Village, Township Officials to Be Selected at Spring Election Tuesday

VOTERS WILL ALSO CAST BALLOTS ON REFERENDUM FOR JUDICIAL OFFICERS

Next Tuesday, April 6, is Spring Election day, when village and township officials and judicial officers will be elected and voters in the Kewaskum School District will also cast ballots on an important school bond referendum issue.

Polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. in the village and townships. Balloting in the village will be at the municipal building and for the Town of Kewaskum at the Labor Center in the village.

A separate item on the school bond referendum appears in an adjoining column on this page and also elsewhere in this issue. The initial resolution to be voted on appears in its entirety on page 4 in the "Notice of Referendum Election."

In the Village of Kewaskum, a president and three trustees will be elected. Village President Cyril N. Wietor is unopposed for re-election. Three incumbent trustees, whose terms expire, Orval E. Behnke, Alfred G. Kral and Charles F. Miller, are candidates for re-election and will be opposed by a fourth candidate, Alvin H. Wiesner. The three remaining trustees hold over in office for another year.

There is no opposition for two offices in the Town of Kewaskum: Incumbent Chairman Alfred C. Johnson will be opposed by Carl A. Melahn and Supervisor No. 1 Arnold Amerling will be opposed by Elton Kirchner. Other incumbents unopposed include Jerome Herriges, Supervisor No. 2, and Alfred H. Seefeldt, Clerk. Donald Below is unopposed for the office of Assessor to succeed Earl J. Etta, not a candidate for re-election.

There is no opposition on the Town of Wayne ballot. Candidates unopposed for re-election are Boetelhofen, Chairman; Leo Zehren, Supervisor; Paul C. Moritz, Clerk; Raymond Kudek, Treasurer; Gerald Schulz, Assessor.

The Town of Auburn ballot also is without opposition. Incumbents up for re-election are: Roger Schleif, Chairman; Hilary Hoepner and Henry M. Ketter, Supervisors; Camilla Butzke, Clerk; Elmer A. Krueger, Treasurer; Norbert A. Gatzke, Assessor. Harry Knoelke is a candidate for Constable.

On the judicial ballot Milton L. Meister is unopposed for re-election as circuit judge of the Twenty-Fourth Judicial District and likewise Robert J. Stoltz is unopposed for re-election as Washington county judge.

District Electors To Vote on School Bond Referendum

KEWASKUM COMMUNITY SCHOOLS—On Tuesday, April 6, residents of the district's Joint School District No. 2 will be deciding the future course of their educational system when they cast their ballots at the school bond referendum.

Voters will be asked to approve a \$2,915,000 bond issue which will provide the necessary funds for the district's building program. The proposed building program is designed to alleviate the school district's seriously overcrowded situation.

The plan of financing that has been adopted by the school board is tailored around the full value of all property in the school district, growth projections, the existing debt and future needs for facilities.

The estimated tax increase necessary to pay for the bond issue is \$2.29 per \$1,000 of market value. Additional taxes for the 1971-72 school year on property which has a market value of \$10,000 would be ten times \$2.29. This amounts to \$22.90 or about 44¢ per week. For property with a market value of \$20,000, the cost would be \$45.80 or 88¢ per week.

These projected tax increases are subject to a slight variation in either direction depending upon the actual rate of interest at the time the bonds are sold. Another factor which affects the tax rate is the full value of all property in the school district. As this value increases, the tax rate for debt retirement purposes decreases.

The school district's Schutte-Moehon, Inc. of Milwaukee, have computed that school building costs are increasing at a rate of approximately 12% per year. The proposed building program which would have cost \$2,640,000 last summer, will now be \$2,915,000. If this project would be delayed for any period of time, rapidly increasing costs would push the total price of the building program to much higher levels.

Another factor affecting the district's building program is the interest rates on municipal bonds. The Bond Buyer Index, a respected barometer of interest rates on municipal bonds, increased from 5.04% on March, 1969 to a peak rate of 7.12% in early June, 1970. However, interest rates have decreased to a current average of 5.37% indicating a favorable market for municipal bonds at the present time would prove beneficial to the school district.

The school board is convinced that the building program is a sound one and is well within the district's means to support. They have pointed out that the decision regarding the future of education in the district is now in the hands of the voters.

An informational brochure has been distributed to the voters of the district to further explain the proposed building program. Polls will be open from 9:00

Death of Mrs. Arnold Fellenz, Teacher 36 Years

Mrs. Arnold Fellenz, 55, the former Marcella Schleif, of 763 Second Ave., West Bend, a school teacher in Washington County for 36 years, and a native of Kewaskum, passed away Saturday, March 27, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

She was born April 24, 1915, in Kewaskum, a daughter of Fred and Elsie Schleif and lived here until the time of her marriage to Arnold Fellenz, which took place at Peace United Church of Christ on June 12, 1946, with Rev. Schwemmer officiating. The couple took up their residence in West Bend at that time.

