Fred Seefeldt Attends National GOP Convention in Chicago

Appointed Honorary Sergeant-at-Arms By National Chairman

Fredric Seefeldt of Kewaskum attended the National Republican convention held last week at the International Amphitheatre, Chicago. Seefeldt was appointed honorary assistant sergeant-at-arms of the 1960 convention by Thurston B. Morton, chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Upon his arrival in Chicago, Fred was caught in the depot demonstration for Philip G. Kuehn, Republican candidate for governor of Wisconsin, who came in on the same train. A motorcade then took all the Wisconsinites to the Executive House, the Wisconsin delegation headquarters. Fred, Kuehn sign in hand, also rode in the huge hour-long Young Republican parade down Michigan Avenue.

Sunday night at the Young Republican reception for GOP leaders, Fred had the opportunity to meet the Honorable William G. Stratton, governor of Illinois.

Young Seefeldt had a first-hand look at President Eisenhower as the President's motorcade came down Michigan ave. Tuesday noon.

Other activities Fred took in included the ball given by Governor Rockefeller and the New York Republicans. The music was furnished by the Glenn Miller orchestra. At the Forum of the Nationalities Division of the National Republican committee, Fred again heard the famed GOP keynoter, Congressman Judd, speak.

The Honorable Barry Goldwater, senator from Arizona, was another of the GOP notables that Fred met at the convention.

Fred visited the various campaign headquarters and amassed a sizable collection of buttons in addition to the bronze convention badge and certificate of appointment which he prizes most.

Fred reported that the convention was conducted in an exceptionally orderly and efficient manner. He said, "while TV brings more details to the viewer's attention, nothing can duplicate actual participation in the acclamations and demonstrations for the speakers."

We believe that Fred is only the second person from Kewaskum ever to attend a national political convention, the first being the late Dr. N. E. Hausmann, who was delegate to a Republican convention. Congratulations to Fred on his accomplishment, a good start for a young fellow, only 22.

CARS COLLIDE ON FOND DU LAC AVE.

Kewaskum Firemen Win \$56 at Badger Tourney

Kewaskum firemen brought home \$56 in prize money (most of it anyway) from the annual tournament of the Badger Firemen's association which was held at Random Lake Saturday and Sunday, July 30 and 31.

Local firemen won \$44 in the contests Saturday evening, which included the four-man hose layout demonstration, relay bucket and ladder climbing competition and relay coupling race. A delegation of 15 firemen participated in the parade Sunday and won \$12.

Top money winner was the Newburg department, which amassed \$95, including a first in the parade with 39 men participating. West Bend won \$75, including first place in the four-man layout for the fifth successive year.

SPARKS AT NATIONAL BOY SCOUT JAMBOREE

James Sparks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sparks of Kewaskum, was one of 11 Washington county scouts who attended the National Boy Scout Jamboree held in Colorado Springs, Colo. last week. Others were from West Bend, Barton, Richfield and Slinger.

The setting for the jamboree was outside the city limits of Colorado Springs, beneath famous Pike's Peak and Will Rogers shrine. Two thousand acres of ranch land were donated for this spectacular event attended by a total of 55,000 scouts. About 25,000 tents sprung up in the area in addition to the 2,000 erected to house officials. Scouts were present from every state and 36 foreign countries.

Former Resident Here, Warren Bowser Killed By Auto in Sheboygan

A former Kewaskum resident, who moved to Sheboygan recently from West Bend, was killed in an auto accident in that city early Tuesday morning. He was Warren H. Bowser, 35, who died instantly of injuries he suffered when he was struck by a car while changing a tire on his own auto shortly before 2 a. m. Two other persons were injured in the accident.

Bowser was brought up in Kewaskum by foster parents, Mrs. Selma Naumann and the late Al Naumann, and received his education in this village.

According to Sheboygan authorities, Bowser was driving east on Kohler Memorial dr. in that city when the left rear tire on his car went flat. He pulled off the highway and onto the shoulder to change the flat but found that his lug wrench did not fit. Leaving his wife, Lucille, and 5-month old daughter, Linda, in the car, Bowser started to walk to a filling station to pick up a proper sized wrench.

On his way to the station Bowser was picked up by a passing motorist, Patrick McMurray, 20, of Sheboygan. After obtaining the wrench, the two drove back to the scene. McMurray pulled in front of Bowser's car and parked off the road. The two men then began to change the tire.

As McMurray loosened the last bolt, Bowser began to jack up the car. At that moment, a car driven by Gerald D. Kiesner, 33, R. 2, Campbellsport, slammed into the rear of the Bowser vehicle.

Bowser, whose car lights were burning, was killed instantly. Kiesner, taken to Memorial hospital in Sheboygan, suffered a head cut and bruised chest. McMurray sustained a badly shattered right collar bone and leg abrasions. He was reported in good condition at St. Nicholas hospital Tuesday. Mrs. Bowser and the baby were not injured.

