Braves' Warren Spahn Speaker at Banquet; Visits Kewaskum

Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, one of the National League's all-time great left-handed pitchers, who was guest speaker at the Rainbow league banquet at Forest Lake resort Saturday night, paid Kewaskum a visit following the affair and quite a few local fans had the pleasure of meeting him and shaking his hand.

Spahn, who has won 21 games for the Braves this season, including a no-hitter, was accompanied by his wife Lorene and another couple, good friends from Milwaukee. Spahn and his party drove from Milwaukee to Kewaskum, being met here by Art. Narlow, proprietor of Forest Lake resort, who guided them to the lake.

Spahn spoke briefly at the banquet and then devoted a lot of time to answering baseball questions which he invited the audience to ask. He patiently answered all questions thrown at him very satisfactorily and informatively and added a great deal of humor to his replies. Mrs. Spahn also was called upon briefly and she, too, answered some questions.

As famous as he is throughout the United States and other countries, Warren modestly stated that when he returned to his ranch in Oklahoma after one season with the Braves his closest neighbor asked him where he had been all summer. When asked what the toughest part of being a pitcher was he answered: "when a guy hits a home run off you. The crowd watches the ball sail out and the runner while you just stand there watching the guy circle the bases. Then the manager comes out to the mound and says 'uh' and motions to the bullpen. Then you stand some more 'till the new pitcher comes in before walking to the dugout." Asked who the toughest batters were to face he replied "all of them." Asked when he starts to think of pitching a no-hitter he said, "with the first pitch." Spahn also showed how he holds and releases his various pitches and what curves result. He also mentioned Kewaskum a couple of times in his talk.

Joe Hauser, another former big league ball player and home run king in the American Association, said a few words and presented the trophies to the league champions. Curt Link, Rainbow league director, was master of ceremonies. Over 200 persons jammed the dining room and enjoyed a delicious chicken dinner.

After the dinner Spahn stayed for a while and quite a few of those present had an opportunity to meet him and obtain autographs. We had the pleasure of introducing him to several Kewaskum people at the banquet. He and his party were persuaded to make a short stop in this village and obligingly did so when they were told that we had a Chicago Cub fan from way back who needed conversion. Also in the window was a picture of the pitcher. The Spahns were very friendly to everyone and seemingly enjoyed themselves here.

PTA Promoting Adult Guards at School Crossings

The executive committee of the Kewaskum Grade School PTA met last Monday night with representatives of the school board, Kiwanis club, village board and the grade school principal to discuss the possibility of replacing the present student safety patrol currently helping our children to cross the busy highways in the village during school hours with adult crossing guards who would have local policing authority.

Many areas of agreement were reached through the fruitful discussions. It was agreed that salaried adults working directly under the supervision of our local police chief, a system used in all progressive neighboring communities, should relieve the student patrol whose members have been sacrificing needed school hours on their volunteer jobs. Six important intersections were designated as most needing guards. They are:

Fond du Lac Ave. and Main St., Fond du Lac Ave. and Second St., Main St. and Railroad St., Main St. and Parochial School, Main St. and West Water St., Second St. and Railroad St.

It was estimated that \$2,000.00 would be necessary to provide these adult guards for the remainder of the school year beginning Nov. 1.

Means of financing the project is of immediate concern. The school board by law cannot provide the necessary funds. The village board does not currently have these funds available. Hope was expressed that a combination of village help, student activity funds, PTA projects, and donations from other civic organizations within the village could successfully finance the project for the current year on a trial basis.

All organizations will be contacted within the coming month by a member of the PTA committee assigned this project, and it is hoped every organization will give it serious consideration. The proper safeguarding of our children crossing the busy thoroughfares in our village is of extreme importance to every citizen.

Local Student, Robert Kroncke, Semi-Finalist In National Merit Test

Principal Clifford Rose of Kewaskum Community High school announced yesterday (Thursday) that one of the school's students has been named a semi-finalist in the 1960-1961 National Merit Scholarship competition. He is Robert Kroncke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kroncke, 1407 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum.

Semi-finalists are among 10,000 in the nation who scored highest on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying examination, a test of educational development given in more than 15,000 high schools last spring. There were 164 students representing 82 schools outside the Milwaukee area upon whom the honor was conferred.

Those who are successful in the competition of semi-finalists will, in many instances, be provided with a four year college scholarship. The eventual winners may choose any college or university to do their degree work in.

Funds for these scholarships are provided by 115 business and professional organizations, professional societies, foundations, individuals and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself.

