Bond Issue for Proposed School Building Program Set at \$2.9 Million

TO PRESENT RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING REFERENDUM

At a special meeting of the board of education Monday night, it was agreed that the bond issue for a proposed package building program be set at \$2,915,000.

A resolution authorizing borrowing that amount and another calling for an April 6 referendum will be presented at the board's regular meeting next Monday night.

The original estimate for additions to the Wayne Elementary, Farmington Elementary and Kewaskum High School was \$2.8 million. However, it was noted Monday night that the architects feel about 10 per cent has been lost since cost estimates were made and it is their recommendation that a 10 per cent contingency be added. Building costs have been rising at about one per cent per month, it was stated.

According to John Underwood of the First Wisconsin National Bank, Milwaukee, the tax impact is expected to be less than he anticipated because interest rates have declined since he appeared before the board with tax impact projections last December.

He said the bond market "looks good now" and that if the issue could be sold now at 4 3/4 per cent we would be looking at a tax increase of \$1.88 per \$1.00 equalized valuation compared with \$2.43 per \$1,000 equalized value which he projected in December on the basis of 5 1/2 per cent interest.

On present projections, a property that would sell for \$20,000 today would have a tax increase of "a ball park figure of \$40," according to Underwood.

Some of the existing debt will have to be re-funded. "We want to fit it all together to get the best rate of interest," Underwood stated.

A slide presentation of the proposed building project will be available to any group or organization. It is currently being prepared by faculty member Howard Zemlicka who is also a member of the volunteer citizens advisory building committee.

Area Residents On UWWC Dean's Advisory Council

2 Kewaskum Area Snowmobilers Hurt

Two snowmobile mishaps involving rural Kewaskum residents were reported over the weekend.

The Newburg rescue squad was called out shortly after 9 p. m. Saturday when a snowmobile operated by Milton Kertscher of R. 2, Kewaskum struck a tree when the machine went out of control on the Milwaukee River just west of Newburg. Kertscher was taken into the Newburg fire station and treated for facial lacerations and head injuries. He was advised to see a physician.

About 1:30 a. m. Sunday the West Bend fire department rescue squad was summoned to Rainbow Lake on State Hwy. 144 when Mrs. Eugene Backhaus, R. 1, Kewaskum, suffered a possible leg fracture in a snowmobile accident. She was given first aid and transported to the hospital.

Frank Winninghoff of West Bend also suffered serious face lacerations last Wednesday night in a snowmobile mishap in the area when he was struck in the face by barbed wire. He was treated at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

It is reported that Wisconsin now has 106,000 snowmobiles in use and with the deep snow, which has covered the ground since December, snowmobilers are really having a ball this winter. No matter where you drive along the highways, you see snowmobiles and trails by the dozens. It is common to see 10 or 20 snowmobiles parked in front of taverns, especially in the rural areas where they are more numerous than cars. But with the sunshine and warm weather this week, when the temperature got into the low 40's two days, who knows how long it will last?

Senior Girls, Mothers Feted By Woman's Club

Senior girls of Kewaskum Community High School and their mothers were feted Saturday afternoon by the Kewaskum Woman's Club at its traditional Senior Girls' Tea.

Speaker for the event held in the social rooms of Peace United Church of Christ was Mrs. Carol Miller, coordinated supervisor for Washington County's vocational instruction, West Bend. "Consumer Protection" was her topic.

She said she feels consumer information is vital to women for they do most of the shopping and control most of the money. Speaking of the "high pressure sell of television commercials," Mrs. Miller cautioned that "we must look beyond the glamour and the pretty pictures and analyze what is being advertised. Know what you are buying," she emphasized.

Discussing possible advantages in buying a brand name over the unknown, she commented that there are times when the unknown could be the better buy.

The ingredients of both brands should be compared. If they are alike and the unknown brand sells for less, it is worth buying for the saving. Many times we pay a higher price for highly advertised products even though their quality is no better," Mrs. Miller stated.

On the other hand, the time to look for name brands is when they are on sale. Merchants often buy unknown brands for special sales and often these are not good buys, the graduate home economist observed.

