### Mrs. Edw. Theusch, Daughter Killed in Train-Auto Crash

FATAL ACCIDENT OCCURS AT CROSSING NEAR VILLAGE Only 304 Votes Cast MONDAY EVENING

Mrs. Edward Theusch, 46, Rt. 2, Kewaskum, and her daughter, Pearl, 17, were instantly killed Monday evening at about 7:15 p.m. when the 1950 model car driven by Mrs. Theusch was struck by a speeding northbound North Western railroad passenger train, the double deck "400," as the two were driving out of their form driveney across the train farm driveway across the train tracks. The cost of the building is expected to run in the neighborhood of \$90,000.00.

The site selected for the new building is directly across the street from the present church, and drops off rather quickly to the east. This drop-off dictated the design and plan of the new the design and plan of the new

building.

The Sunday School classrooms will be on two floors, the building appearing as a two story building to the east, and as a single story building to the west. The 5 assembly size classrooms will be divided by folding doors into 3 rooms each, providing 15 class-rooms of 11' x 19' each. This, plus two smaller rooms on the main floor, 12' x 19' each, will provide a total of 17 Sunday School rooms. Besides the classrooms, the building contains a library, office, large store room, toilet facilities, and

The new Sunday School unit will provide room for 250 students, and is so planned that it can be expanded with a mini-mum of expense and trouble if the need arises.



#### **Our Police Chief Says**

MIDGET VEHICLES

Midget-sized "GO-KART" motor vehicles designed for use on private property are not being registered by the Motor Vehicle Department.

Recently the department has received several applications from

These pint-sized runabouts lack much of the equipment required on a licensed motor vehicle. The items most frequently lacking are proper brakes, a horn, a speedometer, a rear-view mirror, turn signals and a stop lamp.

Whether the small vehicle is a hand-made cart or a manufactured vehicle, if it does not meet specifications set forth in the registration laws of Wisconsin, then such a vehicle cannot be licensed. Without a license, a motor vehicle cannot be driven legally on our streets and highways.

Another matter of concern in this problem is that of driver licensing. The State of Wisconsin does not normally issue a driver's license for any person under 16 years of age. A mechanized cart or play vehicle certainly does not come within the scope of "required driving" for any youngster to qualify for a special permit under the age of 16.




