However, it was noted Monday night that the architects ing held. feel about 10 per cent has been lost since cost estimates were made and it is their recommendation that a 10 per cent contingency be added. Building costs have been rising at about one per cent per month, it was stated.

According to John Underwood of the First Wisconsin National Bank, Milwaukee, the tax impact is expected to be less than he anticipated because interest rates have declined since he appeared before the board with tax impact projetions last December.

He said the bond market "looks good now" and that if the issue could be sold now at 434 per cent we would be looking at a tax increase of \$1.88 per \$1,00 equalized valuation compared with \$2.43 per \$1,000 equalized value which he projected in December on the basis of 534 per cent interest.

On present projections, a prop erty that would sell for \$20,000 today would have a tax increase of "a ball park figure of \$40," according to Underwood.
