School District Electors to Vote On Building Referendum Monday

Electors of the Kewaskum Community School District will have another opportunity on Monday, Sept. 13, to vote on a proposal for school building additions in the district. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. in the cafeteria of the high school.

The proposal being presented for approval will cost \$2,605,000. This compares with \$2,915,000 in the April referendum and, because of increasing building costs, with \$3,060,000 for the same building program which was presented in April.

A change from primarily high school construction to primarily elementary construction is the major reason for the drop in cost. The present proposal would include additions at Wayne and Farmington, the same additions that were proposed in April. The present elementary-junior high in Kewaskum would become a 7-9 junior high. A gym, library or music area, and a shop would be added to this site.

The present 9-12 high school would then become 10-12, with the addition of art, home economics, auto shop and a large group instruction area. A new Kewaskum Elementary School would be built to take care of grades K-6 in the Kewaskum area itself. This building would be placed on a portion of the present high school site.

With growth of 3% to 5% a year, the proposed plan would provide sufficient building space to about 1980. It is so designed that a number of options would be open to the district in deciding what direction it wished to take when building capacities were once again reached.

There is no pool included in the proposal. The money which had been borrowed for pool purposes will be returned on the anniversary date of the loan, Sept. 29.

The new elementary building in Kewaskum, which is the major part of the new proposal, probably will be constructed on a portion of the high school site. With 52 acres at this location, there is sufficient room to construct the new building on the high school site.

Presently, preliminary plans would call for an open-concept school. This means that it is constructed with a minimum of interior walls. Moveable furniture is used to create and change interior arrangements as required for different teaching situations.

Locating the building on the high school site but far enough from the high school building to assure separateness, will help both the elementary and junior high. Having grades K-8 on a small seven acre site, much of which is used for high school athletics, has caused serious playground shortages. Moving K-6 to a new location will provide immediate relief. It is hoped that in the future, high school athletic fields can be moved to the high school site to further improve junior high school facilities.

Hearing Tests To Be Held at County Schools

Of course your child is full of bright sayings, and mighty cute to boot. . . But you're expecting the improbable when you wait for him to tell you he has trouble hearing. Statistics show that among hearing handicapped children, only one out of four complains. Whatever a child is accustomed to hearing sounds all right to him. Indistinct and blurred sounds may have always seemed that way, and he wouldn't know the difference.

The Washington County Public Health Nursing Service does not wait for complaints, but audio screens all children in grades 1-3-6 throughout the county each year during September. Help now could mean a richer, better life.

All children who do not pass the simple screening procedure will be invited to attend a hearing clinic in late October. This clinic is sponsored by the Bureau for Handicapped Children who has a fully equipped bus for this purpose. A specialist is provided who will see each child individually and determine what treatment, if any, is needed.

Four Injured in Two Accidents, One Seriously

A rural Campbellsport couple was injured early Sunday when their car rammed head-on into a concrete bridge abutment on Hwy. 144 a mile west of Silver Creek. The mishap occurred at 1:40 a. m.

Andrew W. Pesch, 30, of R. 2, Campbellsport, the driver of the car, and his wife, Dianne, 31, were taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by Wilk ambulance of Random Lake.

Mrs. Pesch, in serious condition, received a fractured jaw, head injury and facial lacerations. Pesch sustained a cut upper lip and complained of chest pains.

Real Estate Sales Over \$3,000,000 for August in County

Robert J. Klein, county treasurer, reported this week that transfer fees on real estate deeds recorded by Olga Perrin, register of deeds, hit an all time high of \$3,871.07 for the month of August 1971.

These fees represent a tax of \$1.00 per thousand on real estate deeds recorded in the county.

One half or \$1,935.53 of this tax is retained by the county and the other one half is sent to the state monthly by Klein.

These taxes represent real estate transactions of \$3,871,000.00 for the month and do not include over \$100,000 in land contract sales which are not taxable, Klein stated.

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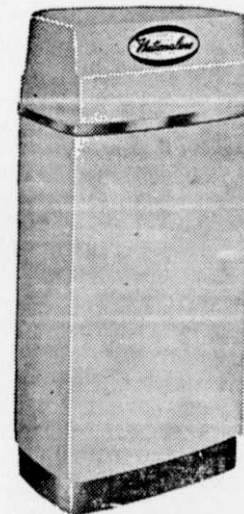

| One 12-oz. pkg. (2 cups) Flako Corn Muffin Mix | ¼ teaspoon salt |
| 1 egg | 1 cup milk |
| ½ cup milk | 2 tablespoons prepared mustard |
| 1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese | 16 thin cooked ham slices |
| ¼ cup onion, chopped | Melted butter or margarine |

Mustard Sauce:

¼ cup butter or margarine

Heat oven to hot (400°F.). For corn bread, empty contents of muffin package into bowl. Add egg, milk, cheese and onion. Blend only until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened. Pour batter into greased 8-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated oven (400°F.) 20 to 25 minutes.