Sheboygan county coroner, Dr. Reed Simpson, said Bowser suffered a fractured skull, fractured neck, fractured left arm and multiple injuries. He said no inquest is planned. Police said they planned to continue the investigation and hoped to question McMurray and Kiesner as soon as possible.

Bowser's body was taken to the Schmidt Funeral home in West Bend. Funeral services will be held there at 2:30 p. m. Friday, Aug. 5, with the Rev. R. W. Groth officiating. Burial will take place in Washington County Memorial park. The body was in state after 2 p. m. Thursday.

Bowser was born at Butler, Pa. on Dec. 12, 1924 and came to West Bend at the age of five. He made his home in Kewaskum with the Naumanns and attended the Kewaskum grade school and high school. Following graduation from high school, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy in World War II. Following his discharge, he learned the draftsman's trade, which he followed for some time. At present he was employed as a tree surgeon.

Dance Ordinance Amended By Board

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION TO MEILAHNS FOR LAND DONATION PASSED

Regular Meeting, July 6, 1960.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee Merwin.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by C. Wietor and duly carried.

F. N. Bohn appeared and inquired as to the procedure to be followed in securing a permit to move a house out of the village. Also the location of the proposed future street just to the south of the south village limits.

The Aring Equipment Company of Milwaukee presented a proposal on a new Michigan front-end loader. The proposal was tabled.

The following resolution, introduced by the Administrative Committee, was adopted upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by W. Tessar, and upon roll call vote unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 60-2

WHEREAS, WALTER MEILAHN AND ADA MEILAHN have generously and graciously given to the Village of Kewaskum a parcel of land which shall be used for a parkway for all the people of Kewaskum.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum that the people of the village are deeply indebted to the kind and gracious act of Walter Meilahn and Ada Meilahn;

That the people of Kewaskum hereby publicly recognize the exceptional community spirit and pride demonstrated by such gift; That this resolution be made a permanent part of the records of the Village of Kewaskum;

That a copy hereof be published in the Kewaskum Statesman and a copy hereof be presented to Walter Meilahn and Ada Meilahn.

The board decided to reimburse the Red Cross for the traveling expenses of the swimming instruc-

tors at the rate of \$7.00 per week upon motion by W. Tessar, seconded by C. Wietor and duly carried. The application of Walter Buss for an operator's license was approved upon motion by J. Geidel, seconded by C. Wietor and duly carried and the commissioner was instructed to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

A petition objection to truck parking at the intersection of Main Street and River View Drive and signed by residents of that area was presented to the board for consideration.

The following ordinance was introduced by the administration committee and is patterned after a similar ordinance recently adopted by Washington County.

ORDINANCE NO. 60-2

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

CHAPTER 11.11 of the Village Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

11.11 DANCE PERMIT

1. License Required:

No person shall hold or conduct any dance to which the general public is admitted without having obtained a license therefor as herein provided. Five days prior to the holding or conducting of such dance in which the public is admitted, application for such license shall be made to the village commissioner in writing and shall state the name of the person or persons desiring to hold or conduct such dance and the location of the place where such dance is to be held, and the day upon which the same is to be held, and shall be accompanied by the requisite fee. The license fee for each dance shall be Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00). Such license when issued shall entitle

such person or persons named to hold or conduct such dance at the place and on the day therein stated and until one o'clock A. M. the succeeding day. In the event that after issuance of such a license the proposed dance does not take place, the person or persons for whom it has been issued will be given a credit toward a future dance permit.

2. Dance Supervision:

It shall be the duty of the police department to provide a dance supervisor to be present and to supervise the conduct of any dance within the village and to enforce all laws and regulations and ordinances. The dance supervisor shall be paid at the rate prescribed by the Village Board.

3. Exceptions:

The provisions of this ordinance shall not extend to any dance where the general public is not admitted and no admission fee is charged nor to private gatherings wherever held.

4. Penalty:

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance and upon such finding made shall pay a fine to the Village of Kewaskum of not less than \$25.00 nor more

than \$100.00 together with the costs thereof and in default of payment of said fine and costs shall be imprisoned in the County Jail not more than six months unless sooner discharged by due process of law.

5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication. Trustee Tessar moved for and Trustee Degner seconded adoption of Ordinance No. 60-2.

County Has 1,850 Farms Census of Agriculture Shows

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Washington county last fall, counted 1,850 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 218,120 acres. The average size of farm was 117.9 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$26,986.

Of the county's farm operators, 1,178 owned their farms, 454 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 211 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 49.6 years. There were 238 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 1,850 farms in the county, 1,530 were commercial farms.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954. Copies of the county report may be obtained for 10 cents each from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.
