Village to Hire Assessor, Building Inspector and Municipal Employee

Strict Snowmobile Ordinance Adopted

APPROVE 14 POLL WORKERS, ISSUE BUILDING PERMITS

Members of the village board decided to advertise for a village assessor, a part-time building inspector and a full-time municipal employee when they met in regular session Monday night.

The assessor's job has been vacant since the death of Carl F. Schaefer in December. The position of building inspector is newly created and carries the duties of inspecting homes under construction. The full-time municipal employee will work under Armin Oppermann, superintendent of public works. Only village residents may apply. Deadline is March 15. No salary schedules were mentioned.

Oppermann will act as building inspector until someone is appointed.

Board members approved a snowmobile ordinance which, if violated, carries a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100. It states that snowmobiles may not be operated between 11 p. m. and 8 a. m.

They may be operated in the village park in these areas: on the west side of the river; on the east side of the river between the dam and the north line of the parking lot that lies south of the village park.

Speed limit within the village limits and on the river between the dam and the north village limits shall not exceed 10 miles per hour. Snowmobiles may be operated on private property only with owner's consent.

Also approved was a list of 14 persons who, for the next two years, will be eligible to serve as poll workers. Democratic Party committee chairman Marvin Martin submitted these names: Mrs. Ernest Mitchell, Mrs. William Key, Mrs. Francis Gilboy, Mrs. Donald Mlodzik, Mrs. Donald Koerble and Mrs. Desmond Smith.

The board authorized an expenditure of \$995 for a demonstrator model four-inch trash pump with a 35,000 gallon per hour capacity. Accepted was the offer of Harry Batzler of R. 3, Campbellsport, to furnish crushing gravel at 90 cents per yard with the village doing the hauling. Between 8,000 and 10,000 cubic yards will be needed it is estimated, most of it for streets in Bel-Ric Acres.

A building permit for a four-unit apartment dwelling was approved for Douglas Boom, West Bend, on the condition that he makes provision for a sump pump and drain tile. A permit was also issued for a single family dwelling to Schulz Realty, West Bend. Both are to be built in Bel-Ric Acres.

8 KHS Students Qualify for Math Contest Finals

"Algebra, geometry, and ingenuity," were the three words used to describe the math test taken by 89 Kewaskum High School students on Feb. 11. The exam was actually a preliminary test in the Wisconsin section of the Mathematical Association of America's high school mathematics contest for 1971. Eight of the 89 students qualified at Kewaskum and will write the final test in March.

The test is designed for students who have studied at least one year of algebra and one semester of geometry. It is intended to identify and reward the very good and encourage all students in mathematics.

The eight students qualified by scoring a 60 or better in the preliminary test. The high score was attained by Jim Kern, a junior with 87 points. His score placed him among the top 2% in the state. The other students who qualified consist of three seniors: Mike Doherty, Jozel Watson, and Steve Bremser and four juniors: Richard Kirst, Sylvester Marquardt, Mike Zuehlke, and Jay Tessar.

The group of eight will write the final test March 27 at the University of Wisconsin building at Sheboygan.

\$145,560 Grant For Sewage Plant In Village OK'd

"A grant award of \$145,560 will be received from the Environmental Protection Agency. The grantee is the Village of Kewaskum. The total cost of the project is \$485,200. The purpose is for addition and alteration to existing secondary sewage treatment plant"

KHS Senior Wins Scholarship Bond

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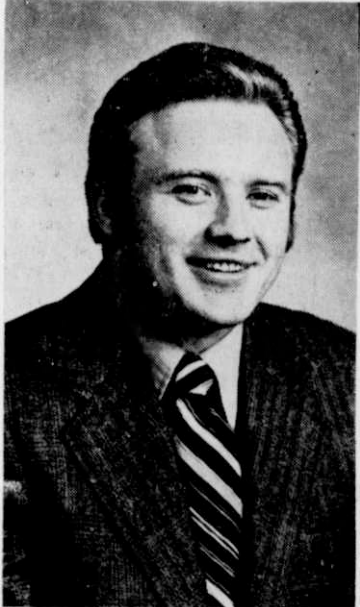

