## School Board to Call for Another Referendum on Its Building Plan

The Board of Education called Tuesday night that it will call for another referendum on the package building plan that electors turned down April 6. Included are additions to the Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools and the Kewaskum High School.

The date of the referendum and the amount of money to be asked for were not decided on although July 26, the day of the annual meeting, was talked about. A formal resolution will be drawn up so that it could be acted on at the next board meeting June 14.

Board members were asked to come to Tuesday night's meeting with a fixed idea on which way the building program should move. Gerald Secor and Richard Theusch favored going ahead only with the Wayne project. Richard L. Edwards and Mrs. Zona Miske favored the package plan.

The board also went on record that it recommends that the \$155,000 borrowed by the district for a swimming pool be repaid on a belief that having pool funds available jeopardized the April 6 referendum.

Tessar, John Jadro and Zimmel said they were reluctant to give up the pool money but that they would be in favor of it "if it means we'll get more 'yes' votes in the referendum."

Interim Supt. Edward Connors was asked to check on the legal aspect of re-paying the \$155,000 pool funds. Mrs. Miske stated she feels the people should be asked if they still want a pool. Richard Theusch said "if the people want a pool, let them petition the board. After all, they voted 'no' when an additional \$75,000 was needed."

If the \$155,000 is repaid before the anniversary borrowing date in September, it will mean the district will have to forfeit interest and it was noted that a forfeit of 90 days' interest would amount to about \$1,800.

Jack Fieweger of the Schutte-Mochon architectural firm was present and Theusch asked him if the cost of the building project could be brought down. The cost estimates made last year were from a preliminary plan, he said. "I think it would be smart to take another look," he added.

Theusch questioned the square foot cost of the Wayne project. He said the 7,770 square foot addition was projected at \$20 per square foot but in the cost estimates, it turned out to be over \$22 per square foot. He contended at \$20 per square foot, the Wayne addition should be holding at \$155,000 instead of \$136,249.

Fieweger said that now that the plans are done, the estimating department could estimate more closely. The first place to look for savings is in the building program, he said. "We have to assess the program that was turned over to us."

Fieweger reported that the estimated cost of converting an unused high school basement room (Continued on page 2)

## Kewaskum Man Awarded \$65,133 Damages by Jury

William Wuebben, Kewaskum, has been awarded \$65,133.66 damages after a Washington County jury found Washington County employees 100 per cent negligent for improperly parking a truck on a highway and causing the death of Mrs. Wuebben and their unborn child.

The jury of 10 women and two men determined that a county highway employe was negligent for parking his truck at the foot of a hill on State Hwy. 28 west of Kewaskum on Nov. 4, 1969. Mrs. Shirley Ann Wuebben, lost control of her car trying to avoid hitting the truck and was killed as a result of the crash. The unborn child also died in the accident.

The jury concluded that the truck driver, Melvin Krueger, was negligent in parking his truck on the highway. Krueger was injured by Mrs. Wuebben's car as it skidded into him when he was about to cross the highway. The Wuebben car ended up going into a ditch and striking a tree. Mrs. Wuebben was pinned in the car.

Her mother, Mrs. Ruth Bintzler, R 1, Lomira, a passenger in the car, was a witness at the trial in which Wuebben was suing the county and its insurance company for the loss of his wife and unborn child. Mrs. Wuebben was close to the delivery date of her child. Doctors delivered the baby stillborn at the hospital. Mrs. Wuebben died five days after the accident of her injuries.

The Washington County Circuit Court trial before Judge Milton Meister took almost four days to complete last week. Atty. Robert Storck represented Wuebben and Phillip Eckert represented the county and its insurance company. The jury deliberated only two hours before coming in with its decision. It was agreed that the total cost of hospital, medical care and funeral expense would be paid to Wuebben, amounting to \$8,708.60.

It was decided by the jury that the pain and suffering Mrs. Wuebben suffered in the 5 days before her death would amount to \$2,375, that the husband should be awarded an additional \$7,250 for the loss of companionship and society of his wife, and the loss of the unborn child was set at \$1,800. "Pecuniary loss" to Wuebben from his wife's death was judged as \$45,000.

State statutory limitations on damages in accident cases may come into play in determining the final awards made to Wuebben.