While corn bread is baking prepare sauce. Melt butter in saucepan over low heat. Blend in flour and salt. Quickly add milk, stirring constantly. Cook until mixture thickens and bubbles, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in mustard.

To assemble sandwiches, cut corn bread into 8 pieces. Split each piece horizontally to make 3 layers; place a ham slice between each layer. Brush tops with melted butter. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in preheated oven (400°F.) about 5 minutes. Top with mustard sauce.

Shall the following initial resolution be approved?

RESOLVED that The Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington County, Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac County, and Towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, borrow an amount not to exceed \$2,605,000 by issuing its general obligation coupon bonds for the purpose of building and equipping additions to the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools, and The Kewaskum Community High School, and the Kewaskum Junior High School, and to build and equip a new Kewaskum Elementary School in said School District.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The electors will have an opportunity to vote either "Yes" or "No". A "Yes" vote will indicate the elector's approval of the resolution, and a "No" vote will indicate the elector's rejection of such borrowing for such purpose.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

Steiger, Dyke to Head Roster at GOP Brat Fry

Congressman Bill Steiger and Madison Mayor William Dyke will head the roster of special guests scheduled to attend the Republican Brat Fry on Saturday, Sept. 18, according to Dr. David Hoffman, co-chairman of the event. The Brat Fry is an annual affair sponsored by the Washington County Republican Organization and will be held this year at the Daalda Arabian Horse Farm, N120 W21671 Freistadt Road, Germantown.

"We are very pleased that both Congressman Steiger and Mayor Dyke will be with us on the 18th," reported Hoffman. "Because we will have a very short program, everyone should have an opportunity to personally visit with the congressman and one of Wisconsin's leading mayors. We want to stress that this is a picnic and that our special guests, including many of Wisconsin's Republican party and legislative leaders, will be mingling with the crowd so that everyone can meet them and express their concerns to them," Hoffman pointed out.

Dyke, who served as executive assistant to former Lt. Governor Jack Olson, was elected Mayor of

Madison in April of 1969 and re-elected in 1971. Presently, Dyke is chairman of the National League of Cities Committee on Intergovernmental Relations, is vice president of the Alliance of Wisconsin Cities and a member of the League of Municipalities Committee on Local Government Taxation.

This past week, Mayor Dyke urged the establishment of a \$26 million emergency fund to aid "financially starved cities" while the legislature tries to work out a new tax redistribution formula. His interim measure proposes that the present tax sharing system be continued through the 1971-'73 biennium, and that the emergency fund be distributed on the basis of a formula taking into account population, per capita expenditures, population density, unemployment index, and welfare roles.

Congressman Steiger is expected to report on the status of the wage-price freeze and the latest developments regarding the implementation of additional economic policies following the initial 90 days. Steiger, who has been a key

man in the adoption and implementation of manpower training and safety legislation, could very well not be Washington County's congressman following reapportionment. All redistricting plans submitted thus far, including one authored by Steiger, place Washington County in the new 9th congressional district.

The Brat Fry will begin at 4:30 p. m. and will be held indoors at the same location in case of inclement weather. Tickets are available from members of the local GOP's executive committee or at the door.

