Record Vote of 750 Cast in Village As Kennedy Is Elected President, Nelson Governor

Republicans Win Three of State and All County Offices

VAN PELT BEATS MEGELLAS FOR CONGRESS OFFICE BY 18-985 VOTES

An all-time record high vote of 750, exceeding by 90 votes the previous high of 660 set in the presidential election of 1952, was cast in Tuesday's election in the village.

In the closest presidential election in this century, Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the Democratic nominee, was elected President of the United States to succeed Dwight D. Eisenhower. Riding to victory with Kennedy was Lyndon B. Johnson, Democratic floor leader of Texas, as vice-president.

Kennedy defeated Vice-President Richard M. Nixon by about a 400,000 vote margin, which was so close that it took until almost noon on Wednesday before Nixon conceded his defeat and sent congratulations to President-Elect Kennedy. Nixon's running mate was Henry Cabot Lodge.

Even if Nixon had edged Kennedy in the popular vote, he would still have lost the election because Kennedy had more than a majority of the 537 electoral college votes needed to assure victory. At one point late Tuesday night Kennedy had led by two million votes, which later dwindled steadily.

Nixon carried the state of Wisconsin by almost 55,000 votes, also Washington county and the village of Kewaskum. Republicans outpolled the Democrats in the village by about a 2 to 1 margin. There were 331 GOP straight ticket votes in the village and 151 straight Democratic.

Incumbent Democratic Governor Gaylord Nelson was re-elected, defeating Philip G. Kuehn by a margin of around 50,000 votes. The only other Democrat returned to office is Atty. General John W. Reynolds, who won over George Thompson by a narrow margin. Republicans won the three other state offices. Warren P. Knowles defeated the Democratic incumbent Philleo Nash, for lieutenant governor; Robert Z. Zimmerman easily won over William H. Evans for secretary of state, and Dena A. Smith defeated incumbent Eugene M. Lamb for state treasurer.

Sixth District Congressman William K. Van Pelt of Fond du Lac was returned to office. He polled 91,456 votes against 72,471 for his Democratic opponent, James Megellas, in the entire district which consists of Calumet, Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Washington and Winnebago counties.

Prior to the funeral the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home in Kewaskum after 2 p. m. Sunday.

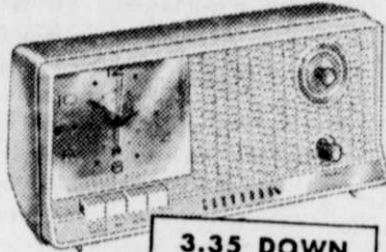

OTTO BARTELT

Otto Bartelt of Slinger, a native of Kewaskum, died at St. Alphonsus hospital, Port Washington, Friday, Nov. 4. He was born at Kewaskum Mar. 28, 1883 and was a son of the late Franz and August Bartelt. He and the former Margaret Kippenhan were married at Wayne in February, 1907. For four years they lived at New Prospect and for the past 49 years in Slinger. Mr. Bartelt was a retired village employee of Slinger.

