## Spring is Here - But Without Matty and His 1924 Model T



For many, many years a sure sign of spring was Math Kohn (called Matty by his acquaintances) and his 1924 Model T Ford on the streets of Kewaskum.

Matty's "convertible" was used strictly as a summer car. Late each fall he would put it into storage for the winter and on the first warm days of the next spring out it would come again as a familiar sight for the natives and a novelty for outsiders.

But Matty and his Model T will no more be seen on the streets of the village. Last fall on his 86th birthday in November, Matty and his Model T came to the parting of the way when both retired from the road.

Matty, who lives about one-quarter mile north of Kewaskum along Hwy. 45, drove his antique car into the village for the last time on Nov. 7 of last year, two days before his 86th birthday, when the above photo was taken. With him was James "Jim" Andre, a nephew and neighbor.

During the summer months Matty usually made one or two

visits a week to Kewaskum for groceries and supplies, a visit with any of his cronies he might happen to meet, and if time permitted maybe a glass of beer or two.

Most car owners greatest concern is the high rate of depreciation these days but not so with Matty. The value of his vehicle has sky-rocketed. He said he purchased the car second-hand for \$5.00, 24 years ago, from a Campbellsport tavernkeeper who was 85 years old at the time. It's been so long he doesn't even remember his name. He was offered \$1,200 for his antique. That's what you call a switch in depreciation. But he gave it to one of his grandsons, 17-year-old Bobby Reese of Campbellsport.

This wasn't Matty's only Model T. He drove Model T Ford's before, in fact that's the only car he ever drove since he started driving. He got used to the Model Ts from the start, stuck with them, and never changed over to any of the new fangled machines.

HUSBAND, WIFE TEAM TO SETTLE IN AREA

Village board members were informed by Trustee Orv Behnke at their meeting last week that a husband and wife doctor team plans to settle in Kewaskum about the middle of June.

Dr. Cesar V. Sison and Dr. Aurora A. Sison intend to live in the village, with one opening a practice in Kewaskum and the other in Campbellsport. It was reported that according to present plans Dr. Cesar Sison will practice in Campbellsport and his wife in Kewaskum. The two physicians are on the staff of Doctors Hospital in Milwaukee presently.

Village officials, clubs and organizations are combining their efforts to find office space, suitable living quarters and other necessary facilities to make it possible for the new doctors, who have indicated they would like to settle in the community, to come here.

No definite arrangements have been made as yet but any new developments will be reported later and also conveyed to the doctors in the hope that it will speed their decision to come to Kewaskum.

## School Board Reviews Solutions for Space Needs; To Use Basement Area

### Village Receives Increase in Grant For Sewage Plant

\$14,500 ADDED TO EXISTING PROJECT GRANT OF \$145,560

The Statesman was informed in a telephone call from Senator Gaylord Nelson's office that the Village of Kewaskum has been granted a \$14,550 increase in grant over the existing grant of \$145,560 for the purpose of additions and alterations to its present secondary sewage plant.

The grant was received from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

After applying for a federal grant for additions to its sewage plant, a grant of \$145,560 to the village was approved early in March. The additional grant of \$14,550 to the existing one brings the total eligible cost grant to \$160,110.

The total estimated cost of the sewage project is \$485,200.

## APPROVES REPAIRS TO BASEBALL FIELD

At its Monday night meeting, the board of education reviewed recommendations for possible solutions for space needs next fall at the high school and at the Wayne Elementary School.

The suggestions came out of a principals' meeting called for by Supt. Marshall Boyd last Wednesday after district electors rejected a \$2.9 million referendum the day before.

After a lengthy discussion, the board voted to proceed with engineering plans and specifications to convert an unfinished high school basement room into useable space for industrial arts auto mechanics classes. It was noted that approval will be needed from the Industrial Commission.

But the board postponed taking action on what should be done at Wayne until next Monday night when it meets again. The alternatives discussed were to convert the gym into classrooms or to pass a resolution to borrow \$200,000 and proceed with the Wayne addition as was called for in the defeated referendum.

