## State Forest Fire East of Village Sunday Destroys 25 Acres of Trees

TWO DEPARTMENTS FIGHT BLAZE; TWO FIREMEN HURT

In a raging fire in the Kettle Moraine State Forest near Kewaskum Sunday, approximately 25 acres of trees and grassland were destroyed. The fire started in the forest about 1½ miles east of the village and about a mile north of Hwy. 28 in the area that was formerly owned and farmed by Philip Fellenz some years ago.

Kewaskum and Boltonville firemen fought the blaze, which spread in a northeasterly direction. The fire alarm was turned in by Kewaskum police who were alerted by a passerby. The first alarm came at 12:05 p. m. and when more help was needed a second alarm went out shortly after.

Twenty-two men from the Kewaskum Fire Department were on the scene. A wind shift and the threat that the blaze might get out of control in the densely wooded area prompted Chief Armin Oppermann to call for help from the Boltonville Department. They responded with 15 men and additional fire fighting equipment. The Wisconsin State Conservation Department was also called in and responded with some of their men to help fight the fire. Many local volunteer citizens also responded to the second call and helped fight the blaze.

The men battled the fire for over an hour and a half before getting it under control. Their efforts were hampered by the hilly terrain and thick growth. Heavy smoke from the fire could be seen for miles around. Two Kewaskum firemen were overcome by the smoke and were given oxygen on the scene. They were Wally Giese and Harry Schladweiler.

Chief Oppermann suspects the fire may have been caused by a careless smoker who failed to put out a cigarette as no evidence was found of a camp fire. He reported police have a lead and were investigating this week. Chief Oppermann also wishes to thank the many volunteer citizens who aided in extinguishing the fire.

Kewaskum firemen had a busy month in August. In addition to the state forest fire, recent Tackes barn fire and Etta home call, they responded to several grass fires. Just about a year ago Sunday over 100 acres of forest were destroyed by fire in the Dundee area and local firemen also helped fight this blaze.

Schools in the Kewaskum Community Schools district opened Monday with an enrollment of 1,979 students, an increase of 3.3 per cent over last year when opening day enrollment was 1,914. The figures were given by Supt. Flicyd A. Brenholt to the members of the board of education when they met Monday night.

There are 1,286 students in kindergarten through grade eight and 693 in high school including 187 freshmen, 187 sophomores, 164 juniors and 155 seniors. Elementary enrollment by schools is Wayne 171; Kewaskum 729; Farmington 232 and Beechwood 154.

Total enrollment by grades is 168, kindergarten; 123, grade one; 155, grade two; 145, grade three; 144, grade four; 151, grade five; 128, grade six; 133, grade seven and 119, grade eight.

The board voted not to go into a junior high football program this year with the recommendation that it be explored for a possible addition to the 1972-73 school year. Brenholt reported "that we have no idea at this time what teams we might be able to compete with, if any. If we are to make the expenditure for junior high football, I feel we should have some teams lined up that we can play."

He also stated there is a question of finding a qualified coach willing to take on this assignment and there is a shortage of locker rooms and storage and drying space at the junior high building.

The board approved a resolution to officially certify the election officials who will serve at the special referendum on Sept. 13. Approved were Henry Weddig, William Bruhn and Mrs. Leonard Peter, inspectors; Mrs. Donald Mlodzik and Mrs. Willard Probst, ballot clerks; and Mrs. Merlin Degnitz and Mrs. Nerman Held, election clerks.

Also approved was hiring of Mrs. Bernice Stange as custodian at the high school. She will work four hours per day and will replace a student who has graduated.

### Firemen Complete Training Course

Twenty-six members of the Kewaskum Fire Department completed the standard firemanship course of the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, according to Chief Armin Oppermann. The members completed the course in the latest firefighting techniques.

Lt. Brian Mayer of the West Bend Fire Department was the instructor for the 30-hour ten lesson course. The firemen were given instruction and practice with their own equipment.

Gordon Christianson, supervisor of Fire Service Training for the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, said, "The firemen of Kewaskum are to be congratulated for completion of our standard firemanship course. Firefighting is becoming a technical field that demands constant training to keep up with the latest development."

**INFORMATION TO ELECTORS**

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

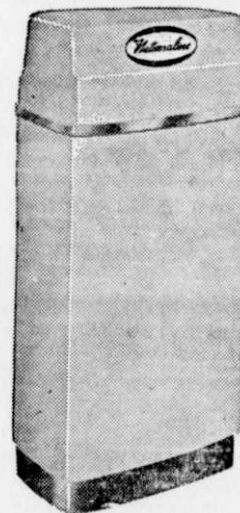
