Annual Firemen - Legion Picnic, Parade Here This Sunday, July 11

BIG PARADE AT 12:30 TO KICKOFF EVENT

All is in readiness for the annual Kewaskum Firemen and Legion Picnic to be held in the village park this Sunday, July 11. The big parade is in its final stages of preparation and all plans are complete to make this year's celebration another outstanding event.

The picnic will get underway with another excellent parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp Sunday which should prove to be the highlight of the event. The parade will feature the St. Matthias Cadets Drum & Bugle Corps of Milwaukee, comprising 90 members; the Chordaliers Drum & Bugle Corps of Milwaukee, totaling 60 members; 45-member West Bend Patriots Drum & Bugle Corps; Billy Mitchell Scottish Band of Milwaukee, including 4 girl dancers; Marseilles Drill Team (with color guard) of Horicon, consisting of 55 girls; Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club, composed of 20 to 30 members in uniforms of western styling; other bands, including the Kewaskum High School band, drum and bugle corps, drill teams, and musical organizations.

Hundreds of persons and numerous units will participate in the parade, which should continue for a good hour. The parade will form at the high school parking lot, athletic field and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at noon.

Other parade highlights will include orchestras, beautiful floats, baton twirlers and drill teams, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, American Legion posts, comic entries, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations, scouts, individuals, and many other surprises. Floats are especially invited and business men have been requested to enter them. Cash prizes will be awarded the best floats and children's entries and youngsters entering will be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps and band music in the park. From then on there will be continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening on the stage or in the beer garden by the popular Two Hits and a Miss and Syl's Polka Dots.

The beer garden is sure to be a popular place again this year. Tables and seats will be provided for your comfort, live music will be provided, beer maids will be at your service, and best of all there will be no admission to the beer garden.

The usual water fights will be held at 6:30 p. m. with several neighboring fire departments battling for honors and prize money.

Adding to the entertainment, there will be rides, concessions and refreshments, including delicious bratwurst and hamburgers. Eighty-seven valuable merchandise prizes will be given away in conjunction with the picnic. Everyone is invited to come to Kewaskum for a real good time at the annual picnic on July 11.

Barn on Seefeldt Farm Destroyed By Lightning

Fire destroyed a barn in the Town of Addison early Thursday morning, owned by Alfred H. Seefeldt of Kewaskum. Lightning during a severe thunderstorm was blamed as the cause of the blaze. The barn is located about 1½ miles south of Allenton and is leased by Milton Abel.

A brief storm struck this area shortly before 3 a. m. and was followed a short time later by a much more severe one which lasted longer and lit up the sky with lightning flashes all around, accompanied by loud thunder and high winds.

The fire at the Seefeldt farm was reported at 3:45 a. m. Firemen from Allenton, St. Lawrence and Slinger battled the blaze about five hours.

Two pieces of farm machinery, small tools, 5,000 bales of fresh hay and four heifers were lost. Seven heifers were removed from the barn. The herd of 44 cows was in a pasture.

The storm caused other minor damage in this area and was accompanied by hail in some places, rain and wind reaching gusts of 50 miles an hour. Some tree branches were blown down, including one on the Holy Trinity rectory lawn, smaller branches were downed, and debris was blown about.

5 Candidates Seek 2 School Board Posts

Five candidates have filed for two positions on the board of education of the Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 at the annual election Monday, July 26.

Two members will be elected to three-year terms on the day of the annual school district meeting. Polls will be open from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. Monday, July 5, was the last day for filing declarations of candidacy.

The five candidates whose names will appear on the ballot are Richard Hensiak, Earl Howell, Thomas Gundrum, David Mueller and Richard L. Edwards.

Edwards, who is currently school board president, is the only incumbent seeking re-election. Not seeking re-election is Mrs. Zona Miske of the Town of Wayne, who has served on the present board for five years.

Hensiak lives in the Village of Kewaskum and is employed by the Gehl Co. in West Bend. Howell of R. 1, Cascade, operates Crooked Lake Resort. Gundrum resides on R. 6, West Bend and is self-employed as a farmer. Mueller of R. 1, Allenton, operates a restaurant. Also a resident of the village, Edwards, is in the insurance business.

Local Students Earn Semester Honors at UWWC

Honor grades for the spring semester have been announced for 116 students from 24 communities at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

Seventy-eight full-time students, carrying 12 or more credits, have qualified for the Dean's List by earning grade point averages of 3.25 or better. Thirty-eight part-time students have also been commended by Dean Harry J. Maxwell.

Eleven of the full-time students earned highest honors for straight "A" (4.0) averages, 16 received high honors (3.75 - 3.99), and 51 were awarded honors (3.25 - 3.74). Thirty-five men and 43 women from 21 communities make up the Dean's List.

Part-time honor students included 12 men and 26 women from 12 communities with 29 earning 4.0 averages.

The honor students represent about 20% of the spring enrollment of 513.

