New Fane Fieldstone Church 100 Years Old, Observes Centennial

St. John Lutheran Church of New Fane, located in an enchanting valley of the Kettle Moraine State Park, observed the centennial of its house of worship last Sunday. Over 350 people were present for the Holy Eucharist celebrating the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the church in which the congregation still worships. The congregation was founded in 1860 and worshiped in their log cabin school until the present fieldstone church was built by the early settlers in 1871. It is an example of Celtic Gothic architecture common in areas of Ireland and Scotland whose topography is similar to the Kettle Moraine.

The Service of Thanksgiving began with a joyful and brilliant organ prelude with trumpet intrada based on the hymn tune "Now Thank We All Our God," which was also the processional hymn sung by the congregation. The trumpeters, Jeanne Burmeister and Alan Floeter, were under the direction of Mr. Harland Nonhof, band director at Campbellsport High School. The organist was Mrs. Arthur Haupt. Leading the procession was the cross bearer, James Herriges, followed by Larry Lendved, book bearer and acolyte, the Rev. Carl Gutekunst, guest preacher, and the Rev. Arthur Haupt, celebrant and parish pastor.

The carrying of the Holy Scriptures into the building was to recall that 100 years ago God entered this house with His Word when it was consecrated as His house on that first dedication day in 1871. One hundred years ago a German Bible was carried into the church along with the sacramental vessels of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. This time the Sacred Scriptures carried in procession was a copy of The New English Bible indicating the need of God's Word in contemporary English for modern man. This action and the words of the Prayer for the day summarizes the theme of the celebration: "Almighty God, to whose glory we celebrate the dedication of this house of prayer: We thank you that 100 years ago you entered this house with your Word. We give you thanks for the fellowship of those who have used it; and we pray that all who seek you here may continue to find you as you come to us with your Word and Sacraments, so that by your grace we sinners receiving your forgiveness, may be filled with your joy and peace, and saved eternally so that while we live in this world, we may bear witness to your Word and love and serve mankind; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

Pastor Carl Gutekunst, son of a former pastor who served the congregation for 33 years preached on the text from Psalm 26, "Lord, I have loved the habitation of Thy house; and the place where Thine honor dwelleth." He cited the fact that the early forefathers did not just build for themselves but also for us. He also said that even though the church's tower was once struck by lightning, by the

11 More Building Permits Issued For New Homes

Issuing of 11 building permits for new homes was the major item at the regular meeting of the Village Board Monday night. This brings the total permits for new home construction so far this year to 25, an all-time high for one year.

Applications of Embassy Construction Co. and Radke Homes, both of Milwaukee for two homes each were denied on the basis that both firms owe a considerable amount of money to the village for sewer and water assessments on the lots in Bel-Ric Acres.

The board decreed the permits will be issued only after assessments are paid.

An application of Mrs. Joanne Bohn of Saukville for a liquor store license was tabled pending a conference with her. The liquor store would be located in the former A. G. Koch store.

The board authorized advertising for bids on a sewer rodder after Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann reported on the rental costs being paid. He said that in 1970 and 1971, the village paid out \$1,870 in rental fees.

The board voted to present a gift of appreciation to Mrs. Carl Schaefer, who recently resigned from the library board after having served almost 30 years.

Tabled was the offer from Harold Mueller Excavating Co. of Campbellsport to compact and cover the village dump twice monthly at \$110 per month.

Police Chief Don Hlavaty appealed for more help to give more complete police protection. Village President Cyril Wietor responded with "some board members think we need it, others do not. Why don't you make up a schedule and present it to us?"

Safe Is Stolen From Area Home

The theft of a safe from the Marvin Tackes farm residence, R. 2, Kewaskum, located about 1½ miles east of the village, sometime Monday was being investigated this week by the Washington County Sheriffs Department.

Chief Deputy Allen Becker of the sheriff's department said the thieves apparently rolled the safe from the residence and carried it off in a vehicle. The theft occurred sometime Monday between 9 a. m. and 3:30 p. m. while the family was away from home.

The safe contained an undetermined amount of money. The Tackes home is located on North Mill Road about one-half mile north of Hwy. 28.

This was the second loss on the Tackes farm in less than a month. On Aug. 19 a barn and all its contents, including hay, straw, grain some farm machinery and a pile of lumber, were destroyed by fire shortly after the noon hour. An adjoining milkhouse, nearby shed and small grain storage shed were also lost in the blaze.

Trout fishing contests are another attraction. They offer fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps the fish he catches.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. An archery target range and marksmanship contests have been added. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

year segments comparable to our high school. Following graduation, Miss Hast would like to attend a business school.

In a light vote Monday, voters of the Kewaskum Community Schools district defeated a \$2,605,000 bond issue for a building expansion program. The vote was 586 to 455.

Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt estimated there are possibly 4,000 electors in the district.

