School Bond Referendum Defeated by 2 to 1 Margin

VILLAGE OFFICIALS ARE RE-ELECTED; MEILAHN BEATS INCUMBENT TOWN CHAIRMAN

The Kewaskum school bond referendum lost by almost a 2 to 1 margin in Tuesday's Spring Election. The final total showed 685 votes in favor of building the additions to the schools and 1,356 against.

The much publicized \$2.9 million school bond referendum brought out a heavy vote throughout the school district. Over 2,000 voters cast their ballots as compared to light turnouts in many communities. The vote was heavy in the Village of Kewaskum, where 538 persons cast their ballots out of a possible 900 eligible voters. Voting in the Town of Kewaskum was exceptionally heavy, where 383 ballots were cast. Not only did the school referendum bring out a heavy vote but there were interesting contests for two township offices.

Surprising to many was the fact that the referendum lost out by almost a 2 to 1 margin in the Town of Wayne. The addition to the Wayne school, which is the most overcrowded, was the first priority. The bond issue also lost out by more than a 2 to 1 margin in the Town of Kewaskum and in this village, but by only a 47 vote margin. Farmington produced the strongest "No" vote, almost 3 to 1.

A breakdown in the voting in the school district, which includes all or 8 parts of townships and the village, located in 3 counties, follows:

In the Village of Kewaskum, Cyril Wietor was re-elected president, receiving 437 votes. He was unopposed. Trustees Orval Behnke, Alfred Kral and Charles Miller, all incumbents, were re-elected to two year terms. Behnke tallied 416 votes, Kral 428 and Miller received the largest number of votes on the ballot, 449. The fourth candidate, Alvin Wiesner, polled 190 votes, and there were several write-ins. In the village on the judicial ballot Circuit Judge Milton L. Meister received 466 votes and County Judge Robert J. Stoltz 419 votes. Both were unopposed for re-election.

There were two races in the Town of Kewaskum which were quite closely contested, in one of which the incumbent was defeated and the other was returned to office. Incumbent Chairman Alfred Johnson was defeated by newcomer Carl Meilahn by 79 votes, 229 to 150. Incumbent First Supervisor Arnold Amerling was opposed by Elton Kirchner but was

Kewaskum Hosts Annual District Music Festival

18 KHS ENTRIES ADVANCE TO STATE COMPETITION

Kewaskum Community High School was the scene on Saturday, April 3, for the annual Scenic Moraine Solo-Ensemble Music Festival. Nearly 1,000 junior high and high school musicians performed in a total of 742 individual entries. They were judged by a panel of 14 judges who were appointed by the Wisconsin School Music Association.

The students competed in Class A, B and C competition. The class was determined by the difficulty of the music and the experience of the student. Awards of 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 were given on the basis of the quality of the performance.

Eighteen entries from Kewaskum received the coveted Class A First Division Awards. These students will advance to state competition on Saturday, May 1:

Salaries of Village President, Trustees Increased by Board

CLEANUP OF MILWAUKEE RIVER PLANNED MAY 22

Members of the village board voted Monday night to increase the salary of the village president from \$600 to \$1,000 per year and the salary of village trustees from \$300 to \$600 per year.

The board also voted to increase the pay for members of the board of review from \$8 to \$20 per day.

The roll call vote was unanimous to raise the village president's salary but there were two dissenting votes for the trustee salary increase. The no votes were cast by Gregor Nigh and Charles Miller.

The new salaries were settled on after a poll was taken in which each board member was asked to list what he thought the salaries should be. Five indicated the president's salary should be \$1,000. One favored \$800 and one \$750.

One favored a \$650 trustee salary. Three favored \$500 and three \$400. One board member stated he feels that even at \$1,000 he considers the president's pay low considering the amount of work involved.

In other action, the board voted to purchase fireworks for the July 4 display from the Spielbauer Fireworks Co., Inc., Green Bay, at a cost of \$430.

CITED FOR COURAGE WHILE ON EXTREMELY HAZARDOUS MISSION

The Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight on May 22, 1969 has been awarded posthumously to Technical Sergeant Charles F. Dreher, who served in the United States Air Force.

Mrs. Dreher, who now resides here at 1433 Park View Drive with their three children, received the award last week. Sgt. Dreher was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl "Pat"

Dreher of 1541 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum. Mrs. Dreher is the former Charlene Vetter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ruben J. Vetter of Beechwood.

A citation that accompanied the Distinguished Flying Cross Award reads:

"To Charles F. Dreher: Technical Sergeant Charles F. Dreher distinguished himself by extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight as an RC-135C Inflight Maintenance Technician, 55th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, Strategic Air Command, on 22 May 1969.

"On that date, Sergeant Dreher demonstrated outstanding airman-ship and courage while flying this special mission under extremely hazardous conditions. His successful completion of this mission produced information of vital importance to the nation's security.

"The professional competence, aerial skill, and devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Dreher in the dedication of his service to his country reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

Sgt. Dreher was aboard a Strategic Air Command (SAC) reconnaissance plane that disappeared just 14 days later, on June 5, 1969 over the Bering Sea with 19 men aboard. (Although a thorough search was made for the plane, he has not been heard from since. The SAC jet disappeared about 30 minutes after take-off from Shemya at the tip of the Aleutian Island chain. It was on a flight to Eielson Air Force Base near Fairbanks.

Headquarters for SAC said the RC135 was on a routine mission and made its last radio report about 250 miles east of Shemya.

