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Mrs. Edw. Theusch, Daughter Killed in Train-Auto Crash

FATAL ACCIDENT OCCURS AT CROSSING NEAR VILLAGE MONDAY EVENING

Mrs. Edward Theusch, 46, Rt. 2, Kewaskum, and her daughter, Pearl, 17, were instantly killed Monday evening at about 7:15 p.m. when the 1950 model car driven by Mrs. Theusch was struck by a speeding northbound North Western railroad passenger train, the double deck "400," as the two were driving out of their farm driveway across the train tracks. The train struck the auto broadside.

The accident occurred about 1 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum just off of County Trunk Highway V, known as the Campbellsport road. It was reported that the mother was driving her daughter to Holy Trinity church in Kewaskum where she was to attend a CYO meeting, and was just about to turn out of the driveway onto County Trunk V when the crash took place.

Debris from the wrecked automobile was strewn from a half mile to three quarters of a mile along the right-of-way. One of the victim's bodies was found approximately 200 feet from the scene of the crash while the other was carried 100 feet from the point of impact. The train was reported by authorities as traveling at about 70 miles per hour at the time of the mishap.

Part of the auto wreckage was jammed under the front end of the locomotive and a wrecking crew from Milwaukee was summoned to the scene to clear the wreckage from beneath the train. It required several hours to clear the tracks and wreckage before the train could proceed on its northward journey. When the emergency brakes were applied, the train's wheels were flattened some from skidding along the tracks about half a mile before it was brought to a halt.

The train, No. 209, is scheduled to depart from West Bend at 6:35 p.m., but usually runs somewhat behind schedule. On Monday, the train was later than usual, leaving West Bend at approximately 7:06 p.m., and it is believed that the lateness of the train may have led Mrs. Theusch to believe that the train had already passed through. The engineer of the train was C. J. Liebhauser.

Their deaths were the 18th and 19th traffic fatalities in Washington county this year. The crash caused much excitement in the village and hundreds of persons were attracted to the scene.

Double funeral services for the victims were conducted by the Rev. John F. Budde in Holy Trinity church at 9:30 a.m. Thursday. Burial took place in the new parish cemetery. Mrs. Theusch was a member of the Ladies' Altar society of the church, the members of which attended the services in a body. Pearl was a member of the junior class at Kewaskum Community High school and the entire class also attended the rites in a body as did CYO members of the congregation.

Prior to the services, the bodies were in state at Miller's Funeral home after 2 p.m. Wednesday and the Rosary was recited at 8 p.m.

Mrs. Theusch is survived by her husband, another daughter, Grace, 18, and a son, Ralph, 19, both at home; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Eckhart of Menominee Falls, and a sister, Mrs. Gregor Gundrum of Slinger rural route. She was the former Evelyn Eckhart.

Her daughter is survived by her father, sister and brother, mentioned above, and her maternal grandparents, the Eckharts.

Mrs. Theusch was born Nov. 3, 1913, at Richfield, and her marriage to Mr. Theusch took place April 20, 1940, at Hubertus. Her daughter was born May 15, 1943, at West Bend.

Only 304 Votes Cast Here Tuesday; GOP Outpolls Democrats

Only 304 votes were cast in Tuesday's primary election in the village, far less than half of the eligible voters bothering to go to the polls. Following the county and state trend, Republicans outpolling the Democrats by better than a 2 to 1 margin. There were 211 GOP votes cast and 93 Democratic.

The main interest Tuesday, however, was centered in the races for the party nominations on both tickets. On the Republican slate there was opposition for five positions, while on the Democratic ticket only one office, that of sheriff, had opposition. This was one reason why the Democratic vote was not heavier.

The vote in Washington county was 9,964. Elmer Schowalter, Republican assemblyman seeking his fourth term, easily defeated his rival, Fred Bammel, by a margin of 4,588 to 2,025.

Robert J. Klein defeated three opponents for the nomination for county treasurer, although Albert Schroeder remained in the race until the final ballots were counted. Klein won out by only 77 votes, 2,356 to 2,279. Herbert Krantz received 1,150 votes and Otto Tank, 837.

In the GOP race for sheriff, Deputy William Johnson beat Robert (Corky) Michels by a surprising 4,698 to 1,782 margin. The third candidate, E. W. Guse, polled 506 votes.