"If you are 'stuck' with an unsatisfactory item, there are places to go for help. The trouble is so many people just don't make use of them," Mrs. Miller stated.

An Office of Consumer Protection has been set up in Madison and blanks requesting help are available at the county extension office or the district attorney's office. The Better Business Bureau is available and some newspapers conduct a column devoted to helping dissatisfied consumers.

She further cautioned "know whom you are dealing with—local stores cannot afford to give a bad deal. Be wary of the door-to-door salesman with the high pressure approach. Also, don't be taken by 'make money quick' ads. Be a shrewd buyer," was Mrs. Miller's advice.

Demolition of Old Rock River Bridge At Theresa Begins

Work on the removal of the old State Highway 175 Rock River bridge at Theresa will begin Thursday, Feb. 18, after the morning run of school buses. By that time, a pedestrian bridge will have been put in place on the

west side of the village.

Work will consist of removing the old five-arch structure built in 1874 at a cost of \$3,500 and erection of a single span prestressed girder bridge. Construction will be carried on by Hedrich Construction Co., Inc. of Chilton at an estimated cost of \$114,427.50. Walter E. Parsons, Jr. of Fond du Lac is the project engineer for the State Division of Highways. The work is expected to be completed in June of this year.

The absence of the bridge will mean that village residents will have to park their cars and walk across the foot bridge to reach churches, schools and other local buildings. Detours have been set up, but they will entail traveling extra miles.

Arrangements have been made to store portions of the Theresa fire fighting equipment on each side of the river. State 175 will be closed to traffic during the time the new span is installed.

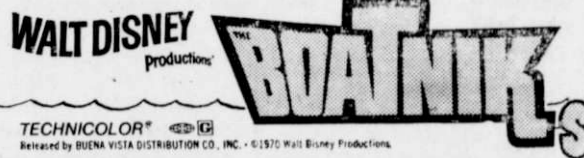
Zimmerman Will Attend GOP Caucus

Losses to Pewaukee, Mayville Drop Indians Out of Championship Race

MAYVILLE CLINCHES SCENIC MORAINES TITLE

A string of 10 straight victories, a chance to repeat as Scenic Moraine champions, in fact the entire season's efforts went down the drain the past week when Kewaskum suffered two defeats with only one game left to play. The Indians were upset at Pewaukee Friday night, 74-61, and Mayville avenged an earlier setback here by shading Kewaskum in a make-up contest there Tuesday, 62-56.

The win clinched the championship for Mayville (12-1) to give them the title in their first year as a member of the Scenic Conference. Last season the Cardinals won the Northern Little Ten championship and were favored to cop the Scenic title, because they lost only one starter from last year's team. If it's any consolation the Indians (10-3) have second place clinched regardless of how they turn out with Grafton here Friday in the finale.

Although the loss at Pewaukee came as somewhat of a surprise, it was not entirely unexpected because the Pirates hold down third place, have not lost a single game all season on their home floor, which is somewhat confusing, they are big, and showed they can score in their first encounter here. The contest was closer than the 74-61 score indicates. Trailing in the closing minutes, the Indians had to get the ball to score and catch up, and in attempting to do so they committed fouls with Pewaukee making good on the free throws to increase their margin.

It was just a case of one team being cold and the other hot. The Indians had a cold night. They had numerous shots at the basket, sometimes getting 4 or 5 rebound cracks at the bucket but the ball just wouldn't go through the hoop. On the other hand Pewaukee hit from all over the floor, many of their scores coming on wild, off-balance shots.

In the first quarter the teams played even with Kewaskum gaining a 15-14 lead. They slumped some in the second period and the Pirates outscored them, 20-14, to take a 34-29 halftime advantage. Pewaukee pulled farther ahead to lead by 9 points, 50-41, at the third stanza's end. The Indians, however, playing like the good team they are, bounced back in the final quarter to cut the lead to 2 points, 59-57. The Pirates again spurred to go ahead by 5, and then iced the win with free throws near the end.

