## Teacher Salary Schedule for 1971-72 Is Ratified by Board of Education

### Theusch Suggests Ways to Eliminate Need for Expansion

**SALARY SCHEDULE TO COST DIST. ABOUT \$50,000 MORE**

A teacher salary schedule for 1971-72 that will cost the Kewaskum Community Schools district about \$50,000 more than the current pay schedule was ratified by the board of education Monday night after having reached an agreement previously with the Kewaskum Education Association.

Not included in the \$50,000 are salaries of about three teachers expected to be added. The new salary schedule raises the base pay for the holder of a bachelor's degree to \$7,400 from the present \$7,200. The maximum, after 10 increments, is set at \$10,470.

A bachelor's degree plus six graduate credits will earn a base of \$7,563 (up \$205) to a maximum after 11 steps of \$11,103. A bachelor's degree plus 15 credits will earn a base of \$7,726 (up \$209) to a maximum of \$11,766 after 12 steps.

A BA degree plus 21 credits will earn a base of \$7,888 (up \$213) and a maximum of \$12,463 after 13 steps. Base salary for a master's degree will be \$8,051 (up \$217) with a maximum after 14 steps of \$13,191. A master's degree plus 10 credits will earn a base of \$8,214 (up \$222) and a maximum of \$13,964 after 15 steps.

The new schedule is based on a 192-day school year of which 180 are teaching days, nine are in-service days and three are holidays. The current school year has 191 days of which 180 are teaching days, eight in-service and three holidays.

Adopted for the first time was an initial salary schedule for teachers new to the district. A bachelor's degree ranges from a base of \$7,200 to \$10,185; BA plus six credits from \$7,358 to \$10,799; BA plus 15 credits from \$7,517 to \$11,449; BA plus 21 credits from \$7,675 to \$12,125; master's degree from \$7,834 to \$12,839; master's plus 10 credits from \$7,992 to \$13,592.

Board member Richard Theusch made some suggestions which he feels would eliminate the need for the \$2.9 million expansion project which will be voted on by district electors April 6.

He said "if we could use the \$155,000 that was and still is borrowed for the swimming pool plus the amount left over from the high school addition, which is about \$20,000, we would have almost enough money for the addition to the Wayne School." The Wayne School it has been pointed out has the most urgent need for additional space.

Theusch was told that the \$155,000 borrowed for the pool cannot be used for any other purpose. The comment was then made that it could be repaid if the board would approve a resolution to that effect. However, Sept. 27 is the only date such a resolution could

be approved. The \$155,000 could then be re-borrowed, specifically toward the Wayne project.

Theusch further suggested that the portable classroom now in use at Wayne could be moved to the Farmington School; the large kindergarten classroom there could be made into two classrooms and the St. Michaels parochial school could be rented for kindergarten use, even if it means bussing the village kindergarten pupils there, he said.

Theusch contended that these shifts would alleviate overcrowding in the Kewaskum Elementary and junior high buildings. Each day about 350 junior high pupils go to the high school for some classes.

Supt. Boyd pointed out that "the ordinary classroom is not the pinch." The junior high pupils come to the high school for specialized subjects such as band, chorus, shop and home economics and therefore special purpose rooms are needed.

Board member Allen Tessar commented that "it isn't fair to say his (Theusch's) idea will work or won't work until he would do some more work on it and see what answers he could come up with."

The board approved the 1971-72 school calendar which calls for an Aug. 30 school opening. New teachers will report on Aug. 25, all teachers on Aug. 26 and 27. Graduation will be June 9, 1972.

Because so many students from the Kewaskum district are transported to private schools in West Bend and because those schools follow the public school schedule the Kewaskum board adopted a calendar which is more like the West Bend calendar. A main difference has been in the amount of Easter vacation. In 1972, Easter vacation will extend from March 31 to April 7.

The board approved, subject to investigation, the short term investment up to \$300,000. This represents tax money received from various municipalities and temporarily not needed.

The board adjourned to executive session for discussion of administrators' contracts and for a preliminary screening of 40 applications that have been received for the position of superintendent of schools to succeed Boyd who resigned as of May 1.

## Police Capture Thief Who Stole Autos in Area

A Horicon youth, 17, was detained in West Bend last Thursday after he was apprehended by a police officer from that city who stopped him for questioning at 3:20 a. m. the same day on Skyline Drive and the youth fled while being interrogated. He was driving a stolen car which he stopped and fled on foot, but was caught by Officer Schwartz of the West Bend police department.

The sheriff's department reported the youth, said to be an escapee from the Dodge County Home, first stole a car from Legal Motors just outside of Horicon. This car was found abandoned near the Beaver Dam and Aurora Roads in Washington County by county deputies.

Another auto was reported stolen in the Kohlsville area which was later recovered on the Badger Road near Kewaskum. A third vehicle was stolen from Mark Rodenkirch, who resides near Kewaskum, in which the youth was apprehended. Juvenile Officer Carl Mayer of the West Bend police department said keys from a car stolen in Fond du Lac County were also found on the youth.

Officer Mayer said the youth may be brought into court to seek a waiver to try him as an adult. He is also wanted in Dodge County on escape and theft charges and may be returned to that county following disposition of charges against him here.

## Fickler in Group Visiting Capitol

The group expressed their appreciation for the passage of Assembly Joint Resolution 24, which called for humane treatment of war prisoners. Representative Schroeder introduced two spokesmen for the group to the members of the Assembly. They told the legislators of their concern for the 25 missing and 8 known prisoners from Wisconsin.

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### Carriveau Among 20 Taking Education Course at UWWC

Twenty pre-education majors are taking a new course at West Bend this spring to help them decide if they should become teachers.

