It is safe to assume that approximately 10,000 persons would have attended the event had it not been for the inclement weather. ## Elmore Man Dies of Injuries in Cave-In

Elroy H. Backhaus, 26, of Elmore, died at 7:15 p. m. Friday, Sept. 16, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, as a result of injuries received when an excavation in which he was working near Allenton on a sewer construction project caved in Thursday morning.

Backhaus was buried up to the waist while removing shoring in a sewer trench. It was reported that he was struck by a large falling beam and blacktop. Fellow workers worked to free him before he was removed to the hospital. Backhaus, a worker for the South Byron Excavating Co., suffered a ruptured bladder, fractured pelvis and partial paralysis of both limbs in the mishap.

He was born Oct. 4, 1933 in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county, son of Anthony and Clara Tesch Backhaus, and was married to Patsy Eggers. Surviving are his widow, four young children, Carol, Barbara, Gary and Randal of Elmore; his mother, Mrs. Clara Backhaus; one brother, Harold, and one sister, Mrs. William Meyer, Jr., of Campbellsport.

Funeral services were held at the Twohig Funeral home, Campbellsport, at 2 p. m. Monday, the Rev. Joel Sauer officiating. Burial was in Union cemetery there.

## Jim Reigle Appointed To Regional Planning Board By Gov. Nelson

Newly appointed members of the Southeastern Wisconsin Advisory Planning Commission held their first meeting at 3 p. m. Wednesday, Sept. 21, at the Waukesha county court house. Gov. Gaylord Nelson appeared before the group at that time. The commission elected officers and planned further procedure at the meeting.

Appointed by Gov. Nelson to serve on the commission from Washington county are Dr. Carlton M. Herman, Allenton, chairman of the Washington county park commission, an orthodontist and graduate of Marquette university's dental school and member and past president of conservation clubs; and James D. Reigle, 34, Kewaskum, president of the Kewaskum village board and secretary and assistant general manager of Regal Ware, Inc. Reigle is a graduate of Lehigh university.

Seven counties in the southeastern section of the state are represented on the commission. They are: Washington, Waukesha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Kenosha, Walworth and Racine. Two qualified persons who applied for positions on the commission were, of necessity, "passed by" because of the limitation of numbers of members.

In addition to the appointments made by the governor, county boards also appoint one member to serve on the board. Joseph A. Schmitz of Germantown has been named to represent Washington county, being appointed last Thursday by the county board.

The seven county agency is an advisory group. Its formation, authorized by state law, is based upon the premise that planning problems of metropolitan areas cannot be solved effectively unless county lines are crossed. The commission's duty will be to plan for the entire region. It will concern itself with such problems as highways, zoning, flood control, stream pollution and industrial development.

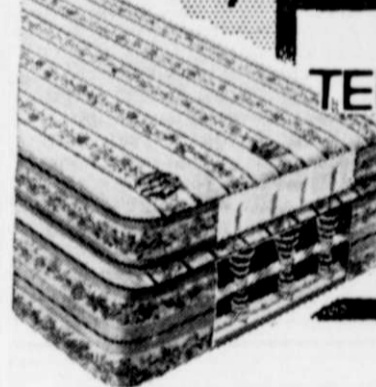

**FIREMAN HURT AT  
REINDL BARN FIRE**

Ted Rohlinger, member of the  
Kewaskum fire department, was  
injured by a falling concrete block  
which cut his scalp, requiring sev-

½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon steak sauce

Cut bread almost through  
lengthwise; carefully open loaves  
and pull out inside of each loaf  
being careful not to split the  
back. Combine remaining in-  
gredients and mix until well  
blended; pack into loaves and  
press them back together; chill.  
At serving time slice each roll  
thinly. Makes about 20 Stuffies.

