## Random Lake Builder Buys 15 Lots in Country View Estates; to Build Homes

SOLD BY BILL RUTH REALTY; CONSTRUCTION STARTED HERE

In a recent transaction, Joe Schneider, Jr., builder from Random Lake, purchased the remaining 15 lots in Country View Estates in Kewaskum from Bill Ruth Realty.

Conventional homes will be constructed on these lots for resale. They will range from 1,350 to 1,700 square feet of living area and will be priced from \$24,000 to \$26,000. These 3 to 5 bedroom homes, including lot, with 2-car garage, will feature floor covering, carpeting and vinyl, a family room, 1½ ceramic baths with shower in the main bathroom, built-in oven and range, garbage disposal, plus other extras.

Some homes, now under construction, will be available by May 1. Model homes can be seen by calling Bill Ruth Realty and all sales will be handled exclusively by him.

## Bomb Scare Call Closes Regal Plant

Regal Ware, Inc., local cookware firm, closed its plant Tuesday afternoon after another bomb threat was telephoned into the switchboard.

Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty reported the phone call was received at the plant at 2:04 p. m. The switchboard operator said she believed the caller was a young male who stated, "There's a bomb placed in your factory which has been activated and set to go off."

Plant officials decided to close down for the day and the plant was evacuated. Those workers who would have reported on the second and third shifts were advised not to come in.

Kewaskum police sealed off the area and streets leading to the plant. They maintained a watch until after 2 a. m. Wednesday when the alert was lifted. Any bomb in the plant would have had to go off within the 12-hour period. A search was made in the plant and nearby schools were alerted. School children were instructed to "go straight home and not to loiter in the area."

Affairs were back to normal Wednesday morning and the plant reopened for normal production at the beginning of the day shift at 7 a. m.

Regal Ware also received a bomb threat in the early part of November, at which time four West Bend firms also received similar calls.

## Plan Immunization Clinic Here Mar. 17

Family immunization clinics will continue for Washington County residents. On March 17 mumps and rubella (German Measles) vaccine will be given at the Kewaskum Elementary School Cafeteria from 6:30 to 8:00 p. m. Cost will be \$1.00 per immunization dose.

All unprotected children are free to attend, and it is especially important that adolescent and adult males who have never developed protection against mumps in childhood should be immunized. Mumps in older males can be quite severe and uncomfortable, so why take the risk of needless suffering.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, Health Officer, sponsors this clinic in cooperation with the Washington County Public Health Nursing Service.

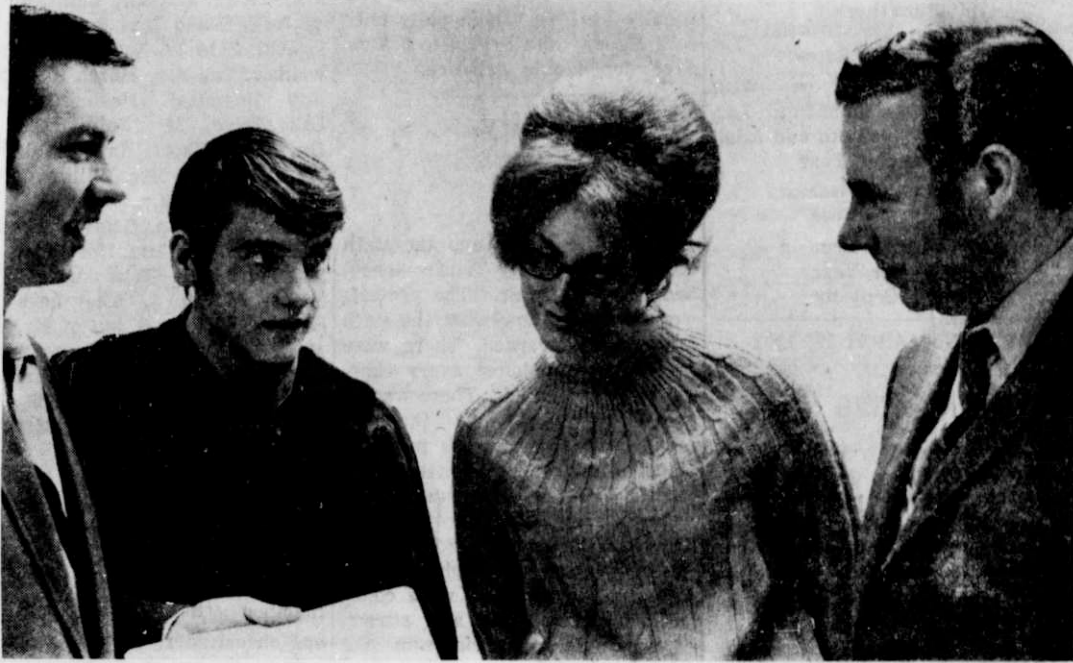
## GIRL SCOUTS TO PRESENT PROGRAM TO WOMAN'S CLUB

## Thieves Break Into Several Plants in Area

A series of breakins and attempted breakins at four industrial plants on Hwy. 45 between Kewaskum and West Bend were made early last Friday. The county sheriff's department is continuing to investigate the breakins.

