COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES AT FOND DU LAC TONIGHT

Vocational, Technical and Adult Education — District 10 will award diplomas and associate degrees to the largest class in its history Friday, June 11, at commencement exercises scheduled to begin at 8 p. m. at Goodrich High School in Fond du Lac.

A tentative list of 281 students who have completed work in programs at the Beaver Dam Vocational Technical School, the Fond du Lac Technical Institute and the West Bend Vocational Technical School has been released by the District office in Fond du Lac. The number is an increase of 8.5 per cent over the class which completed work in 1970.

Two More Families Move Into Bel-Ric Acres Subdivision

12TH PERMIT ISSUED; PLAN PARADE OF HOMES

Two more families have moved into the new Bel-Ric Acres subdivision at the south village limits. These are the third and fourth families to move into the subdivision as the homes are being completed.

The latest families to move into Bel-Ric Acres are Mr. and Mrs. Dave Coulter and family from West Bend and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Pattee and family from Campbellsport.

Construction is underway on a number of other homes there and plans call for the building of 50 or more homes in the subdivision. Five builders have contracted to build 10 homes apiece. Two more building permits were issued by the Kewaskum village board at their meeting Monday night, making a total of 12 thus far for new homes in Bel-Ric Acres this spring. One permit was issued to Schulz Realty of West Bend and the other to Russ Krueger Realty. Eleven homes now have been finished or are under construction. There are 78 lots in the subdivision.

A "Parade of Homes" sponsored by the Metropolitan Builders Association is being planned for July 10 and 11 at Bel-Ric Acres. Watch for further announcements.

Local Firemen Taking State Training Course

Chief Armin Oppermann of the Kewaskum Fire Department announced this week that the members of the department have begun a standard firemanship training course given by the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education. The first class was held last week and weekly classes will continue into August.

This instruction will bring to the firemen the latest techniques of fire fighting. Included are such subjects as ventilation, overhauling, fire stream practices, pump operation, rescue practices, use of fire department tools, ladder practices, forcible entry, salvage and knot tying.

The instructor for the course is Lt. Brian Mayer of West Bend. Classes are being held at the fire station.

The course is sponsored by District 10 Vocational, Technical and Adult Education at Fond du Lac and is part of the fire service training program of the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education.

Gordon Christianson, supervisor of Fire Service Training, said "We are glad to be able to help Kewaskum by giving this course. The fact that they requested the training shows they are alert to the fact that firemanship has grown to be complex and technical. The days are gone when firemen went to a fire and merely squirted water. Knowledge of advanced techniques is resulting in better firemanship which means better fire protection with attendant benefits of a lesser loss of life. The men taking this course are doing so on their own valuable time in order that they may improve their knowledge and serve the community better."

C. L. Greiber, state director of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education noted that a well trained fireman is an asset to his department and his community, but a poorly trained fireman can be a tragic liability. "Rapidly advancing technology of our age brings many improvements in living, but with many of these come new or increased hazards. It is essential that our firemen learn to cope with these hazards through systematic training," the state director said.

Village President Cyril Wietor asked the recreation committee to make a study of the summer swimming program and give a recommendation on whether some regulations should be adopted, when the Village Board met Monday night.

Recreation committee members are Raynor Herriges, Alfred Kral and Charles Miller.

Each summer, for eight weeks, the village provides swimming instruction and lifeguards at the local beach. On weekends, there has been a heavy flow of persons coming to the beach from outside the school district.

It was reported a busload of children are dropped off for an entire afternoon. Board members pondered whether restrictions are needed so that lieguards don't become baby sitters. Issuing a pass to residents of the school district was discussed as a possibility.

In charge of the swimming program will be John Breaker, a teacher in the Kewaskum schools system. He recommended there be two guards. Applications will be received at the municipal building.

In other action, the board approved Class B liquor licenses for William A. Edwards, Milton E. Flynn, Robert D. Flynn, Lawrence J. Galabinske, Sr., Althea H. Keller, Willard E. Lynn, Rose E. Beach, Swim Program to Open June 21

The village beach will open on June 21. The summer swim program will also begin on that day with the schedule for lessons as follows:

9:30 - 10:30—Lifesaving
10:30 - 11:00—Intermediates
11:00 - 11:30—Advanced Beginners
11:30 - 12:00—Beginners

All lessons will be taught by a qualified Red Cross water safety instructor, and successful completion of the outlined program at each ability level will be recognized by a certificate from the Red Cross.