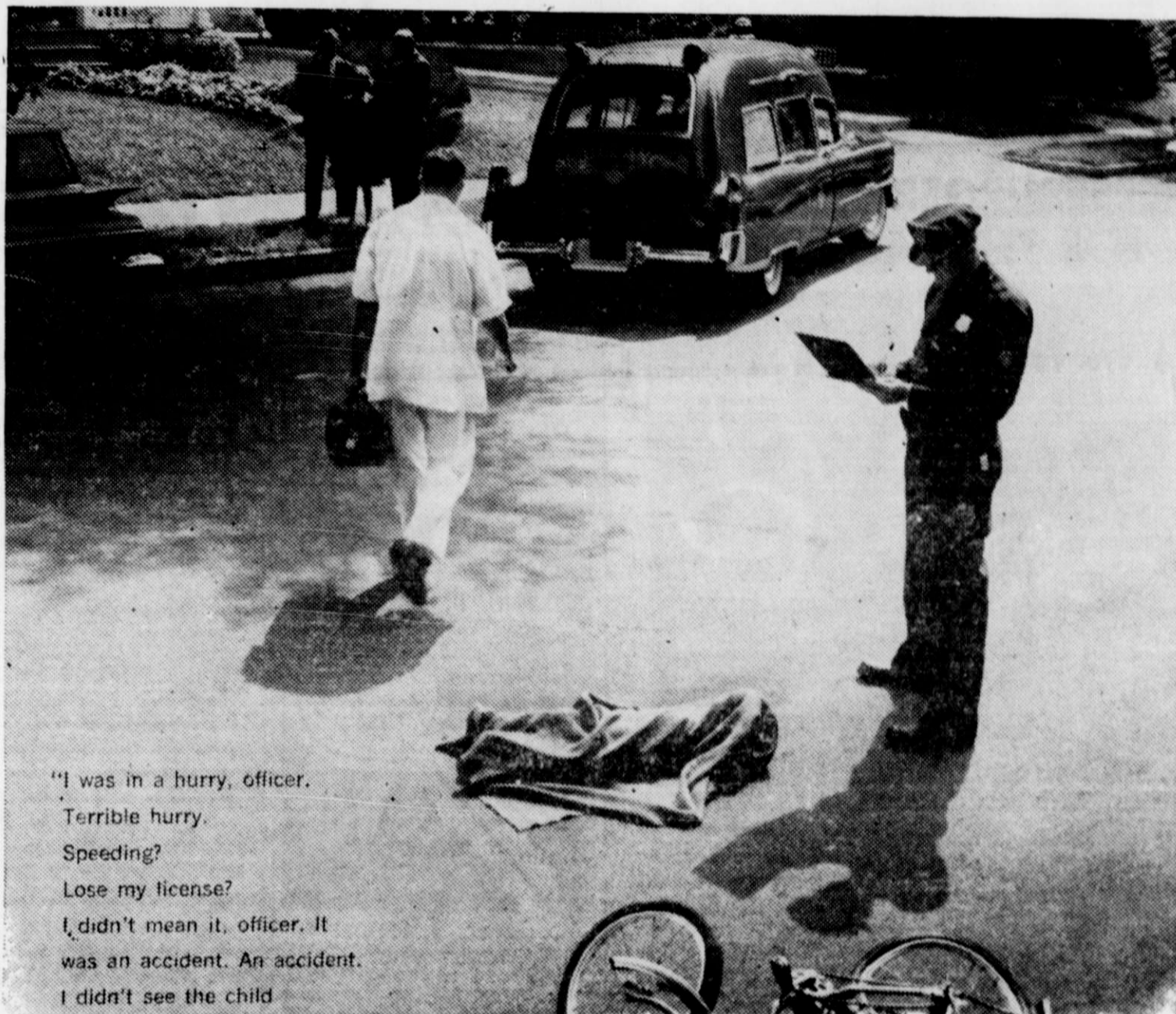
### GOLDEN WEDDING OF MATHIEU OBSERVED

Add salt to ground beef and shape into six patties. Arrange in an 8"x12 1/2" baking dish. Place slice of cheese on top of each

meat patty. Pour one can of tomato soup over the patties. Place in preheated oven for 30 minutes.

9" square pan  
350° oven, 30 minutes

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
- 2 oz. chocolate
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour, sifted
- 1 cup coarsely chopped nut meats

Sift sugar. Beat butter until soft. Add the sugar gradually and blend these ingredients until they are creamy. Melt chocolate over hot water, add to butter and sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time. Add vanilla, and then add the flour beating until well blended only. Fold in coarsely chopped nut meats. Butter an 8x8 inch pan or a 9 inch square pan. Pour the batter into it. Bake the cake in a moderate oven 350° for about 30 minutes.

- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 tablespoon chopped chives or minced onion

