Gov. Nelson Visits Kewaskum Friday

The tentative campaign schedule for Gov. Gaylord Nelson for the week of Oct. 10-16 includes a visit to Kewaskum on Friday afternoon, Oct. 14.

Earlier in the day the Governor will make appearances at Neenah, Oshkosh and Campbellsport where his party will have luncheon, before coming to this village. He is scheduled to be in Kewaskum at 3:30 p. m. for a tour of the Regal Ware, Inc. plant.

From here Gov. Nelson will travel to West Bend where he will visit for 3½ hours, which will include a street tour. He will complete a full day of campaigning in the Sixth District at a Democratic rally at Sheboygan Falls at 8:30 p. m. Friday.

Gov. Nelson is expected to leave Kewaskum in time to arrive at West Bend at about 4:30 p. m. He will be accompanied by Jim Megellas, Democratic candidate for congress from the Sixth District.

A brief stopover in Barton will precede a motorcade to West Bend. The motorcade, with Gov. Nelson and Jim Megellas in open convertibles, will proceed down

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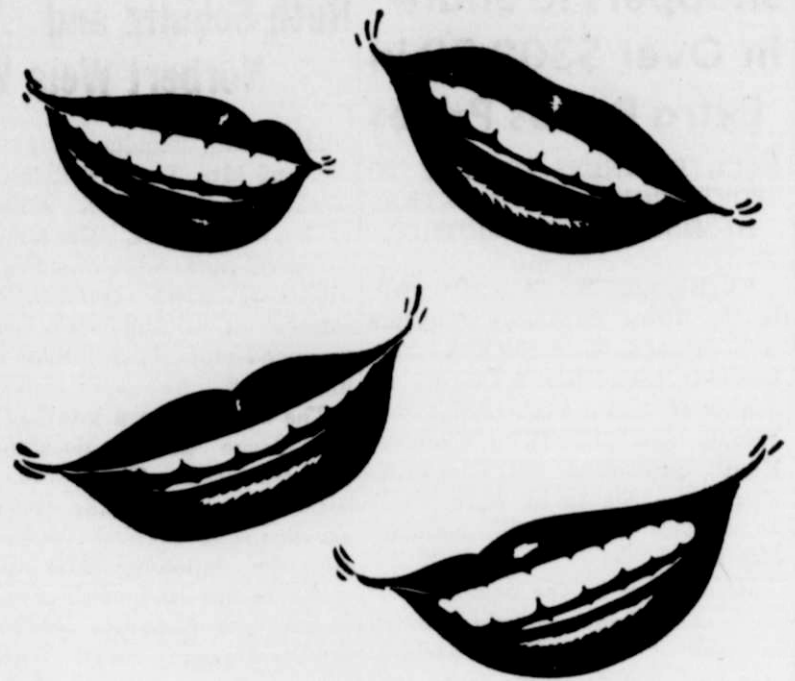

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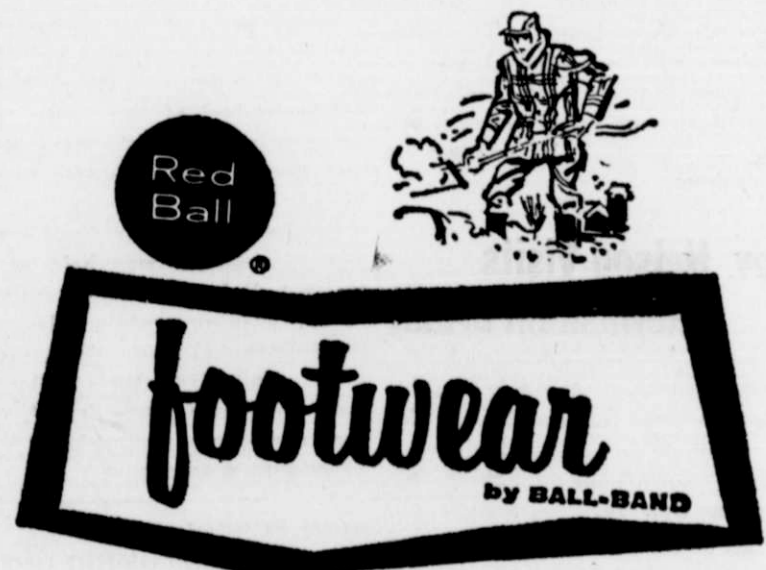

Touchdown in Closing Minutes Gives Indians 6-0 Win Over Warhawks

A week ago Friday Grafton edged the Kewaskum Indians with a touchdown and extra point in the final minute of the game, 7-6. The Indians evened the score last Friday when they came through with a TD in the last two minutes of the contest to win over Washington High's Warhawks of Germantown, 6-0, on the local gridiron.

