## Brenholt Named Superintendent Of Schools for Kewaskum District

SUCCEEDS MARSHALL BOYD; 40 APPLICATIONS FOR JOB

Floyd A. Brenholt, 39, has accepted the position of superintendent of schools of the Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2, according to an announcement made Tuesday by Marshall H. Boyd, who will leave his job as superintendent May 1.

Brenholt is presently superintendent of schools at Johnson Creek, a position he has held since 1967. The Kewaskum Board of Education offered the job last week, and he accepted after being released from his job at Johnson Creek.

A graduate of Ondossagon High School in Ashland, Brenholt attended Wisconsin State University-Whitewater and received a bachelor's degree in business administration. He received a master's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with a major in educational administration. He also has completed 13 credits beyond the master's degree.

The new superintendent was a teacher at Westfield High School from 1953 until 1956 and at the Union Free High School, Holtville, Calif., from 1956 to 1957. He returned to the Westfield High School to teach from 1957 to 1960. Brenholt served the Westfield High School as principal from 1960 until 1966. He was assistant superintendent at Black River Falls in 1966-67, and then he took his present job at Johnson Creek.

The new superintendent is married and has six children.

There were 40 applications for the job, according to Boyd. The date when Brenholt will assume his new job has not been announced, but it will be July 1 at the latest, Boyd said.

## Elmhurst Choir To Give Concert At Peace Church

The Elmhurst College Choir of Elmhurst, Ill., under the direction of T. Howard Krueger, is to appear in a concert of sacred choral music at the Peace United Church of Christ on Sunday, May 2, at 10:15 a. m.

The appearance of the choir in Kewaskum is one of more than thirty concerts included in its musical activities during the 1970-1971 season.

This year's Elmhurst College Choir includes thirty-two young men and women, undergraduates of the college, an affiliated institution of the United Church of Christ. Krueger is now in his twentieth season as conductor of the choir. In this period the college's choirs have made more than six hundred personal appearances throughout the eastern two-thirds of the United States.

An unusual and thoroughly interesting feature of the choir's presentations is the appearance of a group of its members organized into a Handbell Choir. The Chapel Bell Ringers, as the group is called, holds membership in the American Guild of Handbell Ringers, and is one of a relatively small number of such collegiate musical groups. The Chapel Bell Ringers appear in conjunction with the singing of the choir as well as in a group of numbers especially transcribed or composed for their use.

Virtually all of the music presented by the Elmhurst Choir in its 1971 season is sacred music. The Chapel Bell Ringers also concentrate on the performance of devotional music. Ranging in character from folk hymns to polychoral motets, and from sixteenth-century composers like Victoria to contemporary composers Daniel Pinkham and Gerhard Krapf, the concerts include works designed to appeal to all tastes in churchly music.

Souvenir recordings made by the Elmhurst Choir and the Chapel Bell Ringers will be available to members of their audiences. These high fidelity stereo LP recordings are prepared especially for the benefit of those attending these concerts.

Recommendations of Gov. Lucey's Highway Safety Task Force '71 will be reviewed by the Wisconsin AAA Young People's Committee for Traffic Safety at its meeting in Madison Saturday, May 1.

Portage County Dist. Atty. William A. Bablitch, the task force chairman, will present the recommendations to the young people, who range in age from 17 to 34. Committee chairman is Robert Lobos, 26, of Appleton.

Of particular interest to young adults are proposals to establish a uniform beer drinking age of 18, to set absolute blood alcohol levels for proof of intoxication, to establish alcohol education programs in the school curriculum, and to evaluate and improve driver education.

Several young persons will participate in a demonstration of the breathalyzer, the chemical breath test to determine a drinker's blood alcohol content.

## Pouch Stolen at Gamble Store Is Recovered

On Monday of this week two Washington County highway workers, Rolland Senn and Al Muckerheide, both of Kewaskum, recovered a money pouch which had been stolen from the local Gamble Store last Dec. 31.

The pouch was found in a ditch aside of the road on Hwy. 28 east of St. Michaels and approximately four miles east of Kewaskum. The highway employees were doing clean-up work alongside the road when Muckerheide scooped up the pouch with a fork. The pouch had been placed into a paper bag to make it unnoticeable and difficult to find, before apparently being discarded. The workers returned the pouch to the owner here.

The check, saving certificate and all other papers were still intact in the pouch. But missing was the cash money, which amounted to over \$200.

Last Dec. 31 three negroes, two women and a man, entered the local Gamble Store during the afternoon. Frank Felix, owner of the store, at the time they entered, was working on the contents of a money pouch, getting it ready for deposit in the bank before New Year's. All checks, except one, had already been taken from the pouch. Shortly after the three left the store, it was noticed that the pouch was missing.