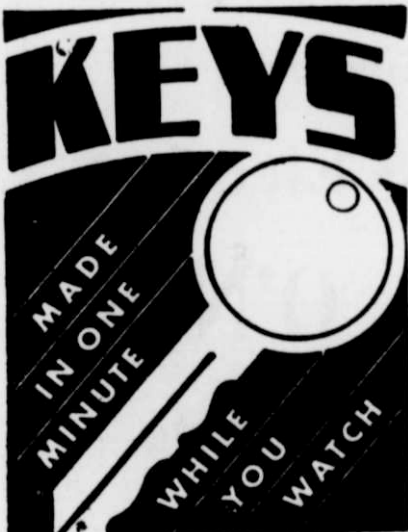

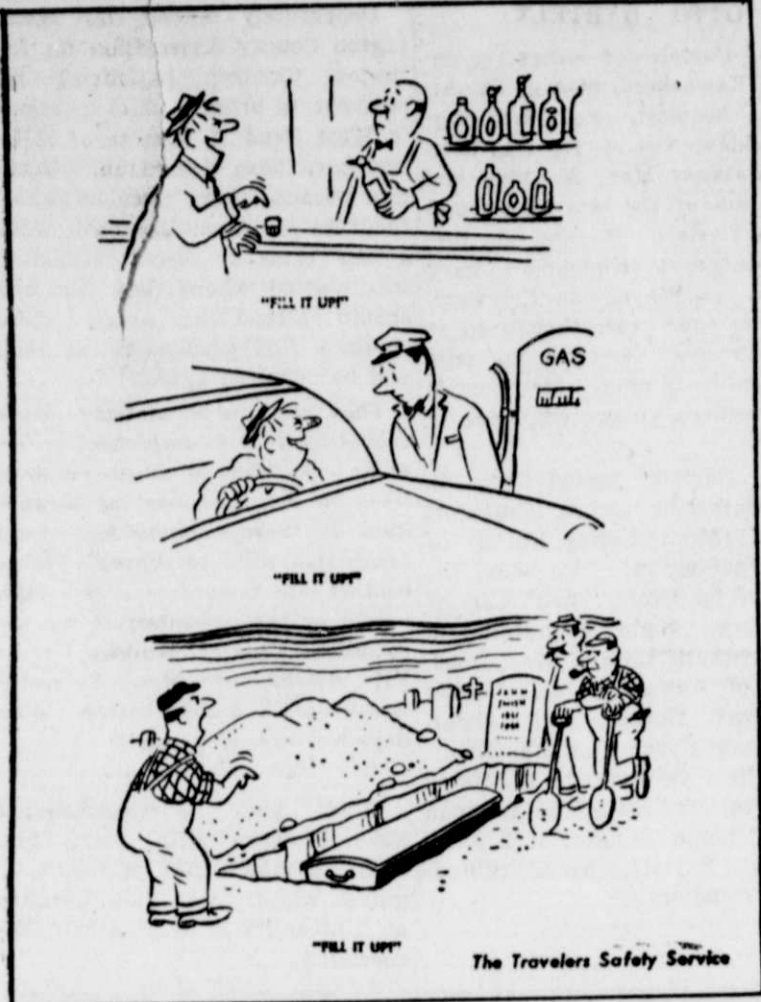

A large buck deer was found on the George Janz farm in the town of Polk, apparently the victim of small game hunters.

A doe fawn was killed by a car Sunday night on the Freistadt road just east of Germantown. A short time later a large buck was killed on US Hwy. 45 south of West Bend. Less than a half hour later, a buck and doe were hit on US Hwy. 41 just north of Menomonee Falls. It is now the height of the rutting season.

Louis Marsel of Pewaukee killed a nice buck Sunday afternoon with

a bow and arrow at the Theresa public hunting grounds.

A doe deer was killed by hunters at the Hartford Public Hunting Grounds. I guess some of the hunters need their eyes tested. People with normal vision should be able to distinguish the difference between a rabbit, squirrel, pheasant or deer.

Squirrel hunting continues good but rabbit hunting has only been fair so far.

The number of opossum killed on the highways is increasing.

Wisconsin vegetable yields were lower this year than in 1959 for beets, lima beans, and sweet corn but higher for cabbage.

Three miles per hour is the top speed for good corn picker operation.

Students to Collect Clothing for Needy

Students in the Kewaskum area are collecting bundles of used clothing to aid needy children and adults in the United States and overseas. The clothing drive, called WORLD CLOTHING WEEK, will continue through next Tuesday, and is part of a nation-wide campaign sponsored by WORLD CLOTHING FUND, Inc., a non-sectarian charitable organization which assists orphans and other needy children and adults.

Superintendent of Schools Clifford Rose has this to say in announcing the drive: "We expect WORLD CLOTHING WEEK to be one of the finest service projects ever conducted in our schools."

The clothing collected will be distributed in poverty stricken areas of America to needy children—some of whom can't even attend school regularly because they haven't a rag or shoe to wear. It goes to orphaned children, too, living in children's homes in the United States and abroad, and to Indian children living on reservations in utter poverty. Free clothing and bedding is also given away by WORLD CLOTHING FUND in disaster areas, when normally self-sufficient families lose all their possessions, should disaster strike here in the form of fire, tornado, earthquake, etc. clothing, bedding and shoes would be made immediately available, and would be shipped within 24 hours. This free clothing will be made available to the community under school auspices if a disaster or emergency situation should occur at any time in the future.

Every school student has received circulars to take home, explaining the purpose of the clothing drive, and asking the cooperation of parents and neighbors. It is hoped everyone will look into his heart and his closets!

