Moderate Income Parade of Homes To Run in Kewaskum July 10-18

A unique Parade of Homes featuring six models specially designed for buyers in the moderate income range (\$6,000 to \$10,000) will run from Saturday, July 10 through Sunday, July 18 in Kewaskum.

The Parade will officially open in Bel-Ric Acres, a 67-lot subdivision developed by the six builders of the Parade models in close cooperation with the Metropolitan Builders Association of Greater Milwaukee, the Farmers Home Administration, and Kewaskum civic, business and governmental leaders. A ribbon-cutting ceremony will take place at 1 p. m. on Saturday, July 10 at the site, located just west of Highway 45 on County Highway H at the south edge of Kewaskum.

Both three and four-bedroom models with attached garages will be featured at a package price of under \$25,000 for house and lot, including sewer and water. Conventional financing will be available along with the financial assistance of federal agencies under their 235 and 502 programs.

All six builder participants are Registered Builder members of the Metropolitan Builders Association. They are: Murray Construction Co., Inc., 16835 Martha Dr., Brookfield; Radke Homes, Inc., 9950 N. Port Washington Road, Mequon; Wimmer-Blatter Bldg. Co., Inc., 3500 S. 92nd St., Milwaukee; Universal Shelter Corp., 5629 Broad St., Greendale; and Schulz Realty, Inc., 1018 Mulberry Dr., West Bend.

After an exhaustive search for suitable lands conducted among the 92 municipalities in Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee and Washington counties, the site in Kewaskum was selected as being most feasible for moderate income housing. A joint venture was formed among five builder members of the association to purchase the site, develop it, and build one model each under the Parade of Homes format, a traditional new home model marketing promotion of the association. A sixth participant who also owned 11 lots in the site was added at a later time.

Kewaskum is a village with a population of 1,924 in the Kettle Moraine area of Northern Washington County, six miles north of West Bend. Kewaskum has an expanding industrial base, the major industry being Regal Ware, an aluminum utensil manufacturer currently contemplating expansion. The housing needs are acute in the city, not only for Regal Ware employees but also for teachers in the large school system.

Full cooperation has been obtained from the village trustees of Kewaskum on the subdivision development which included a reduction in lot size from 90 to 70 feet average width to permit a more economical lot price. The subdivision is improved with city water and sewer.

One of the special advantages of this Moderate Income Parade will be the availability of varied model homes on one site, avoiding the sameness label which has been applied to some moderate

Jacob K. Felix Graduates From Medical School

Jacob K. Felix, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Felix of St. Kilian, R. 3, Campbellsport, graduated from the University of Wisconsin Medical School in Madison on June 14. His parents attended the Medical School Recognition ceremony and buffet luncheon held at the Wisconsin Memorial Union theater on June 7.

Introduction was made by Dr. Peter L. Eichman, dean of the University of Wisconsin Medical School. Remarks and comments were made by H. Edwin Young, chancellor Madison Campus the University of Wisconsin; Dr. James W. Nellen, member of the University Board of Regents; John C. Weaver, president of the University of Wisconsin, and others. The address, "The Watershed of the 1970's" was made by Dr. John H. Knowles, general director of Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston.

Jacob, his wife Jeannette and son Nathan will move to Rochester, New York where he will serve his internship in pediatrics at Strong Memorial Hospital starting on June 30. Mrs. Felix, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Salzmann of Wausau, will complete study and work required for a Ph. D. degree in Medical Genetics in fall. She will also have a position at Strong Memorial Hospital in research beginning Aug. 1.

In June of 1969, Mrs. Jeannette S. Felix, a graduate student, together with Robert I. De Mars, a professor of medical genetics, reported the first successful diagnosis of a case of Lesch-Nyham disease before birth. Lesch-Nyham syndrome is a hereditary body chemical defect, that causes cerebral palsy, mental retardation, obsessive destructive behavior and excessive uric acid in the blood and urine. Except in rare instances, only boys will have the disease; girls will be carriers.

