## James Manthei Killed In Action in Vietnam

### 14 Inches of Snow As Worst Storm of Season Hits Area

Sunday, March 21, was officially the first day of spring but one one would never know it from the weather of the past week.

The worst storm of the entire winter season lashed this area under as much as 14 inches of snow last Thursday and Friday. The storm was accompanied by high winds which piled the snow into huge drifts.

The storm came at a time when much of the deep snow which had covered the ground all winter had melted and residents were looking forward to spring. The storm left almost as much snow on the ground at one time as had blanketed it all winter.

All area schools were closed Friday, many workers could not get to their jobs, all except main highways were impassable, rural mail deliveries were cancelled, all scheduled events Thursday night and Friday were called off, people were stranded and unable to get home, most traffic was halted and cars skidded off roads, were stalled, abandoned and snow-bounded. Stalled cars hampered plowing crews in their efforts to clear the roads. The hazardous roads caused a number of accidents, one of them being a 13-car pileup near Hartford.

The late winter storm moved in about 7 a. m. Thursday and continued almost without let-up until mid-morning Friday. Strong winds which gusted up to 40 miles an hour caused extreme drifting and closed main highways almost as soon as they were opened.

Highway crews were on the job "around the clock," from noon Thursday until Friday morning. Some had not eaten since 6 p. m. Thursday. Friday morning the highway department began to spell the men for short rest periods.

The situation was so bad that even county deputies living in outlying areas were unable to get to work and walked to main highways where they were picked up by fellow deputies in squad cars.

In Kewaskum, village crews were kept busy clearing streets and traffic was moving on the main streets although faced with difficult conditions. Village crews reported for work about 3 a. m. Friday, worked continuously the day and late into the night clearing streets and hauling away the snow. They went at it again Saturday and did a commendable job in getting the streets in good shape in as short a time as possible, even though they had to "plow around" many stalled vehicles.

Residents couldn't get their cars out of their garages Friday morning because of the snow

### Helicopter Pilot, Gunner Reported Killed on Sunday

WAS FIRST KEWASKUM MAN TO LOSE LIFE IN FIGHTING

Warrant Officer James W. Manthei, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Manthei of 306 Third St., Kewaskum, was killed in action in Vietnam Sunday, March 21, his parents were informed by the Defense Department on Wednesday of this week.

Manthei, a helicopter co-pilot and gunner, was believed to have been aboard a helicopter when he was killed. He was sent to Vietnam only last month.

The Mantheis were notified of the death of their son by a "Captain Igel" of the Army about 10 a. m. Wednesday. The body has been returned to the United States and was reported in California Wednesday morning.

The family was awaiting further information and details of their son's death. They expected additional details late Thursday afternoon. Arrangements for the funeral have not been made up to this time.

WO 1 James W. Manthei was born May 23, 1950. He attended grade school here and graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1968. He also attended and graduated from E.C.P.I. Computer School in Milwaukee in 1969 and was employed at Regal Ware, Inc. nights while attending school in Milwaukee.

Manthei entered the service on Sept. 17, 1969. He completed a helicopter pilot course at the Army Primary Helicopter School, Ft. Wolters, Tex., following which he underwent advanced flight training at the Army Aviation School, Ft. Rucker, Ala. where he graduated as a warrant officer Nov. 18, 1970 and received his wings and bars. He was transferred to Savannah, Ga., after which he spent a 30-day leave with his parents, brothers and sister here. Manthei left only five weeks ago, on Feb. 13, 1971, for Vietnam.

Surviving are his parents, two brothers, Robert and Kim Todd; one sister, Brenda Lee, all at home; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Art Manthei of Kewaskum; aunts, uncles, cousins, other relatives and friends.

Jim was an Explorer Scout and received the Eagle Award with the bronze and silver leaf. He was a member of the varsity football and basketball teams while in high school and was very active in the high school band.

Manthei was the first Kewaskum young man officially reported as killed in action in Vietnam, although one other local young man, James Fickler, was reported missing in action.

Counseling Program**

A counseling program on selective service and military training is having a trial run March 22-26 at the Kettle Moraine YMCA, 519 Hickory, West Bend.

During the week, information and counseling could be obtained by calling the YMCA, 338-0353, or stopping in any day from 7 to 9 p. m. Future plans for the program will be announced after an evaluation of the trial run.

The Student Senate at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus has voted \$120 for the purchase of the Selective Service Law Reporter and other literature for the program.

The counseling service developed out of a seven-session training program conducted in January and February by the Wisconsin Council of Churches. Trainees include: the Rev. Jonathan Knecht, West Bend, Immanuel United Church of Christ; Jack Murray and Tom Meisenheimer of West Bend, Kettle Moraine YMCA; the Rev. Dan Robertson, West Bend, Fifth Avenue United Methodist Church; the Rev. Martin Simon, West Bend, St. Francis Cabrini Catholic Church; the Rev. Dave Grafton, United Church of Christ; the Rev. Dan Schowalter, Kewaskum, Peace United Church of Christ; Dennis Strachota, West Bend, Student Senate president.