Winners of the scholarships will be announced about May 1, 1961 and the exact number of winners will depend upon the total of scholarship funds available.

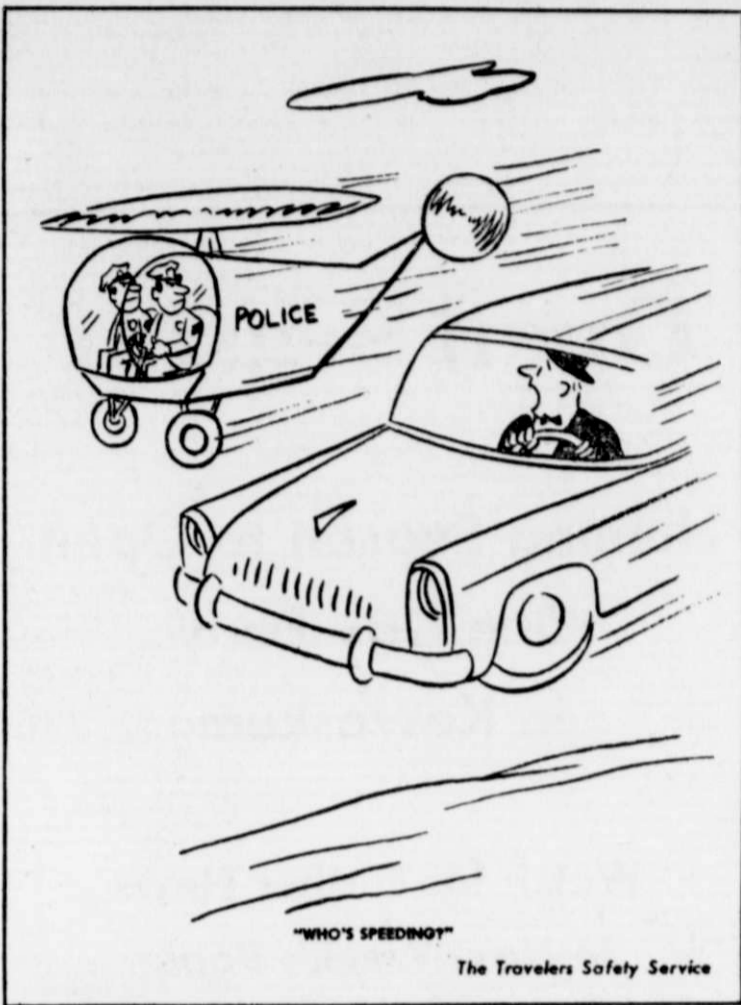

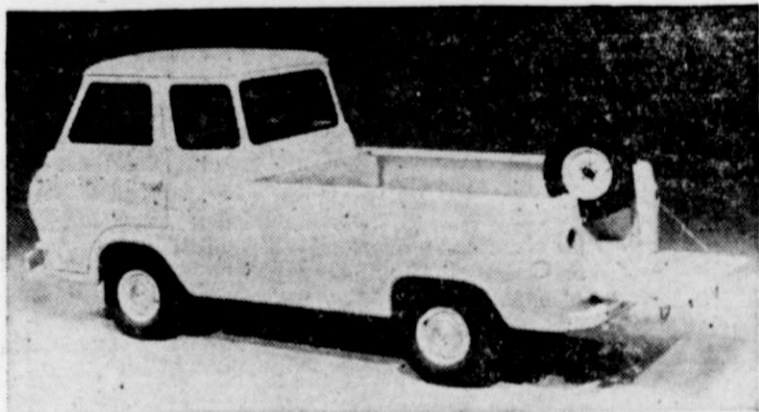
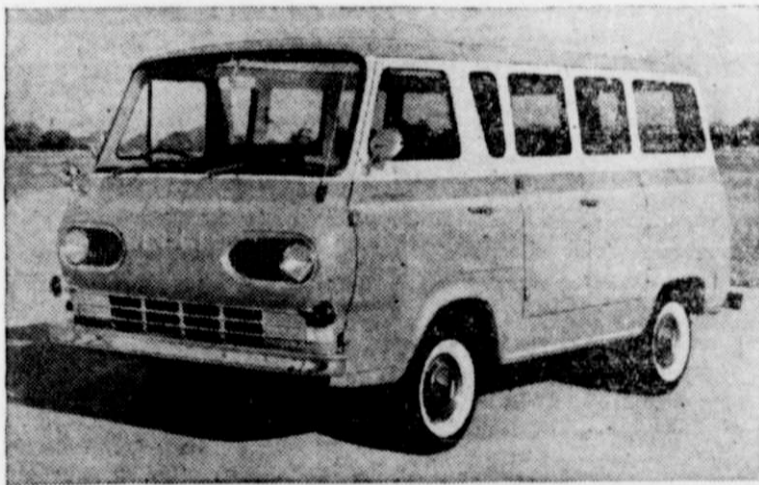
Mrs. Rosenheimer had been ill for about 18 months. She lived at Big Cedar lake and was a member of the West Bend Woman's club.

