Record Vote Expected Tuesday, Nov. 8, for Presidential Election

Indications during the last week of campaigning point to a record vote in Washington county for the presidential and general election next Tuesday, Nov. 8. A very large vote is also anticipated in the village of Kewaskum, with the possibility that a new high may be established.

Voting in the village will be done at the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. Town of Kewaskum balloting will be at the Labor Center in this village and the polls there will be open from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

Voters in the village need not register in advance to cast their ballots. Their name will be registered at the time they vote. But they must be residents of the village at least 10 days before the election to be eligible to vote. Absentee ballots can be obtained from the village commissioner and must be marked no later than Monday, Nov. 7, the deadline for absentee voting.

Interest in the election has been mounting steadily, not only on the national level but in the state and county contests as well, as the time for voting approaches. Apparently this year's election has stirred up the most excitement, enthusiasm and discussion in years.

Two factors contributing to a larger anticipated vote are the increase in population and the fact that presidential elections always attract a much larger percentage of eligible voters. Another factor is the great amount of publicity given the election and the television debates of the presidential candidates.

Three in One Family Hospitalized Same Day

Mrs. Henry Weddig, Sr. suffered a heart attack Wednesday afternoon at work at the school cafeteria and was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, where she is now a patient. Just after returning from being with his mother at the hospital, Henry Weddig, Jr. was called home when his son, Steven, 6, suffered a brain concussion when he fell off of a slide on the public school playground and struck his head on concrete. The boy was also taken to St. Joseph's hospital, where he is expected to be confined for about two weeks. Later when the Weddigs called Boltonville to tell Mrs. Weddig Jr.'s mother, Mrs. Eugene Brabender, what had happened they were informed that Mrs. Brabender had been taken to a hospital in Sheboygan where she underwent an operation.

Voters will also vote on a referendum issue concerning the amending of the state statutes to permit counties having a population of 500,000 or more to base limitations on their indebtedness (borrowing power) on the equalized valuation of property in the county for state purposes rather than on the local assessed value of the property with the method of determining the equalized value for state purposes to be provided by the state legislature. The referendum issue, as submitted to a state vote, applies only to Milwaukee county as it is the only county with a sufficient population.

DRIVERS RUN INTO LIGHT STANDARD, UTILITY POLE

An auto driven by Walter W. Ewert, 17, of 1329 Riverview dr., Kewaskum, struck a street light standard at the corner of Main and Parkview dr. at about 12:05 a. m. last Friday. The car, eastbound on Main st., mounted the curb and struck the light standard when the driver lost control of the vehicle, stating he fell asleep. The standard was damaged and the mercury bulb burned out. The light, one of the new ones installed on Main st., had just been turned on for the first time the same night.

Power in the Allenton area was knocked out for about an hour at 1:15 a. m. Saturday when a car driven by Ralph C. Stern, 20, of R. 1, Kewaskum, struck a utility pole near the Farmers, Inc. mill in Allenton. The crash knocked out a transformer on the pole, blacking out approximately two-thirds of the Allenton area.

Harty Speaker at Citizenship Brunch

At a Citizenship Brunch held at the Fifth Ave. Methodist church, West Bend, on Monday morning, Oct. 31, at 9:30 o'clock, Larry Harty, Democratic candidate for county treasurer, gave the following interesting talk on a county political issue:

