## Bank Purchases Two Properties As Site for New Bank Building

ACQUISITION INCLUDES TWO HOMES, STORE CONTAINING 52,600 SQUARE FEET OF LAND

The Bank of Kewaskum this week officially informed the Statesman of their purchase of two parcels of land in the village as a site for a new bank building.

The acquisition consists of the Francis Bohn property, including a large home and the Kewaskum Liquor Mart building at 1217 Fond du Lac Ave. and the adjoining Ervin Wanke property and large home at 1205 Fond du Lac Ave. These homes are the original D. M. Rosenheimer and John Klessig properties.

The present facilities of the Bank of Kewaskum have been outgrown and are such that there is no room for expansion. Their present lot on Main St. provides approximately 4,600 square feet while the new acquisition contains approximately 52,600 square feet or about two-thirds of a city block with frontage and access on the north, south and east sides of the property.

The new area will allow for more than ample parking and every effort will be made to save as many of the beautiful trees as possible that adorn the property.

While there are no plans drawn as of this date, the bank expects to break ground next spring. Plans for the new building and the removal or razing of the present buildings are presently being discussed.

Plans for the new building will be announced in the near future.

### SEVERAL BOARD MEMBERS ATTEND MEETING ON YEAR ROUND SCHOOL PROGRAM

On a questionnaire mailed out by the Kewaskum Community Schools District, the elector response early this week was about 75 per cent in favor of holding another referendum on a proposed package building plan.

Meeting Monday night, members of the board of education discussed the questionnaire, which was mailed to district electors following the Oct. 11 meeting of the board. The questionnaire inquired of the elector if he favored a package plan, a plan excluding an addition at the Wayne School, a plan excluding an addition at Farmington School, or no building project at all.

Today (Friday) is the deadline for returning the questionnaires. Up to Monday's meeting about 10 per cent or 400 electors had expressed their opinions, according to Supt. of Schools Floyd Brenholt.

The important thing is that the board is receiving an indication of what the electors want. The board will meet in special session at 7:30 p. m. Monday to discuss the results of the questionnaire and the setting up of the referendum.

Brenholt said that if another referendum is to be held, the board would like to set it up as soon as possible. He had reported at the Oct. 11 meeting that the architect's estimate the \$2,605,000 project turned down in the last referendum Sept. 13 will have increased by about two per cent, or to \$2,660,000 by December.

A proposed plan without the addition at Farmington would cost \$2,455,000, and a plan excluding the Farmington and Wayne additions would cost \$2,230,000.

Board members discussed a meeting attended by some members of the board in Waukesha recently regarding the year-round school program. Supt. Brenholt and board members Gerald Secor, Thomas Gundrum, Richard Edwards and John Jadro attended the meeting. At the Waukesha meeting a representative of the Valley View School at Lockport, Ill. spoke to educators attending.

The Valley View School is one of the few schools experimenting with the year-round program in the Midwest. The school utilizes a 45-15 approach to the year-round program, in which a student goes to school for 45 days and then has 15 days off.

Brenholt said that the biggest problem with the 45-15 year-round program is that it has not been attempted at the high school level

**The Chief Sez:**

A reminder that Nov. 1 our  
winter parking ordinance goes in-  
to effect.

Section 9.30 (1) of the village  
code restricts winter parking. No  
person shall park a private vehicle  
on a public street or highway in  
the Village of Kewaskum from  
November 1st to April 1st be-  
tween the hours of 11:00 o'clock  
P.M. and 6:00 o'clock A.M., unless  
such person parks the vehicle in  
accordance with the following sub-  
sections:

(a) On the even numbered side  
of the street or highway on those  
dates which bear an even calen-  
dar date at 11:00 P.M.

(b) On the odd numbered side of  
the street or highway on those  
dates which bear an odd calendar  
date at 11:00 P.M.

