## Village Board Awards Bids Totaling \$425,678 for Sewage Plant Additions

### ORDINANCE REGULATING SNOWMOBILES REQUESTED

Contracts totaling \$425,678 for additions and improvements to the village sewage treatment plant were awarded by the village board at its regular meeting Monday night. Bids were opened Dec. 21.

Contracts were let after James Elder of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers, told the board he had checked the bids and found them "to be in good order." He recommended the following be accepted:

Westra Construction, Waupun, \$392,735 for general construction; Burkhardt Electric, West Bend, \$22,810 for electrical work; Jos. Wittig Co., West Bend, \$4,442 for plumbing; R. P. Honold Co., Inc., Sheboygan, \$5,691 for heating and ventilating.

The project has a one-year completion date. New equipment will be added to bring the level of sewage treatment up to standards set by the Department of Natural Resources. The plant was built originally to handle 450,000 gallons of sewage per day. When expanded it will have a one million gallon per day capacity.

It is anticipated that as much as 80 per cent of the cost may be recovered through state and federal aids. The application has been approved.

The board voted unanimously to accept the offer of the Milwaukee Co., to finance the project in the sum of \$490,000 in 10-year promissory notes with interest of 13.3525 per cent. August Koch presented the sealed proposal.

In view of the fact that bids, when opened, totaled \$442,593, The Milwaukee Co. was asked to give a proposal on \$490,000 which would include engineering fees and contingencies.

However, in awarding the contracts Monday night, alternate bids were selected in two areas. This resulted in a saving of \$16,915. The Milwaukee Co. will be asked to adjust accordingly the amount and the interest.

Village Commissioner William Martin was authorized to arrange for financing the sewer and water project currently underway in Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. The project itself involves about \$177,000. Engineering fees and contingencies will bring it very close to \$195,000, Martin stated. About \$38,000 would be eligible for state and federal aids.

The loan will be set up with the Bank of Kewaskum in the form of 10-year promissory notes bearing 5½ per cent interest, with pre-payment privileges. The village will recover \$118,958 from property owners in the subdivision who will be assessed roughly \$16 per foot of street frontage they own. Some may want to defer payment over several years. Such deferral may be set up with the village at 8 per cent interest.

Currently underway is a study of sewer and water rates to village

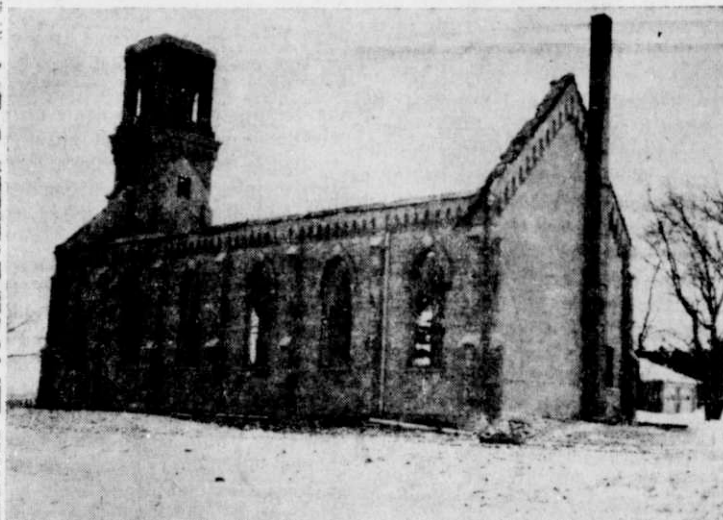

## St. Michaels Church Is Destroyed By Fire When Lightning Strikes



St. Michael's Catholic Church at St. Michaels, located about three miles east of Kewaskum, was destroyed early Monday morning by fire believed to have been caused by a bolt of lightning striking the steeple of the church.

The above photo shows the brick walls and tower which were all that remained following the fire which completely destroyed the interior of the 86-year-old structure.

The bolt of lightning struck the tower with such force at about 2:40 a. m. that the entire community was awakened by the terrific concussion. A severe thunder clap following in the wake of the lightning bolt was felt in the entire community including not only St. Michaels but Kewaskum, West Bend and the entire area said they never heard such a severe concussion. It was more like an explosion or sonic boom, only louder. It caused many Kewaskum residents to jump out of bed with a scare to investigate what had happened. A short time after they retired again the fire siren sounded. People at St. Michaels were almost thrown out of their beds by the bolt.

Light and power were "out" for a time and telephones throughout the area were knocked out of service. Mrs. Marvin Johann said the lightning bolt and resulting crash were so severe that her entire household was awakened. A son, Bill, dashed outside to see if their house was struck. An overnight friend, the Johanns' daughter, Jane, a student at Marquette University, and six Chinese students who were overnight guests were also awakened.

