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School Board Explores Alternate Approach to Solve Building Needs

PLAN INCLUDES NEW 600 PUPIL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The Board of Education voted Monday night to explore an alternate approach to solve the building needs of the district as suggested by Supt. Floyd A. Brenholt.

He presented a detailed study of his ideas after which the board authorized him to get more firm plans and figures from the Schutte-Mochon architectural firm. These will be presented to board members and district electors and according to the architects, could be completed by the end of July.

The alternate plan would call for additions to the present high school and junior high-elementary buildings and the construction of a new 600-student capacity elementary school on the present high school site.

The present 9-12 grade high school would become a senior high school for grades 10-12; the present junior high-elementary would take grades 7, 8 and 9 and the proposed elementary school would house kindergarten through grade six. Additions to the Wayne and Farmington Schools would remain the same as in the original plan.

The proposed high school addition would include areas for auto mechanics, home economics, instrumental music and art. If the people wish, a swimming pool would also be added, according to his printed report.

Included in the addition to the junior high-elementary building would be a new gym, shop and music areas. The present gym there, which is inadequate for present needs, would become a library for the junior high. The new gym would be built south and east of the present junior high building, in the area of the portable classrooms.

The present senior high gym may some day become too small. The new gym at the junior high could be built large enough to handle up to 1,500 in seating so games could be played there.

Brenholt said he has discussed this alternate proposal with the architects and was given a figure of \$2,605,000 (which includes the gym) to be divided as follows: high school additions \$365,000; junior high additions \$530,000; Wayne addition \$210,000; Farmington addition \$200,000; Kewaskum Elementary \$1,300,000.

The elementary costs are based on an elementary school built recently at Kimberly. This school is somewhat larger than would be needed here and \$150,000 could possibly be cut from the cost and used toward remodeling costs and for science equipment.

Henry Weddig, Jr., a Kewaskum elector, cautioned "we must be sure that remodeling costs don't bring us back to the original figure."

When the original plan was brought to a referendum last April 6, it had a price tag of \$2,915,000. Rising building costs between then and the approaching Sept. 13 referendum date would bring that figure to \$3.

Parade of Homes Project Opened Here Saturday

6 HOUSES SHOWN; RIBBON CUTTING CEREMONY HELD

The combined efforts of six Milwaukee area builders and the Metropolitan Builders Association to show what can be done in the truly moderate priced home field was opened to the public Saturday in a new subdivision in the Village of Kewaskum.

The project was opened at 1 p. m. Saturday in Bel-Ric Acres, a 67 lot subdivision just west of Hwy. 45 and south of CTH H on the southern edge of Kewaskum. The models will be open through July 18. Hours are from 1 to 5 p. m. Saturdays and Sundays and from 6 to 8 p. m. weekdays.

A brief ribbon cutting ceremony was held to officially open the Parade of Homes Saturday. This was preceded by cocktails and a buffet lunch at the Wigwam starting at 11:30 a. m. sponsored by the association builders. About 50 persons were in attendance including member builders, village officials, members of the press, and their wives along with other guests.

House and lot package prices are just below the ceilings set to qualify for federal subsidy assistance — \$21,200 for three bedroom house and lot, \$24,200 for homes with four bedrooms. The program is designed for qualified families with an income range of from \$6,000 to about \$10,000.

Steven A. Woll is executive assistant for the builders' association and spoke at Saturday's ceremonies.

The project has received wide publicity in the Milwaukee papers and on TV Channel 6 news the past week.

Village Board Adopts New Building Code With More Stringent Rules

Members of the Village Board passed an ordinance adopting a new building code for Kewaskum when they met in regular session Monday night. The new code went into effect Tuesday.

In writing the code, which has been under study for about six months, a committee of village trustees patterned it closely after a model drawn up by the South-eastern Wisconsin Building Inspectors Association, with ideas gleaned from about 22 different communities in southeastern Wisconsin.

The code calls for more stringent rules, which it was felt are needed, and higher fees for building permits. Previously, the cost of a permit was a flat fee, with a maximum of \$5. Through increased permit fees, the village will be enabled to retrieve the cost of the salary paid to its part-time building inspector.

The cost of a permit under the new code will be based on the cubic foot area of the building to be erected. A separate plumber's application will be based on the number of openings and a separate electrical application on the number of outlets and fixtures.

The new building permit rates are: \$1.65 per 1,000 cubic feet, or fraction thereof, for a one or two family residence; \$1.80 per 1,000 cu. ft. for more than a two family unit or for multiple housing units; \$1.65 per 1,000 cu. ft. for private garage, accessories or breezeway; \$1.80 per cu. ft. for local business or institutions, and additions thereto; \$1 per cu. ft. for manufacturing and industrial, new or additions.