A description of the negroes was released by local police. As a result of this help the three persons were apprehended and arrested in January by Cedarburg police after a similar theft occurred at a Mequon liquor store. Bond was set for the trio, but for lack of sufficient evidence, they were later released.

**'Neighbor' Part  
Of Cancer Crusade  
Is Well Underway**

"The 'Neighbor to Neighbor' part of the annual American Cancer Society's educational and fund raising Crusade should be well underway throughout most of Washington County," according to Drive Chairman Robert S. Barber. "We believe that people-to-people contact," continued Barber, "folks alerting their relatives, neighbors, and friends to cancer's warning signals and helping to raise fighting funds — is part of the combination that will increasingly turn the tide against those dread diseases called cancer." The county drive chairman also pointed out that, "the other part, is the dedication and skill of thousands of physicians and researchers directing their efforts for causes and better treatments."

April is the month which has been set aside for the county-wide Cancer Crusade, and a goal of \$12,000 set. The "Neighbor to Neighbor" aspect brings the drive to each and everyone's front door, hoping to keep cancer from entering that same door in the future. Those who give their time and talent to make that personal contact this year are joining hands with the more than 2-million other volunteers in thousands of American communities whose dedication has already helped save increasing numbers of lives.

Barber expressed a desire to have most of the Cancer Crusade concluded by the end of the month, but due to Easter being as late as it was this year, some additional time in May probably will be needed.

**Bank Contributes  
To Blight Drive**

The Bank of Kewaskum joined over 145 other Wisconsin banks and the Wisconsin Bankers Association in contributing to a drive to raise money for research on Southern Corn Leaf Blight and other blights in Wisconsin. The more than \$3,000 raised from contributions by Wisconsin banks will be used to conduct field research programs designed to study both the blight and its impact on Wisconsin farming operations.

The need for substantial research funds in this area was brought out earlier in a series of bankers workshops on the blight problem sponsored jointly by the Wisconsin Bankers Association and the Extension Programs Division of the University of Wisconsin. The workshops were designed to provide local bankers with the best available information on the blight, primarily for purposes of aiding them in counseling their corn-producing farmer customers on ways of coping with the situation, and alerting dairymen and feeders to the potential economic

impact of the blight attacks throughout the nation's corn belt.

Byran K. Koontz, W.B.A. executive director, commented that the state-wide interest in the blight research indicated that Wisconsin's bankers were taking an ever-increasing interest in the total economies of their local communities, and noted that banks throughout the state had "jumped at the chance to participate in a program which directly benefited some of their major customers—the state's farmers." "The interests of bankers in their local communities," he said, "obviously goes far beyond the narrow confines of their roles as financiers."

To date 3,000 signatures have been collected and a few petitions from Junior Clubs throughout the state have yet to be turned in. It is very possible that the goal will be reached twice over.

The 3,000 signatures have been turned over to Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler. Mr. and Mrs. Fickler will forward them to Mrs. Rowe whose husband, Major Rowe, is an escaped prisoner of the Viet Cong after two years imprisonment. Mrs. Rowe in turn will be presenting the petitions to a delegation that is going to Paris in spring to the peace talks to plead for our POW's and MIA's.

Many people asked as they signed the petitions, "Will this do any good?" Who knows? It will do no harm and every little bit helps in the unending goal of helping our men in Vietnam. One thing America cannot do for the sake of all men in Vietnam, is give up HOPE. Thanks Kewaskum, for your support.

#### Mayer Awarded Bronze Star Medal

Air Force Capt. David W. Mayer, son of Mrs. Oscar Kirchner of R. 2 Kewaskum, has been decorated with the Bronze Star Medal for his performance in Thailand. Capt. Mayer distinguished himself by meritorious service as a weapons controller at Nakhon Phanom Royal Thai Air Force Base. Mayer received the medal at Fortuna Air Force Station, N. D., where he is now stationed. The captain is a 1963 graduate of West Bend High School and a 1967 graduate of Lakeland College, Sheboygan.

#### Airman Hron on Duty in Korea

Airman First Class Kevin T. Hron, son of Mrs. Mary L. Hron of 1402 River View Drive, Kewaskum, is now on duty at Kunsan AB, Republic of Korea, with the recently reactivated and combat-proved 3rd Tactical Fighter Wing.

The F-4 Phantom wing is the only U.S. Air Force operational fighter wing currently assigned in the republic. It replaces U.S. based fighter-bomber units which have previously served only temporary tours there.

Airman Hron is serving as a security policeman with the wing at the air base on the Yellow Sea some 120 miles south of Seoul.