The lifesaving class will include both junior and senior groups as determined by age; 11 years old for the junior group and 15 years for the senior group, according to Red Cross requirements. The lifesaving classes will be held in 2-4 week sessions: Session 1—June 21 to July 16; Session 2—July 19 to Aug. 13.

A swimming test will be given on the first day of each session to all those enrolled in the lifesaving class. Its purpose is to assure both the instructor and the student that each swimmer is physically able to remain in the class.

All other classes will be held in four 2-week sessions: June 21 to July 2, Session 1; July 5 to July 16, Session 2; July 19 to July 30, Session 3; Aug. 2 to Aug. 13, Session 4.

In the intermediate class the instruction will involve learning different swimming strokes. Before enrolling in this class, the student should have the swimming ability to handle himself in deep water.

The advanced beginner class is for those who have some swimming ability; they should be able to swim approximately 50 feet in any manner and be able to jump in deep water and swim safely in shallow water.

The beginner level is for those who have little or no ability and are learning how to swim.

Sign up sheets for lessons during the first session must be completed and returned by June 19. The sheets are available at the municipal building. Lessons at all levels (except lifesaving) are open to those 6 years and older. If there is a question as to the proper ability level for lessons, the instructor will be available to answer questions and give swimming tests (except lifesaving) on Saturday, June 19, and Sunday, June 20, from 1 to 3 p. m. at the beach.

Besides the lessons offered, the beach will be open daily Monday thru Saturday from 12:30 to 5:30 p. m. for free swimming. While the beach is open between 9 a. m. and 12 noon daily Monday thru Friday, ONLY those in lessons will be permitted in the water and only during their scheduled class time. NO free swimming while lessons are in progress. The beach will also be open Saturday morning from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and Sunday from 1 to 6 p. m. for free swimming.

No one under 6 years old will be permitted in the water during free swimming hours unless they

Last Immunization Clinic Here June 16

Family immunization clinics for 1971 finish this month with the offering of diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and polio vaccines. All citizens in Washington County wishing to participate may attend. The location is Kewaskum Elementary School cafeteria from 6:30 to 8:00 p. m., June 16. Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer, will be in attendance along with the nursing staff of the Washington County Public Health Nursing Service. Cost will be \$1.00 per immunization dose, and children under one year need written permission from their family physician.

This will be the last clinic for 1971. Clinics will probably begin again in February 1972. During the clinics all recommended immunizations are offered to Washington County citizens. By attending clinics complete immunizations can be done in one year. Boosters can also be obtained whenever they are needed.

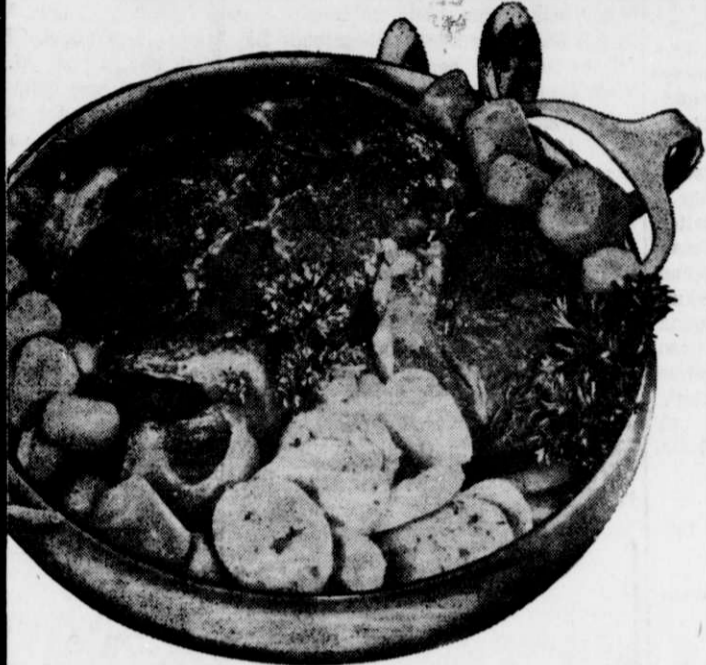

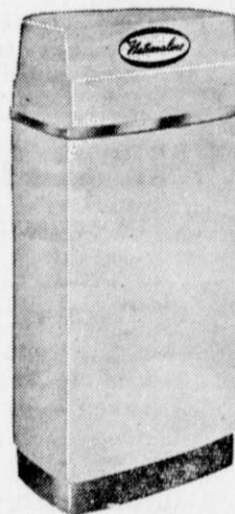
