## Village Buys 4-Wheel Drive Tractor-Shovel At Cost of \$11,000.00

BOARD AUTHORIZES WATER DEPT. TO BORROW \$21,000 FOR OPERATING COSTS

Regular Meeting November 7, 1960  
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by C. N. Wietor and duly carried.

Mr. Kilian, agent for Hartford Mutual Insurance Company, presented a proposal for boiler and pumping equipment insurance. Matter was referred to the proper committee.

Francis Bohn applied for a driveway easement across the sewage plant property to his land located directly north of the sewage disposal plant. The matter was referred to the proper committee.

The proposals for a four-wheel drive tractor-shovel were tabulated as follows. All proposals included enclosed cab, windshield wiper, defroster, heater, anti-freeze and floor mat.

All proposals were tabled pending further discussion.

A resolution authorizing the Water Department of the Village of Kewaskum to make a borrowing in the sum of \$21,000.00.

WHEREAS, the provisions of Section 66.066 (4) of the Wisconsin Statutes of the year 1957 authorize any village in the State of Wisconsin, by action of its governing body, in order to provide for or to secure the payment of the costs of improving, conducting, controlling, operating or managing its water works system, which constitute a public utility, to pledge, assign or otherwise hypothecate the net earnings or profits derived or to be derived from the operation of such public utility and may issue such evidence of indebtedness as may be proper under

## COUNTY DEER KILL ONLY 17; DR. RUMSEY BAGS TWO

The deer kill in Washington county during the shotgun slug season which closed Sunday was disappointingly poor. Only 17 deer were recorded at the two county checking points in West Bend and Hartford. Last year a total hunting kill of 314 deer was reported in the county. The number of deer killed by cars in the county this year, believed to be about 40 animals, far exceeds the number killed during the gun season. Poor hunting weather and lack of snow are blamed for the low deer kill.

Since last week's issue, two more local hunters reported being successful in bagging deer in the north woods. Dr. H. L. Rumsey not only shot his buck but also bagged a doe, the party deer for his group. Don Below also reported shooting his buck.





## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Washington County Conservation Warden

At the time the deer season closed Sunday evening, Hartford had registered 11 bucks, Port Washington 12 and West Bend 11. During the 1959 season about 350 were registered in the two counties.

In the past nine days 2 bucks and 1 doe were killed on Washington county highways, a doe and a fawn were shot and left in the woods to rot by hunters.

Duck hunters, the time is here to remove your blinds from the waters. Regulations provide that it is illegal to place, throw or leave on the waters or ice of this state, any cans, bottles, debris, refuse or other solid waste materials. When you no longer have use for your blind, it becomes solid waste material and must be removed.

er the provisions of this statute; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum by action duly taken as required by law, has heretofore constructed a water works system, and has extended, added to, and improved said system, and has conducted, operated and manages such water works system as a public utility; and

WHEREAS, it is advisable and necessary for the health, welfare and safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Kewaskum that said water works continue to be operated and managed; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum does resolve as follows:

That for the purpose of improving, conducting, controlling, operating and managing said water works system of the Village of Kewaskum, said Water Department be and it is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of Twenty One Thousand Dollars (\$21,000.00) from the Bank of Kewaskum, Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and that there be issued to evidence said indebtedness the promissory notes of the Water Department of the Village of Kewaskum, said notes to be dated the 15th day of November, 1960, to be in a series of seven notes, the notes numbered 1 through 7 to be in the principal sum of \$3,000.00, and that the notes shall mature as follows:


