Gundrum, Edwards Elected to School Board; Approve \$1.8 Million Budget

VOTERS ASK RETURN OF POOL MONEY; FAVOR ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS IN SPRING

In an advisory vote at the annual school election Monday, electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools District indicated they favor returning the \$155,000 borrowed for a swimming pool. The vote was 452 to 254 in favor of returning it. A total of 713 persons turned out for the 1 to 8 p. m. election.

Electors also approved a 1971-72 budget totaling \$1,832,906 calling for a tax levy of \$1,391,793 and a mill rate of \$21.34. The mill rate is subject to change depending on the amount of state aids which the state legislature will decide upon. The mill rate could drop to as low as \$19.44.

In a five-way race for two three-year terms on the school board, Thomas Gundrum of the Town of Farmington was elected and Richard L. Edwards of Kewaskum was re-elected. The vote was: Gundrum 370; Edwards 322; Richard Hensiak; 298; Earl Howell 220; and David W. Mueller. 147.

This was Gundrum's second try. He is self-employed as a farmer and resides on R. 6, West Bend. Edwards will begin his seventh year on the board. He is an insurance representative.

In an official referendum vote, electors favored electing school board members at the regular spring election rather than at the annual school meeting. The vote was 596 to 105.

During the annual meeting at 8 p. m., attended by 221 electors, Supt. Floyd Brenholt went step by step through an alternate building proposal that has a total cost figure of between \$2,605,000 and \$2,685,000. There were no comments from the audience.

There was also some discussion on dissatisfaction of shuttle bussing of some elementary children in the Beechwood-Farmington Schools. One elector asked how the 1971 census figures compare with those of 1970 and he was told the 1971 total is 3,438 compared with 3,331 last year.

Edwards was chosen temporary chairman of the annual meeting in a hand vote over Norbert Dettmann and Richard Theusch.

At the organizational meeting of the new board that followed, Edwards was re-elected director, John Jadro was re-elected clerk and Gerald Zimmel was elected treasurer. The next regular board meeting is Aug. 16.

2 Scouts, Leader To Attend Japan World Jamboree

Ten days at Mt. Fuji, plus a tour of Japan are in the offing for two Kewaskum Boy Scouts and a leader from here. Attending the 13th World Jamboree are Ralph Butz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Butz; Ronald Reigle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Reigle Sr., and E. Mike Gnacinski. Gnacinski will be the scoutmaster of Jamboree Troop 744. There will be 36 boys and three other adults in his troop.

There will be about 7,000 Scouts and adult leaders from the United States going to Japan. The local Scouts are part of Region Seven and will fly from O'Hare Field, Chicago, on July 31 to Alaska and on to Japan. They will return on Aug. 19. After the Jamboree the Scouts will visit Tokyo, Nikko, Kyoto, Nora, and take in many other sights.

The Jamboree theme is "For Understanding" and the slogan is "Brotherhood Is Understanding." The Scouts and leaders will visit Japan to advance the cause of world brotherhood and peace.

The Jamboree will be held at the foot of scenic Mount Fuji Aug. 2-10. Over 20,000 Scouts from 97 nations will assemble to carry out the Jamboree theme.

American Scouts and leaders will be shuttled to Japan in a massive airlift organized by Scout officials in cooperation with airline industry. Thirty-three planes have been chartered for the 20 day trip. This is the largest single international Scouting event ever conducted and it will be the first international Jamboree held in Asia.

The Jamboree campsite is an 800-acre area 120 miles west of Tokyo at the western base of snow capped Mount Fuji known as Asagiri Heights. American Scouts will live in a tent city and their next door neighbors could be Scouts from Austria, Canada, Great Britain, France, or any of the 97 member nations of the Boy Scout World Conference. Iron curtain countries are not represented.

At the Jamboree, the American contingent will participate in a variety of activities, designed to carry out the theme "For Understanding." They will be in a mammoth Jamboree parade in Tokyo, engage in skill and Scoutcraft.

MINNESOTA TEEN QUEEN ALSO MAKES APPEARANCE

The crowds of people present for the evening festivities at Krazy Daze here Tuesday were treated to two unscheduled, complete surprise added attractions which brought quite famous celebrities to Kewaskum.

Foremost of these was an unexpected impromptu concert by the Trinidad Tripoli Steel Band. This group of musicians just happened to be traveling through town by bus when they saw the large gathering of people around the intersection of Main St. and Fond du Lac Ave. They stopped their bus and entirely on their own asked if they could have permission to play their type of music for a half hour or so for the people. They received an OK from Willard Lynn to set up on the Glacier Inn parking lot and also from Syl's Polka Dots, who were playing there at the time.

They then proceeded to park their bus and unload their instruments and equipment from on top and inside the bus. Immediately people began gathering and by the time they were set up a large, inquisitive crowd had gathered around them. The steel band plays a completely different and unusual style of music never heard before in this area. They do not use musical instruments but use chiefly steel oil drums in various sizes with covers to get their "sound." PLAN \$60,000 WORTH OF IMPROVEMENTS; SUNBURST SKI AREA TO BE NEW NAME

A group of Milwaukee investors has purchased the Wunderberg Ski Area near Kewaskum and will operate it next winter under the new name of Sunburst Ski Area. They plan to make about \$60,000 worth of improvements before the season starts.

Improvements will include three new runs, including a "nursery slope," extension of an intermediate run, improving a trail that will be reserved for racing, addition of five new rope tows (the area now has two, plus a T-bar tow), installation of a small jump on one run to satisfy "mogul hoppers," remodeling and redecoration of the chalet.

Corporation President Bob Niss, who also is president of the Metropolitan Milwaukee Ski Council and director of the Blizzard Ski Clubs of southern Wisconsin, said the area would continue to be open to the public. Future plans include installation of two chairlifts and construction of another chalet, he said.

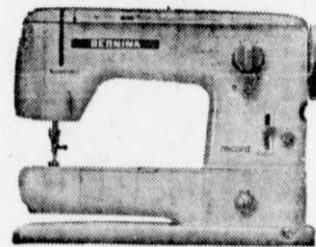

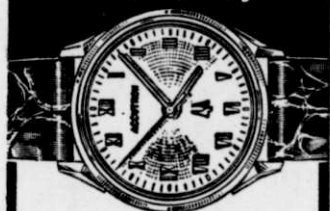

WARN CHILDREN ABOUT PLANTS THAT POISON

Plant	Toxic Part	Symptoms
Oleander, Narcissus, Daffodil	Bulbs	Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea. May be fatal.
Oleander	Leaves, Branches	Extremely poisonous. Affects the heart, produces severe digestive upset and has caused death.
Poinsettia	Leaves	Fatal. One leaf can kill a child.
Mistletoe	Berries	Fatal. Both children and adults have died from eating the berries.
Lily-of-the-valley	Leaves, Flowers	Irregular heart beat and pulse, usually accompanied by digestive upset and mental confusion.
Iris	Underground stems	Severe, but not usually serious, digestive upset.
Rhubarb	Leaf blade	Fatal. Large amounts of raw or cooked leaves can cause convulsions, coma, followed rapidly by death.
Wisteria	Seeds, Pods	Mild to severe digestive upset. Many children are poisoned by this plant.
Laurels, Rhododendron, Azaleas	All parts	Fatal. Produces nausea and vomiting, depression, difficult breathing, prostration and coma.
Jessamine	Berries	Fatal. Digestive disturbance and nervous symptoms.
Yew	Berries, Foliage	Fatal. Foliage more toxic than berries. Death is usually sudden without warning symptoms.
Oaks	Foliage, Acorns	Affects kidneys gradually. Symptoms appear only after several days or weeks. Takes a large amount for poisoning. Children should not be allowed to chew on acorns.

More than 700 species of plants are known to have caused death or illness.

Included in these 700 are some of nature's most delicate creations: the oleander bush, the lily-of-the-valley, and the rhododendron.

Each year an estimated 12,000 children ingest these plants and others like them. A Seattle study revealed that 10 percent of child poisoning cases observed were of youngsters who had eaten toxic plants, and that in six percent of these cases, the children's parents had no idea the plants were dangerous.

The leaves of the lovely oleander bush, an indoor plant, contain a deadly heart stimulant that, if eaten, could kill a child. Some people have died merely from eating steaks that had been speared on oleander twigs and roasted over an open fire.

Of greatest danger to children are the small attractive berries they find in their yards or in fields near their homes. The berries often look like wild fruit — a mouth-watering delight. Danger — their juice may be deadly.

In Ohio, one summer, a little girl prepared a play luncheon in the back yard. On a miniature plate she put an apple, a radish and some berries she had picked from a shrub growing in her mother's rock garden. Four hours later she lapsed into a coma and within seven hours after the luncheon she died.

An autopsy showed that the berries she had eaten were from the *Daphne mezereum* plant. It is cultivated in back

yards and also grows wild in thickets throughout the country. In early spring it has white or purple flowers that are followed by small red or yellow berries containing a corrosive poison that produces severe burns in the mouth and digestive tract. Only a few berries are enough to kill a child.

In Tacoma, Washington, a young girl, who was thought to have choked on a piece of candy, died suddenly. A careful study of the case revealed that the girl had eaten several berries from the poisonous nightshade bush growing near her home.

This vine-like plant, found throughout the country, stretches along the ground or grows upright to a height of about two feet. Its berries, which grow in clusters, are most toxic when unripe; when they ripen to a bright yellow, orange, and red, they become the least poisonous part of the plant.

Another berry found to be deadly only in its unripe form is that of the *Lantana camara* or red sage, which grows extensively in the South. A few years ago 17 children in Florida were treated for ingestion of this berry; four of them were hospitalized with severe poisoning and one girl died a short while after eating the berries.

Of nearly equal attraction to children are the various parts of fruit trees — the twigs of cherry trees that release cyanide when eaten, and the leaf of the peach tree which contains hydrocyanic acid, one of the five most dangerous poisons known. Five children

became ill after drinking "tea" brewed with hot water and peach leaves.

A garden that contains potatoes and tomatoes presents a further threat to the child. The foliage and vines of both plants contain alkaloid poisons that can, when swallowed, create nervous disorder and stomach upset.

Most dangerous of all plants in the vegetable garden is rhubarb. Its stalk, commonly used in baking and cooking, of course is not toxic, but the leaf blade, containing oxalic acid which crystallizes in the kidneys, causes severe damage if a number of leaves are eaten.

Castor bean seeds, found in any garden store for about 25 cents a packet, contain the powerful blood poison ricin that could kill a child. The beans are a mottled black and brown and resemble a beetle. Children often play with them, and jewelry manufacturers make necklaces from them. If they are chewed or swallowed, they become deadly.

It is essential that children and adults understand the dangers involved in eating plants they are unfamiliar with. Those growing in the classroom or around the home should be identified in every way before they are appreciated for something other than their natural beauty!

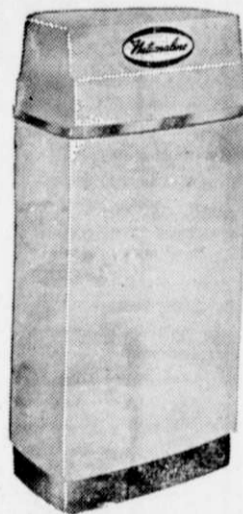