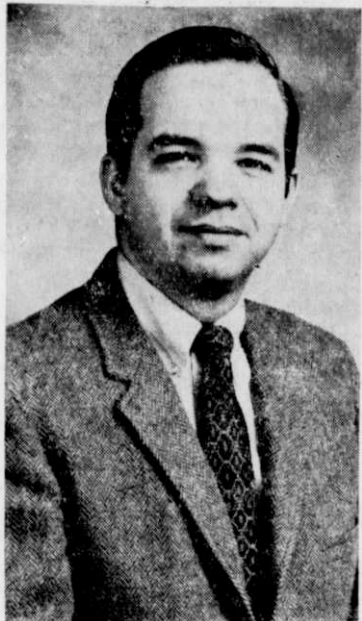


Andrew C. Johnson

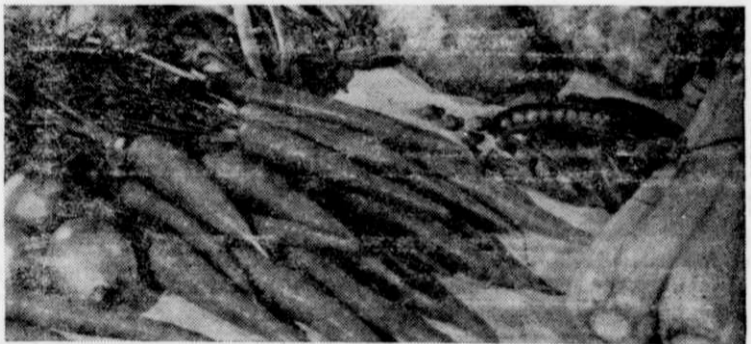

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Indians Upset Mayville for District Title; Regional Next

Face Cedar Grove in Tourney Opener at Beaver Dam Tonight

The surprising Kewaskum Indians won a big one when they upset Scenic Moraine Conference champion Mayville in the finals of the WIAA District tournament at Mayville Saturday night, 69-66, in a barn burner. The Indians reached the finals by easily handling Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference in the tourney opener Friday night, 78-54. Mayville gained the finals by routing North Fond du Lac even more handily, 86-55.

As a result of winning the district title, Kewaskum now advances to Regional tournament competition at Beaver Dam this weekend, together with three other District winners. They are Waupun, Waupun District winner; Oakfield, Oakfield District winner, and Cedar Grove, Cedar Grove District winner. The Indians face Cedar Grove in their opener, the second game of the tournament tonight (Friday). Waupun and Oakfield tangle in the first game at 7 p. m. The two winners meet for the Regional championship Saturday night, with the winner advancing to the Sectional meet at Manitowoc the following week.

The District final at Mayville was played before a packed house of wild, screaming fans, about half of them from Kewaskum. The loss, naturally, was a big disappointment to Mayville, which, after winning the Scenic championship, expected also to cop the District title and continue on in tournament competition. Immediately after the thrilling victory, Kewaskum supporters stormed onto the floor and pandemonium broke loose. Coach Mike Williams and some of the players were carried off the floor by the jubilant fans and one of the Indian players took down the net from the winning basket for a souvenir. The team was also presented a trophy as District champion.

The outcome of the tournament was an exact reversal of that last year. Last year Kewaskum was the Scenic champion and Mayville eliminated them in the District tourney finals. This year Mayville won the Scenic title and Kewaskum knocked them out of the District title.

This was the second time in three games that Kewaskum defeated Mayville's champions this season, which should prove them a stronger team than the Cardinals. They split in two conference contests, the Indians winning the first here by 14 points, 64-50, and losing the second at Mayville by a lesser margin of 6 points, 62-56. But the Cardinals won the championship as the loss to the Indians was their only one of the season and they ended up 13-1, while Kewaskum faltered in three

other games to wind up 10-4 for second place. This is Mayville's first year in the conference and a terrific rivalry has already developed between these two giants.

One too many timeout calls cost Mayville its last chance to cop the District title in the pulse-pounding final. Trailing by only 2 points, 68-66, and having a chance to tie it up and force the game into overtime, the Cardinals' guard Curt Kuehl, mistakenly called a timeout with only seconds left. Mayville had already used up all its timeouts and a technical foul was called on them. The Indians' Glenn Eichstedt was sent to the line and calmly sank the free throw to ice the game. Kewaskum was also given possession of the basketball and Dennis Smith succeeded in retaining possession by dribbling away the last four seconds.

The Indians played one of their best games of the year in downing Mayville. You have to be at your best to beat them. A team has to be hot, can't let up or make mistakes, else the Cardinals immediately take advantage of it and kill you.

