## Doctors Team to Begin Practice At New Kewaskum Clinic July 6



A husband and wife doctors team, natives of and educated in the Philippines, will begin a medical practice in Kewaskum next Tuesday, July 6. Their offices will be located in the new Kewaskum Clinic in the Miller building on Fond du Lac Ave. (Hwy. 45) near the north village limits. There is a large parking lot next to the building.

The doctors are Dr. Cesar V. Sison and his wife, Dr. Aurora Alonzo Sison. The couple and their two children — 5-year-old Norman, who is called "Jon-Jon" and Cesar Jr., who will be one year old on July 8 — have purchased a home and will live at 1435 Roseland Drive here.

The doctors were in Kewaskum last Thursday evening to see their new office quarters. The front portion of the building was remodeled by Edward E. "Pat" Miller, and has just been completed for them. Miller was there to greet them and show them in and around their new clinic. He and the Doctors Sison are shown in the above photo at the entrance to the building.

The clinic has a good attractive reception room on street level furnished in early American furniture and accessories will make the visitors feel most welcome. A private consultation office and two well equipped examining rooms are easily accessible off the wide corridor which also leads to the rest rooms and emergency ambulance entrance. The quarters are fully carpeted in tones of burnt orange. Light olive colored paneling throughout is accented by fold-colored draperies on the windows.

An attractive entrance and shut-

ters have been added to the exterior. Lettering on the building designates it as "Kewaskum Clinic" and the names of the doctors are lettered on the door. Lawn and evergreens have been planted.

Although the Sison family moved into their residence here previously, they had been practicing at Doctor's Hospital in Milwaukee until Thursday. They have been in residency there during the past year. Mrs. Sison's parents reside with them to look after the children but are here only on a visitor's visa. They will have to return home in about a year, but they may come back Mrs. Sison said.

Both doctors were born in the Philippines. He is 32 years of age, and she is 33. They were classmates and finished medical schooling at the Far Eastern University School of Medicine in Manila and obtained their certificate from the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates in 1965.

Ten days after their marriage in their homeland, the couple flew to the United States. Dr. Cesar took his internship and four years of general surgical training at the Illinois Masonic Medical Center in Chicago, an affiliate of the University of Illinois.

He also had six months training in obstetrics and gynecology at the Ravenswood Hospital in Chicago. His wife had one year of internship and two years of residency training in anesthesiology at University of Illinois Hospitals. Both obtained their licenses to practice medicine in Wisconsin on March 1.

The building was formerly occupied by the advertising department of Regal Ware, Inc., which recently moved into their spacious new office building on Regal Dr. Before that it was occupied by Kieckhafer's for a time about 12 years ago and prior to that a service station and garage business was also housed in the building. The structure was built by the late Carl and Harry Schaefer, who conducted a hazy business on the site many years.

The station will sell Shell gasoline and handle Shell and other products. Herriges will also continue to operate his Shell station at the corner of Main St. and Riverview Dr. A grand opening will be held at his new station in the near future. Watch for announcements.

## Fireworks in Park July 3

## Record \$1.8 Million School Budget Will Be Presented to Dist. Electors

BUDGET IS \$159,133.33 HIGHER THAN LAST YEAR

A record budget of \$1,823,906.57 will be presented for approval of the electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools district at the annual meeting July 26. The budget, which was approved by the Board of Education Monday night, is \$159,133.33 higher than the one for 1970-71.

Because the State Legislature has not voted on state aids, the exact mill rate is not now known. However, Supt. Floyd Brenholt stated "we will go into the annual meeting with a mill rate of between 21.34 (which he calculated under the present aid law) and 19.44 (calculated under the proposal passed by the State Assembly)". The current budget mill rate is 20.73.

The budget categories showing the largest increases are instruction, operation and fixed charges. Among items listed in fixed charges are insurance costs and teacher retirement funds.