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UW Washington County Campus; John Olson, Colgate, UWWC sophomore; and Jack Anderson, an assistant to the dean, UWWC.

The training was initiated by Rev. Knecht as a result of his involvement as chairman of the WCC task force on military and selective service counseling.

According to Knecht, the counseling service stresses a young man's legal responsibilities and options under the selective service law. Information is available on the various types of military service, deferments and exemptions, the lottery system, alternate forms of service and all aspects of military and selective service.

Knecht said, "The counseling philosophy we operate under pushes no particular point of view. The right of a young man to make his own decisions is stressed. Our function is to help him become aware of his responsibilities and options."

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**Snowstorm**

plunged up in their driveways and most of them had to walk to work. The entire state was enveloped in the storm but the southern portion of Wisconsin bore the brunt of the snow, with depths ranging up to 16 inches in some sections.

Thousands of county people were completely isolated on side roads and activity was paralyzed Friday as highway crews were unable to divert their plowing activities to town roads. Many people had overnight guests Thursday and in many cities stranded people stayed in hotel lobbies, gymnasiums, police stations, halls, etc. On Tuesday of this week many farm driveways were still closed and some town roads had only a swath plowed open for one lane traffic.

Local and area industries were hard hit production-wise by the storm because many employees were unable to reach their place of employment because side roads were untouched by snow plows. Absenteeism ranged from

50 to 80 per cent, and major industries called off second and third shifts Friday, closing down production.

At Regal Ware in Kewaskum the second shift was called off Friday, which begins at 4 p. m. and affects about 250 workers. Almost 50 percent of the day shift workers did not report for work Friday. Many of the workers on the night shift Thursday were stranded and some stayed overnight at the Labor Center in the village.

Many families who were completely isolated in their country homes used snowmobiles for transportation. Bus service was also cancelled.

After the storm abated, there were still more snow flurries over the weekend and Monday, accompanied by wind. Wednesday night the temperatures dropped to zero and more snow was predicted for Thursday night. This all happened after a balmy St. Patrick's Day. At least the snowmobilers had one more good fling at it.

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### Students on Honors List at Oshkosh U

The names of 1,176 students at Wisconsin State University, Oshkosh, who have been placed on the honors list for the first semester of the current school year have been announced by university officials.

Also announced were the names of 332 of these students who have qualified for the dean's list for their respective school.

To be eligible for the honors list a student must carry at least 14 credits of work, achieve a grade point average of at least 3.3 and to receive no course grade lower than a "C."

To be on the dean's list, the student's grade point average must be at least 3.75 and the classload must be at least 14 credits.

Of those on the honors list, two are from the Kewaskum area. These students are: Peggy J. Buswell, 1222 Meadow Lane, and Dennis P. Ryan, R. 1.

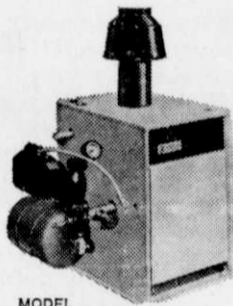

**Bond Issue Informational Meeting Scheduled**

All electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, are invited to attend an informational meeting on Thursday, April 1, at the Kewaskum Community High School at 8 p. m. The meeting will present a film and explanations of financial and educational programs effected by the bond issue referendum.

On Tuesday, April 6, voters in the Kewaskum Joint School District No. 2 will be asked to approve a \$2,915,000 bond issue for the district's proposed building program.

The building program is designed to resolve the critical overcrowding situation of district facilities as well as provide for future growth. This plan is the result of an extensive study undertaken by a volunteer citizens committee working with the school board. The committee studied the district's population trends and need for facilities and made recommendations for expansion. Two years ago a volunteer site committee also made extensive studies and determined the proposed course of action for the school district.

Marshall Boyd, Superintendent of Schools, pointed out that over-

crowding is critical at the elementary and junior high school level. At the present time, all the schools within the district have more students than the building capacities will allow. School officials state that the quality of education which the district is able to provide will suffer if additional facilities are not provided.

The trend of increasing school enrollments is expected to continue. By 1975, the enrollment will be 2,214 students based on a conservative projection of a 3% increase per year. The total capacity of the buildings presently being utilized in the district is 1,750 compared to a 1970-71 enrollment of 1,914 students.

Included in the long range plan of the Kewaskum School District is an addition to Wayne Elementary School, which will double its present capacity. The expansion of the Farmington School will provide for 100 additional children.

Kewaskum Elementary School, also housing junior high students, is lacking facilities and an adequate educational curriculum geared to the needs of both elementary and junior high students.