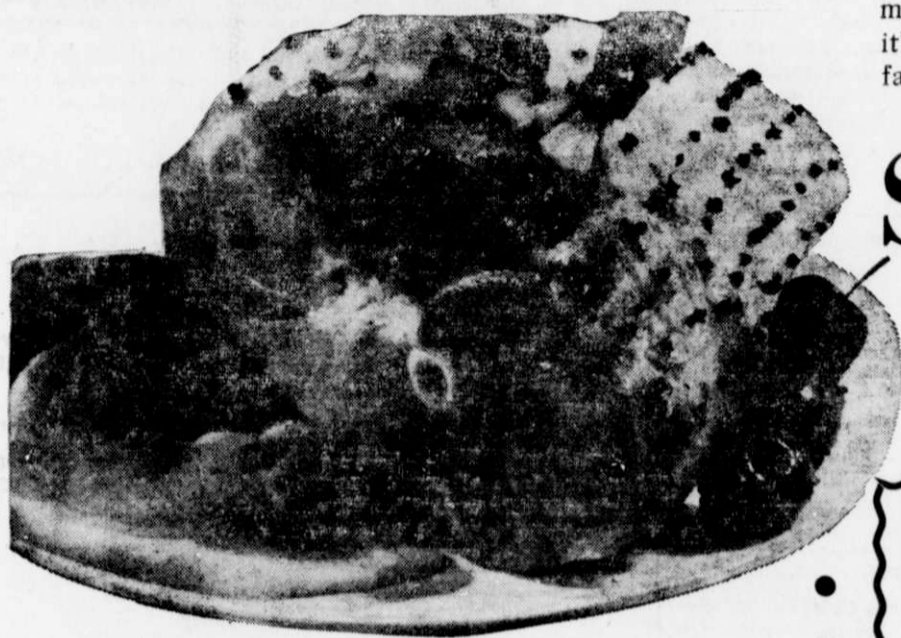

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## Indians Rout Pewaukee to Grab Lead; Host Mayville for Title Tonight

TAKE UNDISPUTED FIRST AS GERMANTOWN LOSES

In their homecoming game Friday night, the inspired and title hungry Kewaskum Indians easily ran over Pewaukee, 27-0, to take over undisputed first place in the Scenic conference. This happened as Mayville knocked off Germantown, which had been tied for the lead with the Indians. Kewaskum has been a title contender for the past 3 years.

Kewaskum and Germantown both went into Friday's games with identical 4-1 records while Mayville was a half game behind with 3½-1½ as the result of a tie with Pewaukee the week before (the same team Kewaskum handled 27-0). Following the Indians in first place (5-1), Mayville moved into second with 4½-1½ by beating Germantown, now 4-2.

The Kewaskum offense and defense put it all together against Pewaukee and came up with one of their best games. They made few, if any mistakes, and had only one turnover on a fumble, in shutting out the Pirates. At the same time they took advantage of four Pewaukee turnovers, two on fumbles and two on interceptions. It was the second week in a row that the tough Indian defense held opponents to less than 100 yards with no pass completions.

Kewaskum rushed for 197 yards to maintain their lead in the conference, and passed for 123 yards for a total of 320 yards, while the defense, also No. 1 in the conference, held Pewaukee to 82 total yards. The Pirates failed to complete a pass in 8 tries, while Dale Luedtke completed 6 of 23 for the winners. Kewaskum made 11 first down to the Pirates' 6.

On the offensive unit, Jim Gaffke again was the star. He did everything but sell popcorn, lead the band and cheerleaders. Gaffke scored two touchdowns on runs of 4 and 46 yards and gained well over 100 yards, exactly 134 in 20 carries. He also stood out on defense, causing a fumble and making 3 tackles, besides assisting in 9 others.

Kewaskum got off to a bad start by fumbling the opening kickoff, with Pewaukee recovering on the Indian 18. The Pirates moved the ball for a first down on Kewaskum's 6 and it looked like a quick score. They got to the 4 where the defense caused a fumble with Gaffke recovering. The Indians took over but with a 5 yard penalty called against them were forced to punt. Pewaukee took Glen Eichstedt's punt on their own 36 and on the first play

fumbled with Indians' Jim Schmidt recovering on the 34.