Beach to Open June 21 for Swim Program

An instructor will be available at the beach on Saturday, June 19, and Sunday, June 20, from 1 to 3 p. m. to answer any questions concerning the swimming program.

The summer hours for the beach are as follows:

Monday - Friday—9:30-12 noon, lessons ONLY; 12:30-5:30, free swim.

Saturday — 9-12 noon, 1-5 p. m., free swim.

Sunday — 1-6 p. m., free swim.

Anyone 6 years or older is eligible to sign up for lessons; anyone under 6 years old will not be allowed in the water during free swimming hours unless they are accompanied and watched by someone at least 16 years old.

As in previous years, anyone swimming when a lifeguard is not on duty will be swimming at their own risk.

Sept. 13 Chosen by School Board for 2nd Referendum on Building Plan

Sept. 13 is the date chosen by the Board of Education Monday night for another referendum on the package building plan that electors turned down April 6.

The amount of money to be called for was not established but Jack Fieweger, representing the Schutte-Mochon architectural firm suggested the amount of the first referendum be used, which was \$2,915,000, plus one per cent per month for the time that has elapsed between the two referendums, to offset rising building costs.

The official resolution is already drawn up. Only the amount needs to be filled in.

At its May 24 meeting, board members had talked about a referendum on July 26, the date of the annual district meeting. Board chairman Richard L. Edwards stated Monday night that the board met on June 4 with Floyd A. Brenholt, the new superintendent of schools, who will take over within a few weeks.

Edwards said they discussed the manner in which to approach the building program and it was the consensus then that it would probably be best to have an advisory referendum at the annual meeting on whether or not to repay the \$155,000 borrowed for a swimming pool and to hold off on a referendum until sometime in the fall to give Brenholt a chance to look at the schools and the situation in general.

Brenholt, who was present Monday night, stated, "I don't claim to have any new or tremendous ideas but it would give us some extra time to try to sell the building plan."

Brenholt says he has in mind a series of meetings, including morning coffee hours, to be held specifically for the purpose of discussing the building program. He suggested holding an ample number in August so everyone in the district will have had a chance to attend. "Maybe the referendum won't pass but we can at least say we tried," he commented.

Before the board decided on the Sept. 13 date, there was a good deal of discussion on whether August or September would be the better time for a referendum. And just when it seemed as though the board was about to again put off setting a date, board

builder has additional models
which could be constructed. Part
of the subdivision agreement
states that no similar model shall
be placed adjacent to or across
from any other similar model.

The Board of Directors and the
Moderate Income Housing Com-
mittee of the Metropolitan Build-
ers Association anticipate that
this Kewaskum Moderate Income
Parade will be a pilot demon-
stration for similar developments un-
der consideration for the future.

member Gerald Zimmel moved
for the Sept. 13 date and it was
unanimously approved.

Board members again discussed
with Fieweger tentative plans to
convert an unfinished high school
basement area and a small garage
near the industrial arts classroom
into useable industrial arts class-
room space. Their decision was
to hold off on the basement pro-
ject and to get more accurate fi-
gures on cost of remodeling the

garage.

Estimated cost of converting
the basement room is \$51,680 but
according to Fieweger, some dele-
tions such as a hoist and pit,
blacktopping, and retaining wall
could reduce the cost by about
\$8,000. He estimated the project
could be completed in three
months.

Principal Edward Connors re-
ported in contacting the West
Bend Vocational School he was
told that it cannot rent any of
its auto mechanics shop facilities
as all are being used to full capa-
city.

Connors said, "If we don't go
ahead with remodeling, I suggest
we continue on the present teach-
ing schedule under which the
first nine weeks is a classroom

phase. Then the class moves out-
doors for actual auto repair work.
If weather is bad, students are
brought inside to clean the shop
or are assigned to a library pro-
ject." Presently there are 3 class
sections in auto mechanics and
two in electricity, he said.

Regarding possible renting of
classrooms, Connors reported
Peace Church has made an offer
and one is expected from St. Lu-
cas Church after its board meets
in early July.