The thieves gained entrance at both the Mill Tool & Mfg. Co. and Weasler Engineering and Mfg. Co. Inc. located between this village and West Bend, where they broke open vending machines in both instances. An attempt was also made to enter the Dairyland Seed plant about one mile south of Kewaskum but it failed. At Badger Packaging Corp., nearby, the thieves gained entrance and attempted to open a safe, but failed.

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### Eddie Hinn, 61 Tavernkeeper at New Fane Dies

Edward A. Hinn, 61, a tavernkeeper at New Fane for the past eight years, who was well known in the area, passed away Thursday, March 4, at Sheboygan Memorial Hospital.

He was born March 27, 1909, in the Town of Forest, Fond du Lac County, a son of the late Otto and Emma Butzke Hinn. His marriage to Elnora Pfeifer took place at St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Batavia on June 20, 1936.

Following their marriage the couple farmed in the Town of Scott for 19 years. Later Mr. Hinn was employed as a farm supplies salesman several years before he and his wife went into the tavern business in New Fane known as "Eddie & Nora's."

Eddie was a member of the New Fane Sportsmen's Club, a member of St. John's Lutheran Church, New Fane, most of his lifetime, and served on the church council several years.

Surviving are his widow, one brother, Harold Hinn, of the Town of Auburn; one sister, Lucinda (Mrs. Ted Backhaus) of Fredonia; four sisters-in-law, four brothers-in-law, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, and other relatives and friends.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Monday at St. John's Lutheran Church, New Fane, Pastor Arthur Haupt officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery. Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home in Kewaskum was from 3 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services Monday.

### Local Students New Enrollees at UWWC

Eighty-five new enrollees from 25 communities are among the 513 students registered this spring at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

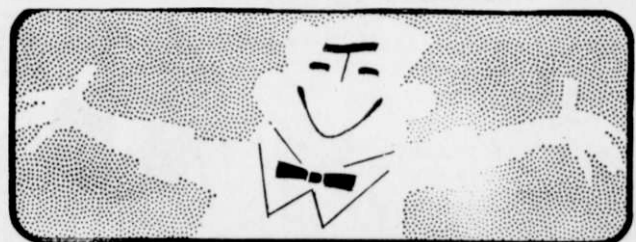
Spring enrollments at UWWC are the highest in the school's three-year existence and represent an increase of about 16% over last spring's 441 students. The traditional enrollment drop-off from fall to spring semester was significantly less than the previous 2 years, down only 52 (9.2%)

compared to 75 (14.5%) in 1970 and 62 (15.3%) in 1969.

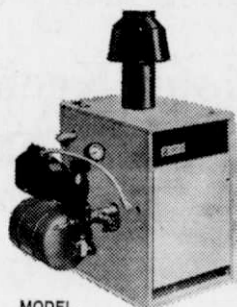
New students include 38 enrolling for the first time in college, 19 transfers from other colleges and 28 students re-entering UWWC after absences of at least one semester.

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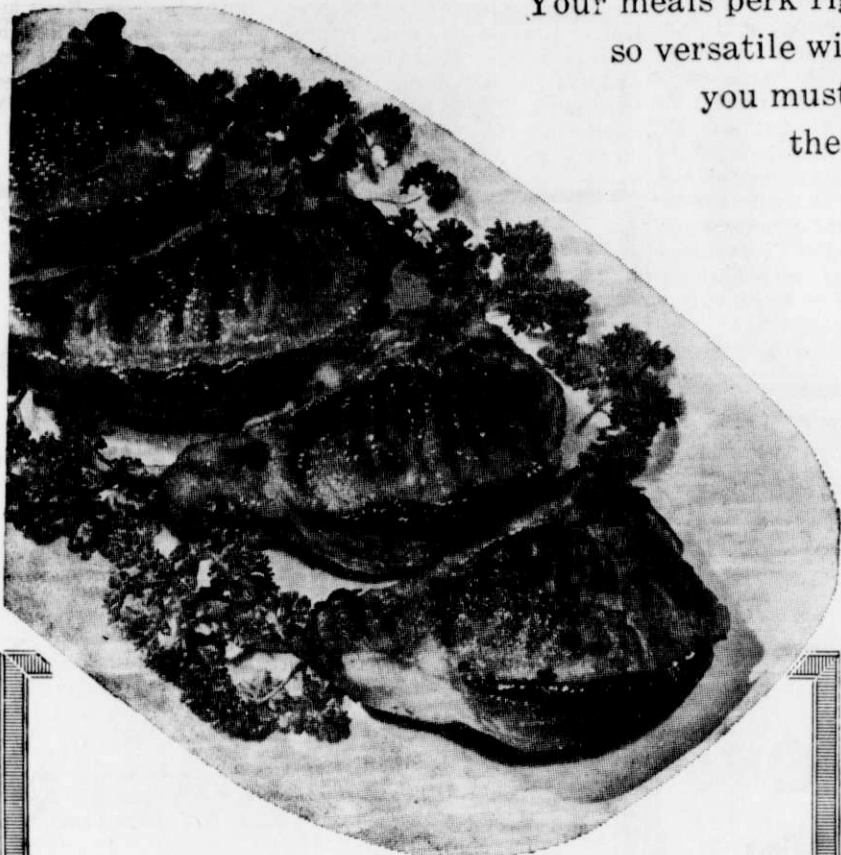