Any other not covered by the preceding categories or where cubic feet areas cannot be figured, such as siding, the permit will be issued on the basis of \$3 per \$1,000 value of repair.

including duct work will be \$5 per unit; central air conditioning \$10 per unit; permanent installation, wall or window air conditioning \$3 per unit. Moving buildings over public way is \$20 plus \$1.50 per cubic foot of principal building. Flammable liquid storage, as for gas service stations, will be \$5 per \$1,000 gallon capacity.

Failure to obtain a permit, prior to commencement of work, will result in a double fee charge. After the building is completed, the owner must get a certificate of occupancy from the village building inspector. That fee will be \$1 for a one or two-family residence and \$5 for any other.

In other matters, the board approved the plat of Bel-Ric Acres addition No. 3 which lies south of the present Bel-Ric additions currently being developed. In-

involved are 17 lots with widths varying from 73 to 80 feet.

A request from Schulz Realty, Inc., of West Bend to reduce five 100-foot lots owned by Mrs. Rose Miller, Kewaskum, in Bel-Ric Acres, into seven lots was denied on the basis that the board approved an original plat, then a re-plat. Being the third request, it was denied.

Building permits were approved for Jos. Schneider, R. 1, Random Lake, for a single family residence for re-sale in Country View Estates; one for John Hubbell, West Bend, single family residence on Hillside Drive; Steve Liegel, single family residence

on Hillside Drive and to Wilmer Ramthun to replace a silo.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty was authorized to attend the annual conference of the Wisconsin Police Chief's Association in Racine in August. An operator's license was approved for William Ruth, Jr., Kewaskum.

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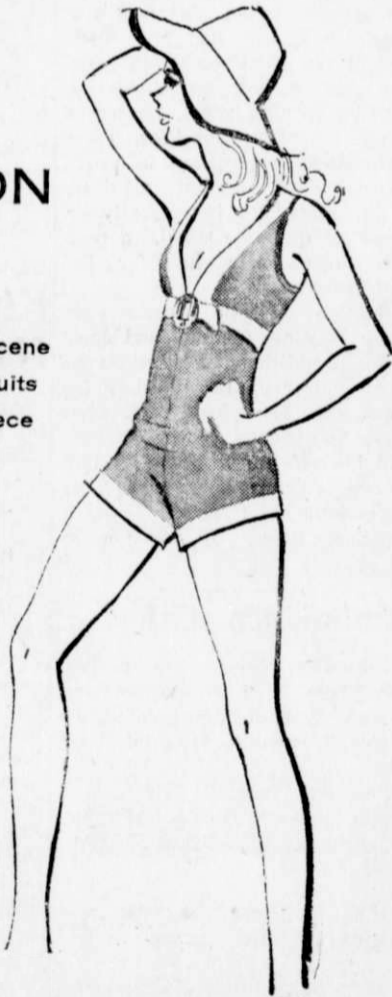

060,000.

Brenholt stated that the alternate plans at this point are general but total space needs and costs would appear to be realistic.

He noted that if the alternate plan is pursued, the primary loss at the senior high level will be a large-group instruction area which could double as a theatre. On the plus side, is the fact that an open-concept elementary school will be provided. In his report, Brenholt noted, "If we are to promote the concept of individualized instruction in our schools, the logical place to begin is at the elementary level."

There was considerable discussion that under the alternate plan, shop space would be "short-changed." But according to Brenholt, the industrial arts department would end up with 13,000 to 14,000 square feet which is what the study committee that worked on the original plan had recommended.

Board member Richard Theusch asked what will become of the two portable classrooms in Kewaskum and the one in Wayne. He followed with the suggestion that additions to Wayne and Farmington be dispensed with for the present; that the St. Michaels School be rented and the portable classrooms be shifted to Wayne and/or Farmington. He observed they are working out well where they are being used now.

Mrs. Zona Miske felt the portable classrooms are not working

out too well. The children, overheated from physical education at Wayne, had to return to their classroom, in all kinds of weather. She also felt the shift would be short-changing Wayne and Farmington students as they would not be given benefit of individualized instruction in open concept areas.

Theusch responded that he is concerned with the rising cost of taxes and that the building program could be postponed until more of the present indebtedness is paid off.

The board approved printing an advisory referendum to be taken of district electors at the July 26 annual meeting on whether or not the \$155,000 borrowed for a swimming pool should be returned to the lender.

Previously, the board went on record as being in favor, 5 to 1, of returning the money, with electorate approval. The question Monday night was how the referendum should be worded.