The board approved a contract
for Harold S. Doss to teach reme-
dial reading. That program will
be moved from the high school to
junior high level. Continued mem-
bership in the Wisconsin Associa-
tion of School Boards at a yearly
fee of \$465 was approved.

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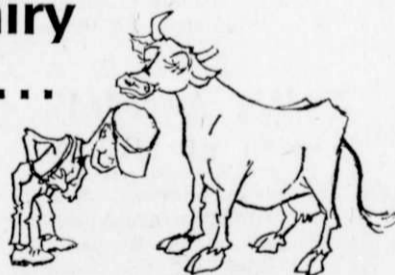

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Sisters Transfer Ownership, Operation Of St. Joseph's Hospital to Community

Negotiations have been completed for the ownership and operation of St. Joseph's Community Hospital (West Bend) to be transferred from the Sisters of the Divine Savior to the West Bend community. The announcement of this transfer was made jointly by Sister M. Helene Patefield, superior of the North American Province of the Sisters of the Divine Savior, and Norman A. Schowalter, president and chairman of the board of directors of the hospital.

Sister Helene stated, "We are not giving up our work in health care. Our Sisters will remain in West Bend as long as the community wants their services and as long as we have Sisters who would choose to carry on this work in West Bend. Sisters presently working at the hospital have indicated a desire to remain."

It is planned that the name of St. Joseph's Community Hospital will be retained. The hospital will continue to be operated as a charitable, non-profit corporation, and shall be governed by a board of directors.

Representation of Sisters on the board of directors is expected to be continued under the new ownership. Presently, the board has three representatives from the Sisters of the Divine Savior as members. They are Sister Cordea Pflieger, Sister Beverly Heitke and Sister Kathleen Bergs, all of Milwaukee. The community representatives include Schowalter, Robert T. Rolfs, Thomas J. Kenny, James R. Brown, and Dr. James F. Baumgartner, all of West Bend; James D. Reigle of Kewaskum; Dr. Carlton M. Herman of Allenton; and Reuben Schmah of Jackson.

Arrangements for the transfer of ownership were completed when permission was authorized by the Generalate and finally by the Sacred Congregation for Religious, both located in Rome. Authorization is obtained from these

bodies whenever there is a liquidation, sale or transfer of property owned by a religious order.

The West Bend community and the Divine Savior Sisters have worked cooperatively since 1927 when St. Joseph's Community Hospital was organized. Starting in 1957 there has been a more active participation by the community when a Lay Advisory Committee was formed to assist the governing board of Sisters in operations at the hospital. In 1967 St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend, Inc. was established as a corporation separate from operating control by the Motherhouse of the Divine Savior order. At that time, laymen were elected to the hospital's board of directors and given the responsibility for establishing operating policies.

The consideration to the Sisters of the Divine Savior by St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend, Inc. for their equity in the current and fixed assets of the hospital is \$960,000.

President Schowalter had this to say: "The West Bend community was most fortunate when, in 1927, the Sisters of the Divine Savior came to West Bend upon the invitation from a group of community minded citizens who saw the need for hospital care in our community. For more than 40 years, the Divine Savior Sisters

have served St. Joseph's Community Hospital faithfully and well. They have given untiringly and unselfishly of their time. To all the Sisters who have served us over these many years, we express a deep feeling of gratitude for their most dedicated service. Likewise, it is our genuine and sincere hope that the Divine Savior Sisters will continue to serve St. Joseph's Community Hospital as long as there are Sisters who are devoted to health care."

Fred J. Bury came to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in 1967 as associate administrator. Starting in 1969, he has served the hospital as the administrator and continues in that capacity.

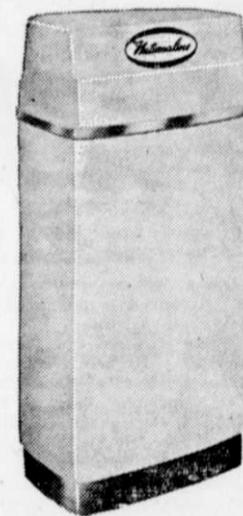