This is the second attempt in the last five months to pass a bond issue. The proposed issue would have financed building and equipping a new elementary school in Kewaskum and additions and equipment for the Kewaskum High School, the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools and Kewaskum Junior High.

When results of the referendum were announced during a meeting of the Board of Education Monday night, the members expressed their disappointment; but Clerk John Jadro said he was "disappointed but encouraged" in view of the fact that the bond issue was turned down by only 131 votes, whereas the April 6 referendum lost out two to one.

At the time of the first referendum, 2,041 voters turned out. "I am willing to try again," said Jadro.

Brenholt commented, "We must now sit down and take a look at any alternatives and pick out the best one."

Those mentioned were going into a split-shift program or the 45-15 year-round plan or to try again to have a referendum passed. Brenholt observed that "we will have to make a real close study," and stated he believes "we should try something second semester so the people can see how the alternatives work."

Under a year-round plan, students go to school for 45 days and then have 15 days off; and under the split-shift, Grades 7 through 9 might attend school in the morning, possibly from 7 a. m. and Grades 10 through 12 would attend a long afternoon session, or vice versa.

In board action, the request of Principal Edward Connors to attend the National Conference of the Association of Secondary School Principals was granted at an approximate cost of \$255.

Permission was also granted for the six principals to attend the Minnesota School Facilities Conference on Individualized Instruction at an approximate cost of \$850.

Elementary Principal Richard Zarling explained a new kindergarten report card, which he described as an individual approach to reporting. The information on the card will become a permanent record, quarter by quarter, and it will be carried over to the student's succeeding school years' record.

The philosophy behind the new report card is to try to give parents a more complete picture of the total development of the child.

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GOP Legislators To Attend Annual Brat Fry Saturday

The leading Republican viewpoints on the state budget and tax redistribution will be well represented at the annual Washington County Republican Brat Fry this Saturday according to County GOP Chairman Ron Rodamer.

The Brat Fry, it was announced earlier, will be held on Sept. 18 at the Daalda Arabian Horse Farm, N120 W21671 Freistadt Road, Germantown. The event, which begins at 4:30 p. m., will feature an all-you-can-eat menu.

Representative Frederick Schroder informed Rodamer over the weekend that invitations to attend the Brat Fry have been accepted by Senator Ernest Keppler, Sheboygan, Senate Majority Leader; Senator Walter Hollander, Rosendale, Chairman of the Joint Committee on Finance and Chairman

of the Joint Conference Committee on the Budget; Senator Roger Murphy, Waukesha; and Representatives Herbert Schowalter (Cedarburg), F. J. Sensenbrenner (Shorewood), John Shabaz (New Berlin, Jon Guiles (Oshkosh), Kenneth Merkel (Brookfield), John Alberts (Waukesha) and William Schwefel (Oakfield).

"We are very enthused by this fine response on the part of Republican legislators who will be joining Congressman Bill Steiger and Madison Mayor William Dyke as our special guests," reported Rodamer. "Area citizens who are concerned about the effects of proposed tax redistribution plans upon Washington County will have an excellent opportunity to question first hand the men who are hammering out those proposals and to get an up-to-the minute report on the status of this legislation," he continued.

It was revealed last week that of the proposals presently under consideration, Washington County would experience the largest reduction in shared taxes under the so-called compromise plan authored by Senator Hollander. The original Senate Republican plan, which makes no changes in the existing redistribution formula, still has strong support among some Senate Republicans, thus making it apparent that the GOP Senators are not yet prepared to present a united front on the issue. Meanwhile, Madison Mayor William Dyke has proposed that the redistribution formula remain unchanged during this biennium while the legislature considers the development of a better plan and that a \$26 million emergency fund be established for "financially starved cities."

"Given these recent developments in Madison, we can expect some very lively and interesting discussions at the Brat Fry," Rodamer observed. "Everyone ought to be concerned about this matter, and we're going to provide our area residents a chance to learn more about it."

Co-chairmen of this year's Brat Fry are Helmuth Prahel and Dr. David Hoffmann, both of German-

town. Tickets are being sold by members of the GOP's executive committee and are priced at \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 12 years or younger. The Daalda Arabian Horse Farm, which is located between US 41 and STH 175 can be reached by using the STH 167 and Lannon Road exits from US 41.

mercy of God it was preserved so that we might continue to hear the saving Gospel of Christ and bear witness to it in a world in great need.

Fittingly, in addition to the celebration of the Holy Communion, the sacrament of Holy Baptism was administered to Eric, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ebert of Kewaskum, thereby including in one service what Lutherans refer to as the means of grace: God's Word and Sacraments. It is also interesting to note that the first infant to be baptized after the church was built 100 years ago was Mrs. William (Anna) Klabuhn who died in 1968 at the age of 97 years and was buried from this church.

