Board Delays Borrowing \$195,000 for Bel-Ric Sewer and Water Installation

DISCUSSES ONCE A WEEK GARBAGE COLLECTIONS, USE OF PLASTIC BAGS

The village board Monday night temporarily declined to act on a resolution that would authorize borrowing \$195,000 to finance installation of sewer and water in the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision.

The loan as presented was set up over a five-year re-payment period. Board members favored a 10-year re-payment plan because the tax impact would be lighter.

Village officials hoped to be able to meet with Bank of Kewaskum officials Tuesday and work out a 10-year re-payment plan.

Once a week garbage collections from October through April and the use of plastic bags instead of a garbage container was discussed without action. Presently garbage is picked up twice a week, year-round.

Some of the trustees felt the whole job could be done in less time if village employees merely had to pick up the plastic bag instead of having to carry each container to the truck, empty it and then return it to the curb.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty said a drug-alert program will be presented to the auxiliary police force on Feb. 23. He invited board members to attend.

James Elder of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers, reported that a sewer and water rate study is currently underway and the findings will be ready in about two weeks.

An operator's license was approved for Roger J. Schmitt, Kewaskum. Application for building permits for apartment buildings in Bel-Ric Acres as requested by Stan Lehn, West Bend, was tabled until all village requirements are met.

Staehler entered into business in November of 1957 and has operated the service station for the past 13 years under the name of Ollie's Texaco. The new owner will conduct the business under the name of Scott's Texaco and will continue to sell and handle Texaco gasoline and products.

Board of Education Interviews Two More Architects

The board of education interviewed two more architectural firms for a proposed building expansion plan when it met Monday night but came to no decision on which one would be hired. Four firms have been interviewed so far.

Appearing before the board Monday night were Durrant-Deininger-Dommer-Kramer and Gordon of Watertown and Plunkett-Keymar and Reginato of Milwaukee.

Representatives of both firms described their organizations and showed colored slides of buildings they have designed. The board left open the matter of choosing an architect until its regular meeting at 8 p. m. Monday.

Firms previously interviewed are Schutte-Mochon, Inc., of Milwaukee and Lawrence E. Bray and Associates, Inc., of Sheboygan.

The expansion plan involves the Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools and the Kewaskum High School.

Annual Heart Fund Campaign Underway Here

The annual Heart Fund Campaign will be conducted in the Village of Kewaskum during the month of February, when heart volunteers will call on their neighbors to distribute heart-saving literature and to receive Heart Fund contributions. A business district canvass will also be conducted during this time. Mrs. Robert Schmidt is the local Heart Fund drive chairman.

The American Heart Association has predicted that diseases of the heart and blood vessels will be responsible for the deaths of 23,300 residents of Wisconsin during the calendar year 1971.

The cardiovascular deaths will therefore represent 57% of the total deaths in this state in 1971 with all other diseases and causes accounting for 43%.

Nationally the overall economic cost of cardiovascular disease has been placed at more than \$10 billion yearly, or about \$50 for every man, woman and child in the country.

These facts unmistakably point to cardiovascular disease as the foremost health problem of our time. They clearly indicated why the Heart Fund is an appeal deserving the fullest support of everyone.

Sengpiel Guest House Destroyed By Fire Monday

An early morning fire Monday destroyed a guest house on the property owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ned Sengpiel in the Town of Kewaskum on CTH H about 1½ miles west of Kewaskum.

Kewaskum firemen were called out at 6:10 a. m. in suzero weather and the entire structure was reported enveloped in flames by the time they arrived at the scene. The building was entirely destroyed by the blaze with the chimney left standing. The 20-foot by 22-foot, 1½ story house had just been completely remodeled, redecorated and furnished inside.

The blaze was discovered by a passing motorist, a Mr. Dornacker, who notified the Willard Prosts, who reside on a farm across the road from the scene. Mrs. Prost turned in the alarm. A total of 20 firemen responded and remained at the scene about one hour.

There was no immediate estimate of the loss, which is reported covered by insurance. The cause of the fire was not determined.

Carl Frederick Schaefer, 73, 229 Forest Ave., Kewaskum, a retired automobile dealer, died unexpectedly Dec. 21, 1970 at 5 a. m. while on a visit at the home of his son Charles in San Francisco, Calif.

