Village Residents Can Expect Big Jump in Sewage Service Charges

LIQUOR STORE LICENSE ISSUED TO M. COULTER

Residents of the Village of Kewaskum, its industries and schools can expect a big jump in the sewage service charges they will pay effective Jan. 1, 1972.

Under a proposed new ordinance, the single family resident, flat or apartment user will pay a flat fee of \$14 per quarter. Presently, sewage service charges are based on the number of gallons of water used with a minimum charge of \$4 per quarter for the first 10,000 gallons of water used.

So for the householder who has been using less than 10,000 gallons, the new rate will result in a service charge 3½ times larger than he is paying now.

The Village Board met in adjourned session Tuesday night to study the proposed rates. It is expected no action will be taken before December and the wage-price freeze is not seen as a problem, it was stated.

The proposed rates are the recommendation following a study made at the village's request by Dr. Raymond Kipp, professor of civil engineering at Marquette University, to guide the board in establishing equitable sewage charges to offset costs of additions and improvements currently being made to the village treatment plant, totaling about \$425,000. The expanded facility is expected to be ready Jan. 1.

In his study made earlier this year, Dr. Kipp analyzed the discharges from various local sources into the sewage treatment plant from a standpoint of volume, b.o.d. and suspended solids.

And he tried to project what it will cost the village to operate the expanded facility and what income must be generated to meet the projected operating costs. Dr. Kipp made his first report to the board in February.

He again appeared in May when industries and schools were invited. He said then that significant items in the increased operating costs include phosphorous removal, estimated at five cents per 1,000 gallons or \$18,000 yearly. Also, chlorination is estimated at \$24 per day or \$9,000 per year based on the plant's new designed value of one million gallons of sewage per day. The cost of power would probably double with more blowers being added.

Under the proposed rates, schools would be charged \$1 per pupil per quarter. Based on present enrollments, this would mean rates about six times more than they are now.

As of now, Regal Ware, Fairmont Foods and the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Co. pay sewage charges in amounts established in separate contracts with the village. Under the proposed plan, sewage would be metered and charges based on the amount that is discharged into the sanitary sewer.

The sewage treatment plant was built in 1954 at a cost of \$250,000. It has been operating in the red.

heard two applications for liquor store licenses during a public hearing in the municipal building Tuesday night. One was issued and one was tabled.

They agreed to issue a Class A combination license to Michael C. Coulter upon the surrender of one presently held by Francis N. Bohn and tabled the application of Sylvester W. Keller for further consideration.

Bohn presently operates a liquor store at 1217 Fond du Lac Ave. But the site on which it stands will be cleared soon of all buildings to make way for a new building to be occupied by the Bank of Kewaskum. Coulter will operate his store in the Koch building at 355 Main. His license will run from Nov. 1 until June 30, 1972.

Coulter resides temporarily on R 2, Kewaskum. He must move into the village within 90 days. He is a welder for Stolper Steel, Menomonee Falls. Keller would have operated his business at 1208 Fond du Lac Ave.

Of the two village residents who attended the hearing, Bohn was the only one to comment. He said he was in favor of granting a license to Coulter. The town isn't big enough for two, he said.

Presently, the village has no limitation on the number of such stores that may operate here but board members feel they should establish a policy stating how many licenses will be allowed in the village.

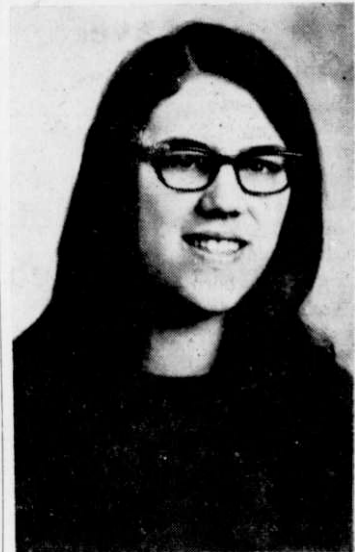
WM. KOEHL AUXILIARY TO MEET AT CEDAR LAKE HOME

