Public Schools to Open Sept. 6 With Record Enrollment of Almost 800 Students Expected

110 Freshmen Registered, 34 Teachers Hired

3 ADDITIONAL TEACHERS WILL JOIN STAFF, OTHER REPLACEMENTS ADDED

The Kewaskum Public schools will open on Tuesday, Sept. 6, at 9:00 o'clock, with a record enrollment expected. The grade and high school cafeterias will begin operating on Wednesday, Sept. 9, the second day of school. Lunches for the remaining three days of the first week of school will be 75c and must be ordered and paid for on Tuesday, the first day of school.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance throughout the year. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance.

Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten and who have not registered for them are asked to do so at the grade school office on or before Aug. 31. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed which session children will be assigned to attend.

The kindergarten and grades one and two will be housed in the new elementary school building. All others, grades three through eight and special education, will be housed in the upper grades building, formerly the old high school. This year there will be two sections of grade one, two sections of grade two, one section composed of third and fourth grade pupils, one third grade, one fourth grade, and one each for grades above four.

There was a total enrollment of 276 in the elementary school during the past year and indications are that it will be larger during the 1960-1961 year. The elementary staff for the year is as follows:

Mr. Zarling, serving as principal of the elementary school, will teach eighth grade classes during a part of each day and for the balance of the time will attend to the administrative and supervisory duties of the school. Mr. Larsen will teach eighth grade classes for a part of each day and will have charge of the physical education program for

Competing in a seven placings system, Seefeldts' prizes were as follows: Blue ribbons—chunk honey (nine competitors); and most attractive display of beeswax. Red ribbons to Wis. No. 1 white comb honey (twelve competitors) and cakes of beeswax. White ribbons to Wis. No. 1 white honey (fourteen competitors) and dark honey. Fourth placings went to golden and granulated honey.

100th Anniversary of St. John's at New Fane Is Celebrated Sunday

St. John's Lutheran church of New Fane celebrated its 100th anniversary with three centennial services of thanksgiving on Sunday, Aug. 21.

The Rev. C. H. Gutekunst of Waterloo, Iowa preached in the morning service at 9:00 a. m., the Rev. E. J. Zanow of New Holstein in the afternoon service at 3:00 p. m., and the Rev. C. C. Gutekunst of Monticello, Iowa in the vesper service at 8:00 p. m. Rev. C. C. is a son of the late Rev. C. J. Gutekunst, former pastor of the parish and Rev. C. H. Gutekunst is his grandson.

The Rev. Arthur A. Haupt, pastor of St. John's, was the liturgist for all three of the services.

Dinner was served by reservation to all parishioners, past and present, in the Kewaskum High school gym at noon.

The church was built in 1870 of native boulders which members of the parish hauled themselves from the local area and they also donated their labor in the construction of the church. The land on which the church stands was donated by the late Henry Heberer. A parsonage of stone was also built later.

Pastors throughout the 100 years of the parish's existence were as follows: Revs. P. Dicke, Theodore Krumseig, A. C. Brosberger, G. F. Schilling, Theodore Brauer, C. J. Gutekunst, Elmer J. Zanow and the present pastor Rev. Haupt.

The original charter members were the late August Oppermann, Christian Bilgo, Henry Heberer, William Backhaus, Carl Bleck, Lubach, Frederick Schultz and August Heise.

The congregation interested in education opened a Christian Day School in 1866. During that time school was in session only four or five months a year and three or four days a week. It was served by men teachers and pastors. German was spoken exclusively.

In 1912 the first lady teacher was employed, Miss Lena Wichmann. Lady teachers were engaged then until 1940. That year the congregation voted to close the school. In 1921 a new school was erected. The interior was remodeled and in 1958 school was reopened after being closed for 18 years. William Osius of Plymouth is the present teacher.

In 1937 the congregation decided to raze the stone parsonage and replace it with a modern frame structure.

The present church board consists of Chairman Rueben Benicke; financial secretary, Fred Meyer; treasurer, Elroy Gatzke; secretary, Eugene Bohn; elders, William Kempf, Harold Krueger and Fred Meyer; trustees, Leonard Schultz, Ray Reysen and Elroy Gatzke. The school board members are Henry Oppermann, Melvin Butzke and Martin Haack.

Funeral services were held Monday, Aug. 22, for Mrs. Edward F. Miller, 83, nee Margaret Mueller, of 1409 Chestnut st., West Bend, a former resident of Kewaskum most of her life, who died at 2:30 a. m. Thursday, Aug. 18, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend following an illness of several weeks with the infirmities of advanced age. Mrs. Miller, one of the originators of Miller's furniture and funeral business in the village, passed on to her eternal reward during the 50th anniversary year of the firm.

She was born May 6, 1877 in the town of Addison, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Egidius Mueller. Her marriage to Edward F. Miller took place April 13, 1903, at St. Matthew's church, Campbellsport, Mrs. Miller and her late husband, who predeceased her on Jan. 8, 1943, formerly conducted the furniture and funeral business, known as Miller's, now being operated by Mr. and Mrs. Edw. E. Miller and family, assisted by Joseph M. Miller. For the past 15 years she had made her home with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Mehring, and family at West Bend, who were formerly of Port Washington.