Explaining the increases, Brenholt said insurance costs, especially health care, have risen considerably and for the first time, the district will be paying up to \$200 per teacher per year toward his retirement fund. That comes as a result of earlier contract negotiations between teachers and the school board, he said.

The board voted Monday night to also have the district pay \$200 toward each of the retirement funds of Brenholt, High School Principal Edward Connors and Elementary Principal Richard Zarling.

Authorized was payment of \$600 to Brenholt for eight days' work in June after taking over as superintendent before his contract goes into effect July 1. Also authorized was payment of \$1,050 to Connors for his services as interim superintendent from May 1 to June 18.

In other action, board members gave their approval to proceed with remodeling the gym at the Wayne School into classrooms as a temporary measure to alleviate overcrowding. It was noted that the state has given permission to operate under this remodeled situation for one year only.

The remodeling cost of \$6,405 includes carpeting, moveable furniture (Continued on page 2)

## Bank Becomes Member of Valley Bancorporation

Gus A. Zuehlke, president of Valley Bancorporation announced the addition of Bank of Kewaskum, Badger State Bank of Denmark, and Farmers and Merchants Bank of Weyauwega as members of Valley Bancorporation. The registered bank holding company declared the exchange of Valley Bancorporation stock for capital stock of the banks effective at 11:00 a. m. on June 23, 1971.

The exchange offer to the banks' stockholders was made after approval by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.

Zuehlke stated that the banks will continue to operate as separate units. They will be governed by their own directors and officers, whose policy will be to increase and amplify banking services to their respective areas. Affiliation with the holding company will enable each bank to furnish financial services usually not available in smaller communities.

Total assets of the corporation, which now has 16 banking offices, are in excess of \$160 million. Other members of Valley Bancorporation are: Appleton State Bank, The American Bank of Oshkosh, Bank of Black Creek, Northern State Bank, Reedsville State Bank, Seymour State Bank, Sherwood State Bank and American State Bank. Appleton State Bank has branches at Dale, Fremont, Hortonville and Shiocton and American State Bank has a branch in Greenville.

## Village Receives \$10,900 Addition To Sewage Grant

In a telephone call to the Statesman office on Wednesday, June 23, Congressman William A. Steiger's office announced that the Environmental Protection Agency has made a grant of \$10,900 to the Village of Kewaskum for continuation of the village's sewage treatment facility.

The grant is in addition to previously announced awards of \$485,000. To date 35% of the federal share has been received.

niture and storage cabinets, tele-  
phone extension and replacing of  
doors, which it was noted, needed  
replacing anyway. Only about  
\$800 of the remodeling costs will  
be lost. All equipment being added  
can be used after the Wayne

Included are \$1,000 for a ceiling,

## 8 Local Students Enrolled in UWWC Summer Session

Summer session enrollment is up 20% from 1970 at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

## Indians Win 4 Games But Lose Again to Slinger

Since our last issue two weeks ago, the Kewaskum Indians have been a busy baseball team, playing 5 Scenic Moraine Conference games and one outside the conference. They won 4 of the 5 conference contests and moved into first place but this week they lost for the second time to Slinger, the only team that has beaten them.

On June 17 the Indians handed Mayville their first loss, 9-4. Clark Eichstedt, in his first mound appearance, went the route scattering 9 hits and receiving good support. Kewaskum scored 6 runs in the first inning, on 4 walks and 3 errors, without getting a hit. Mayville's pitcher, Tony Persha, who has a no-hitter to his credit, was out of the box early. The Cardinals got 3 runs in the 4th, highlighted by Jeff Stieve's triple.

On Saturday night, June 19, the Indians hosted Campbellsport's Flyway Conference champions in a non-loop tilt and were edged, 3-2, in a tight duel. The Cougars, who competed in spring baseball, are continuing action in the Eastern Wisconsin loop this summer although their record does not count in the standings. They have won 4 straight without a defeat in that conference play. Cougar ace Jim Gantner held the Indians to 3 hits while striking out 15. Coach Neil Denniston started sophomore rookie Dale Luedtke against the strong Cougars and after early control problems he settled down to pitch shutout ball the last 4 innings. Campbellsport scored a run in each of the first 3 innings and the Indians tallied their 2 in the second.

