# Village Board Awards Bids Totaling St. Michaels Church Is Destroyed \$425,678 for Sewage Plant Additions By Fire When Lightning Strikes

ORDINANCE RÉGULATING SNOWMOBILES REQUESTED

Contracts totaling \$425,678 for additions and improvements to the village sewage treatment plant! were awarded by the village mas home decorating contest board at its regular meeting Monday night. Bids were opened Dec.

Contracts were let after James Elder of Stone and Robinson, con-ganizations and clubs. Cash asulting engineers, told the board wards in each category of \$11.00, he had checked the bids and found \$8.00 and \$6.00 were presented to them "to be in good order." He recommended the following be accepted:

Westra Construction, Waupur, \$392,735 for general construction; Burckhardt Electric, West Bend. \$22,810 for electrical work; Jos. Wittig Co., West Bend, \$4,442 for plumbing; R. P. Honold Co., Inc., Sheboygan, \$5,691 for heating and ventilating.

The project has a one-year completion date. New equipment will be added to bring the level of newage treatment up to standards set by the Department of Natural Resources. The plant was built originally to handle 450,000 gallons of sewage per day. When expanded it will have a one million gallon per day capacity.

It is anticipated that as much as 80 per cent of the cost may be recovered through state and federal aids. The application has been approved.

Father Bonesho entered the smoke-filled church clad only in bedroom slippers, trousers and Tshirt and was able to save the ciborium and the pix, which contain said Gerald Backhaus and his son awakened him and reported the church was on fire. The pastor had been awakened by the thunder clap but did not see anything amiss and returned to bed. When he entered the church later he felt his way" to the altar area through the dense smoke and saved the vessels. He was unable to save any of the vestments. Fr. He said the lightning bolt lit his entire room.

Chief Belger said the street on which the church is located was unplowed but firemen managed to get through the snow. The fire siren sounded twice in Kewaskum. A number of firemen were snowed in and couldn't get their cars out of their driveways which were drifted shut. As a result they had to walk to the fire station. Fillmore and Kewaskum firemen were summoned by Belger, who said the Gerald Backhaus family gave the alarm.

Mrs. Lorraine Fellenz, who cooks for church affairs and does housework at the rectory, said the bolt left her very shaky and unnerved. It broke a window in her nearby home, cracked others, knocked down a wall plaque and crucifix to the floor and broke them, and knocked drapery fixtures off a window sill.

Chief Belger said the lightning pparently struck the tower on the east front of the church and ignited the roof area. He reported the entire structure was gutted out but the damage could not yet be estimated. He said the oolt

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