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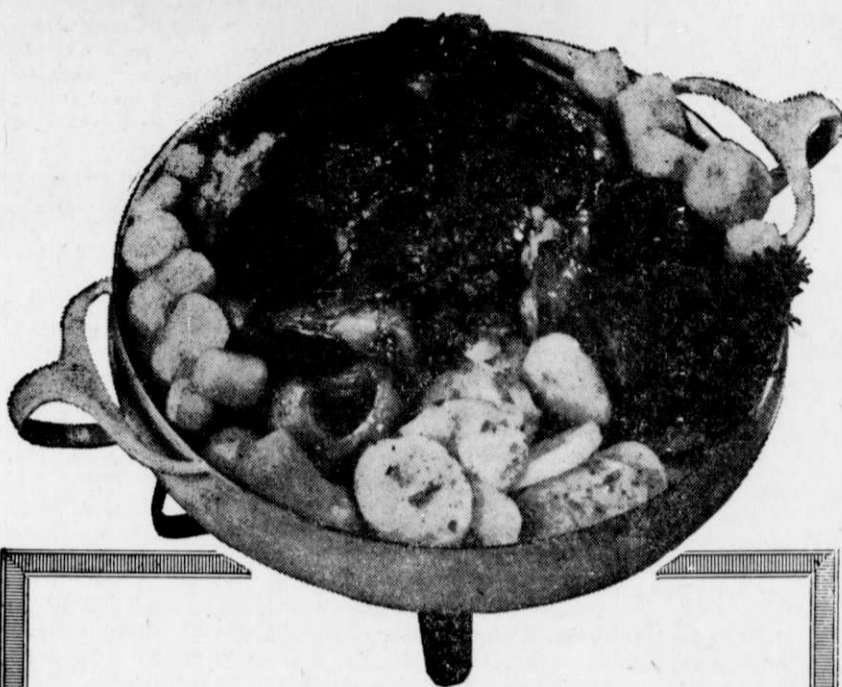

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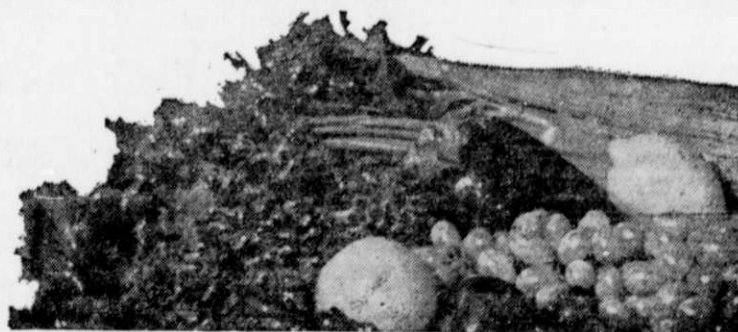

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Indians Run Over Campbellsport Cougars in Football Opener, 48-13

The Kewaskum Indians romped to a lopsided win over the Campbellsport Cougars of the Flyway Conference in their non-conference opener here Friday night, 48-13. The Indians made an impressive showing in the rout.

Kewaskum literally did run over the Cougars, amassing a total of 302 yards rushing, almost three times as many as Campbellsport's 106. The Indians also outgained the Cougars by far, 179 yards to 95, giving them a huge total of 481 yards for the night, well over double their opponents' output.

While the defense was holding Campbellsport scoreless in the first half, the Indians' advantage in the offensive line helped them run up a 21-0 lead. Kewaskum continued to roll in the second half, scoring in every quarter, and topping off their victory with 20 points in the final period.

The Indians, who finished second in the Scenic Moraine last year with a 6-1 mark, started off the game with Campbellsport much like last year—with an Eichstedt taking a pass for the first touchdown. Only last year it was Clark and this time it was Glen, who hauled in a 28-yard pass from quarterback Dale Luedtke. The 14 points in the second quarter were scored on a drive and 4-yard plunge by tailback Jim Gaffke, followed by another Luedtke to Eichstedt pass on a 41-yard play. The conversion after the first TD failed but the second was good on a 2-point pass.

In the second half Luedtke also showed some running ability, going 56 yards on the ground for another score. Tom Theusch kicked the extra point, making it 28-0. Campbellsport finally scored in the 3rd quarter. Quarterback Dennis Pieper, starting his third season as the No. 1 Cougar quarterback, hit Rich Leider on a 55-yard aerial to the 15. A quarterback sneak by Pieper followed for the score. The extra point was good. The Cougars scored their 2nd and last touchdown on another Pieper to Leider pass, this one for 12 yards in the coffin corner. Late in the last period with the Indians far ahead and reserves in the game. The extra point try failed.

But the last quarter was mainly all Kewaskum's as they scored 20 points. Gaffke took over at quarterback and he and Luedtke, both juniors, gave the Cougars fits. Gaffke went to work, passing to Dale Schacht for 16 yards and a TD. The Indians racked up two more touchdowns on Gaffke's one-yard plunge and an 86 yard run with a minute left to play. Gaffke had his biggest night on the ground, rushing for 163 yards in 17 carries, including 3 touchdown runs. Besides scoring on a 46-yard run, Luedtke passed twice to Eichstedt for TD's and completed 4 of 7 passes.