On June 21 the Indians scored 5 runs in the first inning and went on to crush Germantown, 14-4. Three of the runs were scored on Bob Mertz's bases loaded double. The Indians scored in every inning but the 7th to hand Tom Theusch his 3rd straight victory. Theusch also got a single and triple and scored 3 runs. He struck out 7 Warhawks and allowed 8 hits. The win gave Kewaskum a 4-1 record and tie for first place with Mayville.

Last Thursday evening the Indians rallied for 4 runs in the 7th inning to defeat Grafton, 7-3, for a 5-1 record. This moved them into first place temporarily as Mayville and Pewaukee played to a 4-4 tie before rain stopped the game. Luedtke started but had control trouble again and was relieved by Eichstedt, who was hit freely. Theusch then took over, shut out

## Postal Service Announces Revisions In Rates for International Postage

Harry E. Koch, Postmaster of the Kewaskum Post Office, announced the following changes.

The U. S. Postal Service announced international postage rate revisions which will net \$20.6 million annually. The new rates, effective July 1, will help offset increased service costs since these rates were last revised in May 1967.

As part of the overall adjustment, airmail letter rates to many countries will be reduced.

International rates are set administratively by the Postal Service and are not subject to approval by the Postal Rate Commission. The new international rates do not affect first class and airmail letters to Canada and Mexico, which are the same as the U. S. domestic rates. Major provisions of the new international rates are:

1. Airmail letters to Central and South America, the Caribbean, Bahamas, Bermuda and St. Pierre and Miquelon go from 15c to 17c a half ounce.

2. Airmail letters to other countries will be 21c a half ounce. This flat 21c rate is a 1c increase over the present rate for airmail letters to Europe and North Africa, but 4c decrease for other countries, including most of Africa, Asia, Australia and the Pacific area, for which a 25c half ounce airmail letter rate has applied.

3. Rates on surface letters to all countries (except Canada and Mexico) go from 13c to 15c for the first ounce.

4. Rates on air parcel post to all countries except Canada and Mexico go up a flat 10 percent over present rate schedules.

5. Rates on surface parcel post to Canada, Mexico, Central America and the Caribbean go from the present \$1 to \$1.20 for the first two pounds, and from 30c to 35c for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

6. Rates on surface parcel post to other countries go from \$1.10 to \$1.30 for the first two pounds and from 35c to 40c for each additional pound or fraction of a pound.

7. Numerous changes in other rates will be made. These vary widely and should be checked with local post offices. Typically, they include a new rate of 8c for the first two ounces of printed matter, compared with the present 6c, and an increase from 13c to

15c each in the cost of international aerogrammes and airmail post cards used for countries other than Canada and Mexico.

The international rate changes do not affect mailings to servicemen overseas. Domestic U. S. rates apply to such mailings.

In implementing the international postage increases, the Postal Service pointed out that, since the last general increase in these rates in 1967, its salary costs have risen 36 percent.

It noted also that a new UPU "convention" which establishes the general framework, within which all member countries establish their international rates, became effective July 1, and the planned increases are within convention agreements.

The airmail and first class letter rates for Canada and Mexico from the U. S. went up May 16 to 11c and 8c an ounce, respectively, at the same time the domestic U. S. rates increased. Airmail cards to Canada and Mexico went up at the same time to 9c each and the first class cards rose to 6c each.

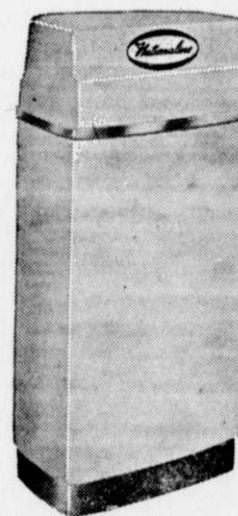