The 2-credit course, Education 200, is being taken by students at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus who plan to major in education at UWM. John Hutchinson, field experience coordinator at UWM, said the field experience gives students an "introspective reflection" upon "themselves as people, their potential as teachers, and their commitment to children."

The 20 students are working at 11 agencies and schools in Washington County and two in Milwaukee. Each person works five to six hours a week under a supervisor.

Course goals include an association with children in learning environments, an experimental base for program planning in the school of education, and a broadened view of the nature of a learning experience.

An orientation and followup evaluations by students and supervisors complete the course.

Cooperating agencies include: West Bend — YMCA, Threshold, McLane Elementary School, Holy Angels School, Decorah School, Badger Middle School, West Bend East and Daycare; Jackson—Jackson Elementary School; Slinger—Slinger Elementary School; Kewaskum—Kewaskum High School; Milwaukee—St. Boniface School

and St. Aemilian School. Students in the course come from ten communities: Adell, Allenton, Campbellsport, Cedarburg, Germantown, Kewaskum, Milwaukee, Random Lake, Slinger and West Bend.

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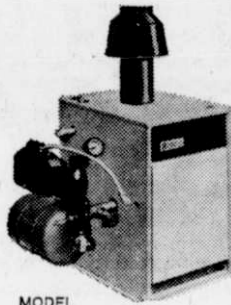

**Solution to School District's Building Problems Goal of \$2,915,000 Referendum**

**VOTERS TO DECIDE FUTURE COURSE OF ISSUE APRIL 6**

The solution to Kewaskum School District's building problems is the goal of the \$2,915,000 bond referendum scheduled for Tuesday, April 6. On that day, voters of the district will be deciding the future course of their educational system.

School officials have pointed out that they have more students than there is space to adequately educate them.

The proposed building program is the result of intensive planning. Over a year ago, a volunteer citizens committee and the school board determined the direction the school district should take in considering expansion. They are convinced that the proposed building program will meet the district's present and future needs.

Increasing enrollments have created a critical overcrowding situation in the school district's facilities. In the past five years, the total school enrollment has jumped 27% to a current enrollment of 1,914 students. The school district's projections, based on a conservative 3% increase per year, show that by 1975 the enrollment will be 2,214 students. The total capacity of all school buildings presently being utilized by the district is only 1,750.

The elementary school facilities are one area of immediate concern. According to Marshall Boyd, Superintendent of Schools, there are three times as many kindergarten students than rooms to educate them. All the elementary schools are operating with more students than their capacities will allow. School officials state that the district has needed an average of three to four new classrooms per year since 1966. At the present time, relocatable classrooms and rented space

are being utilized.

Kewaskum Elementary School is also housing junior high students. Boyd states that this situation has resulted in not only overcrowding at the elementary level but an inadequate educational curriculum geared to junior high students.

The citizens committee and school officials have emphasized that the proposed building program is the answer to the district's problems and that the situation will worsen if additional facilities are not provided.

An informational brochure is being distributed by the school district to further explain the district's needs and the proposed building program.

Voting will take place at the regular spring election. Polls will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. on April 6.

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person's disability.

Mr. Ed. Connors discussed with the Board his problem of ground water infiltration into the basement of his home and inquired what provisions were in the village's building code to prevent such problems.

Mr. Eugene Bohn explained to the Board some of the added features of the village's multi-peril insurance policy.

Mr. Don Mlodzik was advised that a house numbering system for the area where he lives is in the process of being prepared, that the areas where excavating had been done near his home would be improved and seeded as soon as weather permitted and that the village had not yet arrived at any decision regarding the adjustment of the existing sewage rates.

**ORDINANCE NO. 71-1  
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION OF SNOWMOBILES WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM**

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin does ordain as follows:

**Section 1.** Snowmobiles may be operated on private property only with the permission of the private property owner on which the snowmobile is operated.

**Section 2.** Snowmobiles can be operated in the Village Park in areas designated as follows:

- A. On the West side of the river.
- B. On the East side of the river between the dam and the North line of the parking lot that lies South of the Village Park.

**Section 3.** Factory installed standard mufflers must be operative on all snowmobiles. The "cut-out" feature on certain mufflers may not be engaged while operating a snowmobile within the village.

**Section 4.** Snowmobiles operating within the Village of Kewaskum must be mechanically sound and therefore all lights, tail lights and brakes must be operative on said snowmobiles.

**Section 5.** Snowmobiles shall not travel at a speed greater than 10 miles per hour in the Village and on the Milwaukee River between the dam and the North village limits.

**Section 6.** No person shall operate any snowmobile within the Village of Kewaskum between the hours of 11:00 P. M. and 8:00

A. M.  
**Section 7.** Operators will stop at all roads and streets prior to crossing.

**Section 8.** The Statutory Provisions describing and defining regulations with respect to snowmobiles in chapter 350 of the Wisconsin Statutes, exclusive of any provisions therein relating to the penalties to be imposed or the punishment for violating of said Statutes, are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this Ordinance, as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any Statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this Ordinance.

**Section 9. SEVERABILITY.** If any provisions of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provisions or application.

**Section 10.** Any person or legal entity failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, shall be alleged to be in violation of this ordinance and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, and in default of payment thereof shall be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than five days and not more than thirty days.

**Section 11. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

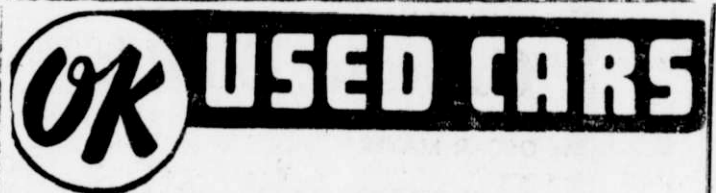
