13 Injured in Holiday Weekend Crashes in Area

At least 13 persons were injured in four separate accidents which occurred in this area over the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

Richard Thompson, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Thompson, 1330 Riverview Dr., Kewaskum, suffered leg and other injuries when the bicycle he was riding was struck by an auto driven by Gerald Secor, 47, of R. 1, Kewaskum, on Main St. at the intersection with Riverview Dr. at 7:12 p. m. Friday. According to local police, Secor was approaching from the east on Main St. and the bike was approaching from the north on the sidewalk on the east side of Riverview Dr. The bicycle ran onto the roadway without stopping and was struck by the Secor car in the right lane of traffic and thrown over the hood of the auto. The fender, handlebars and a wheel of the bike was damaged and the grill, hood and bumper of Secor's vehicle sustained some damage.

In a two-car crash which occurred about 1 a. m. Saturday on CTH V north of Kewaskum, four persons were hurt. An auto driven by Randall Schaefer, 647 S. 16th St., West Bend, collided with one driven by Janice Pocian, 1413 Eder Lane, West Bend. Miss Pocian incurred a bruised right eye and a passenger, Joanne Larson, received injuries to her right hip, back and shoulder. Criss Crass, a passenger in Schaefer's car, sustained injuries to her ankle and Schaefer was also injured. More detailed information was not available.

A two-car crash which occurred about 6 p. m. Sunday on Hwy. 28 a short distance west of the intersection with State Hwy. 144 east of Kewaskum resulted in the injury of three Kewaskum young people and two Germantown men. Jane Fischer, R. 2, Kewaskum, driver of one car, and two passengers, Jeanne Korth and Janet Lawrenz, both of Kewaskum, all were hurt with Miss Korth being injured seriously. The Germantown men, Roman Kreuser, driver of the other vehicle, and Nick Henn were also injured. Kreuser suffered a fractured leg and Henn received lacerations. Miss Korth who suffered serious head injuries, was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, and later transferred to St. Luke's Hospital, Milwaukee, where her condition was reported as satisfactory this week. Details on the mishap were not available.

Leroy Keller, Sr., Kewaskum, suffered lacerations to his chin in a two-car collision between his auto and one driven by Milton Weinhold, Adell, around 7:15 p. m. Sunday in Boltonville. Mrs. Keller was a passenger in her husband's car. Weinhold and a passenger, Susan Weinhold, also received injuries. It was reported that Keller was proceeding on Hwy. 144 when the Weinhold auto pulled out from a side street onto the highway in the path of his car, causing the two vehicles to collide.

Steven Blumer Top Student in Academy Class of 82 Seniors

Climaxing four years of spiritual and academic studies, 82 seniors were graduated from the Winnebago Lutheran Academy at Fond du Lac Tuesday night during ceremonies held in the school gym.

Steven Blumer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Blumer, Kewaskum, was the top scholar in the class and served as valedictorian at the graduation exercises. Sharon Schwietenberg was the salutatorian. The two spoke briefly to their classmates and a capacity audience during the ceremonies.

Blumer declared that the 82 graduating seniors now "have every opportunity to make their life a happy one." He spoke of applying to their lives what the class had chosen as their motto: "Nothing can come between me and the full prospect of my hopes." Using John Milton, an English poet, as an example, he explained that Milton not only conquered his blindness but many family tragedies. He also noted that if Milton had given up when he became blind he would only be known as a minor poet. But instead he went on to write his greatest works. In concluding Blumer said, "To succeed in this world it is more important to reach our heavenly home."

The traditional cap and gown procession was led by Blumer and Miss Schwichtenberg. The graduation address was given by the Rev. Gerhardt Ehler, pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. The academy concert choir rendered three selections. The class sang a song and T. W. Zuberbier, principal of the academy, distributed diplomas. Prof. Walter Hoepner offered the scripture reading, benediction and prayers.