Another neighbor residing across the street from the church who was awakened, was reported to have said that from his window he saw the top of the steeple burning after the bolt struck. The flames appeared to be burning out when he saw flames suddenly shooting out of the interior of the church, where the lightning evidently caused a fire or explosion. Just about everyone in the St. Michaels vicinity was aroused by the bolt and resulting fire.

It is odd enough to have an electric storm in this section of the country in January but even more unusual for such severe lightning and thunder. The storm followed an all-day snowstorm Sunday which turned into sleet early Monday and then was followed by rain. The snow left about 10 more

inches on the ground and was accompanied by winds and drifting.

Three fire departments fought the blaze, including Boltonville, Fillmore and Kewaskum. As the church could not be saved, firemen concentrated their efforts on saving the school, hall, parsonage and other buildings on the grounds.

Fire Chief Elmer Belger of Boltonville said his department was called at 3:14 a. m. and when they arrived flames were coming out of the northeast corner of the roof where a lightning rod had burned off. He said his men were on duty until 9:10 a. m. Monday. Kewaskum firemen remained at the scene until 6:30 a. m. and the Fillmore department until 7:30. About 25 men from Kewaskum, 20 from Fillmore and 31 from Boltonville fought the blaze. The Kewaskum firemen were called out at 3:45 a. m., about a half hour after Boltonville.

The bolt of lightning not only caused power and telephone service to be disrupted in the St. Michaels community but also

## \$1,100 Reported Stolen or Missing From Local Store

Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty reported that a money pouch containing cash, a check and other valuable papers valued at \$1,100, is believed to have been either stolen or lost last Thursday afternoon from the Gamble Store Agency at 240 Main St. owned by Frank J. Felix. The approximate redeemable amount totaled about \$375. Over \$200 of this amount was in cash. Felix reported the loss at about 5:45 p. m. the same day, which was the afternoon before New Year's Eve. He did not report the loss earlier because he believed the pouch might still be found.

Felix told Chief Hlavaty that he was alone in the store at about 3:30 p. m. getting ready to prepare a bank deposit, before the bank closed at 4:00 p. m.

At this time several people entered the store both colored and white. Mrs. Felix then entered the store from their upstairs apartment. One of the shoppers diverted her attention by asking prices of items displayed in the window. The other shoppers strolled around.

After all but one customer had left, whom Mrs. Felix was waiting on, Mr. Felix again went to finish preparing the deposit, but the pouch, from which other checks had already been taken out, was missing.

## Area Fishermen Escape When Car Sinks Through Ice on Winnebago

Three area fishermen escaped possible drowning when their car broke through the ice and sank to the bottom on Lake Winnebago Saturday afternoon.

The fishermen in the group included Richard "Dugan" Dreher of R. 2, Campbellsport, David Oppermann and "Tiny" Michels of West Bend. Dreher and Oppermann are both former Kewaskum residents.

The trio had been fishing out of Pipe on the east shore of Winnebago and they were returning to shore when the mishap occurred. The car they occupied was owned and driven by Michels.

It was reported the fishermen were about one mile out of Pipe when they hit a water spot on the ice. Another vehicle ahead of them got across the spot but their car stalled, probably from the motor getting wet. The front end of the car sank through the ice but fortunately the rear end got caught on some hard snow which held it up long enough for the men to escape although they were in water up to their chests before they managed to get out of the

car. Michels was the first to escape, followed by Dreher, and Oppermann broke a window to escape, it was reported. None of them were injured. Observers believed that had they been older men they might not have escaped, but all of them being young men, they were able to scramble out onto the ice.

The auto sank to the bottom of the lake in about 15 feet of water, where it is still resting. The car will have to be removed from the lake bottom but this cannot be accomplished until the ice is thicker and safe for workmen to venture out on the ice with their equipment. Due to the fact that the weather had not been too cold (up to this week) and a heavy cover of snow on the lake, the ice did not freeze well and was said to be only about eight inches thick.

On Sunday two skin divers, LeRoy Keller, Jr. of Kewaskum and Dick Becker of Dundee, submerged under the ice and retrieved the fishermen's equipment and gear.

broke windows as it rocked the area.

The Rev. William Bonesho is pastor of the congregation of about 80 families. The church was built in 1884.

Father Bonesho entered the smoke-filled church clad only in bedroom slippers, trousers and T-shirt and was able to save the ciborium and the pix, which contain consecrated hosts. Pastor of the parish since June, Fr. Bonesho said Gerald Backhaus and his son awakened him and reported the church was on fire. The pastor had been awakened by the thunder clap but did not see anything amiss and returned to bed. When he entered the church later he "felt his way" to the altar area through the dense smoke and saved the vessels. He was unable to save any of the vestments. Fr. Bonesho said he was thankful no one was burned or injured and it could have been disastrous if it had occurred while services were in progress. He said the lightning bolt lit his entire room.

