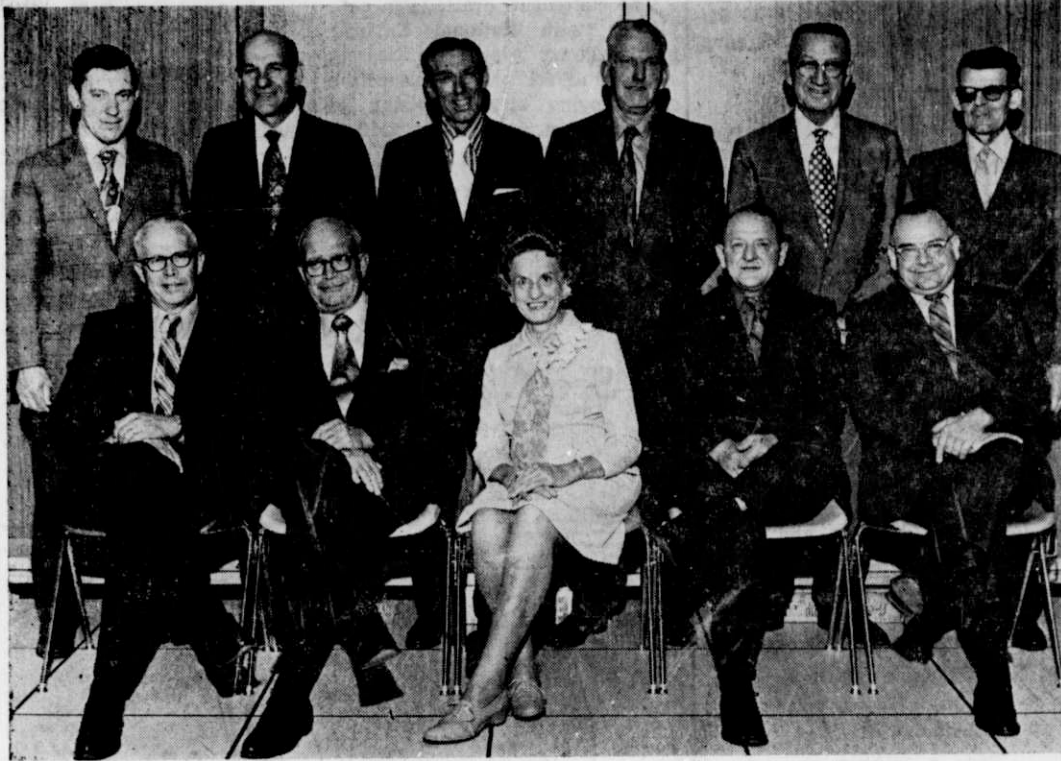

Second Annual Regal 25 Year Club Banquet Held



The second annual Regal 25 Year Club Banquet was held recently at the Glacier Inn in Kewaskum. The event was held in honor of Regal Ware, Inc. employees who have served the firm for twenty-five years or more.

The highlight of the evening was a tour of Regal Ware's new Administrative Center, which was recently completed. Twenty-five Year Club members were escorted through the four level structure by company officers, who served as tour guides for the group.

Other events of the night included a cocktail hour and dinner where members exchanged anecdotes and fond memories of events during the last twenty-five years.

Lightning Strikes Regal Ware, Inc. Etta Home, Causes Damage, Fire

During an early afternoon thunderstorm Tuesday, a bolt of lightning struck a rural home owned by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Etta about one mile north of Kewaskum. The house is located about one quarter of a mile east of the Ettas' residence on R. 1, and CTH "S."

The bolt which caused considerable damage to the house and set fire to the roof, struck about 2:30 p. m. In this village the sudden, very loud and weird sounding clap of thunder threw a scare into residents. The bolt, which is believed to have struck a TV antenna atop the roof, blasted a hole through the roof, ceiling and wall of the two-family brick and log house, and shattered upstairs windows. It then followed an eaves-trough along the roof and down the side of the house, knocking it loose and scorching the side of the building, ripped two electric meters from the building and hurled them 50 feet, and then was grounded.

Etta said the bolt ripped a four-foot hole in the roof, then cut a three-foot hole in the ceiling of an upstairs bedroom and knocked out a wall. Luckily no one was inside the house at the time or they might have been seriously injured or killed as the hole in the ceiling was directly over a bed which was splattered with the debris. The home is occupied by the Merlin Seefeldt and John Breaker families.

Seefeldt, standing outside, about 100 feet from the house was knocked to the ground. Etta, in the barn at his farm about a quarter mile away, said he felt the charge as it knocked out his electric fence. Looking out his barn door, Etta saw flames and smoke coming from the house, summoned Kewaskum firemen, and then rushed to it. He and Seefeldt were able to extinguish the blaze before firemen arrived. Etta said the lightning shook the building he was in and the car of Mrs. Etta, who was driving to Kewaskum at the time.

A television set owned by Seefeldt was charred and clothing in upstairs closets was strewn about and damaged. There was no monetary estimate of damages but Etta said insurance would cover the loss.

The storm, which was much more violent in other parts of the state, killed a 13-year-old girl in Kenosha by lightning, brought damaging winds and funnel clouds to most of the state, knocked down trees, branches and utility lines, caused power shortages, flooded streets and disrupted traffic in other areas. Winds gusted up to 92 miles an hour. Golf-size hail was reported west of Lake Geneva. The hot humid weather disappeared quickly when the cold front descended, bringing severe thunderstorms.