The famed and highly decorated 3rd is the oldest USAF unit on continuous active duty and much of its colorful history parallels the development of U.S. air power.

"Seat-of-the-pants" flying in World War I biplanes, patrolling the Mexican border, touring the country in aerial demonstrations and delivering the mail are all part of the past of the tactical

fighter wing as well as a distinctive combat record in three wars.

Activated at Kelly Field, Tex., in July 1919, the 3rd was comprised of four World War I combat veteran squadrons credited with downing 19 enemy aircraft.

During the twenties and thirties, pilots of the wing helped pioneer aviation technology. The unit tested 20 types of aircraft and logged what were then record long-distance test flights.

One of the first Air Corps units to enter the Pacific campaign during World War II, wing aircrews flying B-25 Mitchell bombers developed low-level bombing techniques that were instrumental in turning the tide of the Battle of the Bismarck Sea and the balance of sea power in the Pacific. Flying in the armada of 120 U.S. and Royal Australian aircraft, 3rd aircrews hit a heavily defended Japanese sea convoy and were credited with sinking 11 enemy vessels. When the war ended, the combat record of the 3rd also included 53 airborne enemy aircraft destroyed.

Three days after the Korean War began, wing bomber crews hit the North Korean capital city of Pyongyang in the first Air Force raid across the 38th parallel. By May 1953 the 3rd had flown a record 30,000 night mis-

sions and garnered a fifth award of the Distinguished Unit Citation and the Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation.

In November 1965, the 3rd began F-100 Super Sabre tactical fighter operations at Bien Hoa AB, Vietnam, and two years later became the first unit in the combat zone to add the Air Force's smallest jet fighter, the A-37, to its arsenal. By the time the 3rd was deactivated last year as part of the reduction of U.S. forces in Vietnam, it has added the Presidential Unit Citation, the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award and the Republic of Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm to its enviable combat awards.

Airman Hron is a 1965 graduate of Kewaskum High School.

## 4-H Speaking and Poster Contest Held in County

"The World Around Us" was the theme for the talks and posters at the annual 4-H Speaking and Poster Program held in Washington County on April 21. Many of the talks and posters related to our environment. Some of them talked about such things as preventing trash and littering, which all of us can do. Some pollution control can be done by individual action, but most of it needs the cooperation of industry and government.

Other concerns of youth were emphasized. David Cross of West Bend talked about the importance of government and things to be done to improve it. He detailed some of the shortcomings of the seniority system for selection of committee chairmen in the U.S. Congress. He pointed out that in this system many of the chairmen are beyond the normal age of retirement and some of them are in

their 80's. He felt that some other system, perhaps election by the committee members themselves, would be a better method of selecting chairmen for the important committees. 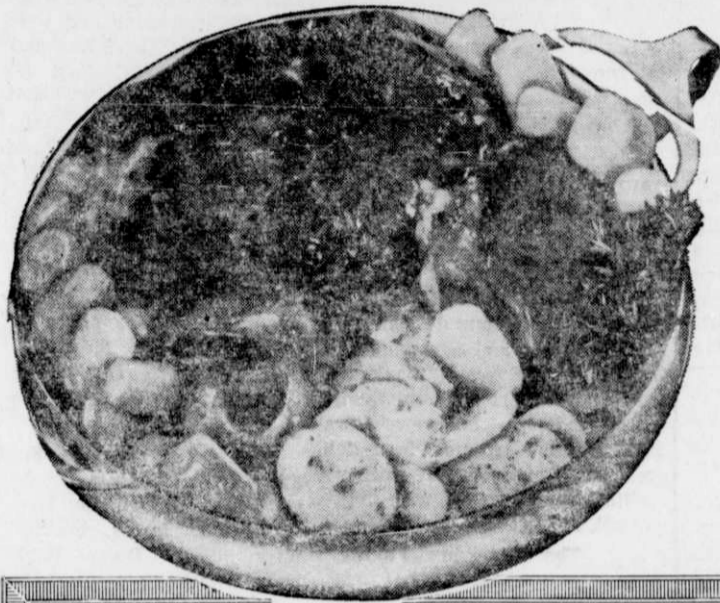

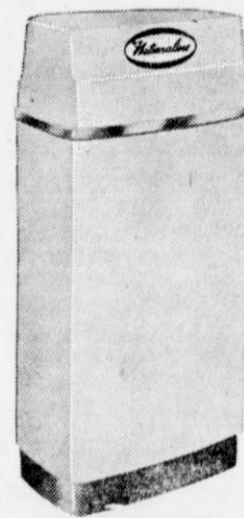