Converting the high school basement room would be done with the idea that it would be useable in the future as the district's maintenance shop. Therefore, only about 10 to 15 per cent of the remodeling costs, which would be for a small amount of plumbing and ventilating, would be lost.

Based on some estimates and some bids, an itemized cost list showed a figure of \$26,243.16, which includes \$5,771.42 for equipment. To convert a garage near the industrial arts classroom into a small classroom would add approximately \$1,400 plus equipment.

And, if both the basement and garage adjacent to the industrial arts area would be used for instructional purposes, then a metal building would be needed at approximately \$2,400.

Kohn's wife died nearly six years ago. He is in good health, alert and his senses are still keen. He lives alone and keeps his own house. The couple's two children, Franklin, and Mrs. Roderick (Ruth) Reese, live in Campbellport. Another son, Roman, was killed in a car-train crash accident in 1932.

A retired employe of the L. Rosenheimer Malt & Grain Co., Matty said he was not saddened, knowing his driving days were over. He said, "No, no, I have driven long enough and I am getting too old. I can see good. I can see everything far away, and I can even read a newspaper without glasses. But it is getting pretty dangerous driving."

Andre said that several years ago the Model T needed a new motor. "I wrote to the Ford Motor Co. in Detroit. They replied that they didn't have one, but they gave me addresses in Seat-

le, Milwaukee and somewhere in Texas where a motor could be bought. I found one in Milwaukee," he said, "and William Schaub, a local retired mechanic, installed it."

Because of its 1924 vintage, the car has been declared an antique by the Wisconsin Motor Vehicle Department. "For the last six years I haven't had to buy a license plate," Kohn said. The car bears a plate with "Wisconsin 584 Antique" imprinted on it.

A simple, uncluttered dashboard has merely a choke button and an ammeter for measuring battery strength. On the left side of the steering wheel is the spark lever, on the right the one for gas.

The car, nearly 47 years old, uses 30 by 3 1/2 tires "which cost \$35 apiece," the owner said. It has neither speedometer nor odometer but Kohn said, "it can do 50 miles per hour," and he estimated he got about 20 miles on a gallon of gas. He stated proudly that he never had an accident.

Asked what was the longest

trip he ever made with the car, Kohn pondered a moment then recalled, "Waupun, maybe."

Although the Model T is equipped with a crank, it also has a self-starter and Matty said he hasn't had to crank it, even in the winter. "It starts good," he said and proved it by starting it on the first try.

And when the above picture was taken, with a sound of the horn and a wave of his hand, (Hi-Ho Silver fashion) Matty and his nephew Jim disappeared down the street. Though his car is gone, Matty is living with his memories.

Wayne, the board would not request renewal of the rental agreement for the church hall where half-day kindergarten meets in the morning. Kindergarten would be transferred to the relocatable classroom in Wayne. In the afternoon, that room would be used for music and specialists.

Fifth and sixth graders would be assigned to the gym where these changes are suggested: 1. Remove steel doors at northwest corner of gym, put in glass and aluminum panic doors. 2. Carpet areas to be used as class areas for sound control. 3. Buy furniture of type used in open concept schools to create walls and storage areas. 4. Possible second window in gym.

Estimated cost of the project was listed at \$8,900. But it was pointed out that the cost of the furniture and equipment would not be lost as it could be later transferred to another school.

Removing the gym as such would eliminate indoor physical education classes. In the cold

months students would have to take calisthenics in their classrooms. Also, since the gym doubled as a cafeteria, pupils might have to eat lunch in their classrooms.

Board member Allen Tassar commented that "I feel we cannot jeopardize the Wayne children by taking away their physical education station." Another commented that the vote in Wayne (101 for and 196 against) was indicative of their being opposed to the total building project.

Other suggestions from the principals included renting space in one of the churches or the village hall for seventh and eighth grade health classes which now are held in the high school. However, it was pointed out the entire plan hinges on the Industrial Commission. "We must go to them for approval. It is possible they won't approve it," Boyd stated.

In other action, the board approved a proposal to make repairs to the baseball diamond to correct troublesome drainage problems in and around the infield. The proposal came from Fred Bruhn who represented the local city baseball team which uses the diamond.