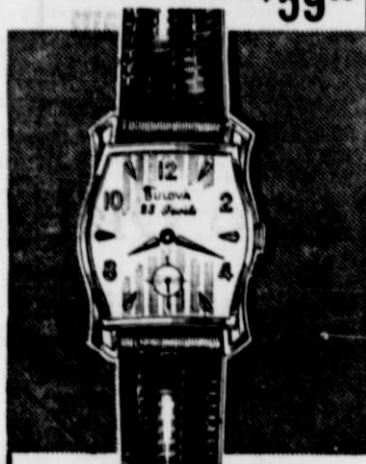

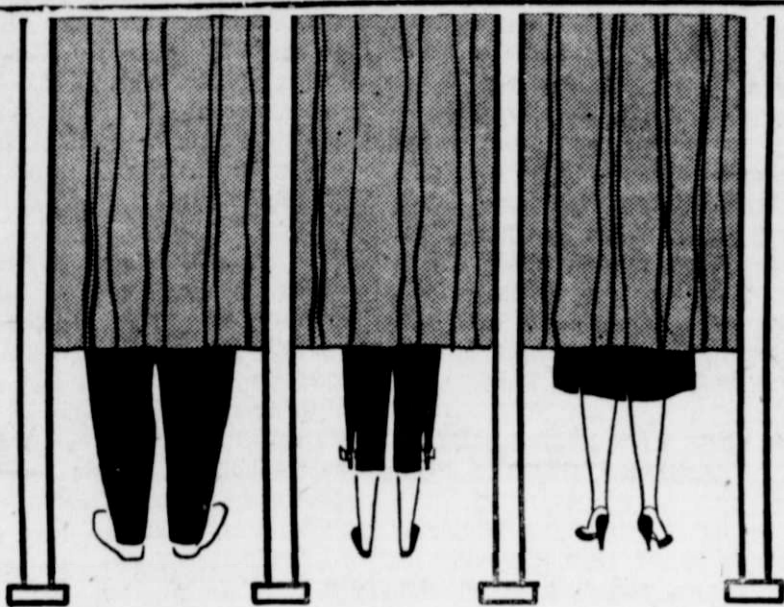

ON VETERAN'S DAY**

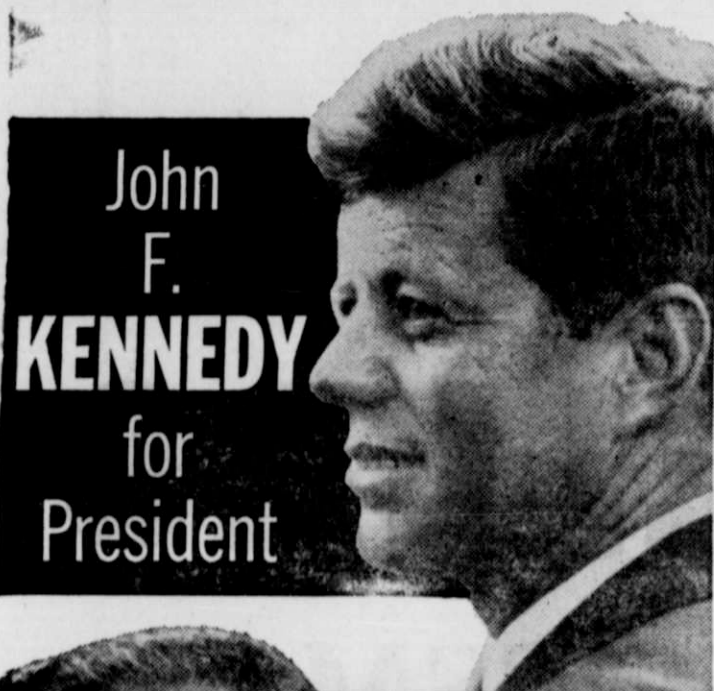

Public hearing was held on the application of the American Legion Post No. 384 for a special intoxicating liquor license for clubs. Since no objectors were present, motion was made by Trustee Geidel and seconded by Trustee Wietor that the application be approved. On roll call vote, all members present voted "aye" and the commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

The following ordinance was introduced by Trustee Degner:

ORDINANCE NO. 60-3
AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Territory Annexed. In accordance with s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin statutes of 1957, and the petitioner for direct annexation filed with the village clerk on the 27th day of September, 1960, signed by all of the owners of land in the territory hereinafter described in the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

That part of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S½ SE¼) of Section Nine, Township Twelve North, Range Nineteen East, Washington County, Wisconsin, described as

follows: Commencing at the point of intersection of the north line of said 80 acre tract, with the westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road, said point being marked by an iron pipe and also being identified as the most easterly corner of Lot 8, Block 15 of the Assessors plat of the Village of Kewaskum, said point being south 88 degrees 54 minutes East, 1249.4 feet from the Northwest corner of said 80 acre tract; Thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East, 75 feet; thence North 89 degrees 43 minutes West 25.2 feet to the point of beginning of lands herein described; Thence South 28 degrees 52 minutes East along the wester-

ly line of the Fond du Lac Road, 70 feet; Thence South 61 degrees 08 minutes West, 110 feet; Thence North 11 degrees 37 minutes West 117.23 feet; Thence South 89 degrees 43 minutes East, 86.13 feet to the point of beginning.

SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation. From and after the date of this ordinance the territory described in section 1 shall be a part of the Village of Kewaskum for any and all purposes provided by law and all persons coming or residing within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the

village of Kewaskum.

SECTION 3. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

SECTION 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

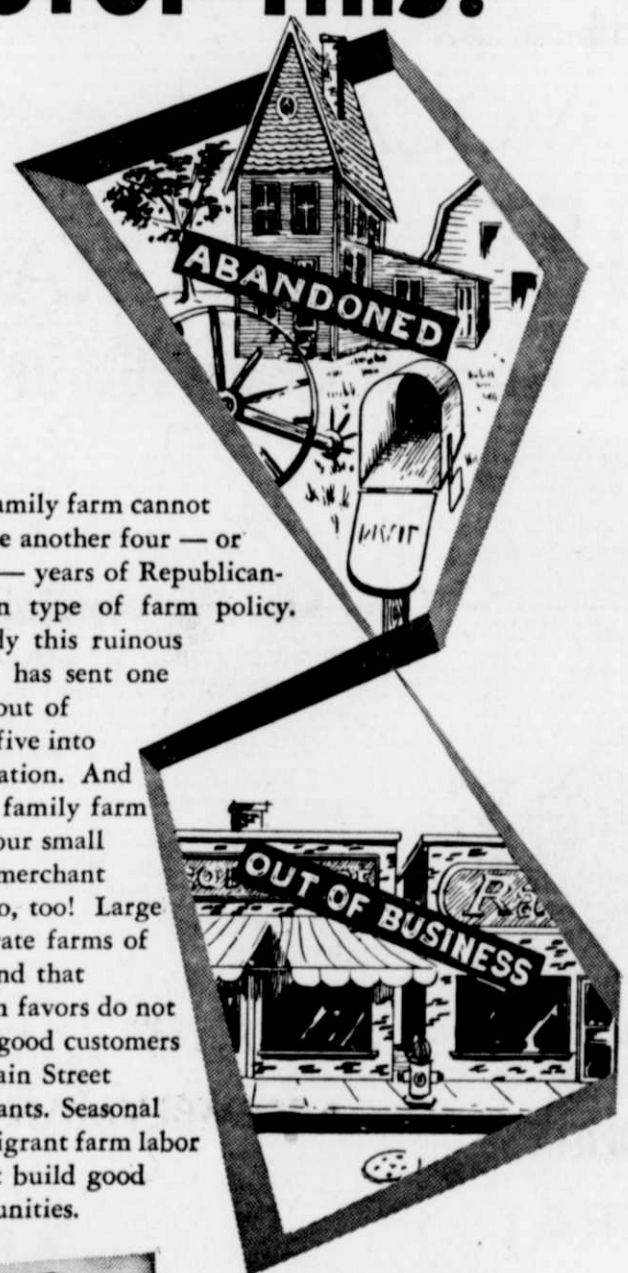

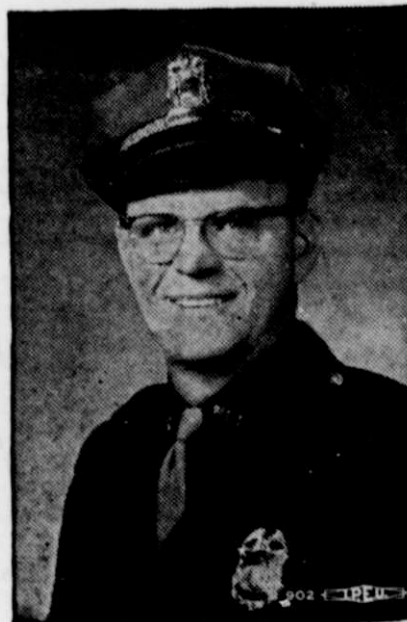
Other Counties Abolish Undersheriff Job!