The victory moved the Indians into third place in the Scenic Moraine conference with a record of 2 wins, 1 loss and 1 tie. The low scoring trend continues in the

conference. This is proven by the fact that Kewaskum has scored only 32 points in four games and still won two of them and tied one other.

The Indians waited until the final two minutes of the last quarter in downing the Warhawks. Kons Sadownikow returned a Germantown punt 25 yards to the Warhawks' 35 yard line with only four minutes remaining to set up the Indians' and the game's only score.

It took another two minutes for Kewaskum to move to the six-yard line, from where Halfback Richie Puerling cut off tackle for a touchdown. The try for the extra point failed.

Germantown had previously brewed the game's most serious

scoring threat in the third quarter by moving to the Kewaskum 13 yard line. However, the Indians defense stiffened and Kewaskum took over the ball on downs.

In other loop action Friday leading North Fondy won its fourth in a row, downing Grafton, 27-6; Pewaukee cashed in on extra points to nose out Campbellsport, 14-13, and Slinger and Random Lake battled to a 13-13 tie.

This Friday Kewaskum travels to Pewaukee for the first of two tough games in succession. The

next week they are at North Fondy to meet the leaders. Pewaukee holds second place with a 3-1 record.

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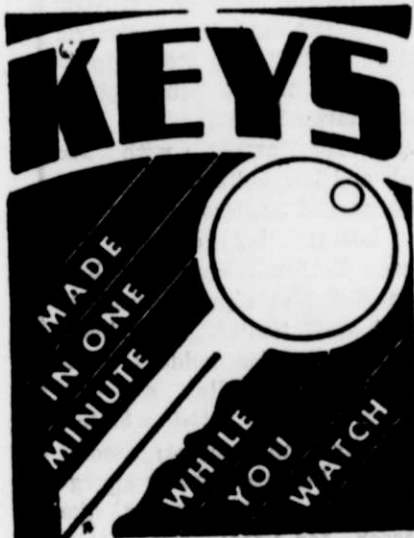

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Washington County Conservation
Warden

The opening week end of the
duck season produced very few
birds on local lakes or on the Mil-
waukee river. The birds appar-
ently prefer water-filled potholes
and the larger marshes such as
Theresa, Eldorado, Puckaway and
Horicon. Most of the hunters on
the larger marshes were able to
kill ducks and geese without too
much trouble.

Within the past week a buck
deer was killed on Highway 33
east of Newburg, a doe on US 41
just north of Menomonee Falls,
and another doe on 41 south of
Allenton. The rutting season has
apparently started.

Local hunters who opened the
ruffed grouse season in northern
Wisconsin reported heavy foliage
and in some areas a shortage of
birds.

Some people seem reluctant to
give information on violations to
their warden although they actu-

ally detest the violations. One
reason for their reluctance ap-
pears to be the fear of being ex-
posed as the informer. Informa-
tion given to conservation wardens
regarding game law violations is
held in strict confidence if the in-
former so wishes.

People think that ruffed grouse
are crazy when they fly into win-
dows at this time of year. How-
ever their damage is mild com-
pared to the actions of four fifteen
and one twenty-one year old Mil-
waukee boys, who shot up farm
buildings on state property, (part
of the hunting grounds on the Ket-
tle Moraine State Forest). Over
250 rounds of rifle and shotgun
ammunition were used.

The duck season opened at
noon on Friday, Oct. 7. Migratory
waterfowl regulations are avail-
able wherever hunting licenses are
sold. Water conditions are excel-
lent and their appears to be more

birds in this vicinity than last year.
Flocks of northern mallard and
black duck moved in this past Sun-
day evening.