He was born Nov. 11, 1897 in Kewaskum and spent his entire lifetime in the area. His marriage to the former Rose Boesewetter took place June 22, 1929 in Kewaskum.

Mr. Schaefer served as village clerk many years and was serving as village assessor at the time of his death. He was a member of the Masonic Order, Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of The American Legion and World War I Barracks.

Surviving are his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Barbara Bercaw of Belmont, Calif. and Mrs. Diane Courtois of San Francisco; a son, Charles E. of San Francisco; three grandsons, Craig A., Jeffrey L. and Mark F. Bercaw, and two sisters, Mrs. Corinne Opgenorth of Kewaskum and Mrs. Miriam Becker of Beaver Dam. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Schaefer, and two brothers, Walter J. Schaefer and Harry J. Schaefer, predeceased him.

Carl was christened and confirmed and was a member of Peace Church all his life.

Funeral services were held at Carlmont Chapel in Belmont, Calif. Dec. 23 followed by cremation.

Jr. Woman's Club Participates in CARE Program

The Kewaskum Juniors learned that nearly 90,000 children under five years of age die annually in Columbia. It is found that most of those deaths are related to malnutrition, directly or indirectly.

Miss Honora Ann Norton, Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club Federation chairman, slowed the slide program "Human Factor" from CARE at her home on Jan. 28.

The club is participating in the Junior Club's project included in the General Federation of Women's Club — CARE World Environment Program, "The Human Factor." Juniors are going to build as many rural nutrition centers as possible in Columbia. Children are particularly vulnerable from one

to four years of age because that is the time when they develop 20% of their adult physical growth and mental capacity. Children who survive acute malnutrition are severely handicapped for the rest of their lives.

Local communities in Columbia will be involved because the people must contribute the building site, provide a volunteer labor force and as much construction material as possible. Junior clubs working through CARE, are providing the balance of the building supplies.

Juniors want to reduce these tragic statistics. Rural nutrition

centers, where preschool children will receive high protein food while mothers attend sessions on nutrition education, are the most effective ways of achieving objectives.

Through Ways and Means projects the Kewaskum Juniors donated a monetary contribution to CARE.