Six children were born to the couple, five of whom survive. They are Sister Mary Aquin, O. S. F., of Cardinal Stritch college, Milwaukee; Fred of Apple Valley, Calif.; Mrs. Mehring, Edward E. "Pat" and Joseph M., both of Kewaskum. She also leaves 16 grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, three daughters-in-law, one son-in-law, two sisters, Sister Mary Cyrilla, O. S. F., of St. Francis of Assisi convent, Milwaukee, and Mrs. Tina Schaeffer of Kewaskum, and two brothers, Edd and Joseph Mueller, both of Campbellsport, R. 1. Four sisters preceded her in death.

Mrs. Miller was a member of the Ladies' Altar society of Holy Trinity congregation, Kewaskum.

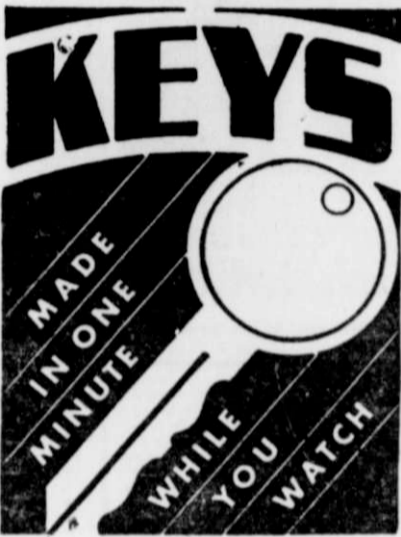

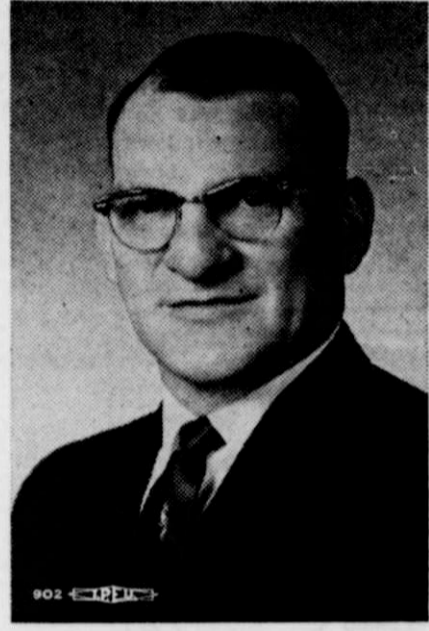

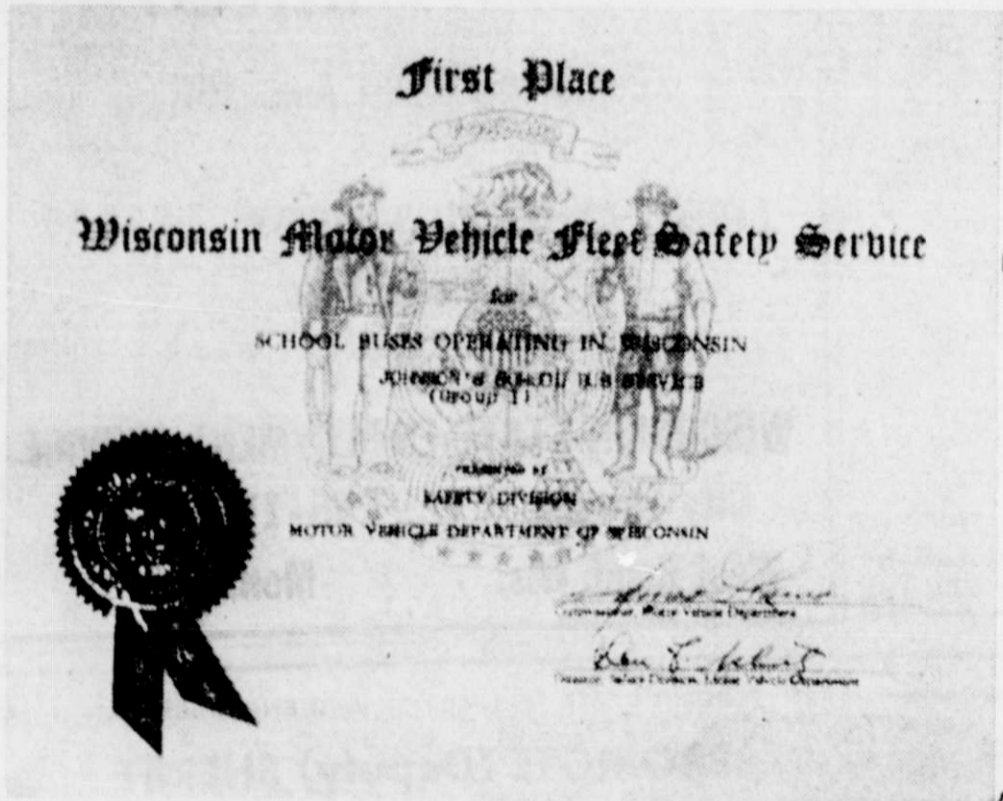