## Crippled Indians Upset in Regional Tournament, 72-51

OUSTED BY CEDAR GROVE AT BEAVER DAM FRIDAY

When they needed to be at their best, the Kewaskum Indians played one of their worst games of the season and as a result were abruptly eliminated from further competition when an underdog Cedar Grove team upset them in their opening game of the Regional Tournament at Beaver Dam Friday night, 72-51.

Kewaskum (16-4) and Oakfield (17-3) were picked by many as pre-tourney favorites but the Oaks also fell by the wayside when they were upset by Waupun (11-8) in the first game of the evening, 82-60. Cedar Grove also possessed a 16-4 record going into the game, the same as Kewaskum, but was not expected to go far because of the difference in the strength of their respective conferences.

Waupun went on to defeat Cedar Grove in the finals Saturday night, 64-53, for the Regional championship. The Warriors, who have come on strong near the end of the season, now advance to the Sectional Tournament at Manitowoc this weekend. They clash head-on with Neenah, (21-0) No. 1 team in the state among the big schools, in their first game Friday night. Other teams in this tourney are Kewaunee, No. 1 in the state among the smaller schools with 21-1 and Manitowoc 20-1, a conference champ. This will no doubt be the strongest tournament among all the Sectionals.

The loss to Cedar Grove by 21 points was Kewaskum's worst defeat of the season but it wasn't entirely the team's fault. They were crippled and not ready for the game with two key players being injured. Clark Eichstedt, ace of the team, fell in a gym class Thursday and sprained ligaments in his shooting hand and Bob Mertz, one of the top rebounders and a good scorer, had been ill most of the week and entered the game with a sore back.

According to Coach Williams, Eichstedt shouldn't have played. He was held out the first quarter and the Indians immediately fell well behind, 13-6. They never could make up the deficit. Eichstedt, an electrifying performer throughout his 3-year varsity career, managed a sub-par 11 points in the 3 quarters he played. It hurt him to shoot and thus his normal accurate outside shooting fizzled as he hit on only 5 of 18. Williams finally came to the conclusion that if the Indians were going to lose anyway, it didn't pay to save Clark. It was obvious the injured wrist affected his shooting. He is usually an excellent shot from the outside. He was not the real Clark on the boards either. He got some rebounds but they weren't the usual vicious type that he and Mertz snap off the boards.

The injuries to Eichstedt and Mertz seemed to carry over to

the entire squad which seemed to lack confidence and their usual zip was lacking. They just couldn't get untracked as their shooting, rebounding and teamwork were off.

The big noise for Cedar Grove was Jim Mills, a 6-1 forward, who went wild to score a massive 38 points. Nobody has done this against Kewaskum. Mills averages only 14 points per game otherwise. The Cedar Grove offense seemed to suck the Kewaskum defense to one side, then Mills would circle around the other side and be wide open to shoot. And he was really hitting. It was hoped this situation would be corrected in the second half but he hit even better then.

The Indians were concerned in containing Dean TeBeest, the Rockets' top scorer who averages 20 points per game. They did stop him with a mere 8 points but this left Mills open. Mills scored only 4 points in the first half and a total of 13 against Waupun Saturday in the finals.

Mertz was Kewaskum's top scorer with 16 points, followed by Clark with 11, Glenn Eichstedt with 10 and John Nohr with 9. The Rockets showed a tough defense.

After trailing 13-6 at the quarter, the Indians, with Clark in the game, managed to tie the score at 22-22 at halftime. Everyone believed they would roll in the second half but they just could not get going.