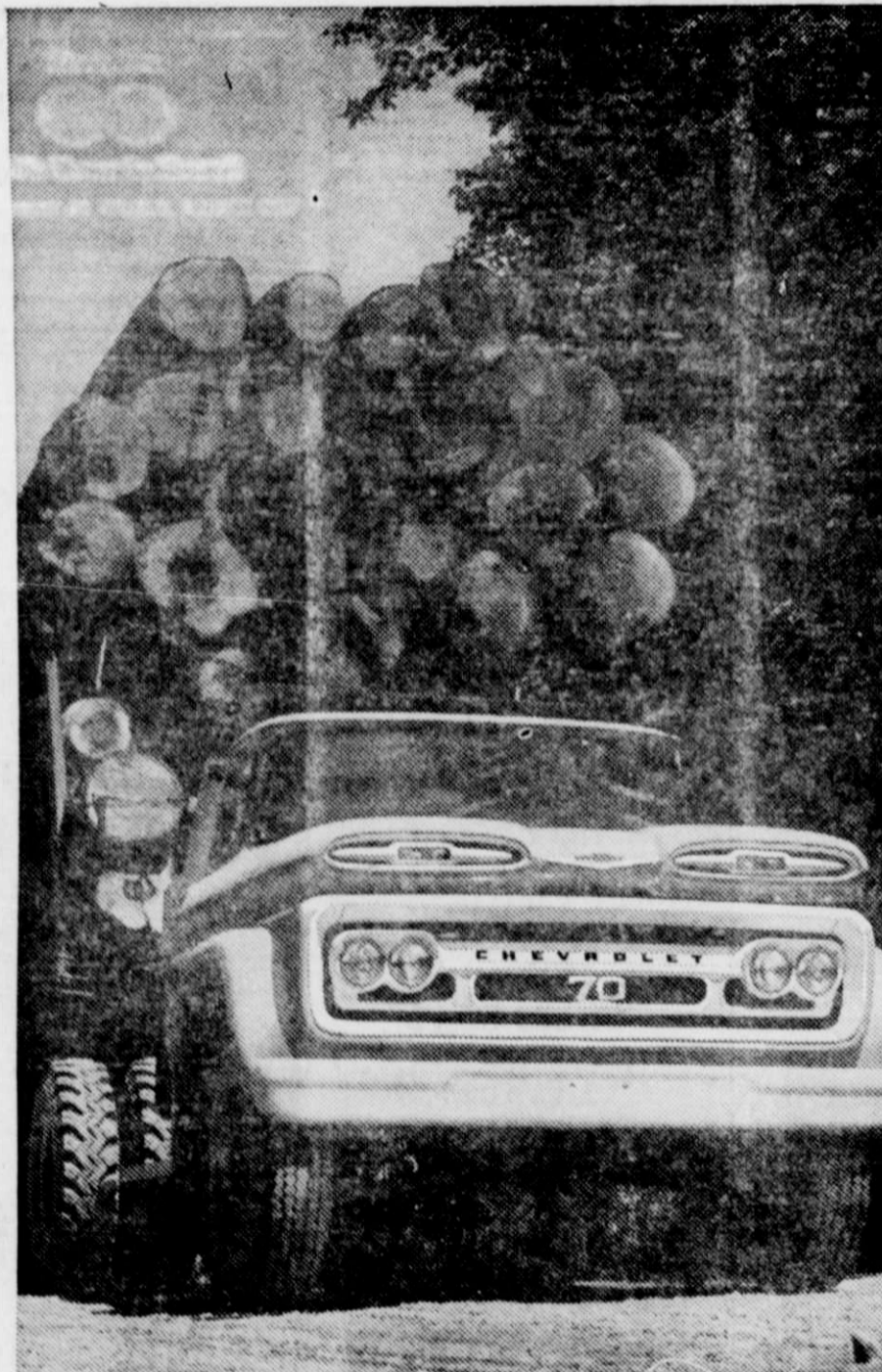
