Judge Bucklin Dies in Plunge From Hospital

Judge Frank W. Bucklin, 80, of West Bend, who served as Washington county judge for 27 years prior to his retirement on Jan. 31, 1953, died Wednesday morning, Dec. 28, in a plunge from third story window at St. Joseph's hospital in that city, where he had been a patient for about a month with a heart condition.

The point where the judge fell to earth is just south of the ambulance entrance at the north wing of the hospital. At that point the third story window is five stories above the ground.

Judge Bucklin had locked himself in his bathroom on the third floor level, opened the window, placed a towel on the window sill and sat on the ledge. When hospital workers learned from a visitor who entered that he was sitting on the ledge they made desperate attempts to reach him. Talking to him, they pleaded with him not to jump. By the time a key was obtained to unlock the bathroom door from the outside, the judge, according to witnesses, said, "I'm going now," and fell to the frozen ground below.

He plummeted to earth just as hospital workers opened the door and made a futile attempt to grasp him. Police, firemen and rescue squad members who had been called had just arrived on the scene. Firemen arrived too late to raise the aerial ladder to halt his plunge.

Judge Bucklin came to Washington county from Brodhead and began his career as a teacher. In 1905 he was elected county superintendent of schools, serving three terms until 1911. After studying law, he opened a law office in West Bend and later was elected county judge. He began serving in that capacity in 1926, until his retirement in 1953. He also served as juvenile court judge for many years.

The judge was prominent in West Bend, Washington county and state legal circles. He was also active in civic affairs and was a member at various times of the hospital board, school board and headed many charity drives. He also was treasurer of the Barton Corporation and served as a director in other capacities of firms.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed at the time of this writing Wednesday. The Ohlrogge Funeral home, West Bend is in charge.

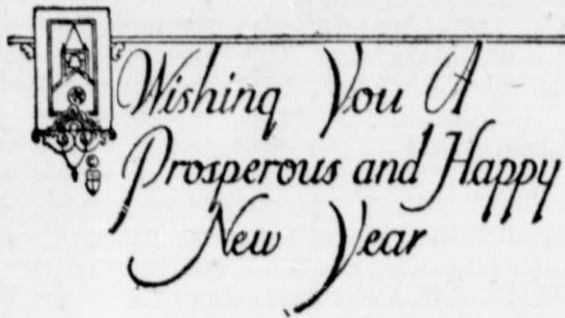
Gwen Edwards, Jules Dreher Wed

FLIES TO CALIFORNIA FOR BROTHER'S FUNERAL

Dorwin Perkins of Kewaskum flew to San Francisco, Calif. on Thursday, Dec. 15, to attend funeral services for his brother, Carl, 66, who passed away on Tuesday, Dec. 13, there. He chartered a jet plane from O'Hare Field in Chicago and arrived in San Francisco six hours later.

Carl was Dorwin's last surviving brother of the Perkins family. The funeral was held Friday, Dec. 16, at 2:30 p. m. from the chapels of Arthur J. Sullivan and Co. in San Francisco, with interment at Cypress Lawn cemetery.

Perkins flew back via jet on Tuesday of last week, reporting a very impressive trip, made especially interesting by the route maps distributed to all passengers on the plane and loud speaking system over which the cities and places of interest the plane was passing over were announced.

Village Receives \$3,755 Share of Hwy. Tax Returns

Every city, village and town in the state has received a share of the \$6,724,424 highway tax allotment on motor vehicles distributed in mid-December by the State Highway Commission. This is the final portion of some \$37 million in state highway funds returned to the municipal units of government during the year.

A total of \$87,279.96 from the motor vehicle tax return was distributed in Washington county to the following municipalities: Cities of Hartford \$8,735.97, West Bend \$18,158.53; Villages of Barton \$2,114.60, Germantown \$2,085.63, Jackson \$1,683.12, Kewaskum \$3,754.99, Slinger \$3,508.03, and 13 towns \$47,239.09.

The present allocation is the so-called "privilege highway tax" that since 1931 has replaced the general property taxes previously assessed locally on autos and trucks. The distribution is based on registrations and title fees for vehicles customarily kept in the respective municipalities according to established boundaries as of Jan. 1.

The law specifies that the allotment for each municipality must at least be equal to the amount of property tax collected locally on motor vehicles prior to 1931. However, only about six per cent of the state's 1,835 municipalities are still paid at the 1931 rate, and the total payment differential amounts to only \$45,466 on the present schedule. The other 94 per cent of the communities are receiving amounts larger than the 1931 rate because of increased vehicle registrations and fees.

This year's distribution is up \$287,000 over the \$6,437,421 sent out in 1959, reflecting an approximate 2-3 per cent yearly increase in motor vehicle registrations. Under the allocation formula cities received \$3,945,661, towns received \$2,062,746, and villages \$716,017.

OBTAINS UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS FALSELY, FINED

On Dec. 29, Theodore C. Mertert, R. 1, Slinger, was arraigned in the county court of Washington county on a charge of making false statements to obtain unemployment compensation benefits. The defendant was found guilty and was fined \$25.00 and costs.

The charges in this case were brought by Wisconsin's Industrial Commission, which administers the unemployment compensation law. The commission stated that this defendant claimed benefits falsely by concealing his earnings and was prosecuted accordingly, pursuant to law.

The commission also recovered from the defendant the benefits received illegally.

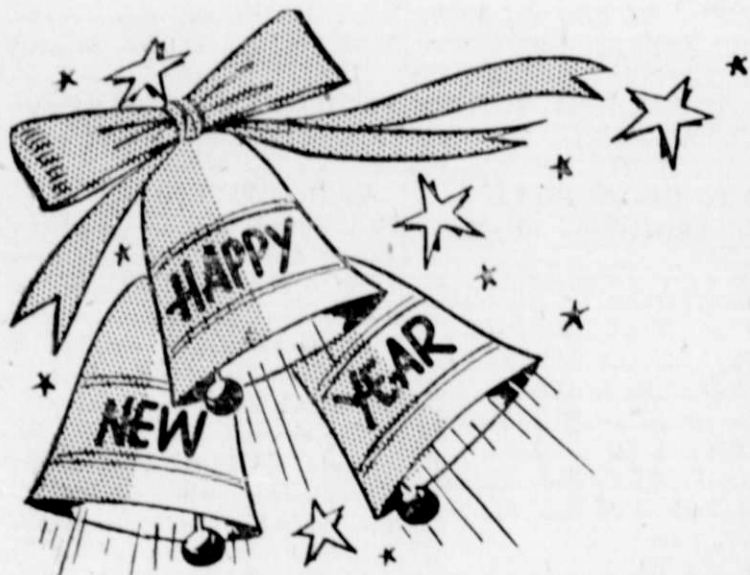

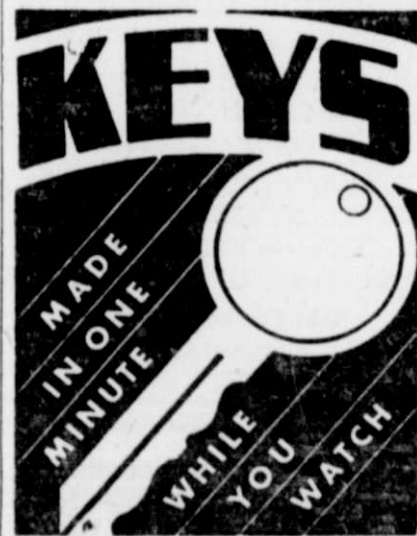