Chief Belger said the street on which the church is located was unplowed but firemen managed to get through the snow. The fire siren sounded twice in Kewaskum. A number of firemen were snowed in and couldn't get their cars out of their driveways which were drifted shut. As a result they had to walk to the fire station. Fillmore and Kewaskum firemen were summoned by Belger, who said the Gerald Backhaus family gave the alarm.

Mrs. Lorraine Fellenz, who cooks for church affairs and does housework at the rectory, said the bolt left her very shaky and unnerved. It broke a window in her nearby home, cracked others, knocked down a wall plaque and crucifix to the floor and broke them, and knocked drapery fixtures off a window sill.

Chief Belger said the lightning apparently struck the tower on the east front of the church and ignited the roof area. He reported the entire structure was gutted out but the damage could not yet be estimated. He said the bolt

knocked out a hole in a wall near the entry and the force slammed two radiators from each side of the entryway together in the center of the doorway area. The snow cover on the roofs helped but the heat was so intense the snow melted.

### RESUME CONFERENCE PLAY AT GERMANTOWN TONIGHT

The Kewaskum Indians swung back into basketball action following the holiday vacation with an easy 77-54 win in a non-conference game at Lomira Tuesday night. The Lions are members of the Flyway Conference, and the victory was a warm-up for the Indians before returning to Scenic Moraine loop play at Germantown tonight (Friday).

Kewaskum, 3-1, is tied with Mayville and Pewaukee for the Scenic lead with 10 big games to go. The win at Lomira gave them a 7-1 record on the season.

The Indians outscored Lomira in every quarter but the last when subs finished the game. They led 21-11 at the quarter, 43-22 at halftime, and held a whopping 63-35 advantage going into

the final period. The reserves added 14 points in the final stanza while the Lions made 19.

Tricky guard Dennis Smith paced both teams in scoring with 21 points on 10 baskets and a free throw. He was again helped by Clark Eichstedt taking the ball off the boards and feeding Smith on a fast break and long pass down the floor. Clark had another big night on the boards, hauling down 22 rebounds. And this wasn't all, he also scored 12 points, made six assists and four steals. Eichstedt, although he has been feeding the ball a lot, is second in Scenic Moraine scoring behind Rod Barbera of Hartland.

In the past few contests, the Indians have come up with balanced scoring which proved successful. Along with the above two's scoring, Bob Mertz, a great jumper and rebounder, came up with 16 points and junior Glen Eichstedt added 15. Then Tuesday night the Indians host Pewaukee, which is tied with them for first place, in what should be a real barn burner. Pewaukee has two high scorers in Wank and Beno.

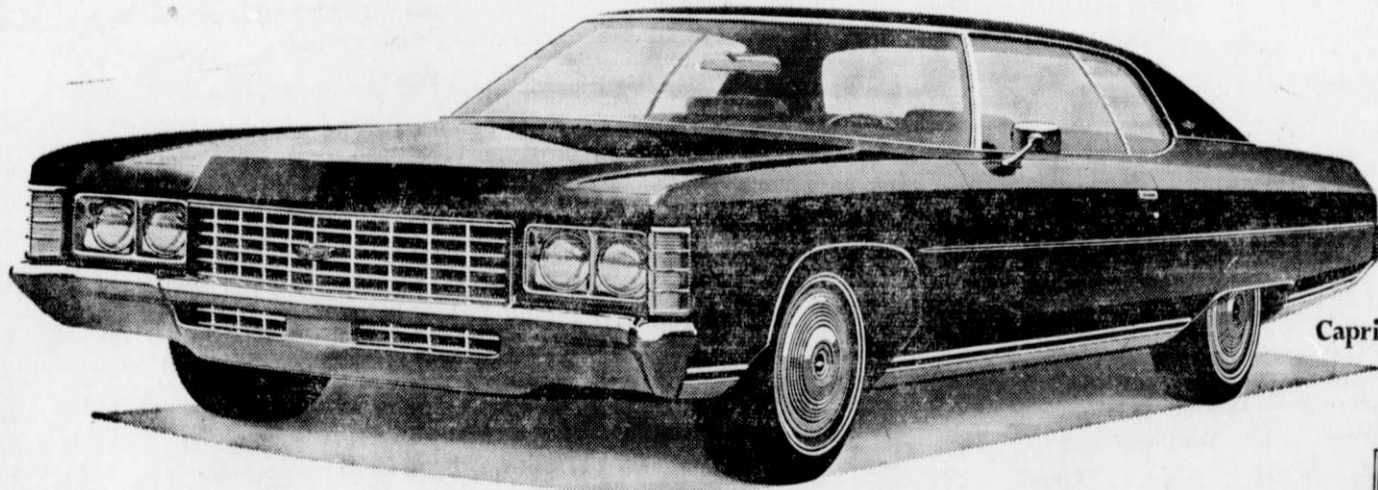
