Kewaskum Man Awarded \$65,133 Damages by Jury

William Wuebben, Kewaskum, has been awarded \$65,133.66 damages after a Washington County jury found Washington County employes 100 per cent negligent for improperly parking a truck on a highway and causing the death of Mrs. Wuebben and their unborn child.