The Children's Choir of St. John's Saturday School, under the direction of Mrs. Arthur Haupt, sang four anthems at appropriate places within the Ordinary of the Service. During the service a letter of congratulations was read from the Wisconsin State Historical Society in Madison. A citation from that society will be placed in the church at a future date. The society, in one of its publications, cites the church as one of the two best examples of fieldstone architecture in the State of Wisconsin.

Friends, former members and members of the congregation gathered in the parish hall for a pot-luck dinner following the service where everyone had the opportunity to visit with one another, with Pastor Carl Gutekunst, his wife, the former Verona Pieper of Dundee, and the other members of the Gutekunst family who once lived in this area during their father's pastorate at New Fane. The ladies serving at the pot-luck dinner were dressed in colorful peasant skirts and poke bonnets reminiscent of a century ago.

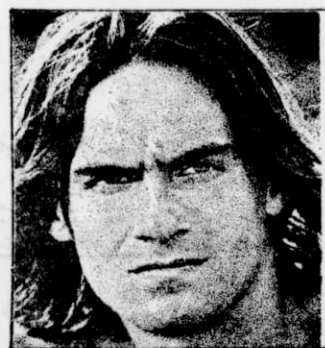

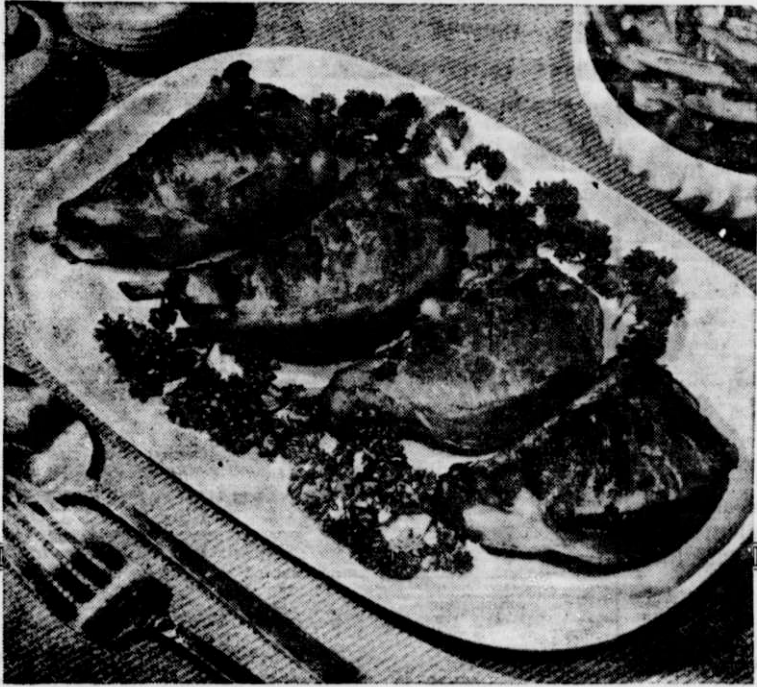

The school board of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, met at 8:00 p. m. on Monday, August 16, 1971, in executive session with all members present. Discussion on custodial salaries was held.

Mr. John Underwood explained the new breakdown on the annual debt service with the new building proposal.

Constitution Week Declared By Village President

The Constitution of the United States of America was adopted Sept. 17, 1787, ratified June 21, 1788, in effect March 4, 1789.

On Jan. 5, 1956 Senator William F. Knowland introduced the following Senate Joint Resolution 105:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, That the President of the United States is authorized and requested to designate the period beginning Sept. 17 and ending Sept. 23 of each year as Constitution Week, and to issue annually a proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe such week in schools, churches and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies and activities."

This Resolution was adopted July 23, 1956, and signed into law (Public Law No. 915), Aug. 2, 1956.

WHEREAS, Sept. 17, 1971, marks the one hundred eighty-fourth anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention; and

WHEREAS, To accord official recognition to this memorable anniversary, and to the patriotic exercise that will form a noteworthy feature of the occasion, seems fitting and proper; and

WHEREAS, Public Law No. 915 guarantees the issuing of a proclamation each year by the President of the United States of America designating Sept. 17 through 23 as Constitution Week,

NOW, THEREFORE, I Cyril N. Wietor by virtue of the authority vested in me as Village President of the Village of Kewaskum in the State of Wisconsin do hereby proclaim the week of Sept. 17 through 23, 1971, as

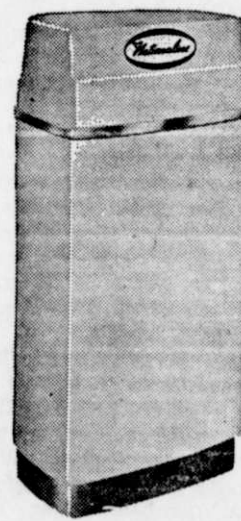
