State Forest Fire East of Village Sunday Destroys 25 Acres of Trees

TWO DEPARTMENTS FIGHT BLAZE; TWO FIREMEN HURT Lions Set Dates

Moraine State Forest near Kewaskum Sunday, approximately 25 acres of trees and grassland were destroyed. The fire started in the forest about 11/2 miles east of the village and about a mile north of Hwy. 28 in the area that was for-Fellenz some years ago.

Kewaskum and Boltonville firefought the blaze, which men spread in a northeasterly direction. The fire alarm was turned in by Kewaskum police who were alerted by a passerby. The first alartm came at 12:05 p.m. and when more help was needed a second alarm went out shortly after.

Twenty-two men from the Kewaskum Fire Department were on the scene. A wind shift and the threat that the blaze might get out of control in the densely wooded area prompted Chief Armin Oppermann to call for help from the Boltonville Department. They responded with 15 men and additional fire fighting equip- Christmas. ment. The Wisconsin State Con servation Department was also called in and responded with some of their men to help fight the fire. Many local volunteer citizens also responded to the second call and helped fight the blaze.

The men battled the fire for over an hour and a half before getting it under control. Their efforts were hampered by the hilly terrain and thick growth. Heavy smoke from the fire could be seen for miles around. Two Kewas kum firemen were overcome by the smoke and were given oxygen on the scene. They were Wally Giese and Harry Schladweiler.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.
