## Board to Visit 3 Other Schools to Assist in Building Program Study

THEUSCH AGAIN SUGGESTS YEAR-ROUND SCHOOL PLAN

The board of education will visit schools in Kimberly, Two Rivers and New London on Jan. 11 to view their architectural structure and design in connection with a proposed three-phase building program for the Kewaskum school district.

The visitation date was decided upon when the board met Monday night. Members of the Citizens Advisory Building Committee will be invited to accompany them.

The advisory committee is a group of volunteers who responded to the board's request for such a group. Since forming in October, they have studied the proposed building plans and have recommended that the program be offered to the electorate as a package plan. Included are additions to the Wayne, Farmington Schools and Kewaskum High School.

Board member Richard Theusch again suggested that consideration be given to the year-round school plan, in lieu of a building program at this time. He said such a plan is being studied by the West Bend school district.

It is known as the 45-15 Plan under which three quarters of the school population is in school at any one time. Each of the groups goes to school for 45 days and then has 15 days of vacation. The district is divided geographically so that all children in a given family are in school at the same time.

Noting that the 45-15 Plan is in operation elsewhere, Supt. Marshall Boyd said the plan is "workable" but that "we would have to do a cost analysis of it." He contended that the year-round plan would not result in a saving of dollars to which Theusch replied "probably not in the first year or so."

The request from Miss Rita Featherstone that she be released from her contract to teach kindergarten at Farmington School beginning with the second semester was tabled until a replacement can be found. Her contract was approved at the Dec. 14 meeting. She told Supt. Boyd since then she was offered a contract to teach closer to her home in the Delavan area.

Boyd reported that at a meeting of high school superintendents in the Scenic Moraine Conference, they went on record suggesting that the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA) should not be given total authority to re-align all schools in Wisconsin. Rather the WIAA should have authority to align a school unable to break into a conference through its own efforts.

The superintendents also went on record as being opposed to glass bounding boards on basketball courts and the widening of goal posts on football fields by two feet. They favored a morning weigh-in for wrestlers.

The board adjourned into executive session listed on the agenda as "negotiations review."

## Republicans Here Form Affiliate Chapter, Elect

A Kewaskum Chapter of the Washington County Republican Organization has been organized and the group held their first annual meeting and election of officers last week at the American Legion clubhouse.

Attorney Richard Becker, chairman of the County Republican Organization, officially notified the group that the County Executive Committee had approved of the Kewaskum branch as an affiliate.

Officers and directors of the organization were elected as follows: President, Dr. R. G. Edwards; Vice President, Clayton Stautz; Treasurer, Lester Francke; Secretary, Orv Behnke; Directors for two years, Gregor Nigh, Howard "Bud" Rumsey and Clifford Stautz; Directors for one year, Dan Rodenkireh and August Bilgo, Sr.

Annual dues, which will provide membership for both the local and the county organization, were set at \$5.00. Plans call for the holding of six meetings or more per year as scheduled by the officers and each member or potential member will be notified of the meetings and activities in the chapter's newsletter.

The annual meeting and election of officers and directors was perpetually set for the second Wednesday following the state and national election date in November. The present membership will be starting a membership sign-up and they invite citizens of the Kewaskum Community High School area to become members.

I am going to take this opportunity to list several suggestions which may prevent your arrest for improper operation of a snowmobile:

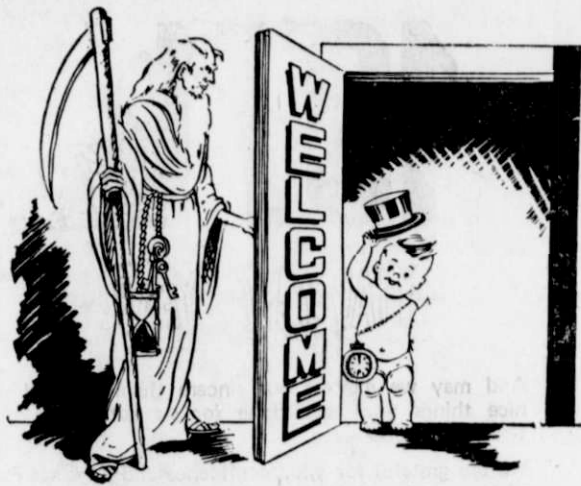

### Two Judgeships Up For Spring Election

Both Circuit Judge Milton L. Meister and Judge Robert J. Stoltz of County Court, Branch II, will be up for election at the non-partisan judicial election on April 6, 1971, County Clerk Anton P. Staral has announced. The terms of office of both judges, which are for six years, expire on the first Monday in January, 1972.