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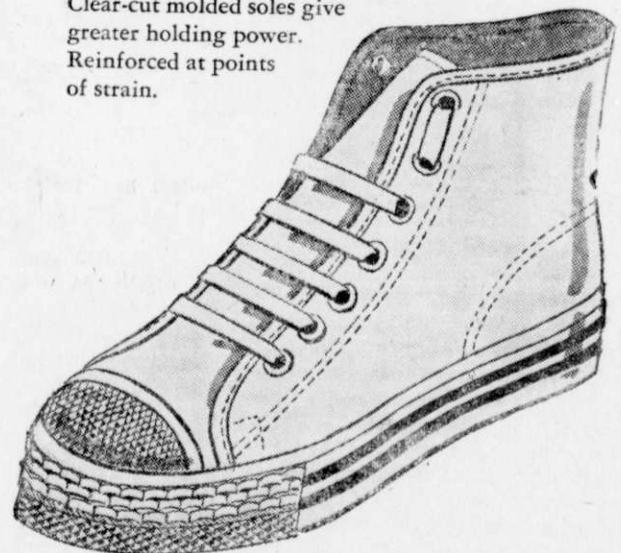
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Administrators of Beechwood Home Attend Conference

Remily, deputy chief of the section; and Louis Hamel, chief of Medicare Certification, of the Department of Health and Social Services.

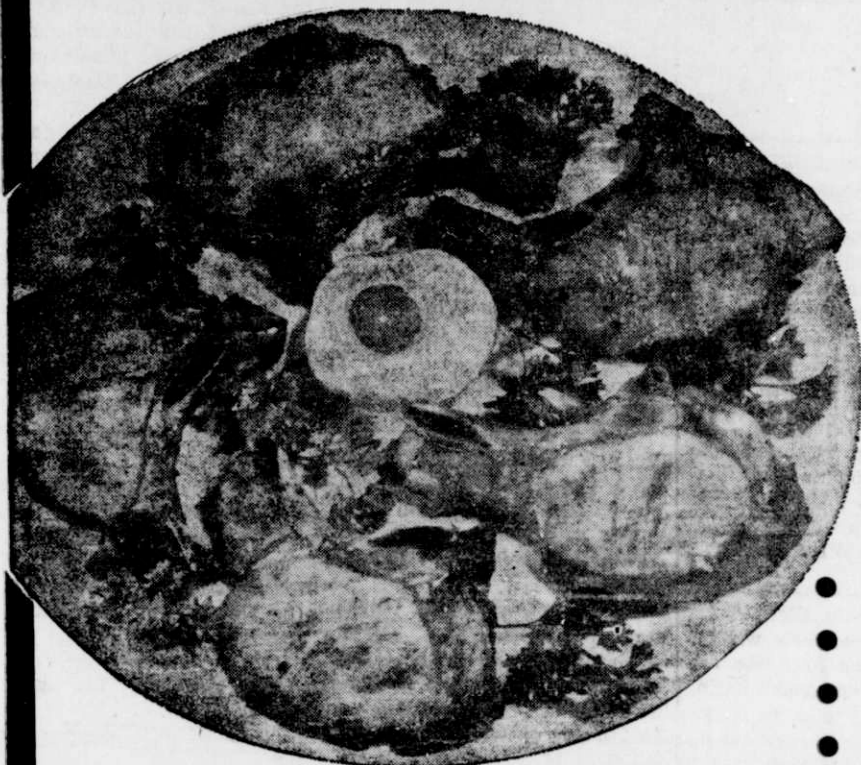

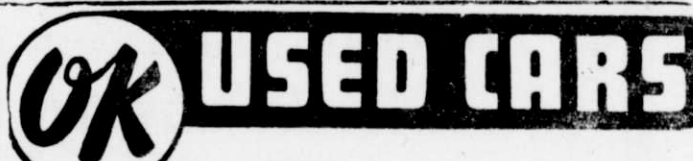

Germantown went on to also win the Class B Sectional at Nicolet Tuesday and took a big step in their bid for the state title, in which meet they will be one of the favorites to win. The Warhawks totaled 49 points and qualified 6 individuals and their great relay team for the state meet. They finished 12 points ahead of second place West Milwaukee which had 37. Other places were: St. Francis 25, Mayville 22, Franklin 19, New Berlin 15, Slinger 13, Dodgeland 12, Milwaukee Lincoln 10, Kewaskum 9, Campbellsport 8, Grafton 7, Shorewood 6, Pewaukee 2.

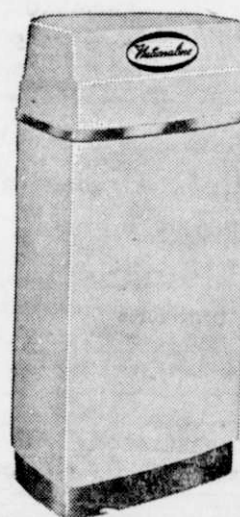