An addition to Kewaskum Community High School would permit the housing of grades seven to twelve at that facility. The expansion of this building would solve the present shortage of facilities at Kewaskum Elementary School and improve the vocational education in the district.

This expansion would also result in savings to the school district by the sharing of certain instructional areas between the junior and senior high school. Therefore, these areas would not be duplicated by constructing a new and separate junior or senior high school.

The citizens committee and school officials are convinced that the proposed building program is the solution to the district's problems and will provide for future growth. They have pointed out that the future of education in the district is now in the hands of the voters.

The building program is explained further in the informational brochure being distributed by the school district.

Voting will be held in conjunction with the regular spring election. Polls will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. on April 6.

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person's disability.

**Phone Co. Presents 4 Science Kits to Kewaskum Jr. High**

Four Science Experimental kits were recently presented to Kewaskum Junior High School by General Telephone Company of Wisconsin to help students in their life science class.

Lowell H. Boehm, service office supervisor for General Telephone Company, who presented the kits to James C. Hanson, said the kits were designed to help narrow the gap between the re-

search laboratory and the classroom.

The "Crystal and Light" kit may be used by the students for numerous experiments to demonstrate the various effects of light on crystals. The second kit "From Sun to Sound" is used to study such electrical devices as a solar battery, transistor, and to construct a solar powered transistorized audio oscillator. Boehm said, the third kit "The Solar Energy" kit contains material needed to turn silicon slabs into working solar cells. The "Speech Synthesis" kit is a laboratory experiment in electrical speech pro-

duction, providing equipment for the student to construct an electronic voice synthesizer to produce six distinct human sounding vowels.

The General Telephone Company provides these four science kits and related manuals to assist the science teach supplement classroom materials.

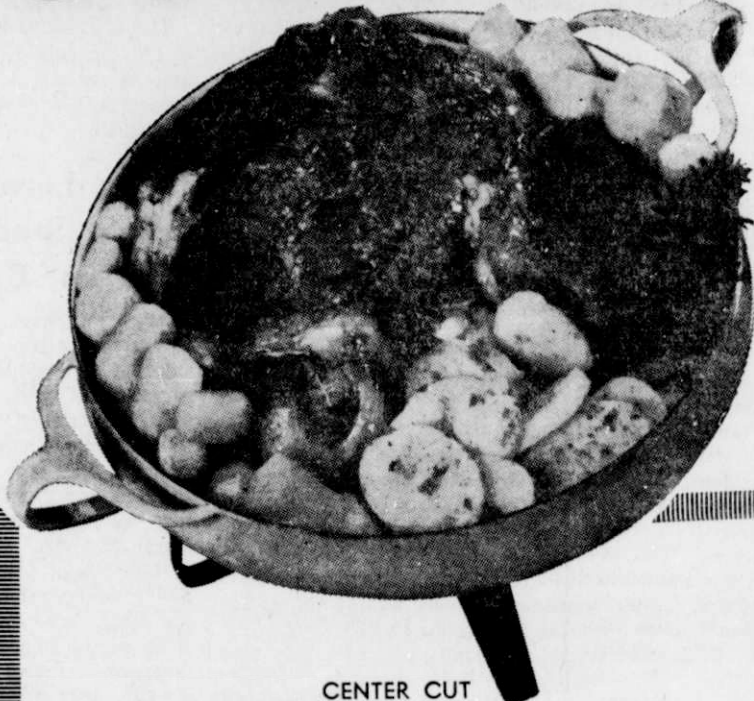

After discussion, upon roll call, the following School Board members voted for adoption of initial resolution: Miske, Edwards, Secor, Zimmel, Theusch, Tessar and the following School Board members voted against adoption of said initial resolution: No one. WHEREUPON, the President declared that the resolution was adopted.

The following resolution was then moved by Member Gerald Secor and seconded by Member Gerald Zimmel:

FURTHER RESOLVED that this School Board shall provide the election officials of the Village and the various Towns within the District with all necessary election supplies; and such election officials are hereby designated for purposes of this referendum election.

FURTHER RESOLVED that the official referendum ballot shall be printed on pink paper.

FURTHER RESOLVED that the School District Clerk shall obtain two copies of the Proof of Publication of the "Notice of Referendum Election," above provided for, from the publisher of the Kewaskum Statesman; and the Clerk shall also provide for printing of sufficient ballots above described so as to have a sufficient number of such ballots available at the voting places of the District. Sample ballots shall also be prepared in sufficient quantity, and be distributed, all as provided by Section 5.66 (2), Wis. Stats.

FURTHER RESOLVED that the referendum election shall be held and conducted and the votes cast thereat counted and canvassed as in other matters voted upon in the Village and Towns, and the results certified forthwith to the Clerk of the School District.