Supt. Brenholt suggested those voting in favor of retaining the pool money should also have a chance to vote whether they favor an outdoor pool or an indoor pool. He observed that there

might be some who would vote against an indoor pool but would favor an outdoor pool. Yet, if given only a "yes" or "no" choice, might vote "no."

Indoor or outdoor, the pool would be located on the school grounds and could at one time in the future, be enclosed, Brenholt pointed out. The pool would be paid for with the \$155,000 already borrowed plus the \$75,000 offered by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club.

Pointing to the fact that the board has already gone on record favoring the money's return with electorate approval, Henry Weddig, Jr., said such wording would be "throwing a curve" at the electors.

Board members concurred and approved a simple "yes" or "no" ballot. "Any mention of 'pool' won't help our building program," observed Allen Tessar. Richard Theusch again suggested "If enough people want a pool, let them petition the board." Mrs. Zona Miske clung to a previous viewpoint and said, "though the board has the power to return the money, for a matter of public relations, let the people turn it back."

In other matters, the board approved going ahead with plans to incorporate a junior high football program, also to mailing the annual report and budget summary to all district electors to give them a chance to study it before the annual meeting.

In recognition of June Dairy Month, three members of the Wayne Crusaders 4-H Club, Karen Williams, Shirley Schmidt and Joanne Garman and their leader Mrs. Arthur Terlinden served

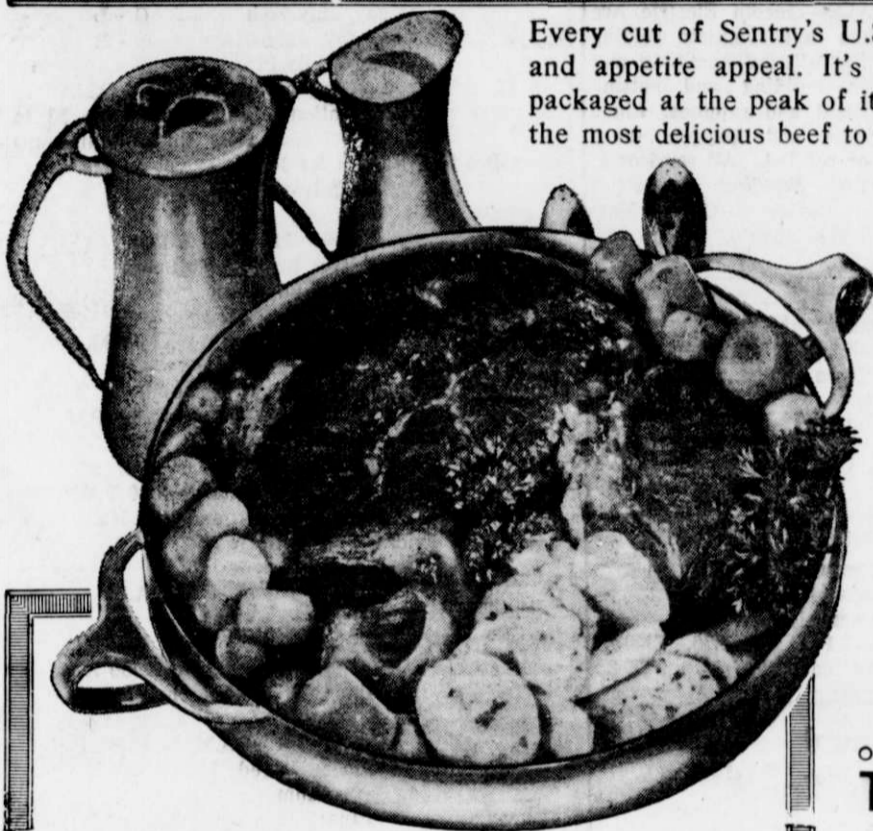

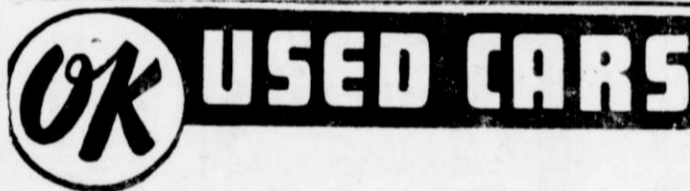

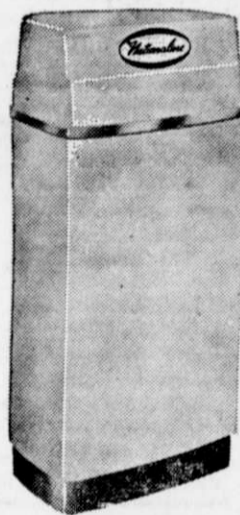
