School Board Agrees to Table Proposed Building Program

SEEK SOLUTIONS TO SPACE NEEDS

The Board of Education agreed Monday night to table the proposed building program with a recommendation that it find out what buildings are available in the district for renting as classrooms.

It was also agreed to get bids on converting an unfinished high school basement room into useable space for industrial arts auto mechanics classes as soon as plans and specifications are ready. "It's the only way we can find out what it will cost," commented board member John Jadro.

The board is seeking solutions for space needs since the defeat of a \$2.9 million referendum by a 2 to 1 margin on April 6.

Board member Richard Theusch suggested a questionnaire be sent to district electors to ask their general feelings about the building program to determine why the referendum was so soundly defeated.

James Plzak, a Town of Farmington elector said, "I agree with Mr. Theusch. I think you will have to go out and find out what people are thinking before you bring anything to them," then he added, "You can't keep laying it on and on. The people just won't stand for it."

Plzak said he has heard many people comment that they voted against the referendum because a brochure that was mailed to district residents just before the election stated that the high school addition would contain a swimming pool.

"If you want the people to vote for a building program, don't mention 'pool,'" he said.

The \$2.9 million project did not include a pool but it was planned to ask for separate bids for a pool.

Plzak also said, "I heard people say they would have voted for the Wayne addition. Why not build just at Wayne now?"

Don Schulz, a Town of Wayne resident, said he also is in favor of taking the projects one at a time rather than borrowing in a lump sum for all three. He also asked, "Why can't Wayne get its addition now?"

He was told that although Wayne has a critical overcrowded situation, it is not any more critical than at Kewaskum Junior High. And besides, someone said, after Wayne has its addition and it comes time to ask for money for Kewaskum or Farmington Schools, the electors might say "No. You just hit us with \$200,000 for Wayne."

Jadro stated he is opposed to going ahead only with the Wayne project. He agrees it is overcrowded but feels the critical area is in Kewaskum where 50 homes are going to be built in Bel-Ric Acres. They will be sold on family priorities and according to adjusted incomes under the Farmers Home Administration Plan.

Those new families will add more children to our already overcrowded situation, Jadro observed.

Board members again pointed out that the package building plan

is the cheapest and that building costs are rising at about one percent per month.

Plzak asked, "Have we looked into renting the St. Michaels School?" Theusch previously had suggested that the four-classroom school be rented for kindergarten use.

But the board's comment was that "St. Michaels isn't where the students are and it would mean more bussing." It was also noted that the district can't get state aids toward rental costs for buildings.

It was stated that renting the Salem Church hall at Wayne ran to about \$2,000 per year. Bussing kindergarten pupils to St. Michaels would be three times as costly.

Plzak commented "that is a paltry sum compared with the \$22,000 spent for architectural fees for a swimming pool." Board member Gerald Secor replied that he saw no correlation in that comparison.

Board member Allen Tessar said "I think we should make the building program a continuous discussion until we come up with a solution. Maybe we should table it indefinitely until students are found standing in the hallways in want of a classroom. Maybe that is the only way to impress the parents," he observed.

Lions Collect 400 Pair of Eye Glasses

This collection will be an annual project for the local Lions Club. If some people missed this year's collection they can either save the glasses for next year or give them to any Lion member.

Worker Injured in New Number to Call Home, Office

Fall at New Plant For Fire, Ambulance Service Is 334-5588

A construction worker on the addition to the new sewage treatment plant at the south village limits was painfully injured in a fall Wednesday morning.

Rollie Klumpers of Waupun, an employee of the Westra Construction Co. of Waupun, which has the contract for construction of the building, fell from the top of a foundation about 23 to 25 feet to a concrete floor below. It was not immediately known what caused the fall but it is believed that some of the heavy material being set into place with a large crane which he was guiding struck him and caused him to lose his balance and fall.

Klumpers suffered a possible fractured leg and other injuries in the tumble. The Kewaskum Fire Department rescue squad was called and members administered first aid at the scene. The injured man was then lifted from the basement floor to a waiting ambulance with the crane. He was rushed to Lutheran Hospital in Beaver Dam.

Award Contract For Revaluation Of Town Auburn

The contract for the complete reevaluation of the Town of Auburn was signed on March 23, 1971. MAP, Inc., of Green Bay was awarded the contract in the amount of \$8,500.00.

Harold B. Moes, the project supervisor, has been an appraiser for 15 years. He began his appraisal background with the USDA, Farmers Home Administration in 1955, and has been employed as an appraiser in the State of Wisconsin for more than five years, working out of Appleton and Green Bay. MAP, Inc. is on the State Tax Department list of approved appraisal companies for the State of Wisconsin and specializes in rural towns and small villages. Moes is a member of the Wisconsin Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers.

Field work is to begin next summer and taxpayers will be given an opportunity to discuss the appraisals at an open house this fall. With a fast growing economy, coupled with inflation and population shift it doesn't take long for a good assessment to become obsolete. Often the market has changed, though not uniformly and the assessments have not changed in line. This means that some property owners are paying more than their fair share of property taxes and some are paying less. The reevaluation is intended to assure that all will be paying their fair share. In a reevaluation some people will be required to pay more taxes and others will pay less, however, the total appraisal of all property will be based on 100% of the fair market value of the property.