Besides the Etta fire, Kewaskum firemen also answered two grass fire calls Monday. The first one was at 10:30 a. m. when a patch of grass burned over along the C & N. W. railroad tracks, parallel to Hwy. 45 between Who's

Boy, 8, Killed By Car Driven By His Mother

An 8-year-old boy, Trent Ellis, was killed Saturday in an accident when his mother, Gail Ellis, 28, struck and killed him while he was riding his bicycle near his home.

The tragic accident occurred near the intersection of Town Hall and Hi Mount Roads, south of Kewaskum. Three other Ellis children were in the car with their mother.

The boy died of his injuries suffered from the collision. He had celebrated his eighth birthday just the day before the accident.

Surviving Trent are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ellis; his maternal grandfather and step-grandmother, Mr. and Mrs. George Guse of R. 5, West Bend; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Wanda Ellis, of Slinger; his maternal great-grandmother, Mrs. Helen Serwe, of Mayville; his paternal great-grandmother, Mrs. Hilda Hemmy, of Juneau; a brother Troy, and two sisters, Beckett and Britt, all at home.

Visitation was at the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend, after 6 p. m. Monday. Funeral services were held at the funeral home at 7:30 p. m. Monday and at 8 p. m. at Immaculate Conception Church, West Bend. The Rev. Thomas Orth officiated and burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Money was taken from one of the vending machines and another machine had been tampered with but the money was still there. The theft was discovered Sunday evening by a janitor when he came to work at 6 p. m. He reported it to local police.

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Southeastern Area Contributions to Heart Fund \$400,000

Residents of the Wisconsin Heart Association's Southeastern Area contributed nearly \$400,000 to the 1971 Heart Fund in the fiscal year ended June 30, Paul M. Haberland, Ph.D., 1971 state Heart Fund chairman, announced.

Contributions from the eight-county Southeastern Area totaled \$398,084. This amount accounted for 47.3% of Wisconsin Heart's \$341,410 state-wide campaign total. Wisconsin's 1971 Heart Fund totaled more than \$12,000 higher than last year's campaign.

\$12,700 Raised in Cancer Crusade; \$426 in Village

Sometime ago, officials of the Washington County Cancer Crusade announced a county goal of \$12,000 for their annual drive. This week, the chairman of the effort, Robert S. Barber, indicated that the goal had been reached and surpassed with the collection of \$12,720.

The head of West Bend Mutual, Barber was especially grateful to the handworking efforts of many volunteer workers as well as the generosity of many more kind Washington County residents. He expressed hope that the money collected would work to accomplish this year's slogan of "wiping out cancer during your lifetime."

Barber noted that special gifts accounted for a large portion of the funds collected with Thomas J. Kenny in charge of West Bend area donations and Hartford Mayor Thomas Buckley heading up similar work in that section. Kenny reported \$2,165 when the drive was nearing completion, and Mayor Buckley accounted for \$365. The cities of West Bend and Hartford also were responsible for a high percentage of total money contributed to the Cancer Crusade, with other contributions received from residents of Kewaskum, Slinger, the Town of Farmington, Germantown, Jackson, and Newburg.

It was also pointed out that memorials can continually be directed towards the Cancer Crusade simply by mailing them to Box 491, West Bend, Wis. (53095). Mrs. Rosemary Neese is in charge of this aspect of the drive on a year-round basis and was responsible for reporting one of the larger totals in this category.

In Kewaskum, the chairman of the local drive, Mrs. Robert Schlamer, together with many other hard-working individuals, were able to accumulate \$426.75 for the future work to eliminate cancer as the killer that it is.

Mrs. Ruth Ramel — pointed out Barber — was just about totally responsible for conducting one of the few Crusade drives in the rural area. Mrs. Ramel canvassed the Town of Farmington, and through her efforts was able to collect

\$305.90 from residents in that township.

In expressing his gratitude, the Washington County Cancer Crusade chairman also conveyed his thanks to the following individuals: Robert Gordon (President), Jack Killen (1st Vice-President), Lem Rosenheimer (2nd Vice-President), Michael Goring Jr. (Treasurer), and Mrs. Phyllis Ermer (assistant to the Crusade Chairman).

Income Gain Is Reported by Valley Bancorporation

Valley Bancorporation reported first half consolidated income before securities transactions of \$617,368 or \$1.07 per share compared to \$1.04 per share for the same 1970 period. The announcement was made by Gus A. Zuehlke, president of the registered bank holding company.

Consolidated net income per share was up 19.8% for the six months ending June 30. Such income totalled \$727,909 or \$1.27 per share compared to \$1.06 per share in 1970.

June 30 consolidated deposits were \$147 million, up 13.5% over last year, and loans were \$98 million, up 13.7% from 1970.

The figures for 1970 have been adjusted to reflect the acquisitions of the Bank of Kewaskum, Badger State Bank of Denmark and Farmers and Merchants Bank, Weyauwega, on a pooling of interests basis.

The Valley Bancorporation

group now consists of 11 banks and 5 branches with total assets over \$165 million.

If any provision of this ordinance are invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or

application.

SECTION IV. This Ordinance is adopted in accordance with Section 66.035 of the Wisconsin Statutes and is in full force and effect after its passage and does not require publication.

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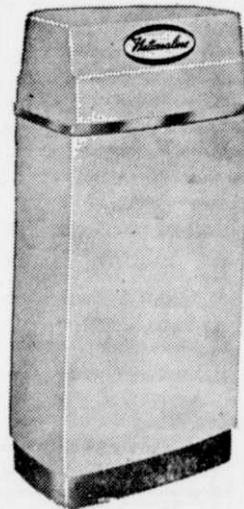