Good used clothing is one of the most vital needs of children the world over. More than half of them are inadequately clothed. Through WORLD CLOTHING WEEK, you can prevent a recurrence of tragedy like that in Arizona last winter—when a Navajo Indian boy was found frozen to death, clad only in blue jeans and a T-shirt!

All types of clothing are needed: clothing for babies, children, teen-agers and adults, as well as shoes, caps, mittens and bedding. Clothing contributions may be deposited at the Kewaskum High school, or given to any school student in your neighborhood. If you do not have a student of Kewaskum High school or Kewaskum Public Grade school living near you please phone Kewaskum 83 and they will see that your clothing is collected.

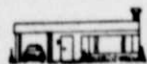

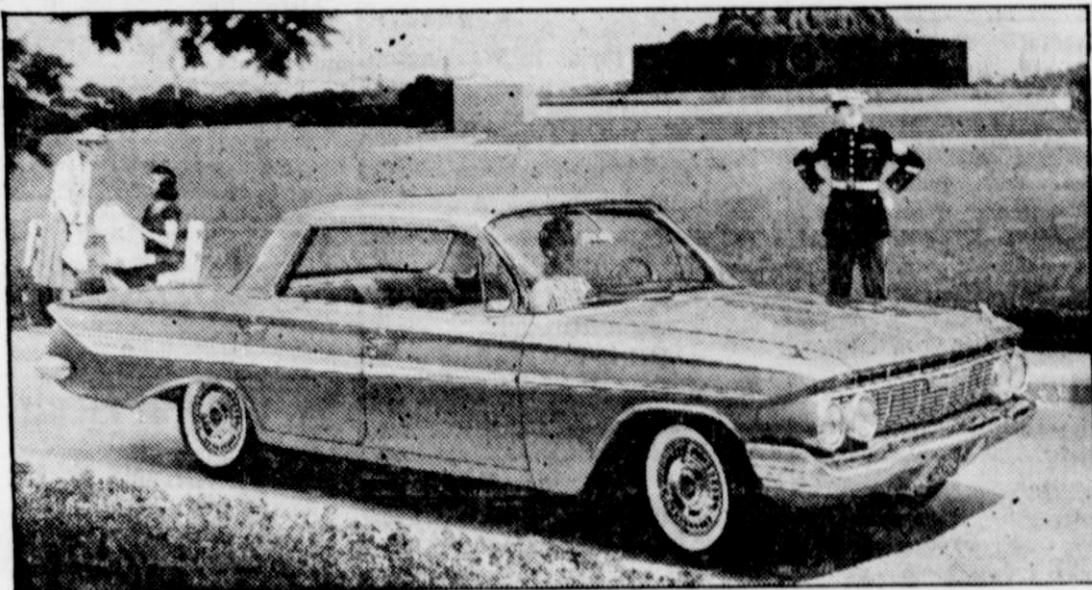

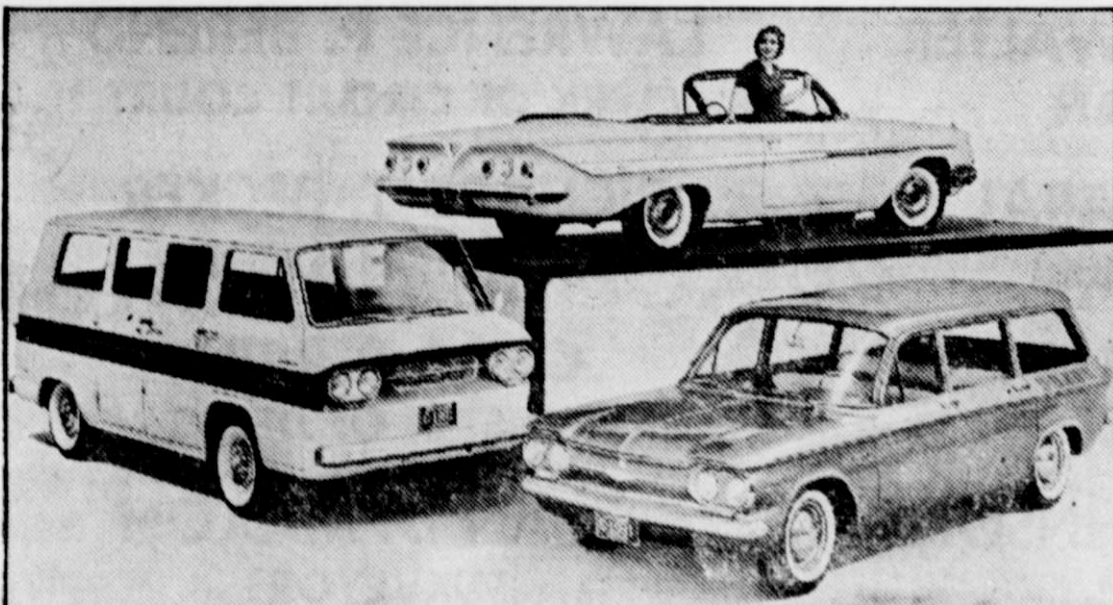

141 New Post Office Buildings Erected in State, 4,886 in Nation

MAIL SERVICE IMPROVED, BIGGEST VOLUME IN HISTORY HANDLED

Nearly 5,000 post office buildings have been constructed since the launching of the department's modern improvement program by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield shortly after his appointment to this position by President Eisenhower in 1953.

In the four-state postal operations region which has headquarters in Minneapolis, there is a total of 323 new buildings as follows: Wisconsin 141, Minnesota 104, North Dakota 39, South Dakota 39. The nation's total, for 15 regions, was 4,886.

It was pointed out by Postmaster Harry E. Koch that while these facilities have been equipped and furnished by the department, the buildings themselves are either leased or rented in line with the completely new policy which has been closely followed during the past seven years.

At least 1,600 new buildings will be added to this total during the current fiscal year. This program not only reduces the government's original expenditure substantially but also means substantial additions to the tax rolls in the communities where the new structures are located since they are not tax-exempt.