During her 36 year career as a teacher, Mrs. Fellenz taught at the Stoffel School in the Town of Kewaskum, Elm Grove School, Germantown State Graded School, and most recently at the Jackson School in the West Bend School System.

Mrs. Fellenz was a member of the Royal Neighbors of America, Camp No. 969 of Kewaskum, for almost 40 years and was an active member of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, most of her life.

Surviving are her husband, her mother, Mrs. Elsie Schleif, of Kewaskum, three sisters, Gladys (Mrs. William Klein), Eleanor (Mrs. Roy Mayer) and Elaine (Mrs. Howard Mayer), all of Milwaukee, sisters-in-law, brothers-in-law, a niece, Patricia Mayer; six nephews, Frederick, Philip and William Klein, Jr., and Kerry, Mike, and Tom Mayer, and other relatives and friends. Her father, Fred Schleif, preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at Peace United Church of Christ, Rev. Daniel Schwemmer officiating. Interment was in the parish cemetery. Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home was from 3 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services on Wednesday.

Services for WO James Manthei, Killed in Vietnam

Funeral services for Warrant Officer 1 James W. Manthei, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Manthei, 306 Third St., who was killed in action in Vietnam, were held Tuesday, March 30, at 2 p. m. at Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, Rev. Daniel Schwemmer officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery and graveside rites were conducted by the military.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home was after 3 p. m. Monday until 11 a. m. Tuesday and at the church from 12 noon until the hour of services.

WO Manthei was the co-pilot and gunner on a military aircraft (helicopter) shot down over Southeast Asia on Sunday, March 21, when he was killed.

He entered military service on Sept. 17, 1969, and completed his helicopter pilot training at the Army Primary Helicopter School at Fort Wolters, Tex. He then received advanced flight training at the Army Aviation School, Fort Rucker, Ala., graduating as a warrant officer and receiving his wings and bars on Nov. 18, 1970. He was transferred to Savannah, Ga. and prior to leaving for Vietnam on Feb. 15 of this year spent a 30 day leave at his home just five weeks before he was killed.

WO Manthei was born May 23, 1950 at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. He attended schools in Kewaskum, graduating from Kewaskum High School in June of 1968. He was a member of the varsity football and basketball teams, and also participated in track meets. He was a member of the high school band, in his junior year he was a member of the homecoming court and in his senior year, during the homecoming game, ran 75 yards from scrimmage for a touchdown, the longest run in high school football history.

After graduating from high school he enrolled in the E.C.P.I. Computer School in Milwaukee, graduating in 1969. He attended school days and was employed on the night shift at Regal Ware, Inc.

Jim was an Explorer Scout and had received the Eagle Award with bronze and silver leaf.

Surviving are his parents, Willard and Anna (Neckuty) Manthei; two brothers, Robert L. and Kim Todd; a sister, Brenda Lea, all at home; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Manthei of Kewaskum; aunts, uncles, cousins, other relatives and friends. A brother, Lynn, predeceased him.

Memorials to Peace United Church of Christ will be appreciated.

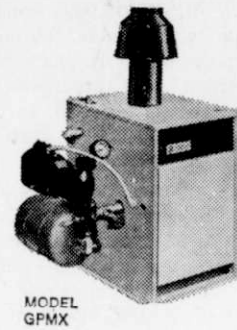

KEA Urges "Yes" Vote on Building Referendum

The proposed building expansion program for the Kewaskum Community Schools has received the unanimous support of the Kewaskum Education Association. In an announcement today, the KEA stated that after again assessing the needs of the district schools, the membership at a meeting Monday, strongly urged voters in the district to approve the referendum on April 6th. In taking this action, the KEA

cited the needs that exist in the district. Presently, student enrollment totals 1914. The estimated enrollment for 1971-72 will be 1989 students, 230 more than present building capacity allows. This enrollment will jump even more significantly as major housing projects in the district are completed, thus stifling quality education. The Association also noted that a number of stop-gap measures have been initiated to alleviate overcrowding, however these measures will not solve the problems permanently. The district has always felt that each child comes to school as an individual, unique in his or her

own way. It is the responsibility of the district to determine what these differences are and to seek to develop and expand upon them. The Association, in its statement today, said that if these ideals are to be continued and expanded, it is instrumental that the proposed program be approved.

If the district permits overcrowding and overuse to continue, the Association asserted, stu-

dents will be deprived of the type of education they deserve and need in today's world.