The Indians have an open date in the schedule this weekend. Their next game will be on Satur-

day, Sept. 18, when they open conference action at Germantown Washington in a 1:30 o'clock afternoon contest.

Defending champion Mayville, the only team to beat Kewaskum last season, also won impressively Friday over Horicon, unbeaten champion of the Flyway conference last year.

Eichstedt Signs Athletic Tender For St. Norbert's

CONTACTED BY MANY STATE UNIVERSITIES

Clark Eichstedt, recognized as one of the finest all-around athletes turned out of Kewaskum High School and the Scenic Moraine Conference in many years, recently signed an athletic tender for St. Norbert's College at West DePere, Wis. and has left to begin his studies at that school.

Eichstedt, who stood out in four sports, had been contacted by many state universities and private schools before selecting the Green Knights of St. Norbert's. His scholarship, which is for one year, is renewable. Clark plans to study business and concentrate on basketball and golf, in which sports he excelled. St. Norbert's has come up with some good athletic teams in recent years.

Eichstedt, a slim 6-3 and 165 lbs., earned 12 varsity letters in his four-year high school career. Clark made the varsity golf team as a freshman and was on the Kewaskum Indians' first golf championship squad that year. He earned 4 letters in golf, 3 in basketball, 3 in baseball and 2 in football. No athlete out of Kewaskum High School has ever surpassed that total.

In basketball, among his many accomplishments, he was an unanimous all-conference selection the past season after leading the strong Scenic Moraine in rebounding and finishing second in scoring. He averaged 14 rebounds and 20 points per game. He made the second all-conference team in his sophomore and junior years. Clark also received honorable mention on the 1971 all-state basketball squad. He finished his school career with a total of 850 points, just 3 short of the school record. No doubt he would easily have broken the record were it not for the fact that he missed five games in his junior year due to an injury. This year, after Kewaskum had won the district tournament at Mayville, an injury also hurt his tournament play and cost the Indians a shot at the Regional title against Waupun at Beaver Dam.

In golf competition, Eichstedt averaged 39.8 strokes in his sophomore year, 41.0 strokes as a junior and 39.9 strokes as a senior. He was conference medalist in his sophomore year (78) and also was awarded a regional medal (75) this past spring. He led the

Indian team to the sectional in golf and this tournament produced the eventual state champion—Fond du Lac.

This was not all. Clark added an all-conference medal for his baseball play this summer. He batted .325 and the highlight of his baseball career was his 2 home runs against Mayville to win the Regional tournament for Kewaskum.

Clark's coaches in high school praised him as a competitive player, who was easy to coach, a hard worker, and a team leader who possessed much natural talent.

The senior championship was won by Al Hemauer of West Bend and the senior veterans title was won by Ray Smith, also of West Bend.

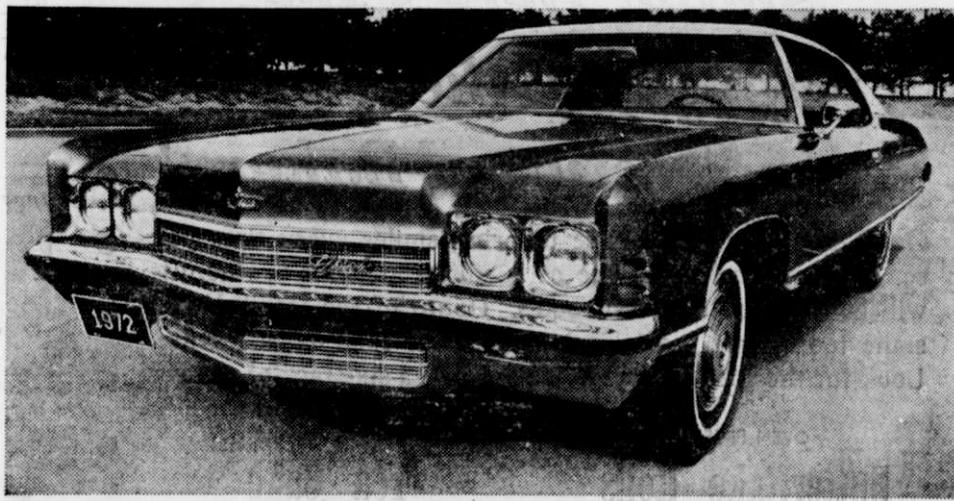
Rick Russart, West Bend, downed Jeff Koth, Kewaskum, 3-2, for the junior championship. Koth held a lead but faltered on the final nine.