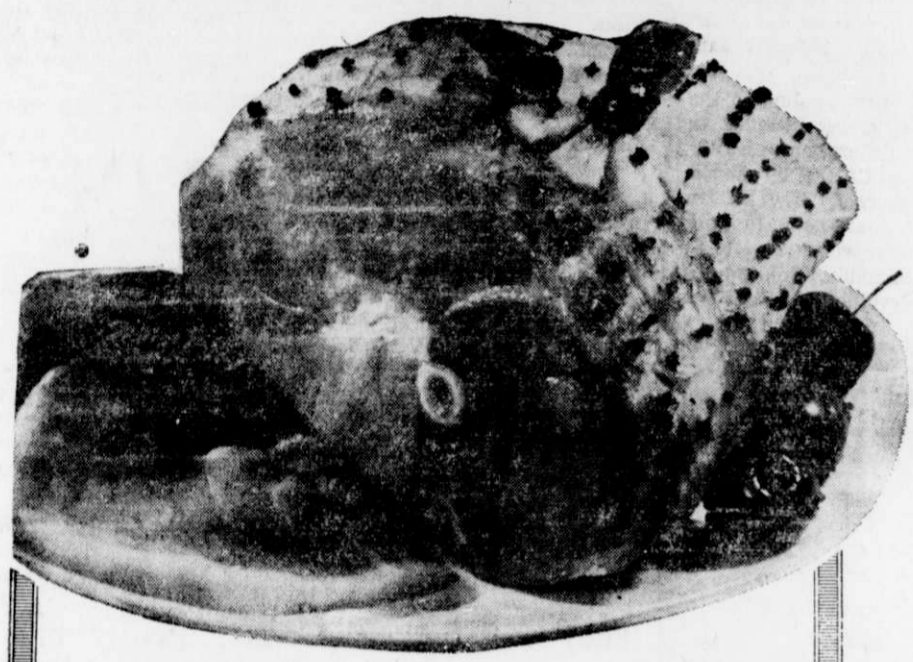

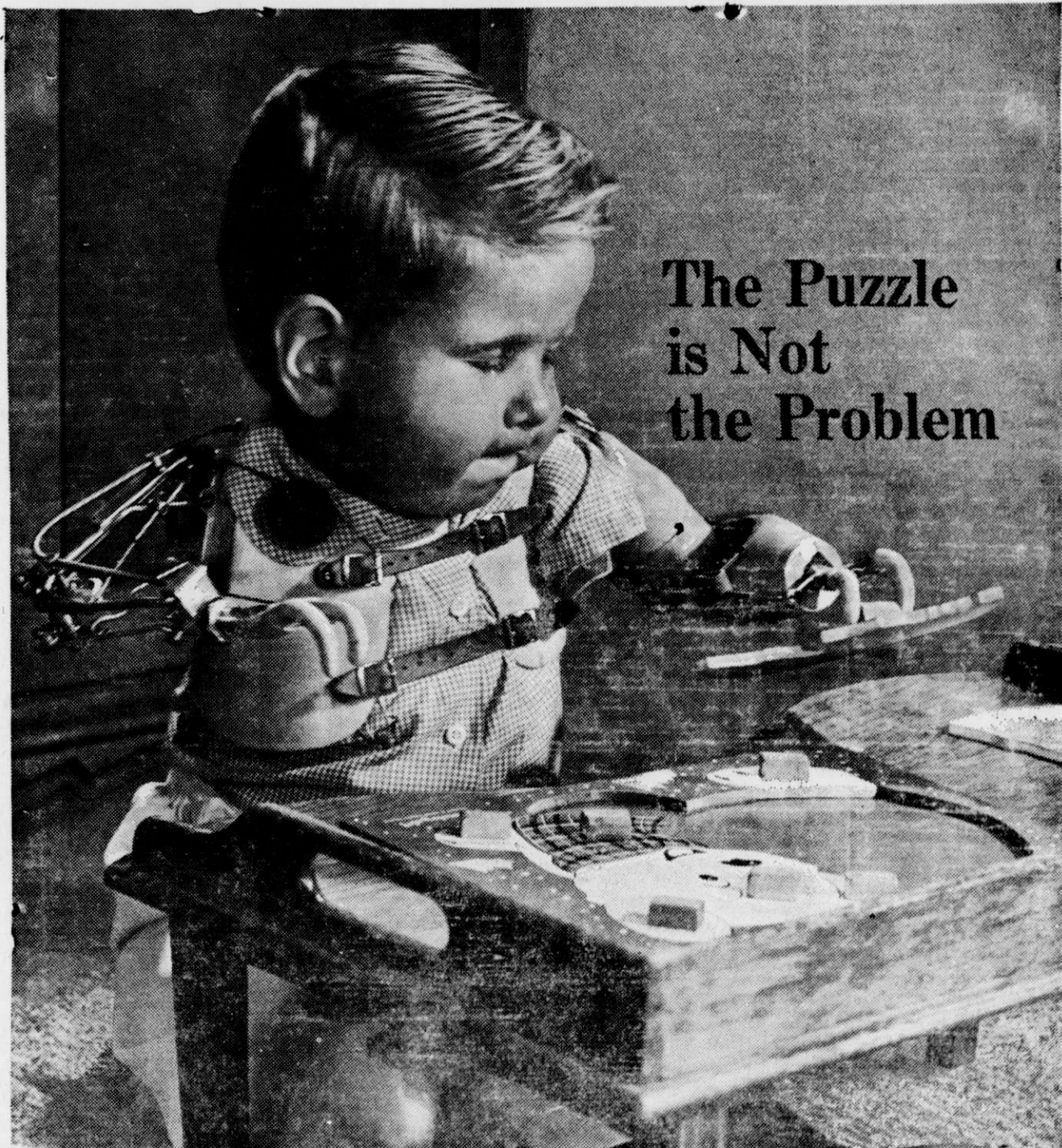

The players were quite shook up, he said, and wondering how they would get home, it was hard for them to keep their minds on basketball. As it turned out, the squad stayed overnight.