Mayville coach Bob Wojtusik muttered after the game, "they just shot out of their heads." Statistics support his statement as Kewaskum clicked on 26 of 40 shots for a torrid 65 per cent. In contrast, the Cardinals dropped only 26 of 67 shots for an ordinary 39 per cent. Mayville's shooting performance may have been affected by Kewaskum's defense as they opened in a zone and it worked so they stuck with it the entire game.

The sharp-shooting Indians took an 18-12 lead in the first quarter and increased it to 9 points, 40-31, at halftime as they led throughout the first half. But they had to hang on in the second half when Coach Williams had to take both ace Clark Eichstedt and Bob Mertz out in the third quarter because they had four fouls. This really hurt and with these two Indian stars on the bench, Mayville charged to a 54-54 tie early in the fourth quarter. Eichstedt and Mertz then returned and Kewaskum spurred back to a 10-point lead again.

However, the fighting Cardinals refused to fold and with some long swishers from far outside they whittled the lead down to a single basket again, 68-66, with seconds remaining. Then the costly timeout, technical foul and made free throw gave the Indians a 3-point lead and the ball game.

John Nohr and Glenn Eichstedt, the two most improved players on the team toward the end of the season, did the most damage to Mayville, hitting 6 of 7 and 7 of 11 shots respectively. Glenn, a junior, led all scorers with 21 points and made 5 of his 7 free throws in the crucial last quarter.

Following is some information and a few facts on the teams for comparison:

WAUPUN—Upset Beaver Dam in the District playoff at Waupun, 85-82, breaking a 17-game Beaver Dam winning streak. Beaver Dam, Little Ten champion, had not lost a game since their first outing of the season when it ran into Neenah, the state's top-ranked team. But Waupun was 10-8 on the season.

OAKFIELD—Defeated Randolph, 71-66, and young Cambria team, 67-47, in Oakfield District meet. Cambria, with no seniors on the squad, won only 4 games all season. The Oaks won the Flyway Conference title with a 11-1 record. However, they lost one game to North Fondy (which Mayville beat 86-55) and won over Campbellsport, who played without ace Jim Gantner, by 6 points in the final game. (Kewaskum beat Campbellsport twice by large margins.) The Oaks are 17-3 on the season.

CEDAR GROVE—Defeated Lo-

Glenn played an outstanding game, which included stealing the ball away from Mayville on a number of occasions. No wonder, it was Glenn's 17th birthday and he celebrated on the floor. Brother Clark Eichstedt, leading scorer, wound up with 16 points and a dozen rebounds, contributing largely to the victory. Nohr added 15 points. Smith and Mertz played their usual consistent game and their team work was a big factor in the win.

Junior forward Don Heim popped in 25 points for the losers while Todd Zangl and Kuehl each contributed a dozen. The Indians did a fine defensive job on the other starters, big Jeff Stieve and Tony Persha, as they hit only 11 and 2 points respectively. Incidentally, only 2 of Mayville's starters are seniors so look out next year.

In the tournament opener, Kewaskum's victory over Campbellsport Friday, 78-54, was its second. They also beat them in a non-conference tilt before the season. The Cougars started strong and hit for a 15-11 lead in the first quarter. Then class showed and the Indians started running away from them, outscoring them in the second period, 28-12, to take a comfortable 40-27 lead at halftime. The Indians continued to pour it on, increasing their advantage to 59-40 at the end of the third period. It was the same story on the final quarter in which Kewaskum ended up with a 24 point advantage.

The Indians, who are putting everything together again after a late season slump, got 26 points from Clark Eichstedt, including 10 in the second quarter, and Mertz speared 15 rebounds. The 6-foot-3 Eichstedt hit 13 of 19 shots to lead his team. Smith sniped away for 16 and Glenn Eichstedt added 14.

With its ace guard tandem of Dennis Pieper and Jim Gantner being held to a combined 17 points, the Cougars offense bogged down. Coach Williams said

Both are complete players who score 20 points a game, rebound in double figures and play strong defensively. But we beg to differ with him, comparing the strength of the Scenic Moraine and Flyway conferences. Besides Oakfield had an easier road to the Regional. Also the Indians have another star in Glenn Eichstedt and 3 other solid players for a well balanced team. GO INDIANS !!!
