the village adopted in July "is  
way out of line." Cost of such a  
permit is based on a rate of \$1.80  
per cubic foot of area plus addi-  
tional costs for electrical and  
plumbing outlets.

Noting that a permit will run a-  
round \$400, Honeck asked, "Don't  
you think that's high when you  
consider the building will come  
under state inspection and won't  
need village inspection? I, for one,  
am not going to pay it," he stated.

He was told that the village will  
be making more inspections than  
the state. Behnke, who worked on  
the code, said "We adopted it af-  
ter a model drawn up by the  
Southeastern Wisconsin Building  
Inspectors' Ass'n. It is similar to  
codes in other municipalities. The  
code is for the protection of both  
the village and property owners."

Honeck replied, "It is time we  
don't pattern ourselves after West  
Bend or any other place."

The board authorized purchase  
of a demonstrator model sewer  
rodder machine from the O'Brien  
Mfg. Co., Chicago, at a cost of  
\$3,825.50 to be paid in 20 monthly

payments. The village has been  
having to rent such a machine.

Martin reported that the village  
has applied for a job opening un-  
der the Emergency Employment  
Act of 1971 on which the federal  
government will pay up to 90 per  
cent but not more than \$7,178 of  
the employe's salary. The grant  
can apply to a step-up of a pre-  
sent employe and Robert Manthei  
was designated to attend school  
for sewage treatment training.

Hlavaty reported he had several  
complaints from persons driving in  
the west section of Kewaskum  
where children are walking to  
school in the road in areas where  
there are no sidewalks. The board  
agreed it should start a program  
whereby some sidewalk is laid ev-  
ery year.

A public hearing on applica-  
tions of Mike Coulter and Sylves-  
ter Keller for a liquor store to be  
located either at 355 Main St., or  
1208 Fond du Lac Ave. was set  
for 7 p. m. on Oct. 19.

Martin was granted permission  
to attend the League of Wisconsin

Green Bay Oct. 20-22. Peter Al-  
bers was given permission to at-  
tend a conference for sewage  
plant operators Oct. 13-15.

Building permits for two homes  
each for Embassy Construction,

struction were approved.

 ion. The friendly force was extracted from a makeshift landing zone. Warrant Officer Manthei laid devastating fire on confirmed enemy positions and opened a secure route which could be utilized by the lift ships. Three times he expended his munitions while encountering intense enemy fire before the lift started. During the insertion the first lift ship was shot down. Warrant Officer Manthei heroically escorted the stricken ship to the ground and laid protective fire around the downed crew members. He also helped coordinate the rescue mission. Observing an assault aircraft going down, he also provided suppressive fire for the damaged ship. He continued to attack and destroy enemy positions in the area throughout the operation. Through Warrant Officer Manthei's courage and determination the mission was a complete success. Warrant Officer Manthei's outstanding flying ability and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

Awarded: Distinguished Flying Cross (First Oak Leaf Cluster) (Posthumously)  
 Date of service: 21 March 1971  
 Theater: Republic of Vietnam  
 Reason: For heroism while participating in aerial flight evidenced by voluntary actions above and

beyond the call of duty; Warrant Officer Manthei distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions while serving as co-pilot and gunner aboard an assault helicopter which was providing air support for an Allied armored column in contact with a large enemy force. Warrant Officer Manthei placed devastating fire on three known anti-aircraft positions which caused them to divert their hostile fire toward his ship. With his wing ship expended of all ammunition, Warrant Officer Manthei continued to engage the enemy without protective air cover. On his final pass over the enemy troops, Warrant Officer Manthei encountered a barrage of hostile fire. His aircraft sustained numerous hits and he was severely wounded. Despite his injuries, he valiantly succeeded in controlling the damaged aircraft until it finally lost all power. Warrant Officer Manthei tried desperately to correct the stability of the

aircraft but his attempts failed. His devotion to duty and to mission accomplishment were exemplary. Warrant Officer Manthei's actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.

## Indians Rout Kettle Moraine, 39-14; Take Over Lead As Mayville Loses

**STRETCH WIN STREAK TO 10 AS GAFFKE SETS PACE**

The Kewaskum Indians continued on the warpath by scalping Kettle Moraine in their first conference home game Friday night, 39-14, before a very large Parents' Night crowd. By doing so Kewaskum took over undisputed first place as Slinger upset defending champion and previously unbeaten Mayville in a surprise, 14-0. The Indians, now 4-0 this season, also extended their winning streak to 10 straight.

Junior back Jim Gaffke again stole the show and was a one-man wrecking crew. Although he sat out much of the game because of the heat (it was a very warm night), Gaffke scored two touchdowns, one on an 82 yard kickoff return, intercepted a pass and gained 90 yards rushing on 13 carries. For good measure he also forced a fumble from his cornerback spot.

In smashing the Lasers, Coach Joe Harlow's team did it again, a highly regarded Kettle Moraine squad, which had lost to Mayville by just one point, 21-20, the week before.

The "big green" scored in every quarter. They piled up a total of 332 yards, most of them (274 yards) coming on rushing. They took the opening kickoff and with a series of first downs marched 75 yards for a score. Terry Backhaus carried it over from the 3.

In the second quarter the Lasers took a momentary lead when Gary Huebner ran 10 yards for the score and the kick by Barningham put them on top, 7-6. Then the "honeymoon was over." Seconds later Gaffke returned the kickoff 82 yards for a TD on a beautiful run.

After holding the Lasers, Kewaskum then marched 67 yards for another score as Jim Kern took it over from 5 yards out. He also ran for a 2-point conversion to make it 20-7 at halftime.

Gaffke's vicious tackle early in the second half caused Kettle Moraine to fumble. The Indians then drove 65 yards for another touchdown as Gaffke punched it over from the one. Early in the final quarter the Indians staged another 78 yard drive with Terry Backhaus hitting pay dirt from the 2. Now it was 32-7.

Then the losers sputtered to life again. Tim Cummings took Glen Eichstedt's long punt and returned it to Kewaskum's 27. Several plays later Jay Feeboth carried it in from the 7 and his kick brought it to 32-14. After giving up the TD the Indians fought back with a vengeance and shortly got the score back. A Dale Luedtke to Eichstedt pass for 22 yards capped the drive to another score and Tom Theusch's kick for extra point brought the final count to 39-14.

Coach Harlow lauded Gaffke for his stellar performance and Backhaus and Kern each had over 65 yards rushing. All combined offensive tackle, 230 pound Kim Rodenkirch, again opened some big holes for them and did excellent blocking.
