### Village Residents Can Expect Big Jump in Sewage Service Charges

LIQUOR STORE LICENSE ISSUED TO M. COULTER

Residents of the Village of Kewaskum, its industries and schools can expect a big jump in the sewage service charges they will pay effective Jan. 1, 1972.

Under a proposed new ordinance, the single family resident, flat or apartment user will pay a flat fee of \$14 per quarter. Presently, sewage service charges are based on the number of gallons of water used with a minimum charge of \$4 per quarter for the first 10,000 gallens of water used.

So for the householder who has been using less than 10,000 gallons, the new rate will result in a service charge 31/2 times larger than he is paying now.

The Village Board met in adjourned session Tuesday night to study the proposed rates. It is expected no action will be taken before December and the wage price freeze is not seen as a problem, it was stated.