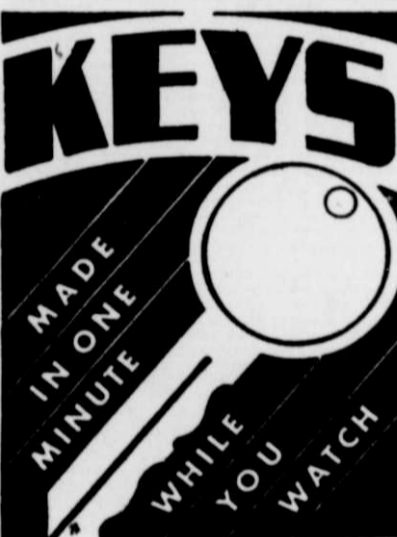

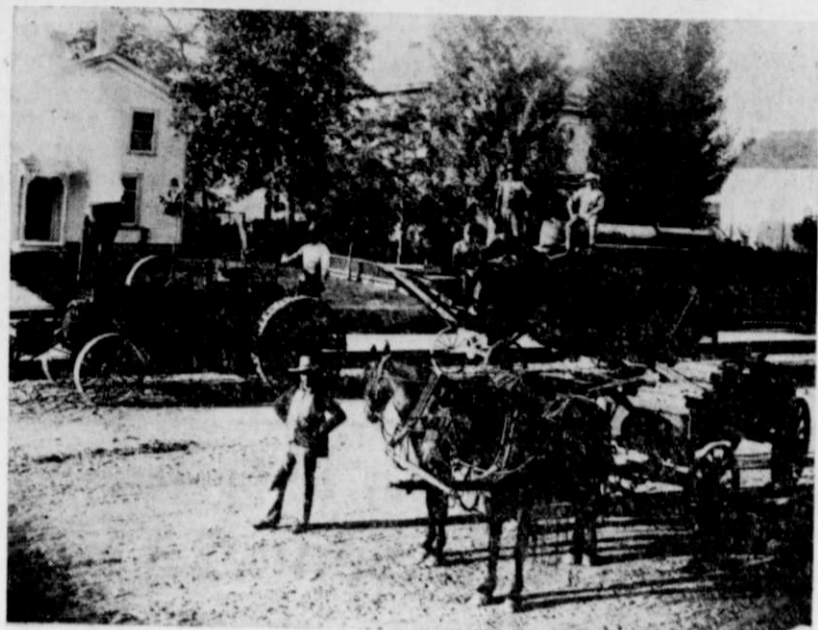

It was a Birdsell engine and threshing machine. It did all barn threshing and had a crew of 13 men. From three to six cents was charged for threshing a bushel of

If the number of mourning doves migrating thru this area is any indication of the 1960 hatch in the northern tier of states, those to the south of us should have excellent hunting this fall.

Something you seldom see, a Wilson snipe feeding on a farmer's front lawn, not far from Theresa Public Hunting Grounds.

Northerns are starting to bite in the Milwaukee river. Perch fishing slow at Port Washington. Fair to good bluegill fishing at Big and Little Cedar lakes. A few northerns and walleyes caught at Pike lake.

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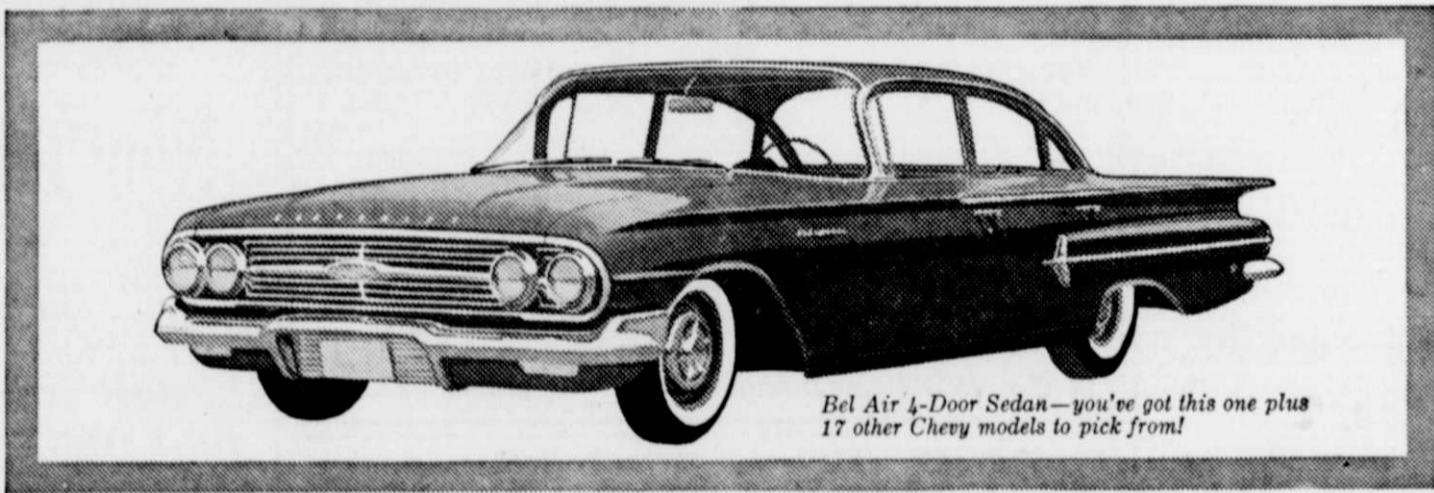
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