"This type of operation has resulted in more and more new mail handling each year since it was first inaugurated," Postmaster Koch said, "and it is my understanding that the annual report will reveal a new all-time high for the fiscal year 1960 ending June 30 when agreements were signed for 1,602 new buildings costing a little over \$1,000,000,000. We have been told that this is part of a program to completely modernize between 12,000 and 15,000 postal facilities during the next few years.

"It is doubtful if the Post Office Department was ever before as careful in making preliminary scientific and engineering checks and surveys in order to be sure that the new facilities will adequately take care of present postal needs in their various communities, and future growth as well."

In addition to the new buildings being made available under the commercial leasing program, the department completed plans during fiscal 1960 for modernizing post offices located in 106 federal buildings throughout the United States and plans are already under way for 31 similar projects.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield recently revealed how the postal service has been improved in the past seven and a half years and is now handling the biggest volume of mail in its history in the most economical and efficient manner on record.

In more than 80 'metropolitan areas' some 168 million people are now getting next day delivery of first class mail anywhere within their respective areas. This represents a radical change when compared with 1953.

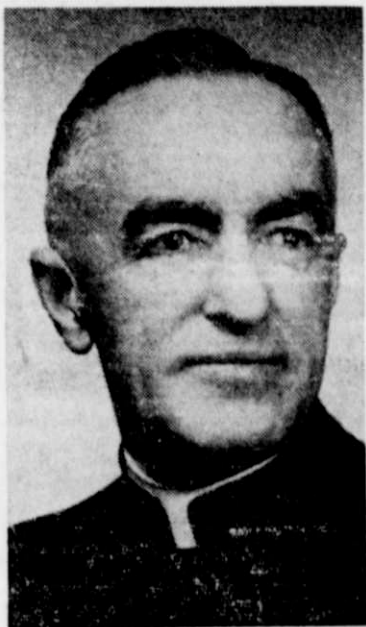
Mail service on rural delivery routes has actually been extended to benefit an additional 1,500,000 families. At the same time, 1,400 rural routes have been consolidated with annual savings in excess of \$4,000,000.

There were established 629 contract stations and branches in or-

der to provide better service for the public. About 5,700 post offices that were found to be unnecessary have been discontinued with a saving of nearly \$9,000,000 a year. A comparison between any corresponding statistics for 1953 and 1960 would show the cumulative effects of all the day-by-day improvements under the guidance of Postmaster General Summerfield. "His constant goal," Postmaster Koch said, "has been to improve service while holding the line on costs through greater efficiency. The results speak for themselves."