Kewaskum marched for first downs, one on a pass to Tom Theusch, and scored on a fourth down pass from Luedtke to Jeff Koth. The run for conversion failed and it was 6-0 at the quarter.

The Indians proceeded to score twice more in the second period. After a 54 yard drive, Gaffke scored from the 4 and again the conversion failed. Shortly before halftime Luedtke passed to Eichstedt for another TD. This time Luedtke's pass to Koth was good for a 2 point conversion and the Indians went into the dressing room with a cozy 20-0 lead.

Pewaukee came out in the second half with a sudden head of steam. They took Kewaskum's kickoff on their own 30 and marched for 4 straight first downs, to the 47, 37, 27 and 10 before being halted. After being smeared for a 13 yard loss and 2 passes fell incomplete, they were forced to give up the football. The Indians then got on the scoreboard again in the final quarter on Gaffke's 46 yard run into the end zone. Jim Kern's extra kick was good to make it 27-0 and homecoming fans happy.

The entire defensive unit played well for Kewaskum and on offense, together with Gaffke, Luedtke, Koth and Kim Rodenkirch played a good game.

In the two other Scenic contests played Saturday, Kettle Moraine bested Slinger, 20-6, and Hartland shaded Grafton, 7-6.

Besides Mayville here, other games this Friday are Grafton at Pewaukee and Kettle Moraine at Hartland. Saturday at 1:30 Slinger winds up at Germantown.

The whole season and championship are wrapped up in Kewaskum's final game tonight, in

which they host Mayville's defending champs in the big one. Kewaskum is 5-1 and Mayville 4-1 and the winner takes all the marbles. In case of a tie the title goes to the Indians. Kewaskum, "always a bridesmaid but never a bride," hopes to wrest the title from Mayville while the Cardinals want to keep it. What a climax to a grand season. It should be a dandy and draw a great crowd. The Indians only loss last year (6-1) was in the opener to Mayville. The Cardinals are big and the Indians quicker, leading the conference in offense as well as in many defensive categories. Mistakes or turnovers could decide the outcome.

### Pheasant Season To Open Saturday

53,000 ROOSTERS WILL BE RELEASED BY DNR

The pheasant season opens Saturday, Oct. 30 at noon and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will stock 25,000 ring-necks on public hunting grounds prior to the opening.

Norbert Damaske, DNR chief of shooting preserves and game farms, announced that a total of 53,000 roosters will be released which is the highest number yet for Wisconsin, with the 25,000 to be released before Oct. 30 and the balance at various times throughout the season.

The main reason given for the public hunting ground stocking program operated by DNR is to give people a chance to hunt without increasing pressure on private land.

In addition, 146 sportsmen's clubs, mostly in southern Wisconsin, were given day old chicks to raise and will be releasing an additional 95,000 roosters on private lands that are open to hunting.

This year some of the birds being stocked from the game farm at Poynette will be first generation of wild birds that were trapped in order to preserve wild bloodlines.

Hunting conditions should be good on the 130 public grounds receiving birds in the southern half of the state. The late opening has

enabled farmers to harvest their corn and soybean crop, providing less cover for the ring-necks and easier walking for the hunter.

Several research projects are being conducted with banded birds and hunters are asked to return the bands to DNR.

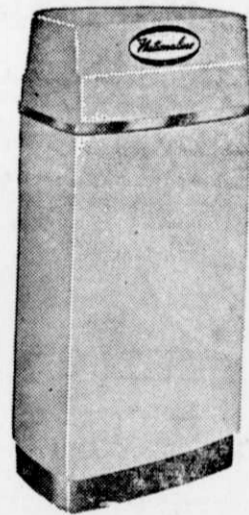
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### Bewitching Brew