Bade Selected to Attend Institute

AWARDED GRANT OF \$450 FOR ENVIRONMENT STUDY

Twenty-five Wisconsin high school science teachers are spending six weeks this summer learning how to measure pollution of the water, soil and air.

They are among 52 science teachers from 15 states awarded National Science Foundation grants of about \$450 each to attend an Environmental Assessment Institute conducted by the Wisconsin State Universities System.

They will study and do field work June 21 to July 31 at the WSU System's Chippewa Lake Field Station in Bayfield County, the former U.S. Job Corps camp seven miles north of Clam Lake.

Among the teachers selected from 352 applicants for the program are: Walter Bade, 233 Clinton St., Kewaskum High School teacher.

"The institute will help protect the quality of the environment by showing teachers how to use various devices to monitor, measure and evaluate air, water and soil quality," said Roy E. Heath, Madison, WSU System office staff member and chemist who is directing the institute.

"Major emphasis will be on small group instruction in the area, which includes about 25 small lakes in the Chequamegon National Forest."

Faculty members will be biologists Frederic Spangler, David Strohmeier and Leonard Tews and chemist Robert Arnott, all of WSU-Oshkosh, and Byron Shaw, of the WSU-Stevens Point natural resources department.

Special lecturers will include Senator Gaylord Nelson and Representatives Alvin O'Konski and David Obey.

The teachers will earn six graduate credits in Environmental Science.

Burglary at Elementary School Here

TAPE EQUIPMENT, CASH ARE TAKEN IN BREAK-IN

The Kewaskum Police Department this week was continuing to investigate a burglary at the Kewaskum Elementary School late last week in which close to \$1,500 worth of tape recording equipment and about \$15 in change was stolen.

The break-in occurred sometime between 5:30 p. m. Thursday and 6:45 a. m. Friday. The burglary was discovered by a janitor when he reported to work Friday morning and was reported to police by Richard Zurling, principal. Police Chief Don Hlavaty reported that the last check of the building, a manual check, was made at 2:15 a. m. Friday and all was secure at this time. Several later checks were made by a mounted patrol.

There was no sign of forced entry to the building. Entry was made through an open window on the east side or rear of the building with the possibility existing that entry could have been made through a door at the northeast corner of the building. There were several pry marks on the bottom of the door, none of which could have opened the door. Inside the building, entry was gained to two office rooms by breaking windows next to the doors, reaching through the hole in the glass and unlocking the doors. At least four more rooms were entered through unlocked doors although they were not broken into.

Taken were a Sony video tape recorder for colored TV, valued at \$1,250, from the principal's office which was locked; a Norelco cassette tape recorder, valued at \$47.50, from the upper left hand drawer of the principal's desk; a Wollensak tape recorder, valued at \$190, from a stand in room 108, and change from the principal's and secretary's desks amounting to about \$15.

Other small items may be missing but police were unable to determine what they were and their value until the individual teachers return to school and get their inventories.

Kindergarten is a mouse race, to prepare us for the rat race ahead.



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Change Names of Three Vocational Schools in District

With the approval of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, the names of the three District 10 schools at Beaver Dam, Fond du Lac and West Bend have been changed, effective July 1.

The name changes of the Moline Park Technical Institute, formerly known as the Fond du Lac Technical Institute; the Moline Park Career Center, formerly the Beaver Dam Vocational Technical School, and the Moline Park Career Center, which was known as the West Bend Vocational Technical School, was proposed by the District 10 Board to identify the separate facilities with the district and not with the communities in which they are located, as an extension of the district concept.

Signs at the individual schools and printed material which is distributed will be changed as soon as possible.



Theusch gave up 6 hits and struck out 6 batters. The only Laser to give him trouble was Barlotta, who connected for a home run and a triple in 4 trips. Eichstedt paced the winners with 3 for 4 to boost his batting average to an even .400. He also had 3 runs batted in. Jeff Koth was also 3 for 4.

In the important first place battle at Mayville Tuesday, it was not so much the Cardinals defeating Kewaskum as it was the Indians beating themselves. Only 2 of Mayville's 5 runs were earned. The loss dropped Kewaskum to 7-3, while the Cardinals are now 6-2 with a make-up game to play

Checks totaling \$6,853 are being sent from the state treasurer's office to tax districts located in General Telephone Company of Wisconsin's Kewaskum exchange.

The sum represents the exchange's portion of license fee taxes paid to the state by General Telephone on gross local and miscellaneous revenues earned in Kewaskum during 1970, according to Conrad R. Engsborg, division manager for the company.

Taxing districts in the nearby General Telephone exchanges will also receive checks for their share of license fee taxes.

Engsborg said license fee (gross revenue) taxes are paid each year by all telephone companies in Wisconsin in lieu of property taxes. General Telephone's gross revenue tax for 1970 totaled more than \$2.7 million.

State law requires 85 percent of taxes paid to the state on local and miscellaneous revenues be returned to the taxing districts in which they were earned, Engsborg explained. The balance of the taxes is retained by the state government.

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
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