Other officers elected are Hilbert Roell, R. 1, Fredonia, secretary; Mrs. Lloyd Merkel, R. 1, Random Lake, treasurer. It was decided to elect one vice president from each of the townships represented in the organization. The vice presidents elected Friday are Vaughn Brown, R. 1, Fredonia; Farmining; Merline Dettmann, R. 1, Random Lake; for Scott, and Roger Kind, R. 1, Random Lake, for Sherman. Vice presidents from the Town of Fredonia and Trenton will be elected later.

The committee was polled on the business of the Tri-County Civic Association. Among those mentioned were pollution, zoning, disposal of wastes, taxes, schools, stronger voice in legislation, proliferation of utility poles, and discriminate roadside spraying.

It was decided the officers should draw a rough draft of a constitution to be presented at a general meeting Apr. 20 at 8 p. m. at the Fireman's hall in Waubeka. This will be the third general meeting and is open to all citizens in the area interested in an organization of this type. The Tri-County Civic Association is the outgrowth of a meeting held in November at Farmington school to discuss the proposed Waubeka reservoir. More than 300 citizens attended that meeting. A second meeting held at Silver Creek on Mar. 11 to report

on the reservoir and the proposed interstate 27 drew 200 citizens.

William Decker, R. 1, Waldo, a member of the Kettle Moraine Concerned Citizens organization urged the committee to charter the association. He said his group had thousands of signatures opposing I-57, however William Steiger told him that the statement of a chartered organization carried more weight than hundreds of signatures on a petition.

Max Buschel and Robert Welton of the Town of Port Washington Civic Promotion Association gave a report on their organization and what problems they have discussed. They said another citizen's organization is being considered in the Mequon area and suggested that all citizens groups be affiliated. Buschel compared their organization with the old town hall meetings where citizens had a chance to discuss their problems.

Norbert Dettmann, R. 1, Kewaskum, reported on information he received on the Upper Raritan Watershed Association in New Jersey. To give the new association some working capital, a hat was passed and \$24 was collected.

Tornado Season Approaches Again; Safety Tips Given

We are approaching the tornado season again. Marvin A. Martin, Civil Defense director of the Village of Kewaskum, and Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty would like to remind everyone of some tips for tornado safety.

First, some terms which cause confusion: a tornado WATCH means weather conditions are such that a tornado may develop. A tornado WARNING means a tornado has been sighted, be prepared to take shelter.

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action may mean life or death. In homes, open some windows (but stay away from them); take shelter in the basement (southwest corner) or under heavy furniture in the center area of the house. In schools, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas or to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. In

office buildings, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. In factories, move quickly (following advance plans) to shelter areas; post a lookout, if this can be done safely. In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle, if there is no time, lie flat in the nearest depression with your hands shielding your head.

During a severe thunderstorm or tornado emergency, listen to radio and television broadcasts or latest weather bulletins. The possibility of a storm kit located in the basement or a shelter area should not be overlooked. This kit should include a flashlight, extra batteries, candles, matches, a transistor radio with extra batteries, blankets, and anything else you wouldn't want to do without.

Tornadoes are spawned by severe thunderstorms, and are only one of thunderstorm's hazards. Lightning is the worst killer. Stay indoors and away from electrical appliances while the storm is overhead. If lightning catches you outside, keep yourself lower than and a safe distance from the nearest high, conductive object. Thunderstorms may cause flash floods. Be careful where you take shelter.

A steady blast of from 3 to 5 minutes on the fire siren will indicate take cover. Tune to your local broadcasting station for official explanation and instruction. Don't call officials unless you have information for them. The police squad will also patrol with its public address system warning those who are on the streets. When this occurs take cover immediately.

Possibly by being prepared we can prevent a tragedy even if we can't control the weather. If you have any questions on storms Marvin Martin will try to answer them for you.

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Prin. Connors Appointed Interim School Superintendent by Board

WILL SERVE UNTIL NEW ADMINISTRATOR IS NAMED TO SUCCEED MARSHALL BOYD

of the Kewaskum Statesman High School Principal Edward Connors was appointed interim superintendent of schools for the Kewaskum district when the board of education met in regular session last week Monday night.

He will serve from May 1 until a new administrator is named to succeed Marshall H. Boyd who resigned last month to become superintendent of schools at Portage May 1. The local board is currently interviewing applicants for the superintendent's post.

June 4, which was to be a teacher-in-service day, will become a school day for kindergarten through Grade 11, to make up the March 19 snow day. The in-service day will be moved to June 5. High school graduation will be held as scheduled June 4.

Supt. Boyd reported on a study he made of the 45-15 Plan under which school is held year-round. Board member Richard Theusch previously suggested such a study be made as a possible alternative to the \$2.9 million proposed building program.

Basing his study on the present state law, and on current budget and enrollment figures, Boyd stated that the state aids to the district would drop from about \$400,000 to \$93,108 because the district would go to a flat aid district from an integrated one. Such reduction would mean an increase in the tax rate of \$5.09 per \$1,000 valuation.

He said the 45-15 Plan would not be economical from the standpoint that 25 per cent of the teachers would teach 210 days instead of the present 180. There would be need for five fewer buses at any one time but the buses would cover the same number of miles, thus increasing busing

costs by 15 per cent.

He observed there would also be scheduling problems. Some problems he sees connected with the plan could be solved, he said. He added that elementary schools have tried the plan but no high school in the country has.

He reported on changes in state aids as proposed by Gov. Patrick J. Lucey and said it would be good for someone on the board to take an interest in these matters because the amount that is put on the tax rolls here in the way of the school district budget is determined by the State Legislature.

The board approved the retirement request of custodian Norbert Gatzke and approved changing the April 26 meeting date to April 19.