In the district attorney race, Richard T. Becker won handily over his two opponents. He tallied 3,322 to defeat Donald A. Frings, who finished with 2,445, and Roy C. Baumann, who had 769. Becker, who just graduated from law school in 1959, also was a surprise winner.

In the contest for register of deeds, Olga Perrin, deputy register for 14 years, won the nomination over Calvin J. (Kelly) Held by a sizable margin of 4,147 to (CONTINUED ON PAGE EIGHT)

Thelma Rosenheimer Returns from Europe

Thelma Rosenheimer returned Aug. 30 from a ten week tour of Europe, which included eighteen countries.

She sailed from Montreal on June 21 on Canadian Pacific's "Empress of Britain," arriving at Liverpool, England, June 29. Her travels included England, Scotland, France, Spain, Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Luxembourg, Belgium, the Netherlands, Denmark, Sweden and Norway. The little principalities of Andorra, Monaco, San Marino and Liechtenstein rounded out her itinerary.

While in Germany, Thelma met Tom Peterson of Kewaskum, who is stationed there with the U.S. Forces. Highlights of her tour were the Passion Play at Oberammergau and the Floriade, an international flower show held in Rotterdam only once every ten years.

Miss Rosenheimer arrived at New York's Idlewild airport on Aug. 29. Incidentally, this was the same jet flight on which Barbara Powers, wife of the U-2 pilot brought down over Russia, arrived back in the United States.

Thelma resumed her duties as English teacher at Beaver Dam Senior High school on Sept. 6.

Barn on Allen Reindl Farm Is Destroyed By Fire; Hay, Grain Lost

Fire, believed to have started in hay near the door, destroyed a large barn on the Allen Reindl farm in the town of Kewaskum, several miles southwest of the village, Wednesday night.

Lost along with the 108 by 36 foot barn was a large amount of hay which filled the barn, about 1,500 bushels of grain, some straw, several bushels of alfalfa seed, some clover and other seed, a hay drier and motor and other equipment. Other machinery and equipment, as well as some farm animals were removed by neighbors, firemen and spectators before the fire got out of control.

The blaze was discovered shortly after 7 p. m. and the Kewaskum fire department, was summoned about 7:30 p. m. Because of the danger in the threatening blaze the Kohlsville firemen also were called. Firemen of both departments fought the fire throughout the night.

For a time it appeared that firemen might be able to save the structure but the flames had spread all over the hay and in the roof. New blazes leaped up all over faster than the firemen could put them out. With a limited supply of water, the blaze finally got out of control and the barn could not be saved. The fire fighters then confined their efforts to soaking the surrounding buildings and saving them from burning.

Most of the firemen remained at the scene until midnight or after. Both departments kept small squads on duty all night soaking and protecting the other buildings. Several tank trucks from Kewaskum and Kohlsville kept busy hauling a steady supply of water. Some local firemen returned at 7 a. m.

An estimate of the loss had not been made at this writing. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

Shortly before 9 a. m. Thursday the Kewaskum firemen were called to the farm again when a part of the barn on the northwest side which remained standing started to burn after drying off some. Only a small part of the roof of an adjoining building was damaged.

This was the second time in recent years that the barn on the Reindl farm was destroyed. About nine years ago a former barn blew down in a severe windstorm.

FIRST PTA MEETING HELD MONDAY NIGHT

The parents of the Kewaskum Elementary PTA were introduced to the teachers by Clifford Rose, high school principal, at the PTA meeting Monday evening.

The guest speaker, Harry Sheski, county superintendent of schools gave a very interesting talk on "Meeting Pupils' Needs in a Changing Curriculum." He pointed out that the changing trend in the world today makes it necessary for changing the needs of pupils in our schools today.

The problem of safety patrol was also brought up and carried over to a later date.

In a special congregational meeting on August 29, the members of St. Lucas Lutheran congregation voted to adopt the recommendation of the Building and Planning committee to proceed with construction of a new Sunday School building to house the congregation's more than 200 children of Sunday School age. The cost of the building is expected to run in the neighborhood of \$90,000.00.

The site selected for the new building is directly across the street from the present church, and drops off rather quickly to the east. This drop-off dictated the design and plan of the new building.

The Sunday School classrooms will be on two floors, the building appearing as a two story building to the east, and as a single story building to the west. The 5 assembly size classrooms will be divided by folding doors into 3 rooms each, providing 15 classrooms of 11' x 19' each. This, plus two smaller rooms on the main floor, 12' x 19' each, will provide a total of 17 Sunday School rooms. Besides the classrooms, the building contains a library, office, large store room, toilet facilities, and boiler room.