Nomination papers for the two judgeships may be circulated from Jan. 1 to Jan. 26, 1971. The later date is the final day for filing nomination papers at 5 p. m. As yet there have been no indications of anyone contemplating running against the incumbent judges.

Judge Meister serves the 24th judicial circuit which consists of Washington and Ozaukee counties. His salary, as fixed by the state, is \$21,000 per year and is paid by the state. He also receives \$2,500 from the two counties in addition to his state salary.

Judge Stoltz presides over Branch II of county court in Washington County. His salary, as fixed by the state, is \$18,500, of which the county pays half. Each of the two county judges, Judge Stoltz and Judge J. Tom Merriam of Branch I of county court, receive an additional \$6,000 from Washington County.

Both Judge Meister and Judge Stoltz are in their second terms.

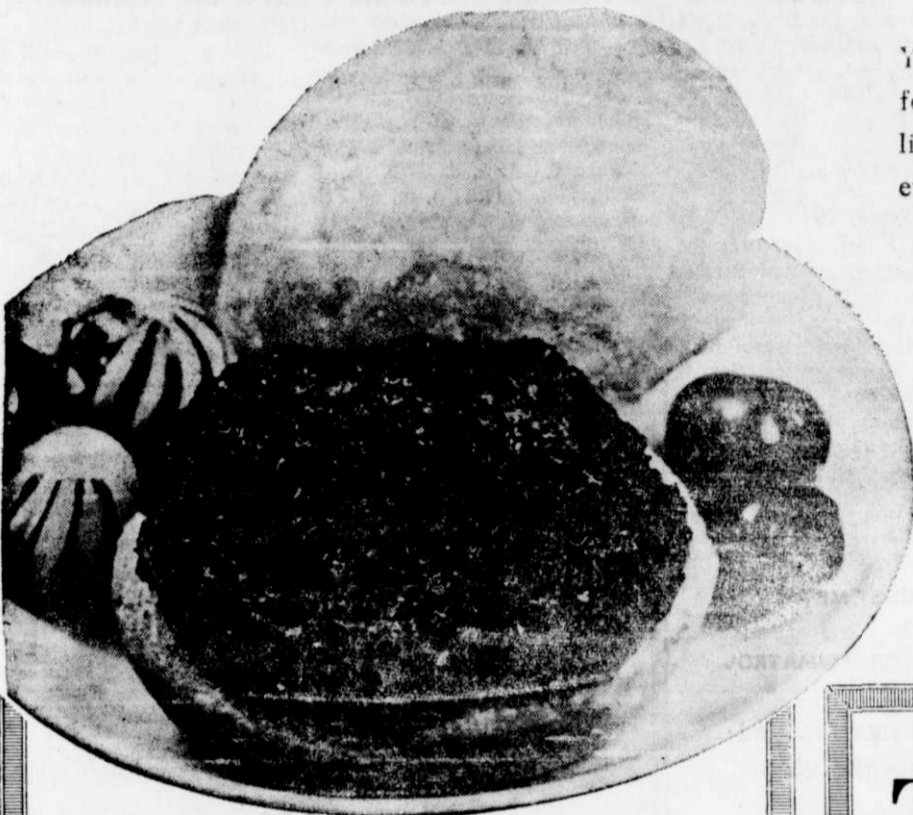

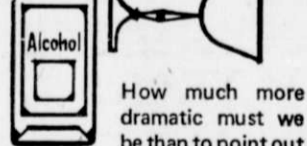

**safety belts**



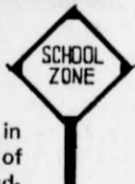
