A golf course will be opened in Kewaskum by Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert "Bud" Korth of this village. Work on the course already is well along and it is expected to be ready for play by late next summer. Few communities of this size can boast of such recreational development.

The course is being laid out at the southeast village limits, directly east of the village park on the Korth land, formerly known as the K. A. Honeck, Sr. farm. It will be a nine-hole course to begin with but Mr. and Mrs. Korth own sufficient land to expand it into an 18-hole links, which they intend to do in the near future.

The initial nine-hole course will cover an 85-acre plot of land owned by the Korths. The second nine would be laid out on 80 acres south of this property which Korth purchased from Jim Koenen several years ago. The owners have selected the name "Honey-E-Kor" for the course.