The unit will be constructed of brick and block, utilizing a pre-cast concrete floor construction, aluminum windows and glazed tile window stools. The roof will be of laminated beams and 4" thick roof deck, exposed in the upper level classrooms to provide a warm feeling, classroom floors to be resilient tile with either tile or terrazzo floors in the corridors.

The exterior of the building will appear low from the street, with a low pitched roof, to blend well with the residential neighborhood in which it is located. Pierced solar block will emphasize the aluminum entrance.

The new Sunday School unit will provide room for 250 students, and is so planned that it can be expanded with a minimum of expense and trouble if the need arises.

Members of the Building and Planning committee who presented this plan to the congregation are Dr. R. G. Edwards, chairman; Ray Schaefer, William Guenther, Max Okrusch, Desmond Smith, president of St. Lucas, and the pastor also served on the committee.

Megellas for Congress Ham Supper and Rally Here Attended By 200

STATE SENATOR WILLIAM PROXMIRE IS GUEST SPEAKER

The ham supper promoted by the committee on MEGELLAS for CONGRESS held at Del's Opera House, Kewaskum, Thursday evening, Sept. 8, brought forth a good gathering of Washington county Democrats. Approximately 200 plates were served.

Richard Reigle, chairman of the committee, served as master of ceremonies. Upon completion of a few introductory remarks and several liberal political comments of his own, Reigle introduced his brother, James D. Reigle, Kewaskum's young and energetic village president, who gave the address of welcome.

Al Roell, chairman of the Washington County Democrats, introduced the Washington county candidates in attendance as follows: Wm. E. O'Neill of Hartford, state assembly; Henry Renard, incumbent district attorney; Lawrence E. Hart, treasurer; Leroy P. Weber, county clerk, and Sheriff candidates Lester Hudson, Sylvester Groth and Donald Mertens. Because of the long program there were no comments by the candidates.

During the severe electrical storm Saturday afternoon the home of Matt Pesch, 2 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum, was struck by lightning. The roof caught fire and the firemen were called to put out the blaze.

The state highway department commenced black-topping the St. Michaels road on Hwy. 28, east of the village. Seven cars of oil containing 10,000 gallons each, are being used. The blacktop will eliminate dust.

A new industry has opened, namely the Kewaskum Plating Works, conducted by August Schaefer and son and located at the former's place at the junction of Hwys. 55 and 28.

The West Bend Moose band will give two concerts in Kewaskum on the lots next to Miller's Electric store and the Bank of Kewaskum.

A truck owned by Frank J. Bauer of Campbellsport and driven by John Bast of that village tipped over with a load of 300 cases of beer and several eighths on Hwy. 55 north of Techtman's hill. Bast, who was on his way to Campbellsport from the West Bend Lithia Co., was forced off the road by a passing car.

Kewaskum's team of the Badger State league, fractured his right leg just above the ankle in Sunday's game with Port Washington here. The injury occurred when he slid into third base after a teammate had singled. In sliding his spike caught in the ground.

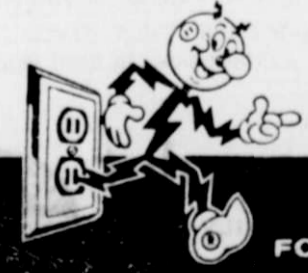

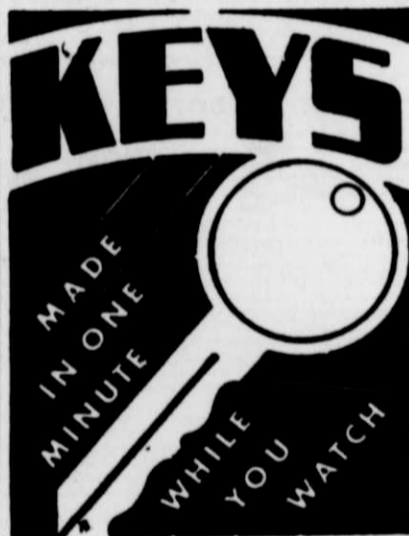

Construction of New Railroad Side Track Near Here Underway

Construction of a mile long "passing track" on the Chicago and North Western railroad right-of-way in the Kewaskum swamp between here and Barton is well underway. Graders and equipment of the Duehning Brothers Construction firm of Slinger have leveled off the track area.