**County's Farms Now Number 1,432 Census Bureau Report Shows**

Washington County showed a total of 1,432 farms in the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census. In the last previous Census of Agriculture (1964) the number of farms reported in the county was 1,715. Of the county's total farms in 1969, 1,054 are reported as selling \$2,500 or more of agricultural products in the year, as compared with 1,290 in 1964. The report also shows average farm size in the county was 130.0 acres, and average value of these farms (land and buildings) was \$58,985. Other figures from the report are: 1. Value of all farm products sold in 1969, \$19,958,856; in 1964, \$16,009,500. 2. Value of all crops sold in 1969, \$2,770,935; in 1964, \$2,735,638. 3. Value of all livestock, poultry, and their products sold in 1969, \$17,172,365; in 1964, \$13,230,387. Reported for the first time in an agricultural census is information on the extent to which the corporate structure is being used by operators of farms from which agricultural products totaling \$2,500 and over were sold. Including family farms using this type of business structure, 5 of the county's \$2,500-and-over farms are incorporated.

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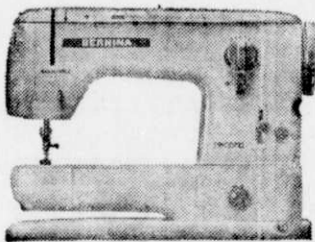


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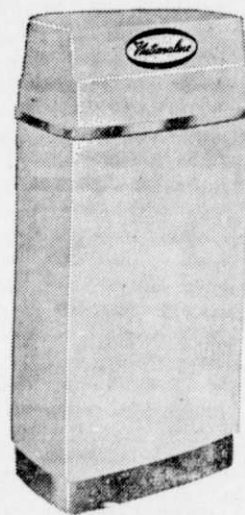
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## Indians Win First WIAA Regional Golf Championship

ADVANCE TO MISHICOT FOX LAKE SECTIONAL

After "blowing" the Scenic Moraine Conference golf tournament at Naga-Waukeee course by 7 strokes last Thursday in which they had high hopes of winning the championship, the Kewaskum Indians golf team came back strong to win the championship trophy in the WIAA Regional tournament held at Sheboygan Tuesday. It was the first Regional golf championship in Kewaskum High School's history since entering the comparatively new sport for the Indians.

In cool, threatening weather with the winds blowing, Kewaskum held a 4-stroke lead over Sheboygan South after 9 holes in the Sheboygan meet. Largely responsible for the Indians' lead was Clark Eichstedt, who shot a two-over-par 37 on the first nine, on which Kewaskum had a 167 total.

Eichstedt, one of the top golfers in the area, who will soon wind up his brilliant high school career, finished with a 76, five over par of 71. He was only 3 over with 2 holes to play but bogied the last two holes as his hands were getting stiff from the cold. Clark, veteran ace of the Indian team, who is averaging under 40, easily won medalist honors for the day. The next closest golfer was George Schroeder of Random Lake with an 83, 7 strokes behind. The other three Kewaskum golfers, sophs Jeff Koth and Jim Gaffke and junior Glen Eichstedt, all shot 89's for a 343 total.

Coach Joe Harlow was particularly pleased with his sophs (Koth and Gaffke) who played steady golf, also with Glen Eichstedt, who hit 12 greens in the winds and would have been second low in the meet except for putting trouble. He said on a warm day with no wind Clark, who shot magnificently, would have shot around the 70 mark.

The Indians will next advance to Sectional competition and will play at Mishicot Fox Lake next Thursday. Sheboygan South, which finished second in the Regional, will also travel to Mishicot.

Results in the Regional at Sheboygan were: Kewaskum 343, Sheboygan South 347, Sheboygan North 349, Oostburg 379, Sheboygan Falls 381, Random Lake 392, Cedar Grove 394.

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## Germantown Wins S-M Track Title; Kewaskum Fourth

JOHN NOHR COPS INDIANS' ONLY 1ST IN POLE VAULT

As expected, Washington High of Germantown ran away with the Scenic Moraine Conference track and field championship at Kettle Moraine Friday afternoon. The Warhawks won 6 of 10 running events and 8 of 15 overall and they almost doubled second place Kettle Moraine in point totals.

Germantown finished with 76 points, followed by Kettle Moraine 42, Grafton 31, Kewaskum 27, Mayville 24, Hartland 21, Slinger 14 and Pewaukee 5. Kewaskum did move up two notches to fourth place, placing sixth last year.

Seven conference records were bettered in the meet, four of them by Germantown—John Mueller's 22.4 in the 220, Mark Gleisner's 10:06.1 in the two mile, Wilbert Henry's 50.1 in the 440, and Henry also anchored the record breaking mile relay unit which won in a time of 3:25.3. Tim Cummins high jumped a record 6-4 for Kettle Moraine and teammate Joe Whitmore ran the mile in 4:34.3. Another record was set by Hartland's John Lechner in the 120 yard high hurdles with a time of 15.1 seconds.

Kewaskum's only first was won by John Nohr, who cleared 11 feet in the pole vault. John Milewski captured three thirds.
