

Indians Win 2 More. Retain Tie for Lead

GERMANTOWN, PEWAUKEE ARE LATEST VICTIMS

The Kewaskum Indians posted two big victories the past week to run their Scenic Moraine Conference streak to five in a row and retain their first place tie with Mayville. After losing their opener at Hartland, Coach Mike Williams' Indians have shown improvement in each game and have again now become a strong contender to defend their championship although lesing five starters off last year's championship team.

Playing at Germantown Wash ington Friday night, Kewaskum won surprisingly easy, 68-41, a margin of 27 points. Previously the Warhawks had shown some strength on occasion. Tuesday night at home the Indians bested Pewaukee, 68-58, in a victory that was not so easy but one Kewaskum had to work for to come out on top. Pewaukee, which came here boasting a 3-2 record, has a big team and one that is pretty sound all the way around.

In burying Germantown, the Indians outscored them in every quarter. After jumping off to a 17-12 first quarter lead, the Indians ran away from them in the second period, 17-8, to take a commanding 34-20 halftime advantage. They continued to outpoint them in the third quarter, 18-8, and went way ahead, 52-28, before easing up in the final stanza but still outscoring them, 16-13.

It was sort of a battle between the Eichstedt brothers for Kewaskum against the colored Henry brothers for Germantwon. Clark the senior brother, rammed in 28 points for Kewaskum with brother Glen hitting 13. Clark hauled down 9 rebounds and Glen 7. Junior Wilbur Henry got 14 points for the Warhawks and his brother Mike collected 12. The Henry brothers also accounted for a majerity of Germantown's 31 rebounds.

While Kewaskum was defeating Pewaukee Tuesday, Mayville also won over Germantown to keep pace with the Indians in the first place race. But Germantown gave Mayville a surprisingly rough game, losing by only 7 points, 59-52. while Kewaskum blasted the same Germantown team Friday by 27 points.

The Indians outscored Pewauke in 3 of the 4 quarters but the Pirates staved within catching distance all the way. Kewaskum possessed a 16-10 lead at the quarter and increased it to 35-24 at the intermission. The visitors outscored Kewaskum in the third period, 16-14. to narrow the gap to 9 points. After a close final quarter, Kewas kum wound up with a 10-point

victory. Clark and Glen Eichstedt poured in 20 and 18 points respectively to pace Kewaskum's win. But the high scorer for the evening was Pewaukee's Gary Thomas, who meshed 23. Tom Theusch and Bob Mertz each contributed 9 points for the winners. Wank and Beno each contributed 10 to Pewaukee's

Besides their scoring, the Eichstedt brothers did a lot of rebounding, Clark especially off Pewaukee's board. Mertz was also very active on the boards but had to sit out a good part of the game due to foul trouble with 4.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians travel to Grafton to take on their old rivals. Grafton has a 24 record but could prove tough.