The passing track begins just south of the Weasler Engineering and Manufacturing Co. and will extend for a mile northward toward Kewaskum. It is located between the railroad's main line of tracks and Hwy. 45 on the east side of the highway.

The new passing track is much longer than the present old passing track located further south. It is being built because of the need for a longer side-track to accommodate the longer passenger and freight trains. It will help clear the main line for through passenger trains and will speed traffic on the line.

Switching of trains into the siding will be done manually, but the trains will re-enter the main line automatically, with switches also closing automatically. Passing tracks in Kewaskum are outmoded because trains "laying over" in the village tie up street crossings and halt automotive traffic, making use of these sidings impractical.

Trains use the passing tracks several times daily. The present passing track north of Barton can accommodate only 35 or 40 cars and is no longer practical for handling the new longer trains. The

new passing will accommodate about 150 freight cars.

Graders and earth movers have moved about 7,000 yards of dirt to make the roadbed for the new tracks and the project is expected to be completed about Oct. 16.

BARBECUE DELIGHTS

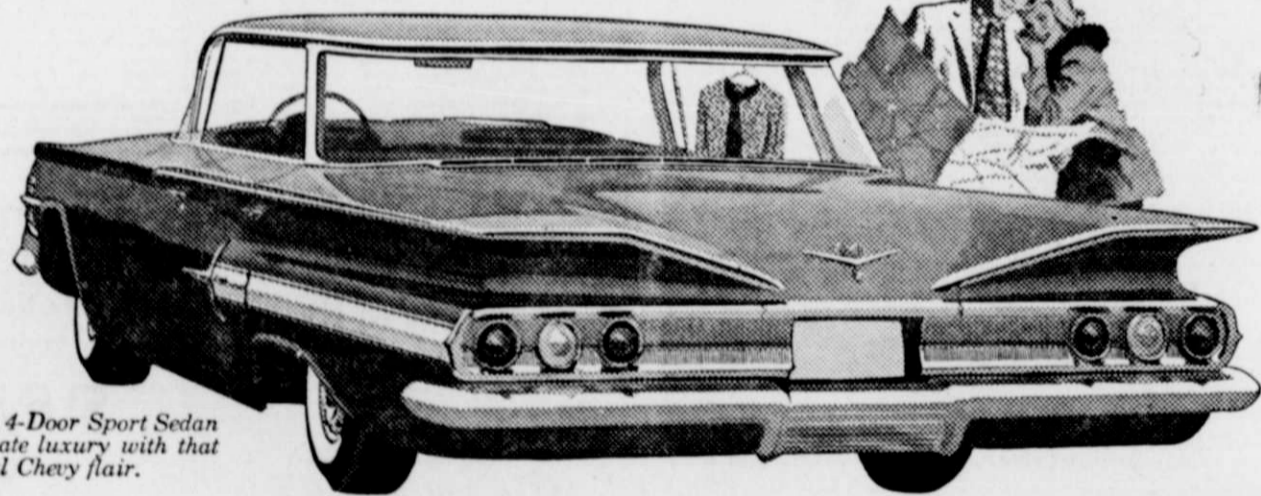

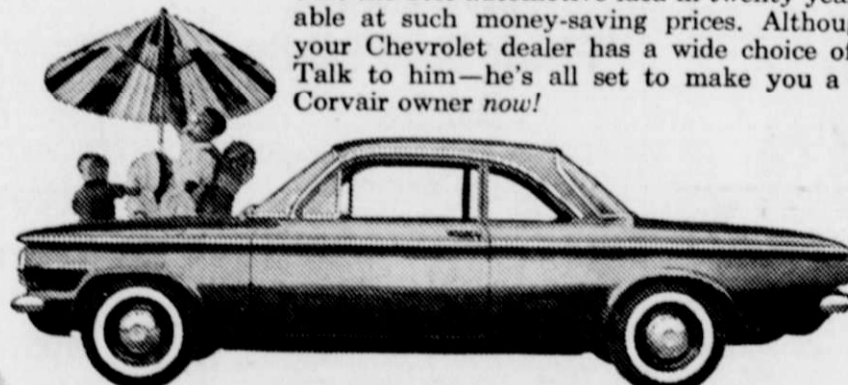