The proposal was approved in view of the fact that the district has paid practically nothing for upkeep over a long period of years because the city team has taken care of it, with time and money.

Bruhn's proposal calls for 250 cubic yards of topsoil for a total of \$1,700 with the exception that if more soil is needed it will be at an additional \$2.75 per cubic yard. The topsoil will be graded to proper pitch, compacted and fertilized. The pitcher's mound will be constructed to standard speci-

fications. Two days are needed for the job and the diamond should not be used for about four weeks.

Customers in General Telephone's Kewaskum exchange may notice some changes when they receive their monthly statements next week: from General Telephone.

The "new look" telephone bills are part of an overall change to a more modern and efficient billing procedure by the company, explained Lowell H. Boehm, service office supervisor for General Telephone Company of Wisconsin.

The new type of bills are designed to provide the utility's customers with a better explanation of their telephone statements and charges, Boehm said. The changes in the telephone bill format have made it more complete and easier to understand.

Each customer will continue to receive a payment card that is to be returned with his remittance.

In connection with the new, improved billing method, Boehm said that many Kewaskum customers will experience a new billing date as well as a new due date. This information will be shown on their statement.

The service office supervisor emphasized that customer questions concerning billing or service for the Kewaskum area will still be handled by the local business office, even though the customer billing is originated at General Telephone's state headquarters in Madison.

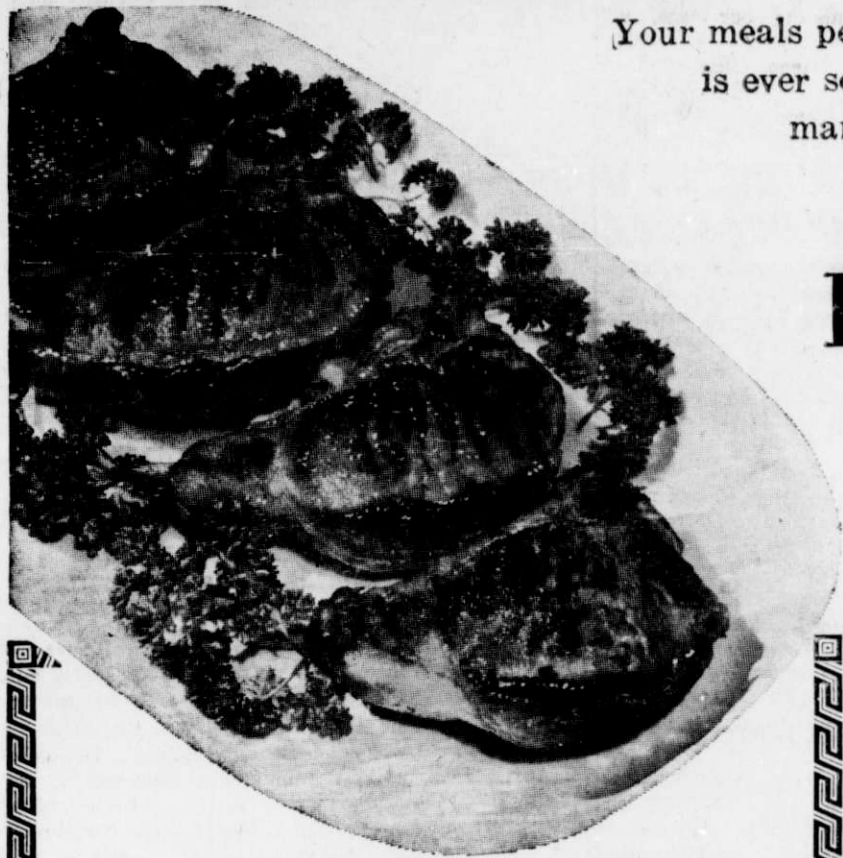

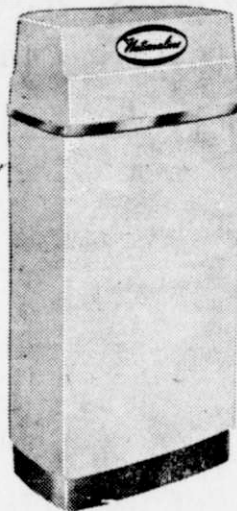