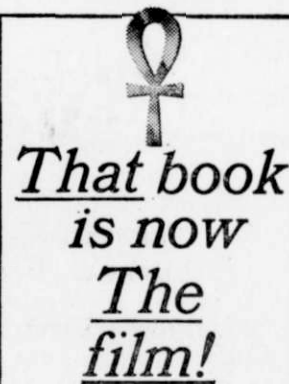

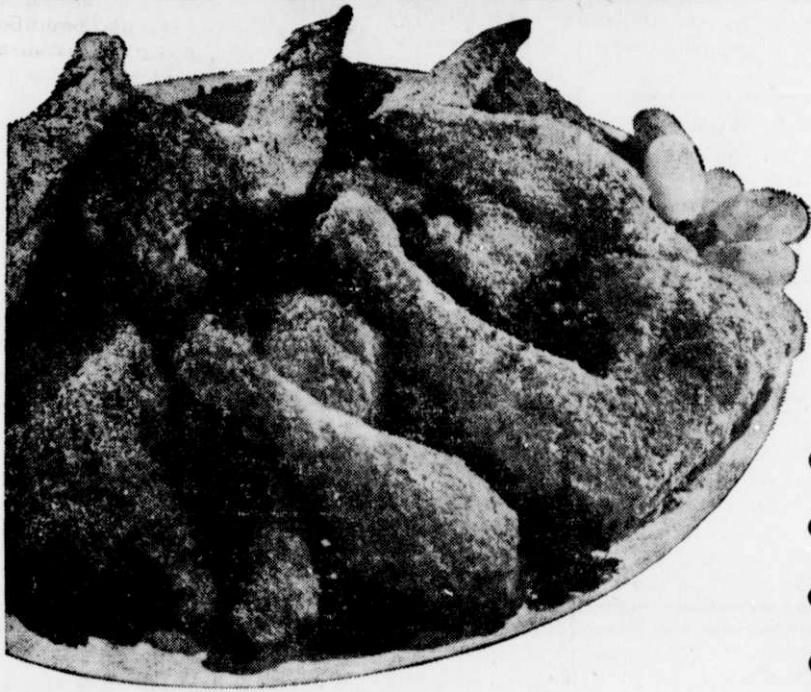

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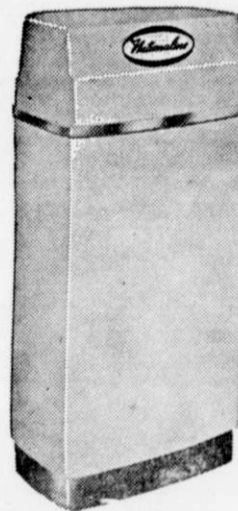
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Indians Beat Hartland Arrowhead, 14-8, to Retain Share of First Place

Kewaskum spoiled Hartland Arrowhead's homecoming Friday night by downing the Warhawks there, 14-8. The Indians took an early 14-0 lead and then relied on a strong defense to hold off Hartland the rest of the way.

The victory gave Kewaskum a 4-1 mark in the conference and retained their share of first place with Germantown, which was also victorious. Germantown's only defeat this season was at the hands of the Indians. Since then they have come on real strong and are rated about on an even par with Kewaskum. Mayville, which had also shared the lead, was surprised by an upstart Pewaukee team which tied them, 6-6, Saturday afternoon. This deadlock dropped the Cardinals out of a 3-way tie for first place, leaving them with a 3-1-1 mark.

All of the scoring at Hartland came in the first half, after which both defenses settled down to hold the opponents scoreless. Kewaskum drew first blood in the opening quarter following an interception by linebacker Gary Marx. He returned the ball 37 yards to Arrowhead's 23. From there the Indians succeeded in making a first down and a few plays later Terry Backhaus carried it into the end zone from the 4. Dale Luedtke, on a quarterback option, took it in for a 2-point conversion to make it 8-0.

The Indians got another march going in the second period and moved the ball 48 yards. Jeff Koth climaxed the drive by lunging it in from the 2. The conversion attempt failed and left the score at 14-0. At this point it appeared that Kewaskum was on its way to an easy win but the complexion of the game changed in a hurry. On the next kickoff John Dibb received the ball, swept across the field and zigzagged down the sideline to go all the way on an 84 yard run and score 6 points.

The Indians stopped the conversion attempt but were penalized and the Warhawks got another crack at it. This time Clark Vanden Heuvel crashed in for a 2-point and narrowed Kewaskum's lead to 14-8 at the half.

This ended the scoring for the night although both teams threatened in the second half. Kieroff and drove to Kewaskum's 22, where the Indian defense held. Then it

was the Indians turn and they marched to Arrowhead's 15, only to lose the ball on an interception.

Strong defensive play featured the final quarter, in which both teams were forced to punt the ball away, but Hartland was far from out of it. On one late punt their kicker got off a 65 yard boot which put Kewaskum in the hole. The Indians' receivers let the ball go and it bounced and rolled to the one-yard line. Kewaskum had their backs to the wall with only 2 or 3 minutes left in the game. They had to have ball control to keep Hartland from scoring. The Indians punched out 5 yards in 2 plays and with third and 5 Jim Gaffke came through with a 7 yard gain for the first down. This gave them time to run out the clock on the next series of plays.

Defensive ends Mitch Ogi and Jim Schmidt came up with some big plays which checked Hartland and forced them to punt. They came through with third down tackles to smear ball carriers behind the line of scrimmage.

Although the score was close, Kewaskum had it all over the Warhawks in the statistics. The Indians made 10 first downs to Hartland's 6. In total yards Kewaskum outgained their opponents, 176 to 60. On the ground the Indians led them, 145 yards to 60. In the air Hartland failed to complete a single pass while the winners gained 31 yards. The Indians completed 3 out of 7 while the losers had 0 for 5. Each team had two passes intercepted and Kewaskum lost the ball twice on fumbles which hurt.

Besides Kewaskum's win and the 6-6 tie between Mayville and Pewaukee, other Scenic results last weekend found Grafton shading Slinger, 15-12, and Germantown ripping Kettle Moraine, 34-6. Oddly Slinger, which upset the two top teams, Mayville and Kewaskum, in its previous games, lost to last place Grafton, which gained its first win. The Owls also lost their first two contests to weaker teams. It would seem they are up for the big ones and down for the others. Germantown again displayed a lot of power in rolling over a pretty good Kettle Moraine

squad.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians entertained the Indians homecoming game at 7:30. The pesky Pirates tied Mayville last week and could provide a stumbling block in Kewaskum's quest for the championship. But we don't go along with that. In another big game which will have a definite bearing on the title, Germantown (4-1) plays at Mayville (3-1-1). Figuring a Kewaskum victory, if Germantown wins they will remain in a tie with the Indians and if Mayville wins they will be a half game behind Kewaskum as the result of a tie and the Indians will hold undisputed first place. But first KHS must win.