Kewaskum, which has had a high shooting percentage all season, couldn't force them to drop in this one. Their percentage from the floor was only 35, hitting on a weak 26 of 74 shots. The Pirates hit on 31 of 58 for a hefty 53 per cent.

The Pirates got good balanced scoring, with 4 starters hitting in double figures. Big Rick Wank paced their attack with 19 points,

followed by Behne with 18 and Bill Beno with 15. Guy Thomas was the fourth with 14. For the Indians, Clark Eichstedt again was the workhouse, scoring 25 points for top honors. Fourteen of these came in Kewaskum's final surge. Bob Mertz did a fine job against his 6-4 opponent. Kewaskum out-rebounded Pewaukee, 54-38. Eichstedt hauled in 23 and Mertz 13. Glenn Eichstedt scored 14 points and Dennis Smith 12.

The Indians return grudge match at Mayville Tuesday was just that, a real barn-burner played before an overflow, standing room only crowd of screaming fans. Kewaskum had 5 busloads of students there to say nothing of the players, and scores of adults and children. There were probably as many local followers there as Mayville had. The local section was a very enthusiastic one which out-yelled the Mayville delegation.

But games aren't won on cheers, it takes points. Although Kewaskum handed the Cardinals their only setback of the season, they weren't to be denied this time. In this one the Cardinal musclemen showed the same balanced scoring ability but their defense was more sound. The Indians jumped off to a quick 4-0 lead, but Mayville came right back to go ahead, 6-4, and from then on it was a dogfight all the way with the winners retaining the lead, but never by much.

The Indians faltered in one quarter, the second, and this lost the game for them. Kewaskum was ahead, 15-14, at the end of the quarter but hit a cold spell in the second period, being outpointed 23-10, and falling 11 points behind at halftime, 33-22. This was the only quarter in which the Cardinals outscored the Indians and proved too much for them to overcome. In the third stanza Kewaskum cut Mayville's lead to 48-41, outscoring them, 19-15. They also bested them in the final period, 15-14, and cut the lead to just 4 points with several minutes left. Then Mayville successfully went into a stall and kept controlling the ball and passing it around without shooting. The Indians had to foul in trying to get possession and the Cardinals added a couple of free throws.

Kewaskum played an aggressive game against their bigger opponents with Clark Eichstedt

leading the way. He was high scorer with 22 points and grabbed numerous rebounds. Dan Heim's 19 points paced Mayville. Tom Theusch contributed 15 for the losers. The Cardinals, with their usual balanced scoring, had 4 men in double figures. Following Heim were Persha with 16, Zangl with 12 and Stieve with 11.

Friday the Indians host Grafton in their final game before entering district tournament play next week at Mayville.

SCORE ONLY 11 POINTS TO PLACE 11TH AT CEDARBURG

Kewaskum High School failed to qualify a single wrestler for the sectional meet in the regional tournament held at Cedarburg Friday and Saturday.

Kewaskum had two wrestlers who made it through the Friday night preliminaries, namely Cal Tackes and John Jadro. Tackes (112 lbs.) lost to Vollbrecht of Sheboygan Falls and Pieterman of Cedarburg Saturday for a fourth place. Jadro (119) made it to the

finals by decisioning Medinger of Port Washington but lost in the finals to Peterson of Cedar Grove after leading 3-0 at one time. Jadro was not in his best form because of illness. After losing to Peterson, whom he defeated twice during the season, he was forced to default the wrestle back.

Unfortunately three other Indian matmen were beaten in the preliminaries Friday night. Kim Rodenkirch (heavyweight) was way ahead, 7-1, when he was pinned. Doug Bindrich (154) suffered the same fate and Dave Schacht (145) lost by a close one point decision.

Favored Port Washington won the meet and qualified six men for this week's sectional competition at Sheboygan Falls. Falls also qualified six and finished in second place. 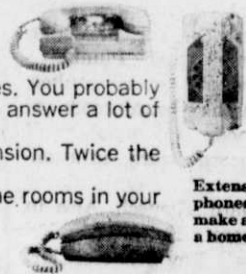
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