Game managers will again
make periodic counts of ducks and
geese by air this fall. The route
will include Horicon Marsh and
Lake Emily in Dodge county,
Lakes Maria and Puckaway in
Green Lake county, Rush Lake
and Lakes Poygan, Winneconne
and Butte des Morts in Winneba-
go county, and Eldorado Marsh in
Fond du Lac county. Flights are
scheduled for Sept. 29, Oct. 5, 13
and 27 and Nov. 10.

The Fire Safe Home

Few things can cost you your home and one or more of your family more quickly and tragically than fire.

Resolve to make your home a fire safe home, urges Fire Chief Harry Schaefer. A home safe from fire, he says, depends on two important factors: good family habits about fire and its hazards, and good construction.

Good family habits include such things as care with matches and smoking, good housekeeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them.

Good construction for a fire safe home, according to the National Fire Protection Association, includes:

1. Built-in fire stops. These are barriers of wood or masonry be-

tween studs, joists, rafters or stringers that serve to prevent the spread of smoke and fire.

2. Solid doors for every room. An ordinary wooden door can keep smoke and fire out of a room for as long as 50 minutes.

3. Good escape routes. Best exits lead directly outside, not through other rooms. Windows should be large enough and low enough to climb through and operate easily enough for the youngest member of the family.

4. Interior finish of materials with low flame-spread characteristics. Wallboards made of gypsum, cement, asbestos and similar materials are noncombustible and resist flame spread.

5. Fire-resistant roofing material, such as asphalt shingles, slate, asbestos or metal. Wood shingles never should be used as a roof covering.

6. Proper wiring. Qualified electricians follow the provisions of the National Electrical Code when

Postal Dept. Reports Record Mail Volume, Improved Service

Mail volume in the Kewaskum area contributed to a new national record of nearly 64 billion pieces of mail, including a billion pieces of parcel post, during fiscal year 1960 ending last June 30, Postmaster H. E. Koch said.

The present day figures represent an increase of 25 per cent over the 1953 volume which totaled 50.9 billion pieces.

This increase, along with a sharp discontinuance of mail-carrying trains in recent years, has helped foster a complete revolution in postal transportation including for more extensive use of highway vehicles. Locally, the transportation pattern for Kewaskum has changed in the following manner: Mail is being carried by truck between Campbellsport and Milwaukee for an increased service to the Kewaskum area.

Today, 85 per cent of the vast postal vehicle fleet — operating under a modernization and improvement program initiated in 1954—is composed largely of new types of standard, commercial, light-weight, maneuverable vehicles. This conversion has meant the "retirement" of worn out units—many in use for ten years or more — which, in turn, has greatly reduced maintenance costs for the postal service.

Described as a vital part of this program which was launched approximately seven years ago under the direction of Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield, vehicle unit purchases during fiscal year 1960 amounted to more than 8,500 as compared with 115 similar purchases during fiscal year 1953.

"The motor vehicle inventory on June 30, 1953, was 18,969," Postmaster Koch said, "and it is estimated that more than 34,000 new vehicles have been purchased since fiscal year 1954 and that with the 'retirement' of old vehicles the inventory total on June 30 of this year was just a little under 37,000 vehicles.

Other figures in the preliminary 1960 report reveal that the post offices which now have mot-

or vehicle service available total more than 3,600 while the corresponding figure for fiscal year 1953 was 2,433.

"One of the most outstanding features of this motor vehicle improvement program is the mechanization of foot delivery routes. The motor vehicle inventory for June 30 of 1958 showed 1,914 'very light vehicles and mailsters'. In the 1959 report this item had climbed to a little over 5,000 and the preliminary estimate from the 1960 table shows 5,816.

On the basis of experience with more than 5,700 mailsters already in operation it has been estimated that each one saves the taxpayers a net of \$300 a year.

Postmaster Koch also pointed out that there have been literally scores of organizational and operational changes during this seven-year improvement program and that each one of them is directed toward the more efficient and more economical operation of the Post Office Department.

Some of the more significant of these are:

Decentralization of postal operating management out of the Post Office Department in Washington, D. C., by setting up fifteen regional headquarters offices; adoption of modern business accounting and financial procedures; utilization of the latest types of electronic machines; elimination of hand-prepared checks, payroll and others, at each post office by making payments from regional offices with estimated net savings of \$20,000,000 a year; introduction of new concepts of personnel management for the benefit and welfare of more than half a million postal employees, including both training programs for promotions and safety programs to reduce on-the-job accidents.