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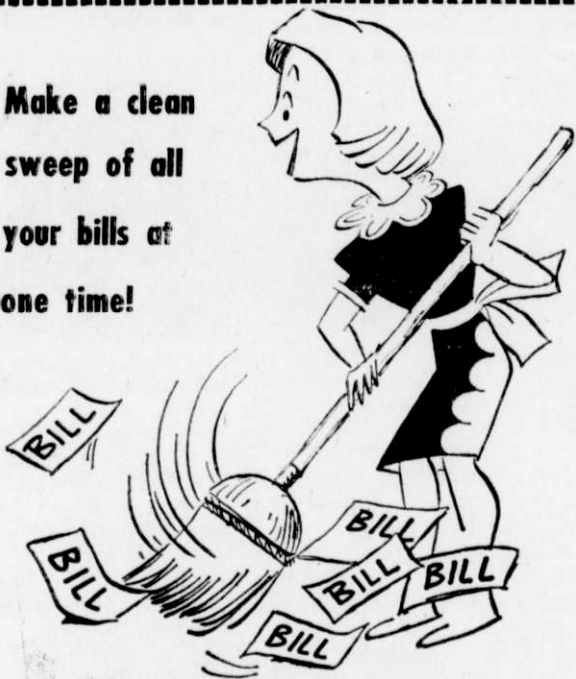

Begin Neighbor to Neighbor Campaign For Cancer in Area

The main collection phase of the annual Cancer Crusade in Washington County, the "Neighbor to Neighbor" campaign, was set to get underway right after Easter. County Cancer Drive Chairman Robert Barber said the collection hopefully would be completed within two weeks, but did emphasize that some additional assistance is still needed to cover all areas of Washington County.

The local crusade hopefully will accumulate over \$12,000 to aid mainly in cancer research. Last year, insufficient appropriations hampered important cancer research programs as the society was overwhelmed with requests for grants, many of which merited scientific support but could not be funded because of a lack of money. While the American Cancer Society increased its research expenditures, some promising developments in the search for the causes and treatment of various types of cancers are marking time.

The president of the Washington County unit of the American Cancer Society, Robert Gordon, also pointed out that education is an important aspect of the annual fund drive; and hoped to persuade the hard core of resisters to join the ranks of the "checked-up" this year. Gordon said, "few realize that there are 1.5 million Americans alive and cured of cancer." He urged the people of Washington County to join this fight "to protect themselves with a check up, and others with a check to their American Cancer Society."

New Phone Rates Effective April 29

The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin has approved new rate schedules for General Telephone Company of Wisconsin. Commencing with the April 29 billings, residential rates for private parties will increase an average of \$1.00 in the Kewaskum area. One party business rates will have an average increase of \$2.45.

There will be no additional charge for color telephones after that date, as well as no extra charge for 9- and 15-foot lengths of telephone cords.

On Feb. 22, 1971, the PSC approved an increase of \$3 million in additional annual revenues for General Telephone. A hearing was held March 8, at which time the utility submitted proposed rate schedules that would realize the added revenue approved by the commission. These rates were reviewed by the PSC and the approval was made on Friday, April 9, reading, in part, "General Telephone Company of Wisconsin be authorized effective on the first regular scheduled billing date 20 days following the date of this order (April 9) to place into effect local exchange telephone service rates."

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE REGIONAL LAND USE AND TRANSPORTATION PLANS

WHEREAS, the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, which was duly created by the Governor of the State of Wisconsin in accordance with Section 66.945 of the Wisconsin Statutes on the 8th day of August, 1960 upon petition of the Counties of Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Walworth, Washington, and Waukesha, has the function and duty of making and adopting a master plan for the physical development of the Region.

WHEREAS, the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission has:

1. Collected, compiled, processed, and analyzed various types of demographic, economic, public utility, financial and natural resource, land use, and transportation data and materials pertaining to the Region;

2. Prepared objectives, principles, and standards for regional land use and transportation development;

3. Forecasted regional growth and changes as related to population, employment, income, manufacturing, automobile and motor truck availability, public revenue, and land use;

4. Developed, compared, and evaluated three alternative plans for the development of the Region; and

5. Selected and adopted on December 1, 1966, a Land Use Plan and a Transportation Plan for the development to the Region to the year 1990.

WHEREAS, the aforementioned inventories, analyses, objectives, principles, standards, forecasts, alternative plans, and adopted plan are set forth in a published report entitled, SEWRPC Planning Report No. 7, comprised of the following volumes:

1. Inventory Findings — 1963
2. Forecasts and Alternative Plans — 1990
3. Recommended Regional Land Use and Transportation Plans — 1990

WHEREAS, the Commission transmitted on March 31, 1967, certified copies of its resolution adoption such Land Use and Transportation Plans, together with the aforementioned Planning Report No. 7, to all local governmental units.

WHEREAS, the Village Board of Trustees has supported, participated in the financing of, and generally concurred in the regional planning programs undertaken by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission and believes that the Land Use and

Transportation Plans prepared by the Commission will be a valuable guide not only to the development of the Region but their community and the adoption of such plans by the Village Board of Trustees will assure a common understanding by the several governmental levels concerned and enable their staffs to program the necessary areawide and local plan implementation work.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that, pursuant to Section 66.945(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, on the 22nd day of March, 1971 hereby adopts the regional Land Use and Transportation Plans previously adopted by the Commission as set forth in SEWRPC Planning Report No. 7 as a guide for regional and community development.
