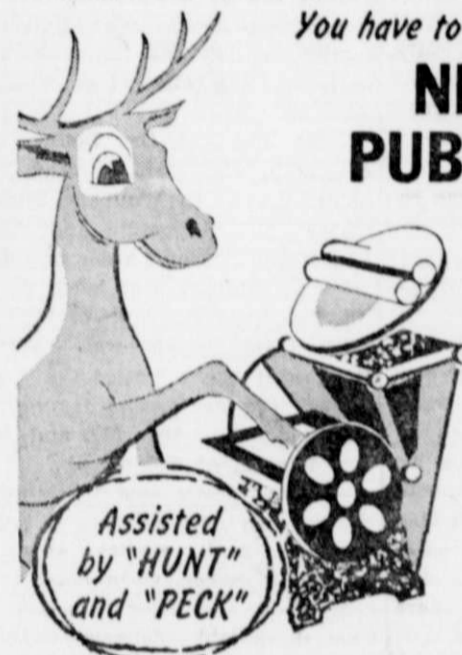

A Picnic? It's In The Bag!

A "spur of the moment" picnic is often described as a "had the best time" type. A late "let's cook out tonight" from the man of the house, or a "why don't we go on a picnic, mom?" from the children, need cause no panic. Decide the family picnic favorites that can be packed in a hurry and the meal is practically in the bag! What to take? that's the next question. Hamburgers?—yes, pull the ground beef patties from the freezer, allowing two for each picnicker.

Hamburgers with Variety

Hamburgers can lend endless variety to meals. Although their cooking at picnics is usually limited to broiling or panbroiling. Seasonings and sauces can add a "different" touch. As a basic recipe, add 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper to each pound of ground beef. Onion, garlic or celery salt may be substituted for 1/2 of the salt, if desired. An eighth teaspoon thyme, marjoram, basil or oregano may be used in place of the pepper. Chopped onion, olives or celery may be combined with the meat. The hamburgers may be shaped around a cube of cheese, a pickle slice or a stuffed or pitted ripe olive. Sauces including a mixture of catsup, prepared mustard and Worcestershire sauce

or soy sauce, sugar and ginger may be brushed on the hamburgers as they cook to provide a barbecued or an oriental flavor.

To Complete the Menu

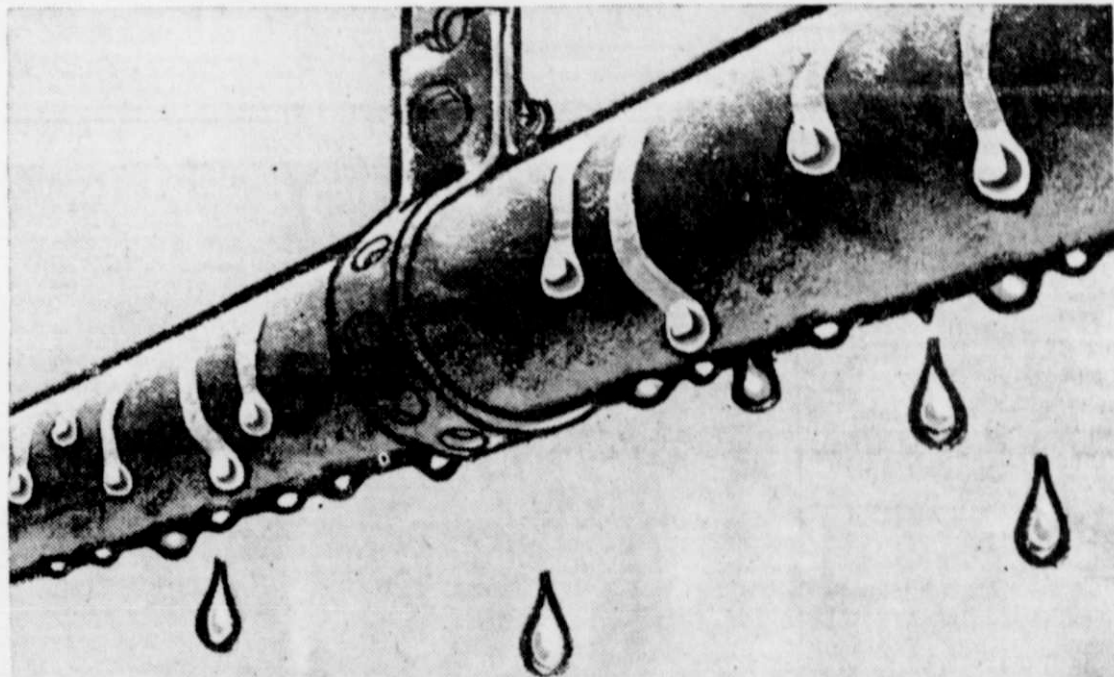
Hamburger buns, potato salad, onions, tomatoes, mustard, catsup, pie or other dessert and beverage complete the menu.

Send one of the children to the nearest market for the buns, canned potatoes or potato salad, and a pie or other dessert. Hard-cook enough eggs to top the potato salad. Put coffee, cold milk, or other beverage in the thermos container.

Packing the Lunch

Make the packing easy—carry all the food in paper bags. Wrap the patties, sliced tomatoes and onions in aluminum foil. Put the potato salad in containers and pack with the hamburgers. Pack mustard, catsup, containers of salt, pepper and sugar and cream (if desired for coffee) in a second bag. Pies, cookies or doughnuts or fruit can be slipped in a third bag. The last bag can carry the picnic plates, cups, napkins, forks, a paring knife and can opener. Someone can carry the beverage container.

Dad's home—is the charcoal in the car? It's time to go.

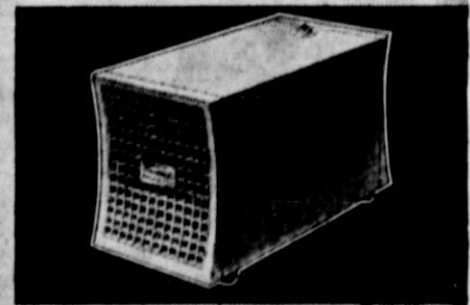

Local Neighbor Cancer Crusade Gets Underway