Eichstedt Receives Honorable Mention on AP All-State Squad

KEWASKUM ACE ON TALLEST TEAM SELECTED BY WRITERS

Senior Clark Eichstedt, 6-3, Kewaskum High School standout, received honorable mention on the 1971 Associated Press all-Wisconsin basketball squad announced last Thursday as selected by a panel of sports writers.

Eichstedt, who starred for the Indians the past three seasons, was a unanimous choice on the 1971 Scenic Moraine-All-Conference team. He led the conference in rebounds with 190, an average of better than 14½ per game. He was second highscorer in the conference with 283 points, an average of better than 20 per game, as well as being the top scorer for the Indians. Clark missed setting a new school scoring record by just 3 points, although he missed the last five games of his junior year because of an injury. Were it not for this and the fact that Kewaskum had a balanced attack with several players scoring in double figures,

Eichstedt would easily have set a school record.

This year's all-state squad was the tallest ever named and was dominated by players who participated in the recent state tournament at Madison. First, second, third and fourth teams were selected, followed by a number of players receiving honorable mention.

Named to the all-state first team were Bob Steif, Wausau East, 6-4, senior; Dale Koehler, Kewaukee, 6-8, junior; Tim Paterick, Janesville Craig, 6-4, senior; Rick Matson, Neenah, 6-5, senior; Tim Moriarty, Appleton West, 6-5, senior.

Second team—William Stewart, Milwaukee Rufus King; Bruce McCauley, Sun Prairie; Bill Letsch, Racine St. Catherine; Bob Luchsinger, Janesville Parker; Ken Hanson, Eau Claire Regis.

Upon receiving the ballot, the voter must retire alone to a booth or compartment and prepare the same for voting. A ballot clerk may inform the voter as to the proper manner of marking a ballot, but he must not advise or indicate in any manner whom to vote for.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the ballot be spoiled, it must be returned to the ballot clerk, who must issue another in its stead, but not more than three in all shall be issued to any one voter. Five minutes' time is allowed in booth to mark ballot. Unofficial ballots or memorandum to assist voter in marking his ballot can be taken into the booth and may be used to copy from. The ballot must not be shown so that any person can see how it has been marked by the voter.

Kewaskum, Wisconsin
The school referendum vote is April 6th. The proposal for consideration has been developed after careful study and thought by many people. The school board, citizens elected to represent the people of this district, feels that the proposal is offered in the best future interests of the district. An advisory committee of concerned citizens in the district has prepared a series of slides illustrating the actual facts concerning the usefulness of the proposal, and has toured the district with this information. The proposal originated with the idea of improving education within the district for the future. The quality of education reflected by our students is everyone's concern, since it in turn actually reflects the concern of the community to provide such an education. In order to assure quality education that continues to show improvement, teachers are required to attend graduate classes to learn of new ideas, methods and equipment, and to more importantly, return to their classrooms and put these new techniques into practice. However, any teacher has little or no control over the confines of his physical setting. He can continue to improve the mental ideas that guide his presentation of material for a class up to a limit — the limit afforded him by his physical conditions, such as equipment, room size and class size. This is most apparent when trying to add new programs or expanding existing

programs that often need unconventional rooms, special equipment or tools and added space. This expansion and updating includes programs that are vocational or extracurricular in nature and include the following: industrial arts, music, drama, art, school publications, intramurals sports and varsity sports programs.

I don't feel that Junior High students should be forced to commute to another building in any kind of weather for any of these existing programs. I don't feel that 1-8 students at Kewaskum Elementary School should be forced to have physical education (a subject that by its purpose requires adequate space for safe freedom of movement) in a room that is too narrow, has too low a ceiling and is crowded with equipment presenting a safety hazard. I don't feel that students at Wayne should have to face the possibility of having indoor physical education instruction eliminated next year (5 months of school year) because the gym is needed for classroom space. I don't feel that a student at Farmington or Kewaskum Elementary School should have his effectiveness as an individual hindered because his class size becomes too large when a mass of new students from new housing projects are incorporated into his room. An overcrowded class allows little time for help with individual problems or needs to both the teacher and the student.

I don't feel that one area of the district should be favored over another at the elementary level; all students attend the same secondary level schools and should therefore have had the same advantages and opportunities for

preparation in all subject areas — particularly in the special areas of music, art and physical education. As the student matures and reaches the high school level he should have an opportunity to participate as an individual in activities reflecting his special interests; the secondary school should be able to provide a varied curriculum that will offer outlets for all these special interests. The need then becomes the concern of the district to fulfill these interests, since it eventually affects all students within the district.

As a concerned citizen, taxpayer and parent, I'm going to vote YES on April 6th for improving education within the district for the future.
